

Even if they were noving at speeds beyond radar's abiliing at speeds beyond radar's ability to track, they could be photographed if they were naterial. We are reasonably well convinced they are not naterial, solid object."

Then came the clinker in Ramey's statement: "About 20% of the reports in the AF hands remain to be exampled." The Air Force is attempt. plained." The Air Force is attempt ing now to make fast explanations, he said in answer to a query whether the Air Force was trying to dispel 'hystoria'. "I can say definitely they are not our own," he said. In answer to a query as to whether, if the saucer reports do not originate from anything made in the US or Russic, could they be from another world, he said: "I still believe they are some phenomena that is not easily explained." A fairly good job of evading the important issues, we would say. General Ramey only admits that they do have facts they do not want to or are afraid to divulge.
