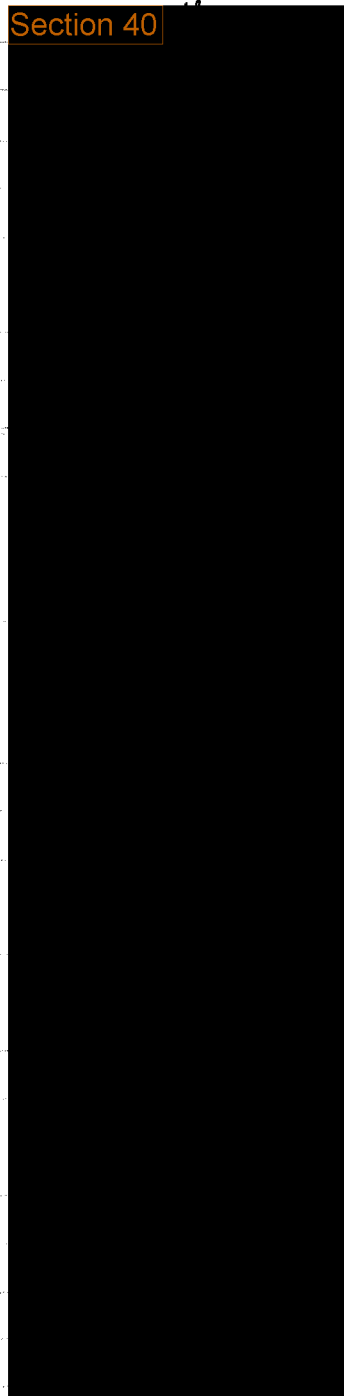

Thank you for your letter regarding the lights which I saw in the sky. They were reported because they were so different to those of aircraft with which I am very familiar.

As an ex-naval pilot, of both fixed wing and rotary wing aircraft, I know how aircraft lights normally appear. I am also used to looking at the sky and to determining the oddities which occur fairly frequently, usually whilst walking our dog.

Naturally being out of touch with current military operations the lights could have been to do with an operation taking place. The lights were reported to enable such normal event to be excluded.

The lights seen were very different to both aircraft strobe lights or navigation lights both in intensity and colour. The group flashing nature of the lights could have been caused by an aircraft rocking its wings and thus obscuring the light from my vision; such would have had to have occurred three times regularly to achieve the effect seen by me.

I saw, in the constellation of Cassiopeia, three separate group flashing lights of very high intensity (similar to photo flood lights) and small size. The lights were Group Flashing (2) with a period of about 15 seconds and appeared to move from a position abeam Schedar and one finger to the left towards the north. Cassiopeia was bright and clear and the lights were considerably brighter than Schedar. There were no aircraft lights visible in the area at the time and no aircraft sounds. The gap between the lights was approximately one and a half finger's widths and about 15 seconds in time. The initial sighting was much brighter than the third and last.

Whilst I would not wish to associate the lights seen with anything untoward they were very unlike any other lights I have seen in the sky.

The Ministry of Defence has never denied that UFO reports are passed to other branches in the Ministry; specialist staffs do look at reports to make sure that what has been reported is not of any defence significance. This examination of UFO reports is quite routine, and in no way substantiates any of the more exotic stories that circulate about secret government work on the subject. Given that Section 40 has said that he is not prepared to reveal his sources, I suspect there is no way that you will be able to resolve the matter. As I said in my previous letter to you, the Ministry of Defence is not prepared to enter into debates about such stories.

I enclose a copy of a letter I received off Section 40. I have also Section 40 included a copy of part of the Official Secrets Act. As you can see Section 40 tells me the name of his informant Section 40 of AS2, who informed him that work is going on behind the scenes on UFOs and that the Defence Intelligence Staff is involved in secret UFO investigations. When I received this letter I obtained a copy of the Official Secrets Act to see if Section 40 was in breach of that act, it turns out that I am almost correct. Under the act it states 'Doing an act as a result of which the communication of Section 40 official secrets is possible, even if not possible is an offence' Section 40 claimed that Section 40 told him that work is going on behind the scenes and that the Defence Intelligence Staff is involved in secret UFO investigations, as you can see this statement breaks the act for it contains information which is useful to the press and investigators like me. However as I stated earlier I am almost correct, if Section 40 was authorised to make that statement by the MoD then he has committed no crime, the MoD however has to be able to produce a document signed by the persons involved who authorised that statement and Section 40 stating the information above and the reasons behind the statement. Also they must give a reason why they did not reveal their information to the press, before Section 40. If the Ministry of Defence cannot release the information required then action will be either with the backing of a national newspaper or through the courts. It is with great regret that I have to inform you of my intentions but since this case began the MoD has been reluctant to give me answers to key questions that I have asked them and have also rejected a repeated request of a meeting. I conclude that if the MoD and Section 40 cannot come up with evidence to support the above theories then the evidence that I have come across in this case, then it surely points to a conspiracy. I suggest you study the evidence that you see before you and get back to me a.s.a.p.

Thank you for your recent letter (undated).

With regard to your queries, most of what I know is published in my books *Above Top Secret* and *Alien Liaison*, including my findings on secret work done 'behind the scenes'. I was indeed informed by an MoD spokesman Section 40 of AS2) in 1986 that some UFO reports are passed to a branch of the Defence Intelligence Staff, namely DI55 in at least one case (see *Above Top Secret*). Should it ever be necessary, I could prove this very easily. In the meantime, I am enclosing an MoD document, one of several in my possession, which prove that DI55 is (or was) on the distribution list for UFO sighting reports given to the MoD (probably as a matter of routine procedure). Naturally, any research done by the Defence Intelligence Staff is classified, so it is pointless hammering away at the Ministry.

I don't know where you got the notion that 'one of Section 40 Section 40 staff' told me about secret UFO files in Room 801. That information was published in *Reynolds News*, and additional information was supplied to me by Gordon Creighton, a former intelligence officer, who never dealt with the subject in his work. (For further details, read both my books.)

The additional information you cite about RAF intelligence research was given to me as described in both books, and I stand by it. I have no intention of betraying my sources. I very much doubt that Section 40 is lying: he may well be unaware of the extent of involvement. Further, I know of no incidents where the MoD has threatened witnesses with violence, nor do I believe that they would do so.

Britain, Northern Ireland or the United Kingdom, if he is satisfied that the person is or has been concerned 'in the commission, preparation or instigation of acts of terrorism'. The order expires three years after the day on which it was made: Sch. 2, s. 3(1)(2).

(e) Under s. 14 a constable may arrest without warrant any person whom he reasonably suspects to be guilty of certain offences under the Act, or of being concerned in acts of terrorism (including international terrorism) or of being subject to an exclusion order. The person arrested may not be detained for more than forty-eight hours in right of the arrest, but the Home Secretary may extend this for further periods of up to five days. See *R. v. Governor of Durham Prison, ex p. Carlsle* (1979).

(f) Note that under the Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984, s. 116 (5), as amended, an offence, or an attempt or conspiracy to commit any such offence, under the Prevention of Terrorism (Temporary Provisions) Act 1989, is a 'serious arrestable offence'.

14. Suppression of Terrorism Act 1978

Under this Act, certain types of offence are not to be regarded as of a political character, but extradition (with which the Act is concerned) may be refused where it is requested so as to punish an offender on grounds of race, religion, political opinions, etc. The offences include, for example, murder, manslaughter or culpable homicide, rape, kidnapping, assault occasioning actual bodily harm, offences under the Explosive Substances Act 1833, ss. 2, 3, offences under the Offences against the Person Act 1861, ss. 18, 20-24, 28-30, 48, 55, or attempts to commit any of these offences, and torture (added by the Criminal Justice Act 1988, s. 22).

15. Internationally Protected Persons Act 1978

Sections 1-4 concern offences relating to attacks and threats of attacks involving 'protected persons' and make some offences under s. 1 extradition crimes. 'Protected persons' include Head of State, Head of Government or Minister for Foreign Affairs, who is outside the territory of the state in which he holds office, persons representing a state or international organisation of an inter-governmental character, members of the family of those mentioned above.

Official secrets

16. General purpose of the legislation

The general purpose of the legislation discussed under 17-22 is to guard the safety and interests of the State against enemies; the term 'enemy' includes a potential enemy: see *R. v. Parrott* (1913).

17. Official Secrets Act 1911, s. 1(1)

It is an offence if any person, for any purpose prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State:

- (a) approaches, inspects, passes over or is in the neighbourhood of, or enters, any prohibited place within the Act, or
- (b) makes any sketch, plan, model or note calculated or intended to be useful to an enemy, or
- (c) obtains, collects, records, publishes or communicates to any other person any secret official code word or pass word or any sketch, etc. or other information calculated or intended to be useful to an enemy.

18. The mischief aimed at by s. 1

In *Chandler v. DPP* (1964), the accused persons, members of an organisation committed to nuclear disarmament, entered a prohibited place (an airfield), and admitted that, in doing so, they had intended to impede its functioning. They contended that they had not the necessary intention under s. 1, since their ultimate object was to benefit the State. They were convicted under s. 1, and their appeal dismissed. It was held by the House of Lords that:

- (a) the mischief aimed at by s. 1 is not limited to espionage, but includes sabotage. 'The saboteur just as much as the spy in the ordinary sense is contemplated as an offender under the Act': per Lord Radcliffe;
- (b) if a person enters a prohibited place in order to cause obstruction and interference which is prejudicial to the defence dispositions of the country, an offence under s. 1 is committed, and the ultimate objects of that person are of no relevance; and
- (c) the Crown's defence policy cannot be challenged in the courts.

19. Communication with foreign agents

In proceedings against a person for an offence under s. 1 of the 1911 Act, the fact that he has been in communication with a foreign agent, or attempted to communicate, within or without the UK, is evidence that he has obtained or attempted to obtain information calculated or intended to be useful to any enemy for a purpose prejudicial to the safety of the State. The term 'foreign agent' includes a person who is or has been or is reasonably suspected of being or having been employed by a foreign power either directly or indirectly for the purpose of committing an act prejudicial to the safety or interests of the State: *see* the 1920 Act, s. 2(2)(b).

NOTE: Doing an act as a result of which the communication of official secrets is possible, even if not probable, is an offence *see R. v. Bingham* (1973). *See also R. v. Schulze and Schulze* (1988).

20. Official Secrets Act 1920, ss. 1, 3, 7

It is an offence to make an unauthorised use of uniform or to make a false statement to gain admission to a prohibited place. It is an offence for any person who, in the vicinity of a prohibited place, interferes with the police or members of the Forces who are on guard. By s. 7, any attempt to commit an offence under the Acts of 1911 and 1920, or to solicit or incite or endeavour to persuade another to commit such an offence, is an offence, punishable as if the offence had been committed.

21. Official Secrets Act 1989: the background

The 1989 Act repeals and replaces the 1911 Act, s. 2, which had been criticised for its ambiguous and 'catch-all' nature. (*See* e.g. the Franks Report (Cmnd 5104 (1972)).) For cases under s. 2, *see* e.g. *R. v. Pouting* (1985); *R. v. Gavin* (1987). The 1989 Act arose from Cm. 408 (1978) which, included, significantly, a rejection of suggestions for a general defence that a disclosure of information was in the public interest. The 1989 Act introduces defined categories of official information, the unauthorised disclosure of which will be an offence. (*See* also the Official Secrets Act 1989 (Prescription) Order 1990 (SI 1990/200).)

22. The 1989 Act

The following matters should be noted.

- (a) *Security and intelligence.* It is an offence for a member and former member of the security services to disclose, without lawful authority, any information, document or other article relating to security and intelligence which is or has been in his possession by virtue of his position as a member of those services: s. 1(1). 'Disclose' includes parting with possession of a document: s. 13(1). (For the statutory basis of the security service, *see* Security Service Act 1989, s. 1.) It is an offence for a person who is or has been a Crown Servant or government contractor to disclose without lawful authority, information which might cause damage to the security and intelligence services: s. 1(3).
- (b) *Defence.* It is an offence for one who is or has been a Crown servant or government contractor, to make a damaging disclosure of any information, document or other article relating to defence: s. 2(1).
- (c) *International relations.* It is an offence for an existing or former Crown servant or government contractor to make a damaging disclosure of information relating to international relations: s. 3(1).
- (d) *Crime and special investigation.* It is an offence for an existing or former Crown servant or government contractor to disclose information which results in the commission of an offence, or facilitates an escape from legal custody or impedes the prevention or detection of an offence: s. 4.
- (e) *Information resulting from unauthorised disclosures.* It is an offence to disclose unlawfully information of this nature: s. 5. (For definition of 'unauthorised disclosure', *see* s. 7.)
- (f) *Information entrusted in confidence to other States or international organisations.* It is an offence to disclose unlawfully information of this nature: s. 6(1)(2). No offence is committed if the State or organisation has previously published the information: s. 6(3).
- (g) *Safeguarding of information.* It is an offence for a Crown servant or government contractor to retain any document or article contrary to his official duty, or to fail to comply with an official direction for its return or to fail to take care to prevent unauthorised disclosure: s. 8(1).

Thank you for your recent letter.

In answer to your first question, we have no intention of taking any action against Section 40 because he has not divulged any classified information; he has simply made statements about his own beliefs, and repeated stories that he has been told about UFOs. No Ministry of Defence spokesperson has passed any classified information to Section 40 or any other ufologist.

In answer to your second question, I am saying that none of the allegations made about secret government studies into UFOs are correct. As I have said before, we are not aware of any evidence that would support the existence of extraterrestrial spacecraft.

As far as your final point is concerned, I am afraid that we are not prepared to get involved in debates to determine whether UFO information is genuine or has been hoaxed; given our very limited role in the subject this is something that ufologists will have to sort out for themselves. As far as we are concerned, we have no objections to Section 40 or anyone else saying whatever they like about UFOs - even if we do not agree with what is said!

When we spoke yesterday I promised to let you have a note setting out the position with regard to the release of UFO material from the early Sixties.

As I explained, a file can only be released when its most recent enclosure is 30 years old. Although records for 1962 have been kept, they are not available for release because they are in files which also contain material from later years. I suspect that in the early Sixties there were simply not enough reports or enquiries to justify a separate file being opened each year, and that files were kept open until they became too bulky.

Our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

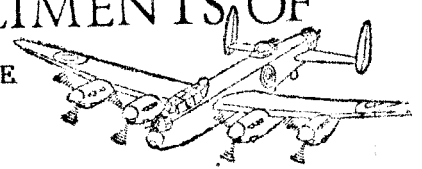

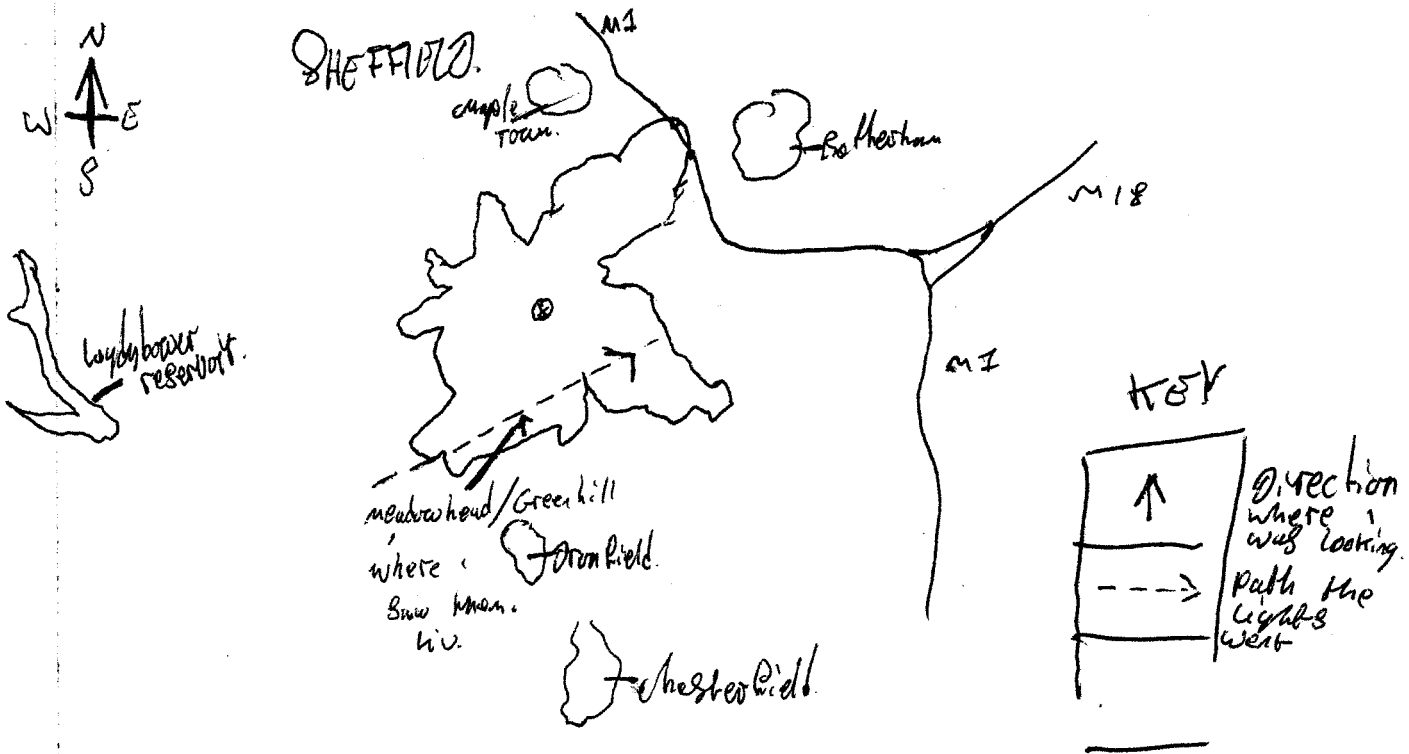
At about 9.00 pm I heard a strange noise coming from outside my window. As I opened my window the noise sounded just like a rather fast jet aircraft in the distance.

Thank you for your recent letter in which you asked for some information about UFOs, to assist you with the project that you are doing. I am not sure how widely you intend to cover this subject, so I will set out as much information as I can on the policy and views of the Ministry of Defence, and include other material that may be of use to you.

Although the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings, our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do - and this has not been the case so far - we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Given this limited involvement with the subject, the Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, nor are there any staff employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive, which are usually limited to very brief details of what was seen, are passed to staff in departments concerned with the air defence of the United Kingdom, who examine them as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that appear to defy explanation, and we hold no definitive view on these.



The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although a small number of files survived, and may be viewed at the Public Record Office. The files we hold in this office go back to about 1985, so we are able to answer specific queries that people have about particular sightings which have occurred in recent years, and can let them know whether we have a report on the incident, and if so, what it contains. Most of the reports that we have are relatively unexciting, and refer to little more than a vague shape or light in the sky, as opposed to the more exotic "close encounter" reports that are sometimes written about. I have attached for your information a copy of the form that we use to record UFO reports.

You may be interested to know the numbers of UFO sightings reported to the Ministry of Defence in recent years, so I have attached some figures that you may find useful.

A number of last year's reports were almost certainly sightings of an airship - illuminated from the inside - which was flying over London a lot during February and March. I saw this myself, and can understand how, from a distance, this generated reports of a bright cigar-shaped UFO travelling slowly over London. I mention this as a useful example of how an explanation can often be found for an apparently quite exotic UFO report. Other reports were caused by lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds; such equipment is used increasingly in advertising and entertainment, especially at outdoor music festivals.

I do not know if you intend to mention crop circles, but if so, you will wish to know that the Ministry of Defence is not involved in any research or investigation into this phenomenon. If you are interested in this subject, then you may wish to contact the following organisation:

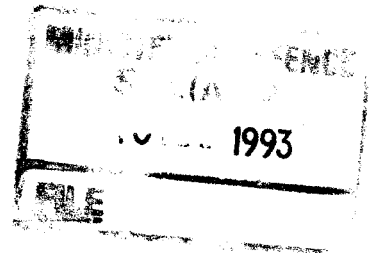

Thank you for your letter dated 2 March, in which you asked about access to our UFO files.

It was certainly the case that before 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed after five years. It is unfortunate if this caused any suspicion, because there was nothing unusual about this; it is standard policy with any MOD file not judged to be of public interest, because of the pressure on storage space. In 1967 there was a dramatic increase in the number of UFO sightings reported to the MOD (I have attached some figures that you may find interesting) and at this point it was felt that there was sufficient public interest in the subject to justify the permanent retention of UFO files. As you say, this should mean that the files from 1962 onwards have survived, and that they will be made available for public viewing, applying the "30 year rule". I suggest that you check with the Public Record Office, who will be able to tell you the definitive position on this. Their address is as follows: Public Record Office, Ruskin Avenue, Kew, Richmond, Surrey, TW9 4DV.

You will be interested to hear that it is now known that a few UFO files from the Fifties did survive the standard destruction procedures. The references, dates and titles of these files are as follows:

- AIR 16/1199. 1952. Flying Saucer Occurrences. Reports by Service personnel at Topcliffe Station, Thirsk and local public sector.
- AIR 20/20/7390. 1950-54. Unidentified Aircraft (Flying Objects) Reports.

- AIR 20/9321. 1957. Parliamentary Questions on UFOs.
- AIR 20/9322. 1957. Parliamentary Questions on UFOs.

- PREM 11/855. 1952. File from the Prime Minister's Office.



I think that all the titles, except the last, are self-explanatory; PREM 11/855 contains the famous memo from Winston Churchill, asking about UFOs, together with the response from the Air Ministry. All these files can be viewed at the Public Record Office. I wish you luck with your research into all our old files, although I suspect that their contents will be fairly mundane; if the sightings are like those reports made to us at present, they will consist almost exclusively of "lights in the sky" reports, rather than "close encounters".

You asked about current MOD policy on the UFO issue. Our only concern in looking at sightings is to judge whether there is any threat to the security and defence of the UK. Unless we judge that there is - and this has not been the case with any sighting reported to us so far - we do not investigate further, or make any attempt to investigate what was seen. We remain convinced that most sightings are generated by known objects or phenomena, although we accept that there will always be some sightings that appear to defy explanation.

We will always try to be as helpful as we can when dealing with enquiries about UFOs. We can answer queries about specific UFO sightings that have occurred recently, and can let you have a copy of any report we may have received (deleting details of the witness's name and address in the usual way). We will also do our best to answer any more general questions you may have on the UFO phenomenon.

I hope this is helpful, and has answered your questions. Please let me know if you have any further queries.

I have been in contact with two of your predecessors in the past, namely Section 40 and Section 40 on the subject of U.F.O.'s. They were both very helpful and forthcoming with the limited information they were allowed to give, but were not able to help me with my specific request, which is as follows.

I was informed that all the files in the Ministry of Defence relating to U.F.O.'s, up to the year 1962, were destroyed in order to relieve filing space. This has caused a considerable degree of suspicion over the years among those who believe there has been a cover-up on U.F.O. information by the Ministry. As you may know, this suspicion is shared by certain Members of Parliament.

I was, therefore, very pleased to learn that a decision was made in 1967 not to destroy any U.F.O. files after 1962. Section 40 pointed out that these would be subject to the Public Records Act, which means that they will remain closed for 30 years. As 31 years has now elapsed since these files were first kept, I assume the release of this important information must have been started and I will be most grateful if you can inform me how I can gain access to studying these very interesting documents.

Section 40 did inform me, in writing, that these U.F.O. reports are not classified but there is a certain confidentiality regarding the people who made the sightings. Obviously, I would not expect personal names and addresses to be released by the Ministry but only the contents of the sightings themselves.

As well as informing me how to obtain this information, please let me know the general Ministry of Defence policy on the U.F.O. issue at present. Many of us feel that this data should not be withheld, even for 30 years, and should be readily accessible to the public. This would seem to be in keeping with the current government policy of making as much information as possible available to citizens. Judging by recent speeches by both John Major and John Smith, we should be able to look forward to a new and sustained openness from the Ministry on the question of U.F.O.'s.

Incidentally, you may be interested to know that, according to opinion polls, a majority of British citizens believe in life on other planets and visitations by extra-terrestrial spacecraft. I am sure you will agree that U.F.O.'s were not sighted around the Earth purely for the purpose of being kept in files by government bodies.

Perhaps you can answer one other question of government policy for me on this subject also. Since Ministry of Defence spokesmen have often stated to the media that U.F.O.'s pose no threat to our national defence, why is it that U.F.O. reports are kept by the Ministry of Defence at all?

We are long-standing campaigners on the subject of U.F.O.'s and it is only fair to advise you that we will regard your reply to this letter as a statement of current government policy on the U.F.O. issue, which we may then choose to quote freely.

Thank you for your letter dated 24 February. The answers to your nine specific questions are as follows:

1. Yes.
2. We actually co-ordinate UFO reports. Radar returns may or may not be a feature of this, although in my time in this job (over a year now) they have not been.
3. Yes.
4. Yes, although you will wish to bear in mind the factors that I listed in the third paragraph of my letter dated 18 February.
5. Yes, although the only security angle to this question is the fact that we do not want to give out any information relating to the range and effectiveness of UK radar systems.
6. Yes.
7. No UFO sighting to date has been judged to present a threat to national security. We look at sightings on a case by case basis, and the situation is therefore kept under constant review.
8. Yes, with the exception of the files that I told you about in my last letter. The Public Records Act does not require files to be kept; it lays down the rules relating to public access to files that are kept. There was a wave of UFO sightings in 1967, and this led to increased public interest in the subject. I suspect that prior to 1967, due to the low level of interest in UFOs, it was felt that retaining these files was not justified.
9. Yes.

Finally, you mentioned Viscount Long's decision about releasing UFO reports. I have managed to track down the Hansard extract relating to the comments that Viscount Long made about UFO reports during questions raised in the House of Lords in 1982 - I apologise for the poor quality of the photocopy. The position



with regard to the files is as I described in my previous letter. We are able to respond to specific requests from individuals or UFO societies about particular UFO incidents (if we have the files in this office - ie files from approximately 1985 onwards) and to offer them such information as we have on these incidents.

I hope this is helpful, and has answered your questions.

Unidentified Flying Objects: Sightings

3.4 p.m.

The Earl of Clancarty: My Lords, I beg leave to ask the Question which stands in my name on the Order Paper.

The Question was as follows.

To ask Her Majesty's Government how many reports have been received by the Ministry of Defence on unidentified flying objects (UFOs) in each of the last four years, and what action has been taken in each case.

Viscount Long: My Lords, in 1978 there were 750 sightings; in 1979 there were 550 sightings, in 1980, 350 sightings; and in 1981, 600 sightings. All UFO reports are passed to operations staff who examine them solely for possible defence implications.

The Earl of Clancarty: My Lords, while thanking the noble Viscount for that Answer, may I ask him whether or not it is the case that over 2,000 authenticated UFO reports were published last year in the national press? If so, were they accepted or passed on to the Ministry of Defence? And what happened to them?

Viscount Long: My Lords, they did not all get to the Ministry of Defence. I have just informed your Lordships of the numbers sighted. If the noble Earl is suspicious that the Ministry of Defence is covering up in any way, I can assure him that there is no reason why we should cover up the figures which he has mentioned if they are true. The sole interest of the Ministry of Defence in UFO reports is to establish whether they reveal anything of defence interest—for example, a Russian aircraft or an unidentified aircraft—which might have breached our security systems. That is the sole reason why we are interested in the reports.

Lord Wynne-Jones: My Lords, does the Answer give any indication that since there has been a Conservative Government the UFOs have done a U-turn and departed?

Viscount Long: Not according to my reading, my Lords.

The Earl of Kimberley: My Lords, as my noble friend said that 600 UFOs had been officially reported or acknowledged by the Ministry of Defence in 1981, may I ask him how many of those sightings still remain unidentified and were not subject to security, or were Russian aeroplanes, or anything like that?

Viscount Long: My Lords, I do not have those figures. They disappeared into the unknown before we got them.

Lord Strabolgi: My Lords, may I ask the noble Viscount whether the present Government adhere to the view of the previous Government which I put forward when I replied to the debate three years ago in your Lordships' House, that most of these so-called sightings can be accounted for as natural phenomena?

Viscount Long: Yes, my Lords, they can be. Many of them are accounted for in one way or another, but nobody has got a really constructive answer for all of them.

Lord Hill-Norton: My Lords, may I ask the noble Viscount whether or not it is true that all the sighting reports received by the Ministry of Defence before 1962 were destroyed because they were deemed "to be of no interest"? And if it is true, who was it who decided that they were of no interest?

Viscount Long: My Lords, my reply to the noble and gallant Lord—I was wondering whether he was going to say that the Royal Navy had many times seen the Loch Ness monster—is that since 1967 all UFO reports have been preserved. Before that time, they were generally destroyed after five years.

Lord Paget of Northampton: My Lords, can the noble Viscount tell us whether, out of these thousands of sightings which he has mentioned there has been a single one which suggested any menace to our defences? In the circumstances, is not an awful lot of time being wasted on this nonsense?

Viscount Long: My Lords, I think Her Majesty's Government are waiting for an invitation from them to discuss these problems.

Thank you for your explanatory letter of the above date and the helpful information contained therein.

It would be of great assistance to me to summarising your previous correspondence, and I would ask for your confirmation of the following facts:-

- 1) That the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings; there were 147 such reports in 1992 of which there were a small percentage that would seem to defy explanation.
- 2) Although you co-ordinate unidentified radar returns, you do not have any figures on these.
- 3) There have been instances of ghost returns where blips have appeared on screens for short periods of time but it is easy for a skilled radar operator to distinguish between these and true readings.
- 4) That radar, as a general rule, behaves as a wavelength of light and will only provide a return from an object of some opacity.
- 5) You are not able to state, because of the time factor and for security reasons, whether the spate of UFO sightings over Northern Belgium in 1989/90 were detected by British radar.
- 6) On the subject of national security, the key consideration is evidence, without which a threat to national security cannot be judged to exist. Reports of lights or shapes in the sky cannot be classed as evidence, even if the sighting cannot be positively identified.
- 7) As Unidentified radar blips, unidentified objects, unidentified lights in the sky, cannot be classed as evidence, then there cannot possibly be a threat to national security.
- 8) Despite the Public Records Act which ensures that public records are protected for 30 years after their last use, all UFO files prior to 1967 were apparently destroyed.
- 9) Some files from the fifties apparently were not destroyed and seven of these are held at the Public Record Office at Kew.

As these above factors now confirm that these phenomena are NOT a matter of national security and are consequently NOT classified, could you please answer and comment on my enquiry, that a decision to release MOD files on UFO reports was made by Lord Long in 1982, but implementation of this was delayed by the Falklands war. This war has now been over for some years and I would enquire if it would now be possible for me to have access to any files that I would require from 1967 onwards?

Thank you for your letter dated 28 February.

You said that you were trying to find out whether there were any aircraft in the area around Evesham at the same time as the UFO sighting that you are investigating. I am afraid that this long after the event, it is simply not possible to be certain. Writing to nearby military bases would not help, because military aircraft do not confine their training to areas in the vicinity of their own base. If military aircraft were in the area at the time, they could have come from a number of bases all over the country. All I can tell you is that Evesham is certainly in an area where military aircraft do train on a fairly regular basis.

From looking at the details of the sighting I wonder whether the witness might have seen the glow from an aircraft's engine; this, as opposed to an aircraft light, might well appear orange. Furthermore, if the aircraft was some distance away, but travelling in a straight line, away from the witness, the effect may well have been as described in the newspaper. If the aircraft altered its position, however slightly, the glow would suddenly disappear.

The article also mentioned a blue light that had also been seen in the Evesham area. You may be interested to know that on 16 August last year a blue light was seen in the sky over a number of regions of the UK. It is believed that a fireball of some sort was involved.

Strange encounter of the orange kind in Evesham night

A MYSTERIOUS bright orange light flashed across the sky above Evesham on Sunday.

The UFO was spotted by Mr Victor Boynton, a technical operator from the BBC training centre at Wood Norton, at about 4.30pm.

"It was like a huge studio floodlight. There was a powerful orange glow in the sky for about 45 seconds and then it just disappeared, as though it had been switched off," he said.

Mr Boynton saw the light about a mile and a half outside Evesham as he drove towards the town on the main road from Broadway.

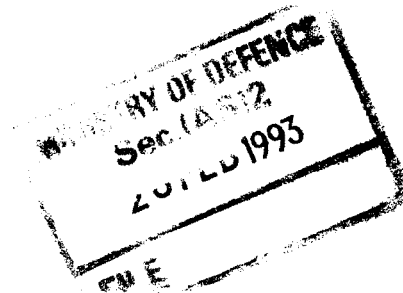

Thank you for your letter dated 21 February.

In answer to your question about national security, the key consideration is evidence, without which a threat to national security cannot be judged to exist. Reports of lights or shapes in the sky cannot be classed as evidence, even if the sighting cannot be positively identified. It is not our practice to name or give details of those individuals or departments involved in looking at UFO reports.

You mentioned sightings that took place at RAF Lakenheath-Bentwaters in 1956. I am unable to comment on the point you make because, while I recall reading about this in Timothy Good's book, "Above Top Secret" I am not aware of any official papers concerning this alleged incident. This ties in with your point about access to our UFO files; it was generally the case that before 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed. After this date, files were kept, but - like all government files - they are covered by the terms of the Public Records Act, and remain closed for 30 years after the last action. A few files from the Fifties did escape the destruction process, and are available for viewing at the following address: Public Record Office, Ruskin Avenue, Kew, Richmond, Surrey, TW9 4DV. The references of these surviving UFO files are as follows:

Thank you for your informative letter and various enclosures.

I appreciate and agree with your comments that the vast majority of UFO reports may be attributed to natural phenomena. I am however, interested in those that are not. I am pleased to note that you do have on record instances that appear to defy explanation.

I would appreciate a reply to my question(e) in my letter of the 7th. I would repeat this question; 'I am most interested in your comments on national security. As to date it would appear that there is a general admittance that although a phenomenon of some kind exists, nobody knows what it is (Your letter 1/2/93 'Clearly there are a small percentage of reports that seem to defy explanation') This being so, how can this phenomenon be assessed as to national security, when it is not known what it is?

I would like to add a further question on this point. Who and what department is it that on this matter would presume to issue dictates on matters of national security?

Your comment that 'There are certainly no instances where solid objects have been detected but not identified' I would draw your attention to the RAF Lakenheath-Bentwaters incident on the 13th and 14th of August 1956 which would seem to contradict your statement.

I would query your observation on whether the Belgian sightings were detected on UK radar. You say that it is not possible to say, this long after the sightings! These occurred less than three years ago and continued for a period of six months! They were witnessed by thousands, were recorded on Belgian radar, were shown by the media and were discussed in the Belgian parliament. I find it difficult to relate your comments to sightings of this magnitude.

Would you please give me your comments on the above queries and advise me if records of on-board radar returns on civil aircraft are recorded by any civil authority?

I have been advised that a decision to release MOD files on UFO reports was made by Viscount Long in 1982, but implementation of this was delayed by the Falklands war. This war has now been over for some years and I would enquire if it would now be possible for me to have access to any files that I would require?

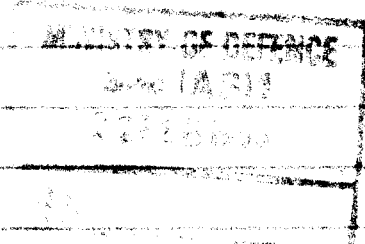

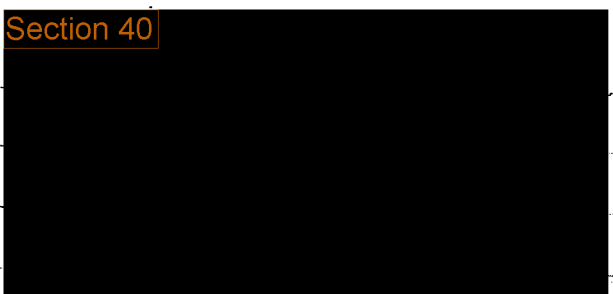

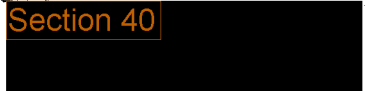

I have attached a few examples from our files, which should give you an indication of the sort of reports we get. Most of the reports we get do relate to little more than a light in the sky. Many of these reports would appear to have fairly simple explanations: sightings involving green and red flashing lights, for example, will almost certainly be attributable to aircraft lights. Even when a report would appear to defy explanation, it does not of course follow that what was seen was anything other than an ordinary object or phenomenon, perhaps seen from an unusual angle. It is simply that it is not possible to be certain what was seen. While all UFO reports are looked at, we do not attempt to investigate sightings in the absence of any evidence of a threat to the defence of the UK.

With regard to your second question in which you asked for examples of unidentified radar returns, I am not able to provide any data. There are certainly no instances where solid objects have been detected but not identified, although there have been instances of "ghost returns" where blips have appeared on screens for short periods of time. This phenomenon is known as Anomalous Propagation (ANAPROP). These blips can be caused by a number of factors: some result from changes in air density which can result in an object outside the usual range of the radar being seen. An aircraft, or even a natural feature such as a piece of coastline, can therefore produce a situation where a blip is seen which does not correlate with the position of an object. Clouds, under some circumstances, can also give a return, and on some occasions a return can be caused when two or more radar systems interfere with each other. Having said this, and in answer to your third question, it is easy for skilled operators to distinguish between these sort of returns, and the track made by a solid object such as an aircraft.

You asked whether the Belgian UFO sightings were detected on UK radar. It is not possible to say, this long after the sightings, whether or not anything was detected. Radar tapes are routinely wiped and re-used, and any tapes dating from the same time as the Belgian sightings will not have survived.



In response to your final question, the only point that I had made about security is that I did not want to get into any discussion about the range and capability of the UK's radar systems. There is certainly no national security angle to the UFO controversy, and I apologise if I have given this impression.



I hope this has clarified our position.

Thank you for your interesting reply to the four parts of my previous letter.

Whilst in the first instance I am particularly interested in actual unidentified Radar returns, your observation that you have some UFO reports that would seem to defy explanation are of great interest to me.

a) Would it be possible for me to obtain details of these?

As you apparently take appropriate action on any unidentified Radar return of potential significance,

b) would it be possible for you to quote/send me an example, of where an actual Radar return has not been identified and defies explanation?

We must agree to differ on my observation that Radar will only detect something of substance. As Radar is purely an ultra short radio wavelength of either an orbital or linear origination, it will behave in much the same way as any wavelength of light and will not reflect back from any object that is transparent-glass being an example. Other anomalies that could be construed as false signals is the scatter induced from inclined surfaces as with the stealth aircraft and false returns from other extraneous sources.

c) Would you agree that any normally proficient Radar operator could easily distinguish between a true return and a spurious one?

I feel that my question as to whether the Belgian phenomena were detected on our Radar is not really a matter of national security and purely a simple 'yes' or 'no' would suffice, particularly as Radar returns could have been registered by any civil aircraft in the near vicinity.

d) Do you have any further observation to add to this?

I am most interested in your comments on national security. As to date it would appear that there is a general admittance that although a phenomena of some kind exists, nobody knows what it is (Your letter 1/2/93 'Clearly there are a small percentage of reports that seem to defy explanation'.

e) This being so, how can this phenomenon be assessed as to national security, when it is not known what it is?

As it is important that I have true and accurate information for my book, whilst I am most appreciative for your kind consideration and prompt replies, I trust that you will not take offence if I feel that in order to attain these ends I must pursue these points through the Minister and my local member of parliament.

Thank you for your recent letter to the Secretary of State for Defence. I have been asked to reply. The answers to your questions are as follows:

With regard to the existence of UFOs, there are clearly many strange things to be seen in the sky, and some do remain unidentified. Having said this, we are not aware of any evidence that would support the existence of extraterrestrial life, or suggest that alien spacecraft have visited the earth. Most UFO sightings can be attributed to the mis-identification of known objects and phenomena, such as satellites, aircraft lights and meteorites.

We are not aware of any evidence supporting the stories about aliens and crashed spacecraft. As you may be aware, a mythology has grown up around the UFO phenomenon, and there are a number of strange stories in circulation, unsupported by any hard evidence.

There has never been any form of communication from extraterrestrials.

With regard to story about the "Secret of Fatima", I am not aware of any interest or knowledge at official level. This is not a matter for the Ministry of Defence, and I suspect that any questions about this should be put to the Church.

I hope this is helpful, and I wish you luck with your article. I am returning your SAE as we have our own mailing arrangements.

Thank you for your letter dated 6 February in which you asked about two UFO sightings near Blackpool.

You will doubtless be pleased to hear that we have received a report that would seem to tie in with the sightings that you mention. It may be that this is actually the same report that you have for 21 November, but the witness in this case is female, and the time was given as 2.30 am, not 2.45 am. The report was forwarded to us by Air Traffic Control at Manchester Airport, to whom the witness had made her report. I have attached a copy of this report, although I have deleted the details of the witness's name and address.

We believe that explanations can be found for most UFO sightings; one thought that springs to mind in this instance is the possibility that what was seen was lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds. As you may be aware, such equipment is used increasingly in the entertainment industry. It might be that the sightings were caused by such equipment being tested at night, and given the location I wonder whether it might not be in some way connected with the illuminations at Blackpool.

You asked about the procedure with regard to sightings of an unknown nature. As you may be aware, our only role in looking at UFO sightings is to judge whether there is any threat to the defence of the UK. Unless there is any evidence of this - and none has been found to date - we do not attempt to investigate further or attempt to determine what was seen. We do accept that there is a small percentage of sightings that would appear to defy explanation, but we have no fixed view on these.

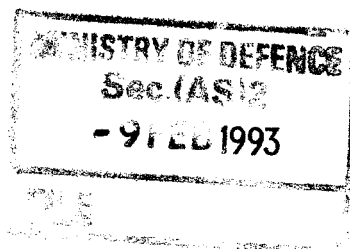

Recently we received a report of a sighting of three bright lights travelling south and moving in 'an intertwining type formation'. They were visible for only 5 seconds. The odd thing about these objects was that they made no sound at all, despite a lack of background noise. The time was 2.50 a.m. The date, 28th November, 1992.

By rare good fortune, we received an independent report of three white lights travelling in a southerly direction and moving in some sort of relation to each other. Again, the witness says he heard no sound whatever. The time was 2.45 a.m. The date, 21st November, 1992.

We have, then, two virtually identical sightings, by independent witnesses, at locations within just a few miles of each other (the former at Marton, Blackpool; the latter just outside Poulton) occurring at exactly the same time of day (or of early morning), and on the same day of the week, but separated by just one week. Clearly the two events are connected.

I think you will agree with me that since natural phenomena such as ball lightning and other atmospheric lightforms do not observe Greenwich Mean Time, the object or objects must have been non-natural

i.e. artificial and man-made. I would therefore be grateful if you would let me know if these sightings are consistent with any known aircraft; and whether you received any reports of similar sightings on or near these dates.

Would you also kindly let me know what the procedure is when an object which is clearly of non-natural but unknown origin is found to have been occupying our airspace.

Our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky, although we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds, or aircraft lights seen from unusual angles.

If you do believe that what you saw cannot be explained in terms of known phenomena, you might like to contact some of the civilian organisations currently engaged in the study and investigation of UFOs. 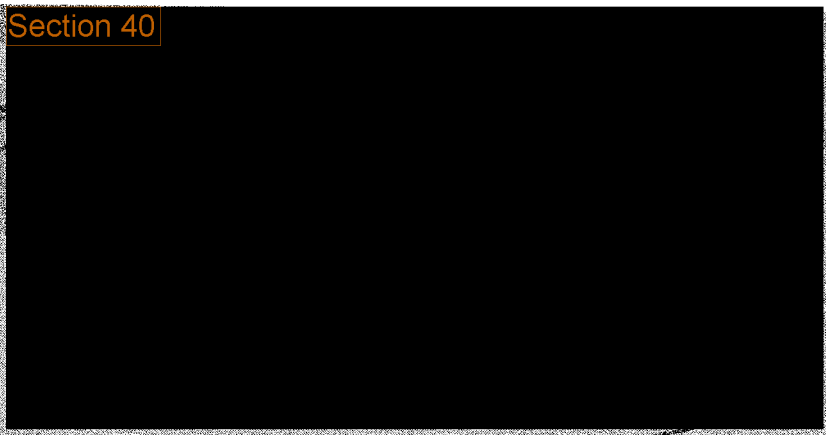

I am now able to let you have my comments on the micro cassette and video that you sent me, and to respond to the points made in your previous letters. While the tape and the video were both very interesting, I have to say that I disagree with a lot of what was said. As you may be aware, ufologists are often plagued by a degree of hoaxing and disinformation, and as far as I am concerned, allegations of top secret work on UFOs carried out by the Government fall into this category.

Stories about top secret information on UFOs being leaked are not new, but this "information" invariably turns out to have been faked. The same is true with regard to stories of UFO witnesses or researchers being intimidated and told to stay silent.

I do not dispute that many people have seen strange things in the sky, or that some interesting photos and videos have been taken of lights or shapes moving in peculiar ways. However, while such objects may be unidentified, it does not follow that they are extraterrestrial in origin. What we have not yet seen, is any solid evidence that would support the existence of alien life.

With regard to what you have said about NASA's SETI project, I do not subscribe to the view that any information would or could be covered up. While any positive results would clearly provoke huge public interest, I do not believe that it would lead to panic. It is my understanding that all SETI data will be available to the public, although clearly this is something that you may wish to check with NASA.

I note what you have to say about the "joint Star Wars project" and the European Fighter Aircraft, and suspect that on this, as with a number of other points, we will simply have to agree to disagree.

I hope this is helpful, and has answered your questions. I am returning your video and micro cassette.

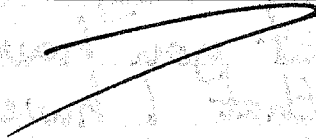

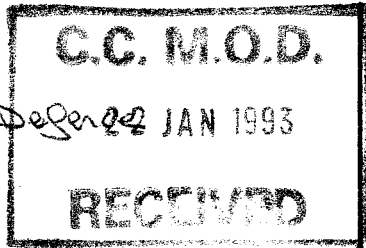

Details of the report that you made concerning the strange lights in the sky that you saw last night have been passed to this office as we receive and co-ordinate some reports of UFO sightings. Our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky, although we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds, or aircraft lights seen from unusual angles.

If you do believe that what you saw cannot be explained in terms of known phenomena, you might like to contact some of the civilian organisations currently engaged in the study and investigation of UFOs. These organisations may be able to offer some thoughts on what you saw, or tie in your sighting with other reports they may have received. I suggest the following groups:

As far as I am aware, this report was looked at when it was received, and it was subsequently concluded that the events described were of no defence significance. The Ministry of Defence receives many UFO reports each year, and while we believe that explanations could be found for most, we accept that some will remain unexplained. SUBJECT: Unexplained Lights

TO: RAF/CC

1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.

2. The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.

3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10° off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

MP demands facts over UFO reports

DEFENCE Minister Mr. Michael Heseltine faces questions about an alleged UFO landing in Suffolk.

A Tory MP says he is going to challenge an official cover-up surrounding the reported sighting of a spacecraft at Tangham Wood near RAF Woodbridge.

"I want the full facts to come to light," said Sir Patrick Wall, Member for Beverley, East Yorkshire.

"I do not expect that we will be told everything that happened but it should highlight the issue."

He has tabled five written Parliamentary questions on the incident which was witnessed by several persons.

Two of the witnesses say they have been campaigning against a wall of silence which has suddenly shown signs of cracking after they uncovered a detailed report by the deputy commander of the base at the time of the landing on December 27, 1980.

Dot Street, who revealed the report by Lt. Col. Charles Halt, said she was pleased that the MP had taken up the case.

Sir Patrick said it was important to have concrete examples with which to tackle the Minister and the report offered one of the most authenticated incidents.

The answers would be given next Tuesday.

Dot, of Blackberry Way, Outon Broad, said the Government was obviously becoming worried as more information came to light and the pressure for facts mounted.

Suffolk 'UFO sighting' raised in Commons

THE MINISTRY of Defence has had reports of 1,400 sightings of unidentified flying objects since 1980, Armed Forces Minister of State Mr. John Bradley said in a Commons written reply last night.

He had been asked about the release of information over a claim that a UFO had been seen by an American serviceman in woods near RAF Woodbridge.

Sir Patrick Wall (C. Beverley) asked Mr. Stanley if he had seen the USAF memo dated January 13, 1981 "concerning unexplained lights near RAF Woodbridge" and if the Government "will now release reports and documents concerning unexplained incidents in the UK."

Mr. Stanley said: "Subject to normal security constraints, I am ready to give information about any such reported sightings that are found to be a matter of concern from a defence standpoint, but there has been none to date."

The MoD had received reports of 1,400 sightings of flying objects which the observers have been unable to identify, but there were no corresponding unexplained radar contacts.

Bentwaters 'UFO' simply a lighthouse, paper says

LONDON (AP) — A newspaper's claim that a UFO landed in Britain in a ball of red light was dismissed by a rival publication Sunday, saying that the light was from a lighthouse.

The mass-circulation News of the World claimed a week ago that the UFO had three beings inside it in silver suits when it came down in a forest near RAF Bentwaters in Suffolk in eastern England, at the end of 1980.

The tabloid Sunday People sent a reporter to the site and quoted Vince Thurlettee, an officer for the state-run Forestry Commission, as saying: "The light from the Orford Ness lighthouse, on the coast, can be seen through the trees. From the hill where the site is, it appears to be practically at ground level and, of course, it

flashes.

"As you walk toward it, because of the lie of the land, it disappears."

The News of the World said a report by USAF Lt. Col. Charles Halt on the UFO landing supported what some patrolmen had seen and that his report was suppressed in a coverup.

The Sunday People quoted a USAF spokesman as saying that Halt's report was based solely on what the patrolmen had reported they saw on Dec. 27, 1980, and it was never classified as secret.

The News of the World returned to the story in its latest issue Sunday and said that, since it published the first report, people from all over Britain have reported UFO sightings.

"It was looked into," said the man from the Defence Ministry, "and there being no military explanation, we lost interest." He was talking about the descent of an unidentified and apparently flying object said to have been seen by U.S. personnel near an important USAF base.

It sounds like a very odd sort of investigation — apparently able to show that whatever had happened was definitely non-military, but unable to find out exactly what it was. It also sounds like a very odd sort of investigator to suddenly lose interest at that point.

He is not entirely alone. It will be recalled that the Americans said at the time that since whatever it was was outside their

base perimeter, it was of no interest at all to them. It seemed a rather casual attitude to an intrusion into a sensitive area.

There may be, and probably are, good reasons why we should not be told the truth about what was going on, but we are surely entitled to be given a story that it is possible to believe. Even the suggestion that it was a localised hallucination would be more credible than this collective loss of official interest.

Plainly, if it were possible for anything to fly that close to a major defence establishment without being tracked or traced it would be a serious matter whether it was military or civilian. The suggestion by the Ministry that its inquiry was less than thorough is unwelcome.

'THIS IS WEIRD . . . UNREAL

Dramatic tape of UFO incident played at Press conference

SPELLBOUND
 American servicemen watched a spectacular display by an alleged alien space craft and an amazing array of accompanying lights in the night skies according to their

aped commentary during Suffolk's 'Sky Crash' incident near Woodbridge airbase.

As they stood in a field between 200 and 300 yards from what is

alleged to be a space craft on its second visit to Rendlesham Forest in three days at the end of December, 1980, commentator Lt. Col. Charles Hall gasps, "It is like an eye winking at you."

The men watch the object with night-sight devices called starscopes and one says, "As you look at it through the starscope it appears to have a dark centre to it."

They refer to several lights in the sky and are heard to remark "There is no doubt about it, this is weird," and "This is unreal."

The object was hovering about four feet off the ground and the drama intensifies as, with a faltering voice, Hall says, "It is coming towards us

... there appears to be a beam of light coming down to the ground."

Hall and his men decide to return to the airbase and the tape ends.

Evidence

The recording has emerged as a new and important part of the evidence in the investigations into the alleged double sighting which forms the basis of the book "Sky Crash — A Cosmic Conspiracy" which was published yesterday.

The tape has been said to be authentic by former Woodbridge airbase commander Col. Sam Morgan, who released it to UFO investigators Dot Street, Brenda Butler and Jenny Randles.

It was played at a London Press conference yesterday.

when a strong demand for a full public inquiry into the incidents was made by the book's authors.

The men in the forest at the time of the alleged second sighting had been taking radiation readings and measurements in the wake of the first claimed sighting when contact was allegedly made with three silver-suited "entities" who hovered in a beam of light from the crashed craft as they repaired it.

The tape records the men's discovery of damage to trees and imprints on the ground where the craft is alleged to have landed.

Hall, who was acting base commander at the time and has since become a colonel

and returned to America where he is said to be at a classified location and unavailable for comment, later made a report on both alleged sightings which was sent to the Ministry of Defence.

When it was later leaked it gave the investigation a major boost.

Jenny Randles told the Press conference, "The MoD seriously ask us to believe that following the receipt of the report from the acting OJ commander, endorsed by the British base commander, involving all these trained witnesses and the alleged interception into British airspace of a craft, leaving damage and radiation right outside two

NATO bases — they do absolutely nothing about it.

"There is sufficient evidence to give the lie to this," she claimed.

Twelve days before the Hall report the only thing the MoD admit to having was ever written, two officials interviewed civilians around the forest.

"Plaster casts were seen to be taken of the traces by Col. Hall on base, although he was not approached by the British people who took them, and radar tapes were taken from RAF Watton, Norfolk, by USAF intelligence officers which could only have happened, as the MoD admit, with MoD permission."

The investigators had no

vested interest in proving an alien space craft was involved, but, Jenny said, were concerned authorities had lied, and deceived the British public.

"We are positive we have sufficient evidence here to make a strong case that the incident happened, the evidence has been withheld and the public has a right to know."

"Either the authors should say they know what happened and they have it under control or they should say they do not know and it all be openly investigated," she said.

"We cannot keep it lobbed off, the truth must come out because we know we are right," Jenny added.

UFO LANDS IN SUFFOLK

A UFO has landed in Britain—and that staggering fact has been officially confirmed.

Despite a massive cover-up, News of the World investigators have proof that the mysterious craft came to earth in a red ball of light at 3 a.m. on December 27, 1980.

It happened in a pine forest called Tongham, Wood just half a mile from the United States Air Force base at RAF Woodbridge, in Suffolk.

An American airman who was there told us there were three beings in silver space suits aboard the craft.

Farm cattle and forest animals ran berserk as the spacecraft, a glowing silver disc about 20ft across its base, slightly tilted to land in a blinding explosion of light.

About 200 military and civilian personnel, British and American, witnessed the astonishing event. The airman said the visitors appeared to be expected.

Two nights later a series of fast-moving objects bearing powerful light northward were spotted

over the base by a number of jets. It sounds like aliens coming to earth in the Jim Close Encounter, but the PROOF that an unidentified flying object landed in Britain is irrefutable. The key witness is Lt Colonel Charles J. Hall, deputy commander of the USAF 81st Tactical Fighter Wing stationed alongside the RAF at Woodbridge.

With the help of UFO experts in Britain and the US we have obtained a copy of his official report on the incident, part of which is reproduced on the right.

On official USAF newspaper and headed "Unexplained Lights," Colonel Hall wrote:

Early in the morning two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge.

PULSING

Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate.

The on-duty flight chief allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest.

The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three metres across the base and approximately

two metres high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object it manoeuvred through the trees and disappeared.

At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.

The next day three depressions one and a half inches deep and seven inches in diameter were found where the object had been crushed on the ground.

The following night, the colonel reported, the area was checked for radiation and readings were found in the depressions and on a tree.

His report goes on: "Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it exploded into a wall of glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and disappeared."

Immediately thereafter three plane-like objects were noted in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10 degrees off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed green and blue lights. The objects to the north

appeared elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then surged to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time.

Numerous people including himself, witnessed these events, Colonel Hall concluded.

Last week he declined to say anything further when we called on him at the base.

"This is a very delicate situation," he said, "but I have been told very clearly that I could jeopardise my career if I talk to you about it."

But before giving his report Colonel Hall sought advice from the RAF base commander, Squadron Leader Donald Morland, who told me:

"The Colonel sat in my office and was a very worried man."

TRUTH

"The first I knew of these events was when he came to me and related what he had seen. I know Col. Hall well and respect him and I fully believe he was telling me the truth."

"Whatever it was, it was able to perform feats in the air which no known aircraft is capable of doing. I put the events the Colonel related to me down to inexplicable phenomena."

The Colonel's report confirms the strange events in the forest that night, but lacks the eyewitness detail given to us by Art Wallace, a USAF Security Policeman, now back in America as a civilian.

He was sent to the site to convey a copy of military vehicles from nearby

NO HOAX SAYS THE AIR CHIEF

THERE has been no hoax, says the man who was in charge of the USAF base at Woodbridge when the UFO came down.

The Wing Commander, now Brigadier-General Gordon Williams, said back home in America: "I recall Lt Colonel Hall's report."

"I don't know exactly what happened. It is all there. He is not a man who would hoax the British Ministry of Defence or the American Air Force Department." Despite official silence, News of the World reporters discovered that the UFO was tracked on radar by RAF Station, 50 miles from where it landed.

Radar technicians remembered: "Tracking unidentified object."

They followed its progress across the east coast until it disappeared off the screen.

U S A F intelligence officers later searched the tapes of all radar installations in the area.

Don't know what night and describes what he saw. We looked up in the sky and saw a red ball of light coming towards us from over the trees. There was no noise, he said at all. We were all mesmerized. 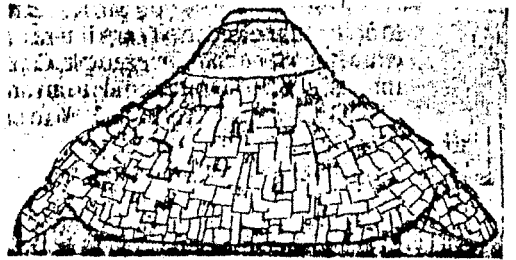
"But others did. They said there were three, wearing silver suits."

Art Wallace—we have changed his name for security reasons—tells his story on Page 3 today.

Last word goes to gamekeeper Roger Boat, who lives in his cottage near the airbase.

Something happened that night. The cattle in a nearby field ran amok. And deer and rabbits ran from the woods. "It is all very strange."

UFO lands in Suffolk—the airman's story

THE FOREST EXPLODED WITH BLINDING LIGHT

THE FIRST terrified thought to penetrate U.S. airman Art Wallace's brain as he saw Britain's first authenticated UFO landing was that he was seeing something from Star Wars.

To Art, the mystery machine that landed silently in a forest in an explosion of red light looked like "the spaceship from the movie." He told me: "It appeared to have a triangular shape and was covered with pipes and valves and things."

"It was about 20ft across the bottom with sloping sides up to the top 12ft to 15ft high... certainly big enough to handle people."

Art's rendezvous with the unbelievable came in the early hours of December 27, 1980, after he was ordered into a jeep at RAF Benlwis, Suffolk, where he was a security guard.

The jeep drove in convoy towards nearby RAF Woodbridge, then pulled up on the edge of lonely Tangham Wood. Said Art:

"We were all told to hand in our weapons. I had an M16 rifle. Then we looked into the woods."

Amazing things seemed to happen even then. I noticed animals running in panic from the forest.

Fuel gauges on the vehicles registered empty when we knew they were full.

As we approached a clearing we could see some very bright lights.

We were a bit shook up to come across a U.S. medic treating one of our security police who appeared to have broken down and was crying.

The clearing was full of RAF and USAF security people—about 200 of them. Several movie cameras had been set up and choppers were flying above.

Then we saw an object. It appeared to be resting

on the ground and looked at a giant saucer. It was transparent.

We were in awe, never having seen anything remotely like this. Nearby, there was an airman carrying a radio. Suddenly, we heard a chopper pilot telling him: "Here it comes."

We looked up and saw a red ball of light coming towards us from over the trees. In the distance, it looked about 100ft high

and appeared to be coming in to land.

It came down right over the trees and disappeared on the ground. There was no sound at all.

We were all mesmerized. All of a sudden, the red light exploded. The place was filled with an explosion of all kinds of colours.

We were blinded. When the colours died down, we looked again, and there was a machine there.

A captain motioned us to approach the ship. We walked up close enough to touch it. It was giving off a metallic bluish light.

There were three groups of about four security men

each drooling the thing. I could see our shadows on the craft. As we walked, they moved.

But when we stopped, the shadows seemed to take another pace. It was weird.

Suddenly, a green light came on at the top of the saucer.

It moved down the side of the craft, until it reached our heads then bounced from one to the other about the side, just like the ball bounces on a video game.

SHADOWS

Then I realized the spaceship was inhibited. There were beings aboard.

I didn't see them because I was on the wrong side of the craft. But others did.

They said there were three, and they were wearing silver suits. I had strange feelings and wanted to black out.

The next thing I knew, it was about 10 a.m. and I was waking up lying half naked on the ground.

To this day, I don't know how I got back to the barracks, or what happened after we saw the green light because of our shadows.

My roommate said I'd been brought into the room by some people. He didn't know who—and just dropped on the bed.

Later that day, my dad

and several of the guys who had been at the field were given the once-over with a smug counter but we were never told why or what the results were.

We were all called to the base security office at Benlwis and told what we'd seen had been classified top secret.

Several civilians were doing all the talking. We took them for CIA.

They said if we ever told the story, no one would believe us. One guy added that if we did talk, their bodies were cheap.

I thought, "This guy is actually threatening our lives. He obviously means it."

Looking back, the one thing that bothers me is

that the officers and civilians present seemed to know all about it—but they weren't all that surprised.

Art Wallace—that isn't his real name—was honourably discharged from the USAF in June, 1961. He is now aged 21.

If named, he could be jailed for saying what he saw.

Attempts to penetrate the mystery have been made by two Suffolk UFO spotters, Mrs Brenda Cutler, 38, of Leston, and Mrs Dorothy Street, of Oulton Broad.

Said Brenda: "We met a wall of secrecy."

But they lined up with American UFO expert Larry Fawcett, who ques-

tioned Art Wallace and obtained a copy of the report on the incident by Lieutenant Colonel Hill, USAF deputy commander at RAF Woodbridge.

The colonel later saw us in his office," said Brenda.

"He was upset because the report had leaked out, but then became helpful.

"He even pointed out on our case the place he said the craft had landed."

At the Defence Ministry in London, a spokesman would only say: "We are aware of the report, but this is a matter for the USAF, not us."

But a USAF spokesman at Mildenhall, Suffolk, said: "All reports of the incident are now with your Defence Ministry."

I saw UFO land —American officer

A SENIOR American Air Force officer reported sighting a UFO landing in Suffolk during Christmas 1980, the Ministry of Defence confirmed last night.

Lieut-Colonel Charles J. Hall, deputy commander of the USAF 81st Tactical Wing at RAF Woodbridge, told of seeing a "red, sun-like light" near the air base in the early hours of December 27.

A Defence Ministry spokesman said: "There was a sighting by an officer in the USAF. He was off-duty and off the base. He made a report and submitted it via the RAF commander at

Woodbridge to the Ministry of Defence."

Sir John Nott, who became Minister of Defence within a fortnight of the report and sighting, said last night: "I know nothing about it. Certainly I never saw any reports about a UFO landing. I don't believe in UFOs, anyway."

Another former Minister of Defence, Sir Ian Gilmour, said: "I should think this is absolute rubbish."

Silver suits, flying saucers and ET

HUGO DAVENPORT explains why the UFOria about mystery objects in the sky is waning

NOT a single silver-suited alien dropped in to join the British Unidentified Flying Object Research Association in London yesterday as it celebrated 21 years of sky watching.

And if an extra-terrestrial had turned up and parked his spaceship outside Kensington Central Library, the UFOlogists would, on the whole, have been more surprised than the crowds of Saturday shoppers.

According to research by Shirley Melver, a postgraduate sociology student at York University, only 44 per cent of the research association's members believe that "physical extra-terrestrials travelling in vehicles" are the most probable UFO cause.

Although no full public survey has been conducted in Britain, she points to a US poll which indicated that about half the population believe in flying saucers.

Her survey, carried out two years ago, set places extra-terrestrials at the top of the possible explanations league, while 19 per cent of her respondents favoured "unknown natural causes"; 12 per cent 'psychic events'; and 8 per cent hadn't

the faintest idea. The decline in the standing of aliens seems also to have coincided with rapid shrinkage in the association's membership, down from 550 two years ago to about 350. The association says numbers rise and fall in concert with "flaps"—waves of UFO activity—and British skies have been fairly empty during the past year. There are, however, more mundane reasons.

Mr Lionel Beer, a founder member and organiser of yesterday's conference, blames the ebb of UFO interest. "When we had our inaugural meeting in 1962, people were spilling out of the doors... you might say the UFOria has somewhat waned."

"We did a survey to find out why we had lost so many members, and a lot of people said they had been made redundant and could no longer afford the subscription."

The present eclipse seems light years from the first flush of cosmic rapture which brought together eight small independent bodies to form BUFORA.

In the 1970s, it drew up a list of 147 different phenomena which had been misidentified as UFOs. The current

estimate of reports worth following up is between two and 10 per cent.

Jenny Randles, Liverpool investigator, found what could be number 148 after she received a promising UFO report. On closer inspection, the 'UFO' turned out to be a luminous stuffed owl abandoned in a bush.

Alternative explanations have proliferated. The arcane science of 'socioUFOlogy', for example, has attracted a growing number of adherents, including Miss Randles. She distinguishes firmly between what she calls GAFs—'unidentified atmospheric effects'—and 'close encounters', in which people claim to have met aliens.

"The more closely you look at these experiences," she says, "the more closely they become aligned with dreams, visions and hallucinations. It's not as simple as that because they have a sort of quasi-reality—they are on the threshold between dreams and reality."

Another school is the ball lightning theory. Its main, indeed, only, proponent is Stewart Campbell, an Edinburgh architect.

He said: "Ball lightning isn't properly understood, so I'm accused of

substituting one unknown for another. It's very unfair. Ball lightning is a natural atmospheric phenomenon, thought to be electro-magnetic, consisting of an ionised plasma.

"UFOs don't exist—they are all ball lightning. Aliens don't exist either—they are only tricks of the light, or wishful thinking, or hallucination."

An interesting theory has been proposed by Paul Devereux, a writer in Wales, who claims a "remarkable correlation" between UFO activity and geological faultlines.

He says some so-called UFOs may be produced by rocks rubbing together under pressure which can emit light and has succeeded in producing coloured lights from a small granite core in a rock-crusher.

Traditionalists have not been totally routed. Founder member Graham Knowlton, now in his mid-seventies, states confidently: "The most likely hypothesis is that technological civilisations have risen elsewhere in the universe and that contact has been going on for a long time, probably on a very small scale because of the vast distances involved."



Yes, it is true

UFO expert Larry Fawcett (right), a police lieutenant in Gloucestershire, says: "I am sure an alien flying craft did land in that forest."

Over intensive questioning, Airman Wallace has never been caught out in a lie.

"We have had corroborations of his account. It is

doubtful if any person, never mind several, could make up such a story."

Lieut. Fawcett, 44, a chief of the American

organisations Operation Against UFO Secrecy, added: "Both the British and American military know a awful lot more about this than they have ever told."

'It was a UFO'

AN official report spelling out how a spaceship landed in Suffolk is genuine, the Americans confirmed today. But they poured scorn on another, even more astonishing claim... that the craft was manned by little silver creatures. That part of the Great Suffolk UFO mystery was unlikely, fanciful and outlandish, they said.

Even so, admission by USAF authorities that the previously secret report is genuine adds weight to a story the Star ran as long ago as May about the out-of-this-world allegations... but still left some people unconvinced today.

The report was written by deputy base commander at RAF Woodbridge, Lt. Col. Charles Hatt, about how a "strange glowing object" came to earth in a remote part of Rendlesham Forest near the airbase in December, 1980.

The document was released when an American citizen requested it under their Freedom of Information Act.

It gives the official stamp of approval to claims first made by two Suffolk women UFO investigators over two years ago.

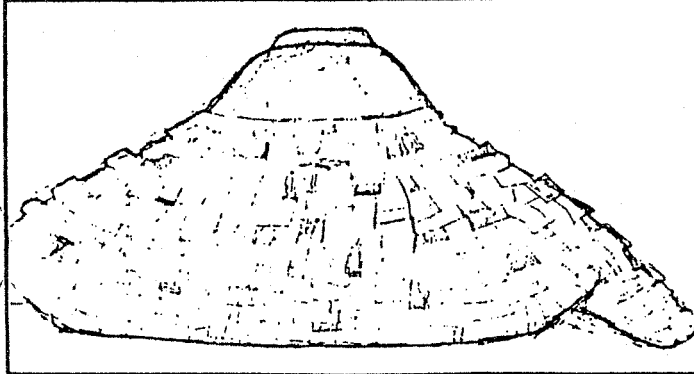
Lt. Col. Hatt's report tells how USAF security patrols from the base were sent out to check on unusual lights in the forest and discovered a "strange glowing object" which "illuminated the entire forest with a white light".

Wrote Lt. Col. Hatt: "The object was hovering on legs. As patrolmen approached it it manoeuvred through the trees and disappeared."

"At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The next day three depression one and a half inches deep and seven inches in diameter were found where the object had been sited on the ground."

Lt. Col. Hatt refused to talk to the Star today. "He would rather our public affairs department handle this one," said a spokesman for his office at Woodbridge.

At the public affairs department, Capt. Kathy McCollom told the Star, "Yes,

it is a genuine report. But it doesn't explain what these lights were.

"All we did was a memo as a courtesy for the Ministry of Defence. We have never investigated it, and we aren't interested in things that happen off base."

But Capt. McCollom described as "fanciful" other reports said to come from an anonymous airman on the patrol that night.

He claims other members of the patrol saw "little silver men" inside the spaceship and ever since had been sworn to secrecy by the Americans.

One of the Suffolk women who have been probing the strange case for two years, Mrs. Dot Street, of Oulton Broad, welcomed the publication of the Lt. Col. Hatt report.

"It's what we wanted because I am sick to death of cover-up," she said. She hoped the report would

"make people realise what is going on and that these things do exist."

Now she hopes more witnesses will come forward to her or colleague Brenda Butler, from Lexton, both members of the British UFO Research Association, as they did in May following news of the women's investigation in the Star.

Promising to treat information and names confidentially Dot says that "this is not the first time it has happened in that area."

Other witnesses have talked of sightings in November, 1980, and she now believes that there were two incidents spread over three days in that December.

Suffolk's official UFO investigator is "keeping an open mind" on the reports.

"I feel that if there were a number of people around who saw this someone would have come forward and said something by now," said Mr. Paul Hermon, of Felstead, who is area investigator for the British UFO Society.

"I would very much like to meet Lt. Col. Hatt and to read the full version of his report," he said today.

But forester Vince Thurkettle, 27, who lives a few hundred yards from the supposed landing site, told the

Star, "I saw nothing at the time, but the next day a chap came round asking questions about a UFO, but wouldn't say who he was."

"A few weeks later I discovered three oval depressions in the ground making an equilateral triangle as though something had landed. But they could just as easily have been rabbit scrapes."

"There's hundreds of rumours about this, but I have never met anyone who actually saw it. It's all a bit odd."

Last night Suffolk Police said their records revealed that in the early hours of December 26 the law enforcement desk at Benstead reported seeing unusual lights in the sky and said they had sent troops to investigate.

A routine check with Air Traffic Control to see if their

radar had picked anything up revealed they had received reports of aerial phenomena over southern England that night.

A traffic car and local beat car were sent to investigate but found nothing unusual, said the policeman and the only lights were those of the Orford light house.

The next day the Americans asked them to examine the indentations in the forest and the officers concluded they were probably made by an animal.

A USAF spokeswoman confirmed that Lt. Col. Hatt was still deputy base commander.

She said the base had not investigated UFO sightings for years and the report was not something that was required but was probably done out of courtesy for the Ministry of Defence.

Two more in UFO sighting

I wish now I had gone back for my binoculars which were in my lounge. I would say the position was near enough over Hales Bakery.

I WAS very interested to read in this week's Mercury the description given by Mrs Doris Galinaitis of what she believes may have been a UFO.

I too saw this object from my bedroom window at about 4.30 am early Monday morning. I was unable to sleep and, looking out of the window saw this extremely bright object which seemed to be skimming the top of the Mendips.

UFO fever hit Britain yesterday, after a close encounter by radio star David Jacobs.

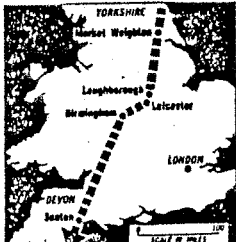
Callers jammed BBC switch boards after Jacobs mentioned briefly on his Radio Two show that he had seen a mysterious ball of light as he travelled to London on the M1.

The callers reported similar sightings and peaced together the path of the UFO as a great swathe from Yorkshire, through the Midlands to the West Country.

Jacobs was returning from the 35th Anniversaries anniversary programme in Mansfield, Nottinghamshire, with panelist, politician Shirley Williams.

He said: "It was extraordinary. I've never seen anything move so quickly. Suddenly, a brilliant white light with a tail shot from left to right in front of us at a height of about 250 to 300 feet—then disappeared."

The spot where 57-year-old Jacobs saw the light was between M1 junctions 21 and 22 in Leicestershire, at 10.30 pm on Friday

night. His driver saw the phenomenon, too, and thought it might have been a shooting star.

gave a sharp intake of breath, and his first words were 'My goodness. That's impossible'."

Listeners' calls confirming or adding to Jacobs' sighting came from as far away as Seaton in Devon and Market Weighton in Yorkshire.

There were so many that the popular broadcaster had to appeal to people to stop telephoning Broadcasting House because the switchboard could not cope.

Air Traffic Control at nearby East Midlands International airport recorded nothing on their radar.

Some are serving police officers with 20 years' experience who are familiar with their locality where UFO's have been seen, as are farmers and landowners who have come across this phenomenon, albeit in remote pastures.

These men and women did not imagine what they saw, and were it not for our protecting their identities, dozens of

reports would not have reached us. As it is, sightings of UFOs continue, and I might add not all of these occur at night, and not all are witnessed by the odd individual, as your reader suggests.

Neither I, nor the Yorkshire UFO Society have suggested that the origin of UFOs must be extraterrestrial. We have an open-mind on the subject. Thank you for your recent letter in which you asked a number of questions about radar and our handling of UFO reports. I will answer your questions in the order in which they were posed.

The Ministry of Defence does receive reports of UFOs; last year, for example, we received 147 reports. Having said this, we believe that nearly all of these sightings can be explained in terms of known objects and phenomena. Examples that spring to mind include aircraft lights, lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds, meteorites and satellite debris entering the atmosphere. Clearly there are a small percentage of reports that would seem to defy explanation; we hold no definitive view on these.

I do not have any figures concerning unidentified radar returns, but any return of potential significance is looked at, and the appropriate action taken. I am sure that you are aware that from time to time aircraft have flown towards UK airspace, and have been intercepted by the RAF.

It is not strictly true to say that a radar will only detect something of substance, because there will always be spurious returns.

Any questions that you have about radar systems should be directed to this department. I am sure you will understand, however, that for security reasons we are not able to go into much detail about the range and capability of our equipment.

All UFO reports are examined carefully by us and by departments responsible for the air defence of the UK. Sightings are then assessed on the basis of military expertise and an analysis of the available information. To date, no reports that we are aware of have been judged to present a threat to the defence of the UK.

I hope this has answered your questions, and helped explain our position on the subject. If you require anything further, please let me know.

Thank you for your letter dated 22 January.

You asked about photographic evidence of UFOs; in my time in this department I think I have received one photograph of a UFO. It was taken over Belgium during the wave of sightings some years ago, and is in the public domain. While the MOD clearly does have the facilities to analyse photographs, this has certainly not happened in my time here.

The other departments who see UFO reports are departments concerned with the air defence of the UK. They examine reports to see whether there is any evidence of a threat to the defence of the UK. As you know from previous correspondence, the MOD's only concern with UFOs is to determine whether or not there is such a threat.

The MOD is not carrying out any research into the crop circle phenomenon, and I am not aware of any other department that is. Having said this, people do ask us about crop circles from time to time, probably because of a perceived link with UFOs. I have, on occasion, spoken to the Centre for Crop Circle Studies (CCCS), and we refer people who ask about crop circles to them, in the same way as we refer people who ask about UFOs to organisations such as BUFORA. The CCCS will keep us informed of major developments, mirroring the way that some UFO groups and researchers will pass us information.

I hope this is helpful, and has answered your questions.

Thank you for your letter D/Sec(AS)12/3 of 12th January.

I have in fact received only the one letter about unusual ground markings which we spoke about last July. (It turned out to have nothing about which the CCCS could advise the lady.) You mention that you have continued to pass my address to anybody who writes to you about crop circles; but I have not had any mail in consequence. (It would be interesting to know, if the information is readily available, how many enquiries you have dealt with in this way.)

The Press have certainly dropped the subject for the time being or treat it with derision when they mention it - a not unwelcome development to those of us who have been studying the phenomenon at close hand. Project ARGUS was able to get on with its seven-week exercise with little interruption except from local hoaxers or those claiming, not necessarily with truth in every case, that particular events had been man-made. (Some undoubtedly had been.) We and our North American colleagues hope to be publishing the report fairly soon. I will let you have a copy in case you may be interested.

In advance of the report, which will reflect the work of a number of well qualified scientists, I mustn't draw conclusions. But we have been sufficiently encouraged by some of the effects detected to begin drawing up a further research programme for 1993.

There is possibly one matter on which you can help us. My own observations during the seven weeks I spent at Alton Barnes suggest that units of the Army Air Corps take a close interest in the crop circle events - as well they might, given the inherently interesting nature of these occurrences and their proximity to a major training area. I cannot help wondering whether the AAC might be prepared to help us, for example with good aerial photographs. Our own aerial surveys took a substantial part of our funds in 1992 and fell short of the systematic 'reconnaissance' we would have liked. Help with expert photographs (made available to us at minimum cost !) would greatly help scientific enquiry. Perhaps you could refer this suggestion to your colleagues in the Army Department.

I can't imagine who may have suggested to you that there is a 'split' in the CCCS Council. There are, of course, some strong differences of view about the nature of a phenomenon which remains very puzzling and about how we can best continue our studies of it. But research will undoubtedly continue and I remain the right point of contact within CCCS for any further correspondence about the research programme.

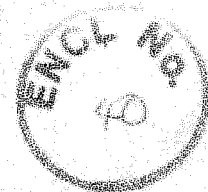

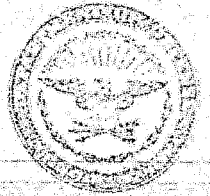

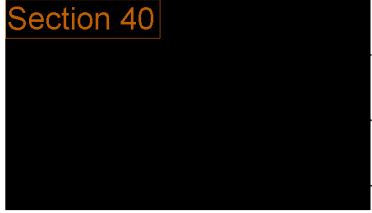
1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.
2. The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.
3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10^0 off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

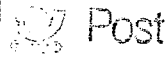

Thank you for your letter dated 9 January, in which you asked for some details on our procedure for dealing with UFO reports. I am not sure how widely you intend to cover this subject, so I will set out as much information as I can on the policy and views of the Ministry of Defence, and include other material that may be of use to you.

Although the Ministry of Defence does receive and co-ordinate reports of UFO sightings, our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do - and this has not been the case so far - we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

Given this limited involvement with the subject, the Ministry of Defence has no department which is appointed solely for the purpose of studying UFO reports, nor are there any staff employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive, which are usually limited to very brief details of what was seen, are passed to staff in departments concerned with the air defence of the United Kingdom, who examine them as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications, we do not carry out studies into the UFO phenomenon, nor do we have the resources to undertake any in-depth investigations. Defence funds are fully committed to maintaining the security of the UK and meeting our responsibilities to allies and dependents. This being so, we could not justify the use of defence funds on scientific investigations, unless a threat to the security of the UK had been identified.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky. However, we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Some of the possible explanations include aircraft lights or aircraft seen from unusual angles, satellites in orbit or satellite debris re-entering the atmosphere, high altitude kites, helium balloons, weather balloons, searchlights or lasers reflecting off clouds, ball lightning, fireballs and meteorites. As you are also doubtless aware, some reports turn out to be hoaxes. Having said this, we accept that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation, and we hold no definitive view on these.



The Ministry of Defence does not release material on the subject "en bloc", because, as is the case with all government departments, all Ministry of Defence files are subject to the public records act, and generally remain closed from public viewing for 30 years after the last action has been taken. Prior to 1967 all UFO files were routinely destroyed, although a small number of files survived, and may be viewed at the Public Record Office. The files we hold in this office go back to about 1985, so we are able to answer specific queries that people have about particular sightings which have occurred in recent years, and can let them know whether we have a report on the incident, and if so, what it contains. Most of the reports that we have are relatively unexciting, and refer to little more than a vague shape or light in the sky. I have attached for your information a copy of the form that we use to record UFO reports.

A number of last year's reports were almost certainly sightings of an airship - illuminated from the inside - which was flying over London a lot during February and March. I saw this myself, and can understand how, from a distance, this generated reports of a bright cigar-shaped UFO travelling slowly over London. I mention this as a useful example of how an explanation can often be found for an apparently quite exotic UFO report. Other reports were caused by lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds; such equipment is used increasingly in advertising and entertainment, especially at outdoor music festivals.

I have been given your name as a contact within the Ministry by Section 40 who I'm sure you are aware, is a dedicated UFO researcher.

I am at the moment, researching material for a programme to be shown on Sky News about UFO phenomenon and I wondered if you may be able to help me.

I think I have a very clear idea of how the ministry sees the situation. That is, all air encounters within our airspace is due to natural events, such as meteors or aircraft off course. There is no evidence to support a theory that these encounters could be spacecraft.

What I am trying to do, is to make a balanced programme, which can contain two opposing views. I don't want to make out that eye witnesses are deliberately lying, I can find no reason to doubt their stories. Yet I would want to question just what it was that was seen.

What has become apparent to me is that the secrecy of government departments worldwide, possibly for the best of reasons, has given UFO researchers the chance to promote a huge conspiracy theory where knowledge of spacecraft is kept secret.

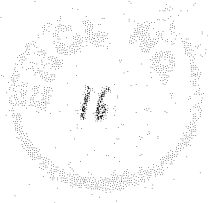

Section 40 [We were] travelling along the road after turning left at the traffic lights at Hockliff [with] the three girls singing Beate songs Section 40 made a comment about Section 40 [daughter] not hitting the notes. we turned to look at each other, then heavy rain started. I said we forgot the macs. My last thought at that point was that I could buy an umbrella at Milton Keynes; I was going to say this but didn't. It seemed in the blinking of an eye we were eight miles further on in the woods just past the golf course entrance. I felt nothing unusual, although we seemed to just be THERE. I was aware that I was not speaking and yet I was thinking about a quiet 'feeling' and that there was no other traffic.

At this point Section 40 said, as he nearly always done, that we're in 'Asian Country'. At that point, a car appeared around the corner entering Woburn Sands. There was a workman by a manhole in the road on the left which Section 40 said about; I was still silent. Then two cars were manoeuvring on the right; Section 40 again mentioned this. Again it seemed, as if blinking, we were at a roundabout; I had a sense of travelling fast. Looking at Section 40 he didn't seem to be actually controlling the car; I never had any fear of crashing though. At that same instance, Section 40 said, "Do you know I can't remember going over the bump." I immediately leaned towards Section 40 with a feeling of a peculiar sort of excitement and said, "Well, we haven't."

At that point, I was aware of an icy-coldness up my arms and back of my neck and head with a strong pins and needles prickling sensation. Section 40 said, "I've got a tingling sensation at the back of my head and neck and cold up the arms." I said, "Yes, so have I." We did not realise at that point that we had also missed Woburn, the railway lines at Woburn Sands and the garden centre. A feeling of unreality set in.

We pulled into the Fishermead Petrol Station [at] 10.50; I evidently remembered the children who were there silent in the back. Section 40 got out the car to use the pump. The pins and needles in my head was quite uncomfortable; people seemed strange somehow. I had a feeling of of not worrying about anything, although all the time this pins and needles would, I am sure in different circumstances, would have made me probably consider a doctor.

Further to your letter of October 19, I am now able to give you a meteorological report for the Dunstable - Woburn - Milton Keynes area on August 8:

Intermittent light rain occurred throughout the morning, cloud cover was complete (infact, there was no sunshine all day in the specified area), and winds were light (Beaufort force 1 to 2) easterly. The temperature was about 19C at 0930 G.M.T. Thunderstorms had developed by evening, and between 1800 and 2400 (G.M.T.) they were widespread south and east of a line from the Humber to the Bristol Channel.

Conditions were humid, and it is likely that mist did occur. It is also possible that heavy rain fell, but it would have been quite localised. More likely is that there was intermittent moderate rain, as the general public usually over-estimate the intensity of rainfall (and the intensities of most other meteorological phenomena, incidentally). Lightning is liable to be seen for many tens of kilometres during the hours of darkness, compared to usually within 3 km in daylight, so the report of lightning without thunder (within audible range) is perfectly acceptable.

I hope that you find this information of use; I am sorry for the delay in getting back to you, which was due to your letter just missing me in Wolverhampton, the weather report of the date in question missing from my laboratory, and the need to obtain a replacement copy. 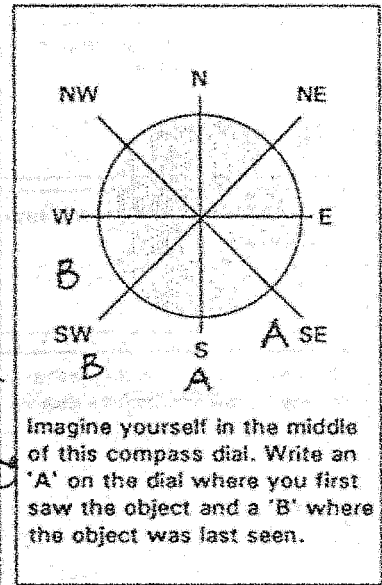
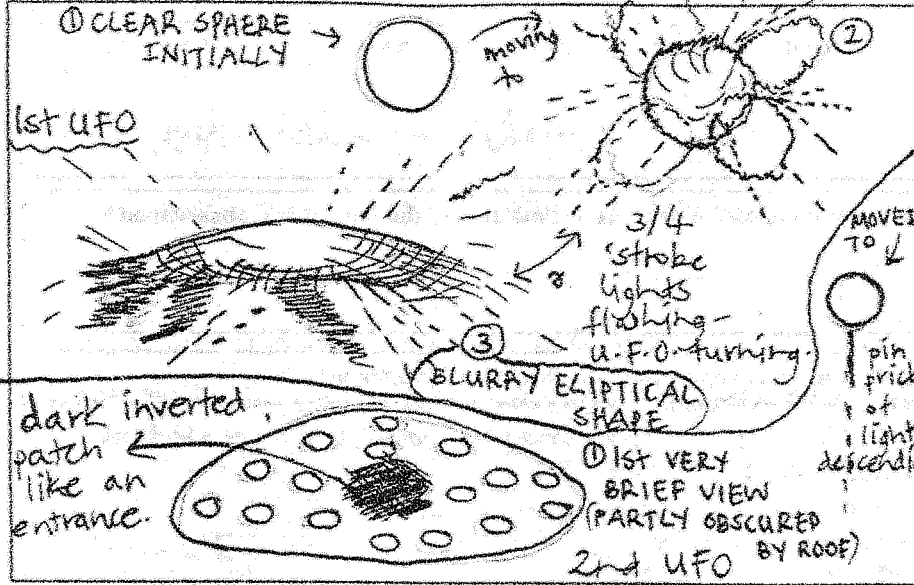

THE SUSPENDED OBJECT WAS BLURRED BUT SPHERICAL AND WHITE IN COLOUR.

THE SKY WAS VERY CLEAR AND STARS CLEARLY DEFINED.

I LUCKILY HAD BEEN LEFT A PAIR OF BINOCULARS FOR BIRD-WATCHING PURPOSES, SO USED THESE.

I LOCATED THE LIGHT EASILY AND AS I DID SO, THE OBJECT BEGAN TO MOVE AGAIN. THIS TIME I COULD DISTINGUISH 3 OR 4 FLASHING WHITE LIGHTS OF VERY STRONG INTENSITY ON THE UNDERSIDE (?) OF THE OBJECT. THEY FLASHED CONTINUALLY AND WERE VERY LIKE STROBE LIGHTS. THE U.F.O. MOVED IN VARIOUS WAYS, SEEMINGLY CHANGING IN APPEARANCE.

THE 'STROBE LIGHTS' WOULD APPARENTLY VANISH AND THE OBJECT APPEARED AS A BASICALLY ELIPTICAL SHAPE - A HAZY EDGE, BLURRED WITH LIGHT, NO DEFINED EDGES; MOVED CONSTANTLY.

IN ORDER TO GAIN A BETTER BEARING ON IT'S POSITION, I LOOKED AT THE STARS AGAIN, (ALTHOUGH I HAVE ONLY A VERY BASIC KNOWLEDGE.)

IT WAS THEN I SIGHTED ANOTHER U.F.O. ALMOST DIRECTLY ABOVE - QUITE STATIC INITIALLY. (~~WIFE TO GIVE~~ COMPASS BEARING.)

THIS WAS MORE DIFFICULT TO VIEW BECAUSE OF IT'S POSITION. AFTER SOME MINUTES HAD ELAPSED, THIS OBJECT TOO BEGAN TO MOVE. AGAIN, USING THE BINOCULARS, I HAD AN EXTREMELY BRIEF GLIMPSE OF A SAUCER SHAPED OBJECT, SLIGHTLY INVERTED UNDERNEATH (ie. A DARK CENTRE) WITH MYRIADS OF WHITE LIGHTS AROUND THE REMAINDER OF THE SAUCER LIKE MASSES OF ELECTRIC LIGHT BULBS.

THE OBJECT THEN MOVED AWAY TO THE EXTREME RIGHT (WEST) BUT VERY HIGH UP AND STAYED AS JUST A BRIGHT LIGHT - STATIC - EASILY MISTAKEN FOR ANOTHER STAR, HAD I NOT SEEN IT IN MOTION.

IT THEN SEEMED THAT A PIN-PRICK OF LIGHT, LIKE A THIN STRAND DESCENDING, CAME AWAY FROM THE OBJECT ABOVE, AND REMAINED A GOOD DISTANCE BELOW, ^{IT} BARELY PERCEPTIBLE.

THE FIRST U.F.O. REMAINED SOMEHOW OPPOSITE THE SECOND, BUT LOWER DOWN, MOVING ABOUT QUITE FREQUENTLY AND FLASHING. IT WAS AT ONE STAGE SEEMINGLY ABOUT TO DEPART. AT TIMES, AGAIN USING BINOCULARS, IT SEEMED TO BE JUST A BLUR OF WHITE LIGHT.

IN FACT, BOTH THESE UFO'S REMAINED FROM 1.15. a.m. UNTIL 3.24. am. approx.

BOTH OBJECTS 'LEFT' TOGETHER - ie. AS IF ABLE TO COMMUNICATE THE SIGNAL TO DEPART.

THE FIRST U.F.O. STARTED TO TRAVEL HORIZONTALLY TOWARDS IPSWICH S./S.W.

IT TOOK QUITE A WHILE TO TOTALLY VANISH FROM VIEW. WITH THE NAKED EYE, JUST FLICKS OF LIGHT WERE APPARENT AT INTERVALS.

THE SECOND U.F.O. APPEARED TO MOVE UPWARDS. (MY VIEW WAS IMPEDED BY THE WINDOW.)

AS IT MOVED, A GLOW DISAPPEARED GRADUALLY LIKE THE SUN SETTING. (VERTICAL 'TAKE-OFF'?)

WITH THESE OBSERVATIONS, IT WAS VERY DIFFICULT TO JUDGE

- a) SIZE OF OBJECTS

- b) SPEED

- c) DISTANCE AWAY.

I WOULD HAZARD A GUESS THAT THEY WERE PERHAPS A FAIR DISTANCE OFF OR THAT THEY WERE QUITE SMALL OBJECTS.

Our only concern is to establish whether or not they pose a threat to the security of the United Kingdom. Unless we judge that they do, and this has not been the case so far, we do not attempt to investigate further, or to identify whatever might have been seen.

It is clear from the reports we receive that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky, although we believe that explanations could be found for most of them. Possibilities that spring to mind include lasers or searchlights reflecting off clouds, aircraft lights seen from unusual angles, or ball lightning. We accept, however, that there will always be some sightings that defy explanation.

You might like to contact some of the civilian organisations that investigate UFOs, as they may be able to offer some further thoughts, or tie in your sighting with other reports they may have received. The details are as follows:

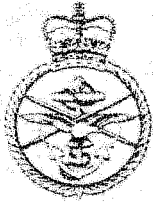

Thank you for your letter dated 2 December in which you asked about our policy with regard to UFO incidents.

You asked about the role of this department with regard to UFOs; essentially, we are the sole point of contact for enquiries about UFOs, both on specific sightings, or on more general enquiries on policy - such as yours.

You asked about investigation of incidents; as our only concern is to determine whether there is any threat to the security of the UK, we do not investigate UFO sightings unless there is evidence of a threat. No sightings received to date have been judged to pose such a threat.

With regard to what information is available to the public, we can release reports that might tie in with specific sightings that people enquire about, exactly as I was able to do with the sighting that we corresponded on during October.

We are not able to release our files or any of their contents "en bloc", because of the provisions of the Public Records Act, which states that files generally remain closed for 30 years after the last action has been taken. With regard to the contents of our files, they consist of a mixture of letters on the MOD's policy, such as yours, and sighting reports such as the one I previously sent you. Before 1967 all UFO files were destroyed after five years, although a few, from the Fifties, survived. These are the only files currently available for public viewing, at the following address: Public Records Office, Ruskin Avenue, Kew, Richmond, Surrey, TW9 4DV. Thank you for your letter dated 2 December, in which you raised the case of Section 40. In fact, Section 40 contacted me some time ago about her husband's condition; I am sorry to hear that he is still so ill.

I have explained to Section 40 the - very limited - role of the Ministry of Defence with regard to UFO sightings, and stressed that we are not qualified to give any sort of medical advice. I suggested that if she was having difficulty in getting treatment for her husband, either from a GP or from a radiologist, then she should go to a Citizens Advice Bureau and ask for their assistance.

We take no definitive position on UFOs or abductions, but, irrespective of this, the key requirement seems to be to obtain some medical treatment for Section 40 and this is clearly something that needs to be followed up with the appropriate medical authorities.

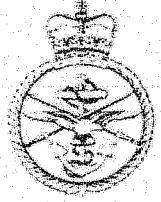

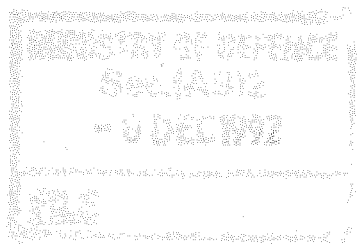

7th October 1992 approx. 4.30 pm. 2 little beasties (see page 72) together, punched their way down vertically at a point marked (a) on drawing (page 29).

10th October 1992 at 10.05 and 10.07pm they turned up again, the first little beastie flying 'eye height' (about 5 foot) 50 feet in front of me on line with the west wall of the mill building (south to north) the second little beastie flew in 150 yards further west at 15 feet above the lane (south to north) the lane lowers in height about 8 to 10 feet in its length, so, these two little uns were obviously on a coordinated flight pattern.

And a supplement to pages 82-86 which I will now include, but couldn't when this book was first written, as I do spend a lot of time cross-checking relevant details, especially when there is an official 'clamp down' on information. 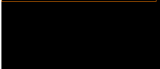
