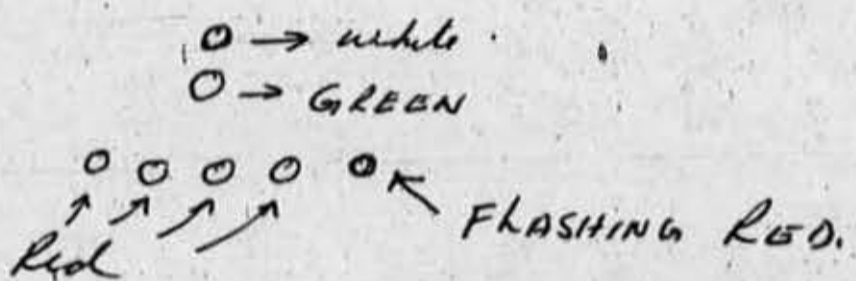

Dear Sir or Madam:

There are certain phenomena in evidence over the Chignecto area of the Maritime Provinces of Canada that I feel should be reported to some interested investigative body, but I hesitate to notify the local authorities for the reasons made obvious by the reception given almost universally to previous reports of UFO sightings. Because your organization seems to be making a genuinely conscientious effort to separate the grain from the chaff and solve the mystery of UFO's, I shall try to relate as nearly as I can the things we ourselves have seen and heard, and what our friends and acquaintances have told us, and will trust your guarantee of integrity in the matter of personal privacy. Although I would be willing to contribute any effort within my limited scope to help to discover the nature and source of UFO's, please do not use my name publicly.

Sackville is a small town with a population of around 3300, situated at the western end of the Chignecto Isthmus at the head of the Bay of Fundy. Its main features are its Mount Allison University; two foundries manufacturing stoves and furnaces; two or three other minor industrial enterprises; the junction of the Canadian National Railway systems serving the provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island as well as the Eastern extremity of New Brunswick; and the radio transmitters three miles east of town on the Tantramar Marsh, one a 50,000 watt transmitter for the CBC station CBA, and the other the Short Wave station the Voice of Canada.

I am a hairdresser with four children: Jean, aged 18 this year; Robert, 15; Michael, 13; and Creighton, 10. My husband is not living, and with no man in the house and my flexible working hours, we are apt to be somewhat undisciplined in our regimen during school vacations, following up any constructive or intriguing activity that promises to add a dimension or make home more interesting than the street corners. The family dog, a 9-month-old female in the process of being housebroken, is responsible for our having become involved in our current interest. Not daring to ignore her requests to go out, no matter what the hour as long as we are not in bed, I took her out around midnight on the night of July 30, and standing around waiting for her to perform, I noticed a tiny point of light, which may have been a satellite, moving across the sky in a

northeasterly direction. We had seen a similar thing last year on June 30, at about the same hour of night but moving in a southwesterly direction.

On the following night, July 31, the dog was restless, demanding trip after trip outdoors. It occurred to me that the youngsters had never had the constellations pointed out to them; and although I knew only the ones around the North Star, we got out a book and flashlight and began to explore. An airplane flew over, and we had still been unable to catch sight of it, fading out of earshot, when some sort of aircraft came low over the town from southwest to northeast, having two steady, unblinking red lights about the same distance apart as if they were on the wingtips of a light plane. As it went past, a white light became visible on it, but I can not remember just where it was situated in relation to the red ones. We could not see any shape of the object in the darkness, and in spite of the quietness of the night and the fact that it could not have been more than two blocks away from us at its closest point, we could not hear any sound from it. The probabilities of its having been a glider or a plane with its motor cut seem remote, since there is no airfield nearby, and there was no sound of a motor coming to life after it passed.

A few minutes later something flew southward on the west side of town, displaying a steady white light and flashing red and green. We watched its progress until it came to a position south-southwest of us, where it hovered for around half an hour. A second one came into view near it, with a much tinier light, possibly because of a much greater distance. It soon passed from view behind a church spire, but a few minutes later, while we were still looking at the first one hovering, Creighton spied another, with a steady white light, flying fairly high above the town toward the northeast. While the youngsters ran around the house to watch the progress of the new one, I stayed at the back to watch the first one, still hovering. They soon came back, complaining that the new one had put out its light.

We saw two more that night, both travelling northeastward north of the town. They were not as close as the previous ones, but were as bright as the stars of the Big Dipper. Finally, around 2 A.M. we gave up and went to bed.

With our curiosity whetted by that night's adventures, we resolved to watch the following night, which turned out to be a bit foggy but with the stars clearly visible. We had sighted a light similar to one of the ones we had seen on the previous night and had phoned a friend who lives a couple of blocks away. A few minutes later we were on the front lawn and somewhere in the darkness over the house, (I have little sense of height in terms of feet but in view of the direction it took and the distance it seemed to be from us, I would say it must have been over our back yard and about the height of a ten-to-twelve-storey building when we first caught sight of it) was a deep, rich, red glow, moving eastward. The moon had set and the sky was very dark except for the stars, and there was no point of light visible on the object; the

only other thing I could add is that the glow seemed to be divided down the middle by a darkness. It moved fairly rapidly but no faster than a cruising plane, if as fast. The glow had not moved far when we heard the roar of a plane, but by this time the glow was to the east of us and the sound of the plane was to the west. Our friend, still outdoors looking for the light we had phoned her about but unsuccessfully because her vision was blocked in that direction by trees, saw the plane flying westward. Our glowing thing gradually faded from sight in distance to the east.

On the Friday night, August 2nd, Jean, taking seriously my remark that I had read somewhere that UFO's are usually active in the hours around dawn in the areas in which they have been observed, determined to stay up and watch. (And she calls ME "Pandora"!) I stayed up with her, but we did not remain outdoors; she watched through an open window on the south side of the back porch. Around 3:00 A.M. she saw a red, glowing object flying northeastward, and called me, but I was in the front part of the house for the moment and did not hear her. A minute or so later a light with the appearance of a bright star that had been stationary to the south during all the time she had been watching (approximately three-quarters of an hour) started off and moved at about the cruising speed of a small aircraft to the northwestward. That time I heard her when she called, and we watched it through the south window until it got too far to the north, then we hurried through the house and out the front door and watched from the lawn as it travelled northwestward until it was a little north of due west from us, where it changed course a little and travelled directly away from us until it was out of sight.

We have watched on every clear night since then in an effort to see one closely enough to determine something of their shape and size. There has not been a clear night that we have not seen at least two, and sometimes several, at varying heights and distances, obviously moving. Only three or four nights in August have been overcast, and we remained indoors. Recently we have seen them at comparatively close range, as follows.

One night about a week and a half ago, quite late, Creighton and I saw what at first we thought was a private plane, at about the height that they usually fly, as it approached and crossed our west-northwest to east-southeast street at an angle of perhaps 40° on a southeasterly course, about half a block eastward from our house. It did not display any red light that we could see, only tiny white and green ones which either blinked on and off successively in the manner of a marquee or else the object rotated as it flew. We watched it out of sight across the marsh toward Nova Scotia. On Thursday night of this week, August 22, between 11:00 P.M. and midnight, Jean and I saw one on the same course and with the same appearance except that this one did not have the appearance of revolving. Both had a velvety, purring sound, without the hard, droning sound associated with aircraft engines. We thought it possible that what we had seen may have been some sort of light aircraft that was unfamiliar to us, but they were not carrying the sort of flying lights that I have understood are regulation, since only small white and green ones were visible on both. About an hour and a

half later, around 1:15 A.M., I was in the kitchen making a hot drink to take off the chill before going to bed when I heard the same soft purring motor sound again and headed for the front door, and was in time to see an aircraft on the same course or more easterly, only about half a block away and this time it displayed one very large, very white light, similar to many that we had seen at greater distance, the whitest I have ever seen. I am certain that it was no conventional aircraft. Creighton also saw it, and Jean was out in time to see it when it had got considerable distance away.

We have only once seen one of these things moving at any more than a leisurely pace, and that one was at quite a distance to the north, travelling eastward very fast, but I suppose no faster than the speed of which some jets are capable. We have only seen two of the red, glowing things, but have all seen numerous single steady white lights or blinking white ones, or blinking red ones, or white ones flashing red and green, or white and green, steady or flashing. There seems no end to the variety, but only white, red or green colours involved. A number of times we have been watching them when the lights on them would dim and go out, sometimes reappearing shortly afterwards in the same position and then proceeding on their way. We have never seen two or more flying together, although two might be visible in the same direction at the same time. We invested in a 16.5x50x50 telescope hoping to be able to see more detail, but it is quite small and difficult to focus effectively.

Many of our friends have also seen them, and some have seen things that we have not. They, like ourselves, have not reported them to officialdom. I learned of most of them in conversations with customers in the beauty shop, most of whom I have known for many years and many of whom are also friends socially.

Miss Amy M., older than I, (the friend whom we phoned on the night of August 1st to look at a distant moving light and who saw only the westbound plane) had a sighting experience earlier in the summer than any of ours. She and I were in conversation on the phone early one evening during the second week in July, and she made a remark about the "fog coming in again." It was not foggy on our street, which is usually foggy if any street in the town is, but I didn't think much about it. About the time we finished our conversation my daughter came down from studying upstairs to tell me she had been hearing "the weirdest high-pitched sound like a whistle or siren." This, too, I didn't give much thought to, although a defect in her left ear renders it deaf to ordinary sounds but extraordinarily sensitive to tones of high frequency. The following morning Amy called to tell me that when we had been talking the evening before, she had been gazing absently out of the window, believing that the flame-coloured object showing part of its form past the side of her window was the sun going down toward the horizon to the south of the house next door. Since it did not blind her with glare, she thought it to be somewhat obscured by fog. Later in the evening it occurred to her that at this time of year the sun does not go down to the south of the house next door, but to the north of it; then for the rest of the night she wondered what she had been looking at. The following morning before she called me, she

had just heard the newscast on radio, telling of reports from Prince Edward Island of sightings of "a flame-coloured object flying very high". (These reports were explained by a helpful meteorologist as possibly a weather balloon from a Maine weather station, catching the rays of the setting sun.) Perhaps the weather balloon came in a down-draft to say hello to Sackville, but we are still wondering about the unusual sound my daughter heard and the fact that the object that Amy saw as "about the size of the sun or a little larger, and quite low" was a glowing flame colour on the side away from the sun.

On the first Sunday in August we had a thunderstorm during the evening. It stayed hot and close and we didn't go outdoors, since the occasional flash of heat lightning that we could see was evidence that the sky was still overcast. Mrs. W., who is in her sixties and lives in Middle Sackville, about two miles from here, parted her drapes to look out to see if the sky was clearing. She told me afterward, "There was some heat lightning, and two red balls, one off toward the left and one off toward the right, weird looking things, and when there was a flash of lightning they looked all the worse. I didn't know what they were and they scared me so I just dropped the drapes back and got back on the chesterfield. They were the weirdest things I ever saw!"

Mrs. A., a young woman in Moncton, about 25 miles from here, saw one red ball under the same circumstances about that long ago. I do not know whether it was the same night or not. I learned about this one third-hand, so do not have the woman's own description, or accuracy in placing the time.

Mrs. M. has a daughter in her early teens, who woke up in the wee hours of the morning to find that her sister, with whom she was sleeping, had taken all the blankets, and she was cold. When she sat up to retrieve the blankets she looked through the window and saw a disc-shaped object with a dome, and the girl was too frightened to get out of bed to go to tell her mother. She appeared in the morning, told her mother what she had seen and asked her not to tell any of her school friends, for fear she wouldn't be believed and would be ridiculed. I am not sure whether they were at their home, about sixteen miles from Sackville, or at the grandmother's home in Moncton.

As very likely you are aware, various reports of sightings have been made from points in the Maritimes during the past two years. I was told yesterday that a researcher from an American university is at present in Nova Scotia conducting an investigation, but I do not know who he is or where, and do not know where to enquire locally that the enquiry would not stir up a hornet's nest. If he is the usual run-of-the-mill intellectual I would not feel inclined to pass along the information in any case, since there is a tendency on the part of these people to believe that any person without a college degree or a government appointment is necessarily lacking in intelligence or emotional balance.


We see many conventional aircraft of all types, since the Air Canada route from Moncton to Halifax crosses Sackville, and the Canadian Forces

air bases at Chatham, N.B. and Summerside, P.E.I. are not far away to the north and northwest. Some of the far distant moving lights are travelling at the speed that distant high-flying jet planes appear to be moving when one can not see the aircraft itself but can only see the vapour trail slowly growing longer and longer. I enquired of an electronics engineer if one would be able to see the light of an airplane at that distance, and he told me that we would not see the light itself, but for a few hours after sunset we might see the reflection of the sun's rays off the aluminum body of the craft. Since we see many of these between midnight and two in the morning, this seems to rule out the possibility that they are conventional planes.

I have nothing to add, except that some of the craft seem to follow the same route for several days, and then follow a different one for a while. Whether modern invention has produced craft of a new and secret nature which fit the above descriptions we do not know, nor are likely to find out. The manoeuvres are not unlike those of known aircraft, but their frequency and lighting and sound and behaviour in hovering and sudden disappearance suggest that they do not conform to anything we have hitherto observed or would be likely to see of new invention in this area at this time.

It would seem that the Chignecto area has been getting a continuing scrutiny by some entity the nature of which, or of whom, we can not imagine. I wish that we had kept a log of our own observations that might be of use, but can only suggest that a professional observer with adequate instruments might be rewarded with information about their activity. Since school will resume for the fall term on Sept. 4, our own nocturnal watches will of necessity be curtailed. However, while maintaining a healthy respect for their possible potential at close range, I feel an enormous curiosity about them, and if in any way I can be of service to your organization I should be happy to do so.

Dear Professor MacNeill:

Last Sunday I wrote a letter to the Aerial Phenomena Research Organization in Tucson, Arizona, to tell them of our experiences of the past month. As very likely you are aware, it is an organization which has operated independently of government control or restriction for a number of years, and which has solicited reliable information from any location in the world for its own research purposes, at the same time guaranteeing anonymity to those who wish to avoid publicity.

Since writing to them, it has occurred to us that it is hardly good citizenship to offer information of any nature to a group in a foreign country without at least offering the same, for whatever it is worth, to Canadian investigators. I believe there was an item in the newspapers some time back announcing that the research committee that was appointed by the Canadian government, or at least connected with it, several years ago had been dissolved; in any case, not foreseeing the occasion when it might be of use I have no record of the address to send any pertinent information. On Thursday I saw a news item in the Telegraph-Journal to the effect that you are anxious to receive reports from bewildered individuals who have seen and heard unfamiliar sights and sounds.

Since the item did not guarantee the privacy of those who cooperate, I am of two minds in the matter: one, first to obtain your guarantee of anonymity; and second is the time element that does not promise that the phenomena we have observed will continue for any great length of time, if indeed past today. The urgency of time has won, and I enclose herewith a carbon copy of the letter I sent to APRO, and insist that whatever value it has, my name must not be used publicly. While I would stand behind all the statements it contains, my livelihood and that of my children depends to considerable degree on public opinion regarding my own mental stability and discretion. Women seldom entrust their crowning glory to an individual suspected of color-blindness, hallucination or lack of judgement. Besides that, my four children have to face their friends from a point of insecurity in having only one parent, and their associations would be made intolerably difficult if that one became notorious as a kook.


Finally, after nearly a month's hesitation, this week I contacted the RCMP, and except for an understandable hesitancy to swallow whole such an improbable tale, they are surprisingly open-minded and have offered to use their standard equipment, upon notification of sighting, to try to discover what indeed are the "things" described herein. If, at least the more frequent white-lighted motorized vehicles can be identified, so much the better. In case they, too, are at a loss to explain the phenomena, I should imagine their conclusions will be subject to regulations governing publication of classified information.

I think it probable that most areas, yours included, have their quota of objects similar to those I have described. You will need only a few evenings' free time, a large stock of patience, clear weather and a couple of sharp-eyed youngsters who can stay awake until after midnight. Doubtless you would find multitudes of volunteers, but if you feel it would be in the best interest of the project to investigate in this area, I'll lend you mine--they're professionals--just as long as it's not a school night. By the way, we observed another one on Wednesday evening, displaying only a green light when approaching and an intense white light on the rear. For all that it was close enough to see the lights clearly and separately, its sound was barely audible.

Those of us who have seen these strange craft, and particularly we who have taken a long, hard look at the slaving jowls before crying "Wolf!" will be hoping for some explanation more original and convincing than the planet Venus, weather balloons and marsh gas.

With apologies for my remark about the attitude of the educated elite toward the unwashed masses, may I wish you Godspeed.

These are some of the night lights that have us puzzled. All but the last one could conceivably be some new design in hovercraft of the helicopter type; we have never seen "impossible" maneuverings that would convince us that they are too advanced for modern technology, but their strange appearance and unusual characteristics give us reason enough to believe that they are not domestic, and would bear appraisal by experts. They all have two things in common: they are silent except at close range (and sometimes at close range) and they are lighted in such a way as not to throw any glow of light on the body of the craft itself, to give a clue as to actual shape or size. Motors invariably have a humming, purring sound when at close range, not unlike a noisy electric toaster.

Times are approximate, but durations fairly accurate.

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 15

9:57 P.M. Object with red lights, first seen in SSW travelling eastward, estimate not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ mile distant, silent except for momentary motor sound when due south, which may have come from the other direction, since we spotted new lights approaching from northwest before "first one was out of sight and abandoned first one to try to identify second, which would travel almost overhead, but at enough of an angle toward the northeast at closest point as to cause uncertainty; in cases that we are not certain, we dismiss them as airplanes, and so we did with this. When it was well to the southeast, as the first one must also have been, our neighbor's garage interfered with our line of vision, and when we moved to look past it on the south, saw one of these craft hovering and flashing red flasher at regular intervals. We watched it for about 20 minutes, then it moved off toward the southeast and disappeared in the distance. We have no way of knowing for certain which of the craft hovered.

11:20 P.M. Approaching from northwest across town, with brilliant tiny scintillating green headlight which disappeared when broadside (northeast of us) and intense white light appeared on rear. Somewhat higher than regular airline flights. When to southeast of us the white light slowly turned red (first time we have seen them do this) and hovered in approximate position of previous one and began to flash red flasher (these are similar to ones on police cars and fire trucks, a deep red, seemingly rotary) regularly, and as nearly as I could estimate, about one flash per second, then moved off and disappeared in distance. It had a quiet, purring motor.

When we first spotted the little green headlight, which we had seen at close range on one other occasion, we called R.C.M.P. who had expressed interest previously, but they were unable to see it from their vantage point. They asked us to call at time of future sighting, and they would hustle to our vantage point.

11:27 P.M. Light resembling fairly bright star, sighted about 20° south of

East, travelling toward southwest but at distance enough that it seemed to pass over red, flashing light previously mentioned then it, too, turned reddish. We took our eyes off it to glance at the flashing one, and on looking back to the south, found that new one was nowhere in sight. It was about 15° or 20° east of south when it disappeared, and could not have got out of range of vision so quickly at rate it was travelling. We heard no sound from it.

Tuesday, September 17 or rather, Wednesday, September 18

12:30 A.M. Seen first in northwest, travelling southeast, at first only regulation red and green lights visible, unblinking. When almost overhead (slightly to southwest) large, intense white light "popped out" at rear, as though just switched on. This is a phenomenon we have observed two or three times previously; this large white light suddenly is there, without any gradual coming into view or pre-glow, except that when it was oncoming, I could see through the telescope a suggestion of white toward the rear that I think was a reflection on moisture in the air, as it disappeared a couple of seconds later, and only the red and green were visible until the large white one appeared. Another craft intersected its path flying southwestward, at a point near the lower right-hand corner of Pegasus, quite high. The second one sounded like an airplane, so we assume that it was, although not on regular airline route.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 19

9:27 P.M. Brilliant but not scintillating or blinding white light, similar to, but brighter than, previous white lights, but suddenly grew extremely intense, greenish white, described in letter. Would judge first appearance to be perhaps one-third diameter of moon but it happened so fast and frighteningly I cannot depend on my own recollection except in the matter of direction, colour and approximate time.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 20

Shortly after 10:00 P.M. Reddish, glowing, ball-shaped object, first sighted in WNW, apparently proceeding east-northeasterly course, about one-third to one-half diameter of a dime held at arm's length, quite high and fairly distant. So obviously global in shape and not conventional aircraft and presented good opportunity for corroboration, so called R.C.M.P. immediately. It was still about 20° or more West of North after I phoned; it proceeded at constant rate of speed, fairly fast, until in a position about 15° or 20° east of North, when it vanished, a couple of minutes before R.C.M.P. arrival. His skeptical query: "How is it you people are the only ones seeing these things?" Can only say we try not to be, and with some success among friends, but little among officials.

I realize this sketch of Ursa Major is not in proper proportion, but illustrates the speed of one typical distant point of light which we clocked a couple of weeks ago, when at this time of the evening the two end stars of the handle of the Dipper were about horizontal in line at that time of evening. We see one soon after the stars appear every evening that we take time to look, usually pick them up somewhere in region of the Big Dipper or east of it, and may see as many as three in the run of an evening.

On this particular occasion, a second one caught our eye at 9:26 $\frac{1}{2}$ P.M., directly North, lower in the sky than the first one, also proceeding East. Their course is not always straight or speed constant, sometimes standing still for a moment and sometimes ascending or descending gradually, though not taking a direct vertical course; sometimes they gradually lower, continuing their eastward course, then gradually rise; sometimes go off on a tangent seeming to descend to an angle of 45° and disappear in distance, which we interpret to mean they have changed course to northeasterly and are travelling away. They are apt to disappear in distance anywhere after reaching a point about 20° east of North, but often continue through Auriga. They are varying degrees of brightness, and one may be much brighter through part of its course than through the rest of it, or give a sudden flash of brightness.

Their speed varies from a little slower than that of the one illustrated to the one we saw that covered the distance from Ursa Major's tail to the vicinity of Capella in about five or six minutes. The one illustrated is the only one we tried to time precisely and kept notes.

They could not possibly be satellites, weather balloons, or planes unless equipped with lights much more powerful than any we see.

Dear Professor MacNeill:

When I suggested that I might report anything "spectacular" that might occur, I did not realize just how spectacular these things were apt to become. This event will be of interest to you in one capacity or another, if not because of your interest in UFO's, then because of your affiliation with the Meteorite Committee.

On Thursday evening my daughter and I were outdoors as usual on fine nights that we are free; at the particular moment that this took place, she was sitting on the front step on the northerly side of the house, and I was around at the back looking this way and that, facing toward the south, when something bright caught my eye toward my right. Turning quickly to look at it, it appeared as of the same quality as the white lights of which I have written you,, but brighter --it looked to be at fairly close range--then it began to grow in intensity, a brilliant greenish-white, with the effect that it was coming at high speed straight for me, and lighting up the whole area. I wish that I could tell you what next happened to it, but at that moment my only concern was what next was going to happen to us, and I took off around the house like a scared rabbit, expecting to hear anything from a thud to an explosion but nothing happened at all. Jean was still sitting there in the doorway, having seen the flash and thinking it had been heat lightning or some other commonplace thing, since the house faces a little east of north and she had been unable to see the source of the flash.

By the time I had reached the front of the house and told her about it and we went back to take a look, there was no evidence in the sky or anywhere else that anything unusual had taken place. This happened at about 9:27 or 9:28 P.M., in a direction due west, give or take 5° north or south (according to the Pole Star, not magnetic north) and at about 30° or 35° altitude. My boys had been watching television and there had been no interference.

About a half hour later my neighbor, a man with a responsible position with the C.N.R. who has had little patience with our interest in UFO's and has refused to look (I've wished one would land on his lawn) arrived home from work, having driven from Cape Tormentine. I enquired if he had seen anything unusual, and he told me that when he had been driving through Melrose, about halfway between Cape Tormentine and Port Elgin, he had seen a bright "ball" in the sky, which at first he thought was the moon, until it grew extremely bright, lighting up the whole countryside, and "went out." It had been at approximately the same time as we had seen it. I suggested that it might have been a meteor, and he replied that he thought it had been too low, only two or three hundred feet up and stationary, and he doubts that it could have been ^{the same} flare of brightness that we saw.

According to the road map, the road through Melrose, which is fairly straight, runs something like 20° south of West, which would mean that looking a little to his right, as he said he saw it, it must have been almost straight west of him too, and since Melrose is about 25 cross-country miles from here that pinpoints it for you as somewhere between here and Portland, Ore. Big help.

There was none of the reddish quality that I associate in my mind with meteors in the lower atmosphere, or seeing them through it, although admittedly I've never seen one coming in my direction, or a piece of space garbage re-entering, or anything else except meteors burning themselves out while still well away from the horizon. This thing held constant its position as regards angle of elevation, and I never saw anything less red or more awesome in my life.

At first I thought there would be no point in my writing you, since anything as spectacular as this would be bound to come to your attention and the news media would take due note of a brilliant object that lit up the whole eastern end of the province and goodness knows how much else. However, no mention has been made of it in the New Brunswick papers or on radio, and it is an unnatural silence if it was a natural phenomenon. If, as my neighbor believes, the UFO's were putting on separate displays, you might not hear of it except by communications from individuals, therefore this is to inform you. It occurs to me that the Dorchester Chemical Park and C.F.B. Gagetown are both almost directly to our west, and that what I saw would not be unlike a gigantic magnesium flare. I asked the Mounted Policeman when he was here on the occasion mentioned in the enclosed report, and he said he had had reports, but would not say anything to give a clue about how far away it might have been.

Our interview on this occasion was most unsatisfactory. In the first place, he took four or five minutes to get here, a distance of about three blocks, got out of his car after tidying the seat beside him, and on finding the object we had seen had disappeared, enquired how it comes we are the only ones seeing these things. I told him we

are not--that many other people are seeing them, but are keeping quiet about them rather than risk making fools of themselves, which is true; thirteen people of our acquaintance that I can think of have seen these things--fourteen if you count the man next door--which none of them have reported to anyone in authority, but only wonder about privately. Six--seven if you count one we got on the phone in time to look--have been in our company and seen the things we saw on various occasions. Corporal Nowe made a feeble attempt to educate imbecility by showing me through his binoculars the normal red flashes from a star,--I couldn't resist explaining to him the effect of the atmosphere on white light and the spectrum--and he himself mistook Capella for the Pole Star! He had pretended interest when I had enquired previously on the phone, which I had hesitated to do because it does not seem to be in the category of Police business, unless these things may be of foreign terrestrial origin, say from off-shore-based aircraft-carrying sea vessels. (The fact that UFO's are being seen elsewhere would make a dandy cover-up for international snooper.) However, it was evident that his whole intention was to disparage--accidentally he had the cooperation of the object itself--and I will not be calling them again.

Who does one call for corroboration or identification on sighting these things? Especially after 10:30 P.M. or so, one hesitates to call the average private individual, and many who are interested are hampered by trees or other obstructions to view. Knowing that there are things to be seen, it is frustrating to find that the only people with equipment, some technical knowledge and weight of authority are unwilling to look.

We intend to continue scanning for our own enlightenment and entertainment when time and weather permit, but I have reasoned that if we can see as much as we do with patience and the naked eye, then as much would be evident to those manning observation posts in weather stations and defense bases which our taxes are paying to keep on the job, and they have the equipment to follow it up, and personnel to allocate. Therefore our own observations, which can only be descriptive and comparative, not technical seem to me of little practical value.

One thing that bears notice, is that very often (but still a minority of cases) the strangely-lighted craft that we see are following, or near to, the airline route between Moncton and Halifax. We have specified, or left unmentioned, the ones that left us in any doubt as to their conventionality. For some strange reason, most of the objects that we see these nights (there are fewer than during early August) seem to be travelling in an easterly or southerly direction.

May I ask just one question, which should not be categorized as secret? Is there any record of a meteor that would fit the data on my first two pages? Surely information about these is not becoming restricted!

Dear Sir:

The following is a report of a UFO sighting made from Dartmouth, N.S., on the evening of October 7, 1968. The sighting occurred between 6.45 and 7.00 p.m. from this address and involved two other witnesses besides myself -- Mrs. M. Dawson, my mother, and Mrs. K. Dort, my sister.

So far as our reliability as observers is concerned, I personally am a former member of the Nova Scotia Astronomical Society (1954); former council member and editor of publications of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada Halifax Centre (1955-1959). I am also a freelance writer on scientific subjects -- mostly theoretical subjects -- for various American magazines. I am the originator of a number of cosmological theories of my own and have, on occasion, worked in association with top scientists in other countries in developing interesting new concepts.

My sister, Mrs. Dort, is a very honest woman and is noted for her extremely sharp eyesight. I doubt very much that this sighting would have occurred had she not been present. My mother, Mrs. Dawson, hasn't very good eyesight, but she has a powerful set of binoculars to compensate for this deficiency. She, too, is beyond reproach insofar as reliability and integrity are concerned.

All three of us were fortunate enough to have optical equipment on hand when the phenomenon occurred. First, there was my mother's binoculars 7X50 power. Second, there was a brand new Tasco 66TE refractor telescope -- a precision astronomical telescope with a 50 MM objective cell lens (focal length 600 MM). We employed an H5MM eye lens in a 1.5X terrestrial eyepiece, which provided us with 180 power. There was also a 5X24 MM Finderscope with cross-hairs mounted on top of the Tasco 66TE telescope, which could be used by one person while the other looked through the H5MM eye lens of the main scope. Thus, we were all able to view the spectacle under varying degrees of magnification.

Meteorologically, it was a relatively clear sky with random clouds breaking up the monotony here and there.

There were two objects and they were spotted by Mrs. Dort with the naked eye first. They descended from a clear patch of sky over southwestern Halifax and began to lope lazily along over the city in a northerly direction. Mrs. Dawson was next to catch sight of them in her binoculars.

The western horizon was quite bright, the sun having set only a short time before, but the objects were even brighter. To the naked eye they appeared like two extremely white cells of light moving in such proximity that it was hard to resolve them as more than one object.

We were not able to get a fix on them with the telescope until they came to a stop between 10 and 15 degrees above the Halifax horizon due west of our position. They hovered there for 3 or 4 minutes. With maximum magnification possible, the phenomenon resolved itself into two perfectly clear bodies which appeared to be about the size of quarters held at arms length. They were extremely white glowing objects that resembled two bright oval eyes (or flattened bells) floating side by side.

During the period of observation we carried on a continual dialogue among ourselves -- questions and answers -- in order to determine whether we were all seeing the same thing: to prevent ourselves from imagining we saw something which wasn't in fact to be seen. It soon became apparent that we were all looking at precisely the identical thing, there being no variation in our separate descriptions. Because of the duration of the objects' hovering over the horizon, we were able to trade places and view them through one another's instruments.

Shortly before 7 p.m. the objects vanished in a westerly direction. On the chance that there might be others in the metro-area who witnessed the same thing but would fail to report it under normal circumstances, I phoned the news room of Radio Station CJCH. They phoned search and rescue who reported that there was only one aircraft operating in the vicinity at the time. The following morning, however, a navy spokesman stated that there were several planes aloft at 6 p.m. which might have been mistaken for UFOs -- the sighting occurred shortly before 7 p.m., however, and occurred under ideal conditions.

I might add that I was employed by Fairley Aviation of Canada Limited up until a little over a year ago and have a fairly good idea what an airplane looks like close-up and at a great distance. I have yet to see one that in any way resembled what I saw through the telescope -- it wasn't anything man-made, that is 100 % definite.

The following are some personal comments and observations:

(1) The light intensity was particularly remarkable. The objects were so bright that if you stared at them long enough with the naked eye, they seemed to turn black for brief moments. This, I suppose, is not too unusual. If you gaze at an ordinary lightbulb in your home long enough, it will take on a black hue as your eyes reject the torture.

The light emanating (or reflecting) from the objects did not vary from point to point over their respective surfaces. This seems to me to overrule the possibility that they were shining by reflected sunlight. The intensity of the light was equal at all surface points and might imply that the entire "skin" of each object was radiating as a single unit.

If, however, the objects were shining by reflected light, then the material composing them consisted of a highly polished metal or alloy. It is difficult, however, to imagine a polished metal reflecting sunlight with such intensity (unless it was at an extremely great elevation and reflecting the direct rays of the sun rather than low in the depths of the earth's atmosphere). There were no shadows on the objects -- that is, on the side away from the sun -- so I am inclined to believe that they were generating their own light and were quite low in the atmosphere, possibly 2,000 feet above the western horizon.

(2) There was a peculiar texture and bouyancy about the objects that continued to intrigue me long after they vanished from view. So far as texture and surface quality are concerned, they seem to have closely resembled that of a white pearl. Yet, as I stated earlier, the light intensity was equal from all surface points -- like it was radiating from inside a diffusion glass, or like a flourescent tube.

The way the objects hovered -- sort of drifting lazily like vessels afloat in some invisible sea -- gave me the impression that they were extremely light in density, at least their outer skins had this quality about them. I am reminded, of all things, of an ordinary tea-strainer -- how solid and rigid it is, on one hand, and how light and bouyant it is on the other. The tea strainer, of course, is made of metal strands woven together which gives one the impression of solidity, but the numerous spaces between these strands causes it to be a whole lot lighter in weight than it appears at first glance.

The mysterious objects over Halifax didn't show any sign of being composed of thin metallic strands woven together, but then we weren't examining them at first hand -- that is, close enough to determine whether their skins were solid or woven together with tiny spaces in between the strands. To us, from our distance, they appeared to be solid, rigid structures with the same clarity of configuration -- sharpness of outline -- that an ordinary car or truck reveals during a trip across the Angus L. MacDonald Bridge. Yet, unlike the motor car on the ground, they seemed to have a certain weightlessness about them: a certain lightness and bouyancy that can be best compared to a tea strainer.

In conclusion, as a man who has been investigating mysterious phenomena in our skies and in space for over 20 years, I am quite thrilled that I have had the incredibly good fortune to have sighted these objects. To me this amazing phenomenon was somewhat of a reward for my years of effort to unravel the secrets of the universe. Whatever doubts I harbored before about UFOs are now entirely obliterated -- they exist, as surely as I exist, and I hope you will be similarly rewarded in your quest for understanding of this fascinating mystery.

● I know of other people who have seen six V.F.O.'s moving toward the east in a pattern like this:

They stopped at once and remained there for the night. The next night they were gone.

I also know of a man who has seen a V.F.O. down near his ^{farm} house. He has a farm in the woods about five miles from New Germany. He lives in New Germany, but occasionally goes there to look the place over.

A couple of hours after he arrived there one night last fall, a brightly coloured saucer-shaped U.F.O. came out of the sky and ~~was~~ ^{circled} over the house about ~~no~~ fifty feet over the roof, then shot up ~~up~~ quickly and went out of sight. It made no sound whatever and did not stir up the slightest breeze. It was a sparkling, brilliant white when it was over the house, but turned ^{flickering} red as it went up and out. No-one else saw it as there are no near-neighbours to his farm.

One last thing I would like to add is a strange ^{thing} happening to a radio station. The station is WBZ, Boston, on 1030 Kilocycles. It has a power of 50,000 watts ~~in the night~~.

Normally I can't get it very well in the night, and not in the day at all. But in August, 1966, I got it one day - it came in about as good as I would get a Halifax station in New Germany. In the night it was the loudest and clearest station on the dial. There was about absolutely no fluctuation in its strength day or night, ~~this went~~ it stayed the same, even when ~~all~~ other stations faded out in the night. ~~This went~~

on, until December that year. ~~This increased~~ Then suddenly, as I was listening to it one day in December, it went out just as one would click a switch. The next night, it returned to its weak strength as it was back in August four months before. The same thing happened in 1967, but for a shorter time. On June 21, I was listening to my radio. I had just ~~two~~ passed over its frequency, 1030, ten minutes after I turned it on. ~~The radio~~ There was nothing there. Five minutes later, it was on just as the year before. It stayed on like this until June 30, when I happened to be listening to the radio at 1:30 p.m. In the middle of a record, the station went off ~~like the click~~ with no click or noise, ^{or fading out.} It just stopped. It hasn't come on that strong again since.

I have made these observations with many radios, from a cheap transistor, to a powerful console stereo. With the car radio, I was able to get it all over Nova Scotia.

I have written to the station, and they said they had not increased their power during these two periods, nor have done anything to make their station come in like this.

The fact that I am trying to put forward is that U.F.O.'s could have been receiving this station, and re-broadcasting it to out into space to other, larger U.F.O.'s, probably landing bases. What we received on the earth could have been the U.F.O. transmitter, not the station, during the two periods of increased strength. Direction-finding equipment might have been able to tell if the signal was coming from Boston, but if anyone had tried this, they might have not been able to prove anything if the U.F.O. transmitter was directly ~~over~~ over Boston, where it probably would have been to get the best signal. The U.F.O. transmitter may be much superior to ours, thus overriding all interference from atmospheric conditions, and hiding its direction. Would you please send me forms to fill out when spotting U.F.O.'s.

Dear Sir:

I have been watching U.F.O.'s for the last five months, this and have seen them move through the sky as Blain Henshaw at CKBW Radio in Bridgewater did.

The first ~~or~~ moving ones I've seen were on the 8th. of July. I was looking toward the north, when a light appeared out of nowhere. At first it was red, then sparkled and turned white. When it changed from red to white, it seemed to have a gaseous vapor around it. When it became white, it was a steady bright light which moved across the sky in a jumpy pattern, accelerating at ~~fantastic~~ a fantastic rate. It generally travelled much faster than a jet. When it approached the east, it turned red gradually from white, stayed red for a short time, then quickly went out.

Others I've seen went from the south to the east. Some ^{were} stayed red as they moved across the sky. These sparkled brilliantly the whole time, and seemed to throw out showers of red and yellow sparks. They all travelled very fast, and I could hear no sounds whatever. I've seen a few which were going in one direction, then stop and go backward, then go ahead again.

I have told you about the ones that move. There are a few others that stay in one spot.

Here is a diagram of a constellation of stars which is in the

Southwest near the horizon as seen around 9 or 10 p.m.



The star I've circled, since the first week in July has been different ^{and sparkles throwing sparks} the rest: It is yellow in colour, while the others are white. It moves around, mostly from side to side, but it doesn't move out of its general position (not more than its diameter away). Before the first week in July, it was a small white light like the other stars.

Another one, the first one I've seen back in March did the same thing, up until May, when it stopped moving around and became a steady white light. The constellation is in the top of the sky at 9 p.m. this time of year. It is the circled star that did this:

As far as I can figure, ^{the} V.F.O.'s placed themselves up very high so they would appear to be directly in front of these stars as seen on the earth in order to hide themselves. These H.F.O.'s could be large space stations which send out the smaller, saucer-shaped ships.

I could not tell whether this object appeared close to the surface of the moon or many miles above it.

But the colors of this object were definitely reflected through my telescope.

I used different eye pieces, so that I wasn't making any mistake about what I saw. And it did exist. I am very skeptic about flying saucers, as I've been observing for over one year, and haven't seen any as yet.

The only thing which seem strange is the fact that for this object to be seen by me at that distance, it would have to be considerably large.

My dear Prof. MacNeil,

I am writing this in response to your request in the Halifax Chronicle-Herald of Aug. 29th; and let me start this note by saying that I am a sceptic. I am afraid I have not the imagination to believe in a U.F.O. However, last Tuesday night I was standing on our terrace in Chester over looking Mahone Bay. I went out to see the moon going down over western shore. It looked like a huge slice of orange and caused a spectacular stream of orange light on the water. While looking toward the west I saw what I thought must be a small plane flying to see the lonely moon set.

• It flew up and down over western shore vertically and horizontally, for perhaps five to ten minutes before streaking east immediately in front of me over Big Gooseberry Island. My only question is — if the occupants were trying to see the moon, why was the plane so well lighted on the outside as well as within? I saw no blinking port or starboard lights.

I understand a second lighted object was seen. This, it was quite obvious to me, was a falling star seen so often in August.

What I thought was a plane, although more brightly lighted than I have seen before, flew off in the direction

of Halifax. Has there been an investigation of air fields in the vicinity to find out if a small plane was cleared that night?

I would be quite interested to know your findings on the incident, and if you have time would appreciate hearing from you. My address in Chester is "Half Moon", Chester, N.S. and after September 9th, Owings Mills, Md. U.S.A.

I am writing to you tonight because I feel that what my wife and I saw last Sunday evening should be brought to your attention. I know it seems strange to get a second report from me, and believe me, I thought about it a great deal, before writing

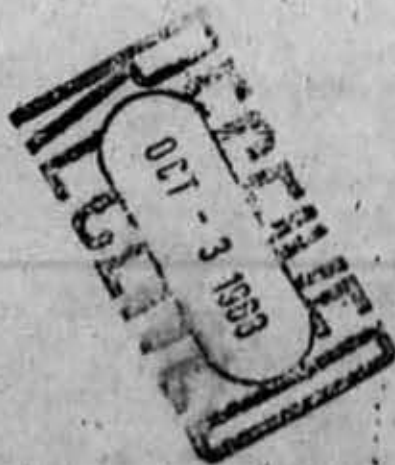

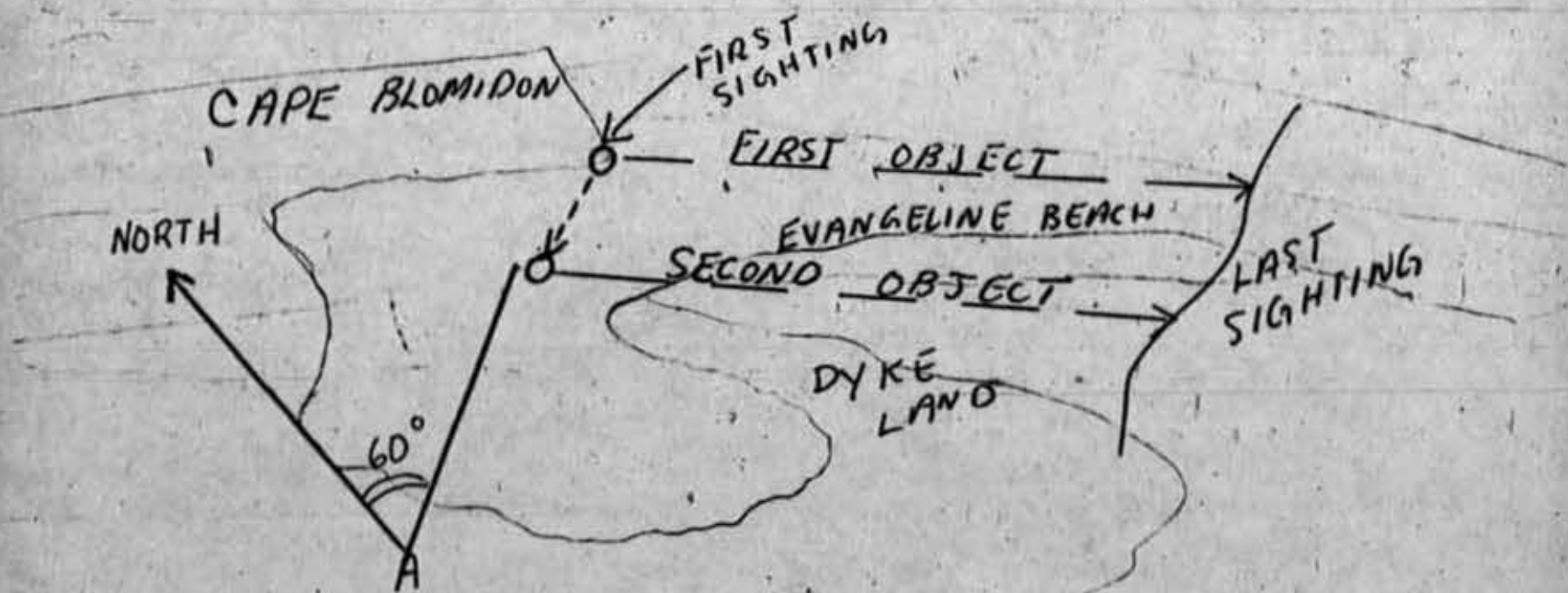

1. On the above date Fred LINCOLN, North Pacific Fish Cannery near Port Edward, B.C., reported to this office, at approx. 5:30 pm, that he had just observed an unidentified flying object flying from South to North over the above Cannery.

2. The following information concerns the sighting. The points are listed as outlined in OPERATION MANUAL CO-Air paragraph 6.

- A. 14 JAN 69 - 5:00 pm P.S.T.
- B. Clear
- C. Fred LINCOLN, Native Indian, North Pacific Fish Cannery near Port Edward, BC
- D. Near North Pacific fish cannery.
- E. LINCOLN only person to observe U.F.O.
- F. Dirigible shaped balloon with small stabiliser fins on rear, 30 - 40' in length, approx. 20' in diameter, grey in color, no motor sound, no lights. U.F.O. had what appeared to be a mooring cable or rope affixed to the leading end, same was approx. 5' in length. U.F.O. was flying at an altitude of approx. 1,000 feet. Same appeared to be travelling at a speed of 50 - 100 mph.
- G. Approx. 5 minutes.
- H. n/a

3. As it was originally suspected that the U.F.O. might have been a weather balloon, a check was made with the Meteorological Station, Digby Island, B.C. They advise that there should be no balloons in the area. They further advise that the above description is not that of a weather balloon. The above department contacted and advised #1 - Air Sea Rescue Co-ordinator - Vancouver and #2 - Air Transport Command - Vancouver about the reported sighting. They were in turn advised that the Canadian U.F.O. program had been discontinued.

1. At approx. 9:20 P.M., Mrs. DONALD LUNN of Valleyview contacted this office and advised that she and her husband had observed an object flying over Valleyview. She stated that she had observed a "pinkish" light that had appeared from the south-west, appearing high over town travelling south-east. The light then disappeared and then again appeared in the south-west and returned over the town. The object then seemed to hover over the town and then appeared to drop down. It then disappeared and was again sighted north of town very high in the sky and it could be seen at this time.

2. Upon receipt of this phone call, Cst. B.M. HURST went outside and observed this object at which time was north of Valleyview and appeared to be very high. It appeared at this time as a "pinkish" light. Cst. HURST then contacted me and I observed this object for a matter of approx. 2 - 3 mins. at which time it was travelling in a northerly direction and then disappeared. This object appeared to me as a pinkish colored light which was very high. It appeared to be travelling at a very high rate of speed. The brightness of the light would change in intensity and the object at this time just appeared to be a pinkish colored star that was moving quite rapidly in a north-easterly direction across the sky. Cst. R.F. MATTSOON of this detachment also observed this same object from his residence.

3. Telex Message VV15 was dispatched from this office giving details of this.

"22 JAN. 69"

4. Donald LUNN was contacted further in regards to this sighting. LUNN stated that he first observed the object to the south-west of Valleyview as a yellowish-orange light, quite high in the sky. The object was travelling to the south-east and after it got south of Valleyview it appeared to change direction and head straight south and then disappeared. LUNN then went back into his house and a minute or two later he saw the object again from his window again in the south-west. It appeared lower and brighter at this time and appeared as a yellowish-orange glow. The object got straight south of town and appeared to come down. It then hovered and appeared to move from side to side and then come down lower. LUNN stated that it then appeared to disappear behind buildings so he got into his truck and drove south of town up on the hill but could not see the object anymore. He then came back to town and saw the object to the north of town, very high and it appeared travelling in a north-easterly direction and then disappeared. LUNN stated that this all occurred during the period from 8:45 PM to 9:30 PM. LUNN stated that at no time was he able to make out any definite shape

but that it appeared only as a brilliant light.

5. Other persons reporting the sighting of this object were William BOMBUARD and his son, both of Valleyview and William PORCHUK of Valleyview. BOMBUARD was contacted and he advised that he had also seen the object south of Valleyview at which time it appeared very low. BOMBUARD related pretty well the same as LUNN and both of them stated that they did not hear any sound from the object even though it appeared quite close. The 21-JAN. 69 was clear and approx. 30 degrees below zero at the time.


6. William PORCHUK was contacted and he advised that he had seen the object on Monday night, 20 JAN. 69. PORCHUK stated that he first observed it come over the water tower which is straight east of Valleyview and when he first saw it he thought that it was a plane that was on fire. Stated that at this time it appeared to be approx. 2' orange ball but that he could not tell how far away it was. When it got closer it looked to be about 1' in diameter. It then hovered over the town for approx. 1 minute and then took off directly east. This occurred at approx. 8:15 - 8:20 P.M. This was observed through field glasses but PORCHUK stated that there was no definite shape due to the intensity of the light.

7. There have been others that state that this object has been seen since this time but none have volunteered any information in this regard.

"28 JAN. 69"

8. At 10:00 P.M. this date a phone call was received from Mrs. Mary JACKSON that she was watching an object to the west of Valleyview. I along with other members stationed here observed this light in the sky which appeared to be quite far off and appeared as a light in the sky. This appeared as a pinkish reddish light again and would change in intensity from reddish to a white color. This appeared stationary and then just appeared to disappear. This was observed for approx. 5 mins.

STATEMENT OF ARCHIE VAN BIBBER

taken at Carmacks, Y.T. on 23 JAN 69.

On January 20th, 1969, at about 9.00 P.M., or a little later, I was driving to Mount Nansen Mines from Carmacks. I had two passengers, John BUROWSKI and Bill McGRATH. At about Mile 5 we first saw the objects. We stopped and looked and just over the tree top level we saw a blue light. It appeared to be changing size some, and was moving from left to right and back, just sort of hovering. After awhile it started moving slowly towards Mount Nansen. I would estimate it to be about 15 miles S.W. from us at this time.

Sky clear and black, stars out and partial moon. Archie Van BIBBER is surface foreman at Mount Nansen Mines. Born at Pelly Crossing in 1914.

We started driving again, after the thing moved out of sight, and from the top of the hill over Victoria Creek, about 5 miles from Mount Nansen and about 1 mile from the air strip, we saw the lights of Mount Nansen and to the left of Mount Nansen, on top of the ridge about 1 mile South of Mount Nansen, we saw the thing again. It looked bigger this time and a short time later it suddenly shot over the ridge, leaving a red flash or trail of fire behind it. This was the last we saw of it this night.

We watched for about 5 minutes at 5 mile and for a very few seconds at Victoria Creek. All I can give as a description was that it looked like a round blue light, pulsing light and darker and the last time we saw it it moved very fast.

STATEMENT OF BILL McGRATH

Of Mount Nansen Mines, taken on 23rd JAN 69 at Mount Nansen, Y.T

On a evening in late November, 1968, Punch COYNE, Supt. at the mine, and I, were driving to Carmacks at about 6.00 P.M. At a point about 6 miles from camp (Mount Nansen) we saw one large bright yellowish light several miles off to the right of the road. The light appeared to pulsate steadily and appeared to move up and down. We then saw a second light behind us and thought it was another car coming. Before we saw the second light the first one had taken a couple of dips up and down and had then taken off, heading West towards camp. It might have been the same light coming back when we saw it the second time, because it wasn't a car.

About 12 miles from Carmacks we saw a light for the third time, ahead of us, but we never got close enough to check on it.

On 20 JAN 69, I was with Archie VAN BIBBER, coming to the camp from Carmacks, at about 9.00 P.M. We saw it South of the road again, at about mile 7 - 8 from Carmacks. The light looked the same but was bigger and brighter and appeared to be closer. We stopped and checked again and it appeared to be moving back and forth awhile. We started driving again and stopped several times to check, but it didn't seem to change much. Finally it seemed to fade and then we lost it. When we were near camp we saw it again, near to the camp. We just saw it when it seemed to turn red and it rapidly took off over the hill past camp. At first it had been more or less yellow with a light blue aurora around it. It changed more blueish, then to the red. I've seen this now on two occasions and have no idea what it might have been. I've never seen anything like it before.

STATEMENT OF John VEVERS -

About the 17th. of December, 1968 I was up to the fuel tank putting gas in a truck. I saw a light, about level with Tit mountain. It wasn't moving, and was low on the horizon. From a white glow, it turned to a reddish colour, then green, then back to white again. I observed it for about 15 minutes, but when I got in and backed the truck down the hill, I noticed it softly just glowed out like a candle and disappeared. It didn't move at all while I observed it, nor did it make any noise. It was hard to judge the distance, but appeared in the vicinity of Tit mountain, about 3 or 4 miles. I couldn't make out any distinct shape, just a light which changed colours. I am employed here at Mt. Nansen as the master mechanic. This is the only time I have ever observed such a phenomenon. It was about 8:00 p.m. when I saw this light. I was by myself at this time and I don't know of anyone else in camp who saw this.

STATEMENT OF Erik MARSBOLL -

Last night I saw a strange object, under the following circumstances:

- (a) 20 JAN 69 - 9:45 p.m.
- (b) Sky was clear and dark, stars out & slice of moon.
- (c) Erik MARSBOLL, DB: 27 AUG 25, Odense, Denmark.
Employed by Mt. Nansen Mines Ltd. as light truck driver
- (d) In a pickup truck driving from Carmacks towards the mine, between mile 5 & 7. Sat & watched it from truck.
- (e) Nil other observers. (Arche VAN BIBBER from minesite.)
- (f) Two objects size & shape of a 45 gal. drum., appeared to be light blue & turquoise, brighter than a 19 candle light, sharp clear light; they came down from the sky towards the valley, and appeared to hover and send down beams, the same colour light but not as bright as themselves. I figure they were approx. 20 miles away from where I was parked, and from the height of the beam, they appeared to be a mile off the ground. Both of them hovered from 2 to 3 minutes, then disappeared like a light bulb softly fading out of sight.
- (g) 2 or 3 minutes.
- (h) After I saw the above mentioned objects, I drove on, and about mile 15 I looked up to the right of the road, and saw 4 lights come down the measurements between being exactly the same. As they came toward me, they were in a line following each other. As they approached the valley they turned broadside to me, hovered then disappeared in a line again. They appeared to come into one light or object, then softly faded out like the first objects. This didn't take more than a minute altogether, before they came and disappeared. The second objects also appeared to put down a beam when they were over the valley, before they left.

I wish to submit the following, as I believe it may be of interest.

Time: 6:45 a.m. to 6:53 a.m. - Sunday, December 14, 1968.

Position: $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles west of longitude $122^{\circ} 00'$ and 6 miles north of latitude $56^{\circ} 30'$. Rough position - 18 miles west of Mile 106, Alaska Highway.

Altitude: 2,500 feet.

Surface temperature: 20° below zero. Sky clear of clouds, stars visible, no wind. (Vapor trail from jet plane made shortly after sighting remained in straight line for long period before dispersing).

At 6:45 a.m., Sunday, December 14th, two men and I were waiting for sunrise to commence hunting and were positioned looking due north on a hill overlooking two meadows. Behind and between the meadows two ranges of hills are situated with aspens and spruce silhouetted on their summits which were visible in the twilight of the early morning sky.

The first range being one and a half miles away, while the second is situated three and a half miles distance.

I observed what I believed to be a very bright twinkling (changing colors) star, but as it was so bright I drew the attention of my companions to it. As we all were remarking about its clearness to our surprise, it moved a short distance in a straight line flight in a westerly direction, then stopped. (The movement had not acceleration or deceleration, just fast travel between two points). The position in relation to our view was now at two o'clock and its altitude approximately four thousand feet. It remained perfectly still for one full minute, then dropped like a meteor a distance of some three thousand, five hundred feet, in a south westerly direction, then stopped abruptly.

We could see it through the silhouettes of the first line of trees (1½ miles away), but it was in front of the second range (3½ miles) away. It now appeared the size of a 3/8 of an inch disc of alternating (changing colors) radiant light.

As it reached its lowest point of fall it changed course and travelled in a north westerly direction parallel to the earth's surface. This line of flight continued for approximately one mile then changed at an acute angle to travel almost due east. This easterly line of flight continued for approximately 1½ miles, then changed course from a point to travel south westerly for half a mile, then due north for a distance not defined as only diminishing size could be observed.

The flight now stopped and the alternating light became perfectly still (so still you could imagine it sitting in space on a gigantic unseen tripod). It remained so for a full minute then moved upward in vertical flight for 1,000 feet or so, then dropped to a point lower than we had previously observed it. From this low position it immediately rose to a point midway between the high and low points of flight and remained stationary for a full minute and a half. As it was in this stationary position, Dal Heservy (one of the men with me) flashed the car head lights on and off. Whether this had any significance or not I do not know, but the light moved towards us at great speed and stopped at a point between the first line of trees and the car (I estimate this point at approximately 1 mile distance).

It became stationary and remained so long enough for us to really note with some detail the nature of the light emitted. There were two distinct phases of the light--one being a very pure pale green as produced by an expensive light filter of very precise frequency, while the other was a very bright transparent white light of adamantine lustre.

The light alternated constantly throughout the entire period we had it under observation. Then it suddenly moved away into the northern sky at an enormous speed and was out of sight in two seconds (the light becoming smaller and smaller as it became further away until it finally disappeared).

Points of Scientific Interest

- (a) All flight was in straight lines, change in direction was from points (as in a geometry figure). Example - the general impression was that of the flight of a humming bird.
- (b) The light was always of a constant brightness (as if beamed always towards us)--not as in conventional aircraft where the beams change direction to the stationary observed as the plane maneuvers.

- (c) There was no solid form of any kind seen, only the light.
- (d) There was no audible noise (complete silence).
- (e) All observations were made in the open with only the atmosphere between observer and subject.
- (f) All distances were calculated by the aid of known locations of trees and other land marks by which the object moved.

I served a five year apprenticeship in professional photography in England, and worked as a photographic artist for Campbells Studios in Vancouver, Canada, prior to joining the Department of Agriculture of B.C. I have taken courses in microsophy and optics at the Faculty of Medicine, U.B.C.

The above is outlined as I wish to express the fact that I am very well aware of artifacts and aborations in optics, together with the fact that I am trained in critical observation as to focus, structure and alumination of objects.

I state that what we observed was emitting light, had a position and size and was always in critical focus not fuzzy or diffused in any way.

Thank you very much for your clear and detailed account of your sighting of December 14 as contained in your letter of January 10. It is difficult for me to arrive at a complete solution of your sighting especially since I cannot recover some of the quantitative measurements.

The nature of what you saw most closely resembles the phenomenon observed when a star image is modified by peculiar and unusual conditions in our atmosphere. The results of such action may be quite spectacular producing rapid motion of the image including changes of shape and colour. While I cannot be certain that this is the explanation of what you saw, this seems to fit best with the nature of your observation. We have put your record on file, and we should like to thank you for your co-operation in reporting to us.

Willow Lake area, N.W.T., 24 Jan 69,
(Assistance to Canadian Armed Forces)

27 Jan 69

1. This date NORWEGIAN came to this office and reported that last Friday, 24 Jan 69, while he had been sitting in his cabin, situated on the west end of Willow Lake, (72 air miles NE of Fort Simpson) he had noticed a flaming object, flying at a high rate of speed to the west of his cabin, the object flying in a northerly direction. NORWEGIAN stated that he ran from his cabin and observed the following: (in accordance with "C" Department Operational Manual)
 - (a) Friday, 24 Jan 69, 7:15 PM, Pacific Standard time,
 - (b) Clear sky, very cold,
 - (c) West end of Willow Lake, N.W.T.,
 - (d) Continuous flames, resembling a blow torch,
 - (e) Very bright, NORWEGIAN described it as resembling the igniting of an acetelyne torch,
 - (f) Black dot, with blue green flame,
 - (g) Black front, 150' to 200' flame shooting from the back,
 - (h) Observed for a period of 1½ to 2 minutes,
 - (i) Sounded like an uneven screaming jet sound,
 - (j) NORWEGIAN first saw the object approximately 3 or 4 miles to the west, of his cabin travelling in a northerly direction, and he advised that the object was angling toward the ground and after watching the object for approximately 2 minutes it went over a hill about 10 miles away and behind some trees, and all of a sudden the noise stopped. He explained that there was no explosion, or any loud noise.
2. NORWEGIAN advised that there is a company working near Willow Lake and he travelled to the camp and inquired about the UFO and a man named Pete said that he had seen the same thing. The name of the company is Esterbrook and at present we are unable to drive to their camp, however it has been learned that this company is moving to the Horn Mountain area, near Fort Providence.
3. NORWEGIAN is well known to members of this detachment and is considered as a stable and reliable source of information. He further advised that in the past he has seen meteorites and explained that he felt sure that what he had seen was not a meteorite.
4. I advised Sgt. D. FRIESEN, Fort Smith Sub/Division, this date, of the above occurrence. I also advised D.O.T. seradio of the above and requested information concerning any missing aircraft around the time in question. After some enquiries D.O.T. advised that there were no missing aircraft.

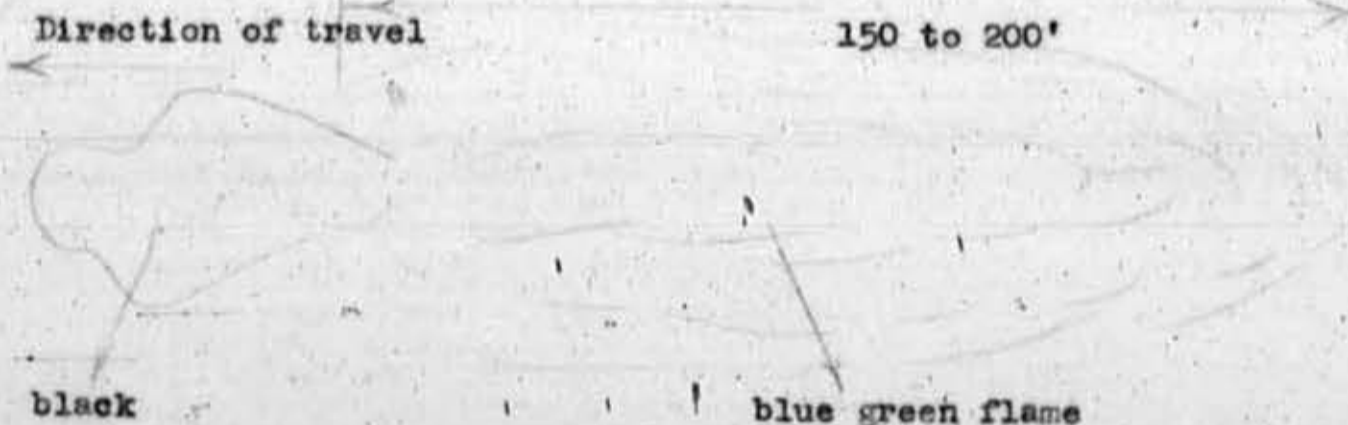

1. A telephone call was received from Maurcen (Mrs. Roland) JOHNSTON to the effect that she and her husband had seen a U.F.O. a few minutes before. Mrs. JOHNSTON was very upset however she stated the object was disc-shaped and had windows in it. She further advised that her husband was enroute to Crossfield, taking their baby sitter home. The JOHNSTON'S reside on a farm 4 miles west and 1 1/2 miles south of Crossfield, Alberta.

2. Mr. JOHNSTON was located in Crossfield and interviewed relative to this matter. He had left the farmhouse immediately after the object had been seen and had not discussed it with his wife to any degree. Mr. JOHNSTON stated the object had been disc-shaped and that he observed windows along the contour of the object. He indicated that there was glowing yellow light coming through the windows and that this was the same colour as a long pointed object coming from the rear of the object. He could not say if the object coming from the rear could have been exhaust. JOHNSTON estimated the object to be the size of a large airplane and to be 2 - 3,000 feet in altitude. He stated it appeared to be about 1 mile north of his farmhouse and proceeding from west to east. JOHNSTON stated he could easily be wrong in his estimate of size and distance as he did not observe the object for more than about 5 seconds. He felt its speed was over 900 mph.

3. Patrol was made to the JOHNSTON farmhouse. Mrs. JOHNSTON was interviewed and she stated she had first noticed the object and brought it to the attention of her husband. They had just driven into their yard and were facing in a north westerly direction when she looked out the window and saw what she thought was a meteorite. Both were seated in their truck at this time. She told her husband to "look at the meteorite" however she then took a better look and claims she saw windows in the object. Her husband, seated in the driver's seat of the truck, had to move the gun visor and on looking also saw the object. Mrs. JOHNSTON said the circumstances were the same as described by her husband and that she saw the object for possibly 10 seconds. Mrs. JOHNSTON got out of the truck to see the object better however suddenly both the lights and object disappeared. There was no noise heard.

4. When interviewed Mrs. JOHNSTON was still upset. She is an amateur astronomer and mentioned that the planet Venus had set prior to their arriving home. There were no stars shining to the north at the time the object was sighted. The sky was clear and there was no haze or mist. The temperature was about 30 degrees below. No Northern lights were visible. A flare pit was visible

A FLARE PIT WAS VISIBLE to the north west of the farmhouse. To the east of the farm is a large Petrochemical Plant that was giving off a large quantity of smoke and steam. Both the pit and Plant are well known to JOHNSTON and as he is a foreman at the Plant he is familiar with them. He stated neither could have caused an illusion similar to the object he saw.

5. Mr. JOHNSTON has been known to myself for about two years. He has been found to be reliable and I consider him to be very level headed. Neither he nor his wife drink alcohol and both were found to be very sincere in telling their stories. Both persons advised that they could be far out in their estimate of size and distance of the object as it was not in their sight long enough for them to really make a good sighting. There are no other occupied farmhouses for about 1 mile in any direction from their farm. No other U.F.O. reports were received from persons in this area.

6. From the investigation made I feel that the JOHNSTONS did see something and that their descriptions are the best they could make in view of the length of time they had the object in sight. Crossfield Message 69/2 was sent to Calgary Sub Division. The correct spelling of JOHNSTON was not given in the Telex and might it please be amended.

- At 5.50 PM, Mr. Gordon Bishop Sr. of Ste. Rose du Lac, Man., reported that he and his family had just observed an Unidentified Flying Object and if I wanted to see it, to look towards the West just above the horizon. I looked towards the West as instructed but did not see any U.F.O.
- I talked to Bishop later that evening and learned that his son Gordon Jr. (15 yrs), around 5.00 PM had been looking out a window on the West side of the house and observed a white light in the Western sky. As he watched, it appeared to go up and down and then it came down to a point just above the tree line. As the object commenced to come towards Ste. Rose du Lac, Gordon mentioned the fact to his sister Peggy (16yrs) and two of her friends, Cecile ZASTRE (BD 12 Apr 1950) and Mary-Ange JACOB (BD 11 Mar 1950) of Ste. Rose du Lac, the statements of Gordon Jr. and the three girls, attached hereto on Appendices "B" to "E" inclusive. According to Gordon Jr. and the girls, the object seemed to hover directly over the village of Ste Rose du Lac at a height no greater than approximately 100 feet. It stayed in that position for close to five minutes at which time they observed it was circular in shape, with a dome in the middle. There were lights running along the middle of this object, with the one at the front being red in colour, the next one blue, there was a green light in the middle and the end was black (Gordon Jr. described it initially as a black light) There also appeared to be heat waves emitting from this object. The object was silver in colour at that particular time. The object then reversed itself and disappeared to the South-West.
- Gordon Bishop Sr. and his wife had been into Dauphin, Man. that afternoon and returning around 5.40 PM, he noticed the youngsters standing outside and looking towards the West. They related the above story to Bishop Sr. and while showing him where the object had appeared, he saw a black thin object appear in the West and proceed towards Ste. Rose du Lac. Bishop Sr. claims it was not an aircraft. His statement is attached hereto on Appendix "A".
- A check with the Dauphin Airport revealed there were two aircraft in that vicinity around 6.00 PM, but nothing in the area prior to that time.
- In compliance with Operational Manual - Co-Air Para.6, our message #1. was dispatched to our Dauphin Communications at 7.20 PM.

6. Around 5.45 PM this date, Bishop Sr. called me again and reported sighting another flying object in the West and this one was heading towards the South-East. Using binoculars, I observed either a commercial jet or a military aircraft coming from the West and heading in the general direction mentioned by Bishop.

7. The photographs taken by Bishop and his son were taken on a colour film, only one turned out, having been developed by the Winnipeg Tribune in black and white. The picture is not clear, but a silver object slightly larger than a pin-head can be seen just above the horizon in the general area where the youngsters saw the U.F.O. No definite characteristics of the alleged U.F.O. can be made out from the photograph. After receiving the negatives of the film from the Tribune, Bishop sent them away to be developed in colour. They were all developed with the exception of the one mentioned above, the negative of which, was not returned. If Bishop recovers the missing negative, I could have our Ident. Branch develop some prints if the NRC Meteor Centre so desires.

8. I consider Gordon Bishop Sr., to be a reliable person, he is a Councillor for the Village of Ste. Rose du Lac, Man. and is also in charge of the local Civil Defence Office. Although I am inclined to believe his particular sighting may have been the type of aircraft mentioned in Para. 6 of this report, he would not knowingly mislead authorities in matters of this nature. I also believe the teen-agers saw something in the sky and are truthful. However it is difficult to understand why no one else reported the sighting if it was actually that close to the village. Mr. Laurent Menec who was listed as a witness in our Message #1, did not see anything when the youngsters brought the sighting to his attention (He is a Science Teacher at the Ste. Rose High School), but this was after Bishop Sr. had returned home and the object had disappeared.

9. Unless further action is required as per the final sentence of Para. 7, this investigation will be considered closed.

"On Sunday Feb 2, 1969 at approximately 5:40 PM I returned from Dauphin. While driving up the street I saw three girls standing in my yard without any coats on. The temperature was 14° below at this time. The girls were staring towards the sky.

Upon entering the house I asked my son Gordon Jr. what had happened. He explained that he and the girls had seen something strange in the sky.

I started to question him on what he had saw and where it had come from. While he was showing me through the kitchen window a black, thin object appeared in the west. This object came towards town. I watched this object for approximately two or three minutes then phoned the R.C.M.P.; took my camera and went out to try and take a picture. Outside my vision was obscured by a telephone cable. This object tilted on it's side, sat motionless for a few seconds, then disappeared up in the air towards the south-west."

Then Peggy called Marie-Ange, Jackie and myself to the window to see the object. It was very bright and when it came closer to us it appeared oval shaped with a dome on top. A red light was blinking. There was a black tip in the front and on each end there were heat waves. It moved back quickly to where it was before and started to move southward. Gordon Jr. said he saw it appear above the treeline at the West. I then went outside to look at it better. Gordie then came out also and took a picture. It kept moving quite quickly and then went behind a cloud and disappeared when it was about south, south-east. About 5:30 a second object appeared from above the tree line. We had phoned our Science teacher when we saw the first one but he could not see it. We went to see him when the second one appeared and pointed it out to him. This one did not appear to be as close as the other one (first). It was bright in colour then it suddenly started turning black at the tip towards the end. It continued to travel southward a few more minutes (while still black) and the tip changed to a pinkish colour and changed that colour till the end of the object. It was dome-shaped and as it seemed to be stopped there were heat waves all around it. There seemed to be something revolving at the bottom of it and it vibrated. On the left side there was a black object and there were lights blinking off and on on the right side. Then it rose quickly in the west and travelled through the sky and disappeared all of a sudden. We went outside and could hear no sound. My parents then came home at 5:30 and as my brother was pointing out the direction it again appeared about ten minutes later. This time the object was much higher and further away. It appeared in the same place. At first it was black and travelled quite rapidly across the sky. Then starting on the right it began turning pink till the object was completely pink. It moved west again and from where we were it disappeared behind smoke from a chimney."

"Sunday, February 2/69 about 5:20 PM I was over at BISHOP'S. Gordie BISHOP Junior called his sister Peggy and 3 of us to the window. He pointed out an object in the sky. He had been watching this object for about 15 mins. It was moving terribly fast. We were all fascinated by it. We watched it move - and it moved fast.

It first was white in color. It came very close to us. I saw one bright light on it. It was oval shaped being higher in the center. It had a black thing on the end. It came very close to us. We went outside to examine it closer. It seemed to move closer to us and rush back. When it came closer it seemed to have heat waves around. It was moving terribly fast. From West across by the South and disappeared below the tree line. All of what I saw was directly above the tree line.

Everyone was puzzled at what they saw. Gordie Jr. spotted another one in the sky above the tree line about 10 to 15 apart. This time it was black. It seemed stretched out in length. Then it turned a pinkish-orange from one end to another. Then it disappeared. It didn't disappear up or down. It seemed to disappear out of the atmosphere. It appeared the same height but seemed to just push away."

Report of Sighting at Ste. Rose, Manitoba Canada (30 Miles east of Dauphin, Man.)

Mr. Meneo described the object as disc-shaped and moving at a slow speed from his right to left. He was looking in a westerly direction indicating movement was from the north to the south. He stated that the size was somewhat smaller than a straight pin held at arms length. Mr. Meneo was unable to approximate the distance that the UFO was from his position. He stated the colour was pink and felt this was due to the setting sun's reflection. Duration of his observation was about three minutes.

Miss Peggy Bishop was in her house when she first noticed the UFO. At 5:20 p.m. she watched it for approximately 10 minutes. She stated, "At first it looked just like a bright light. It started coming closer and I saw lights blinking off and on. The others said the lights were coloured but I couldn't tell. All I could see was the lights blinking off and on." She described it as disc-shaped with a dome on the top. She saw "something dark or black on the left hand side of it". This dark spot was a part of the object, Miss Bishop felt. She stated that when it was at its closest point to them, the size was a little larger than a paper safety match held at half arm's length. She went outside and said that it grew in brightness and it came closer. As it reached its closest point it "hovered" and at this time, wobbled and gave off what Miss Bishop describes as "heat waves". She had the impression that the wobbling was due to the fact the object was revolving. The object retreated into the distance and appeared like a bright star. Her second observation came ten minutes later in company with her brother and parents who had just returned home. This time, as the object approached it was black in colour. Confirmation of this was received by Mr. Bishop Sr. and his son Gordon. Miss Bishop stated it was only two blocks away at its closest approach on this second occasion.

The second incident followed similarly to the first in that the object appeared to move close to the observers and then fade away into the distance.

Gordon Jr. was actually the first one to see the UFO. He was passing the living room window "eating crackers" when he noticed "a solid looking object with lights going all around it" approaching from the west. Gordon described a dome on the top of the UFO. He stated there was a red light on the NNE north end of the object, a blue and green light in the middle and a black mark on the left hand side. Gordon said these lights flashed regularly and could have been revolving about the perimeter of the object. He noted the black light seemed to protrude slightly from the side. The UFO was brighter than the headlights on a car and was pink in colour. During the second observation, in company with his parent and sister, Gordon Jr. said that the object changed colours from pink to white to black to pink in 30 second intervals as it approached from the west and hovered. At its closest point to Gordon, he also described waves emanating from the object. He said, "They looked like heat waves". In addition these waves were spiralling giving the impression that the object was revolving or spinning. His description of size (two and one half feet at arm's length) was far in excess of the other witnesses. When it disappeared, Gordon Jr. stated it moved very fast (no better description of speed could be obtained). It is important to note that Gordon Jr. did not see the object move away as he was running outside at the time. The others told him it moved off rapidly and disappeared.

Mr. Bishop Sr. observed the object the second time it seemed to approach and he watched it "come out of the sunset." It was a very light colour at this time and almost blended in with the sky. He said it then changed to a black colour and moved in toward the town. He watched it approach although could not ascertain any shape other than that it was a "speck in the sky". He stated it moved quite rapidly when it disappeared. Mr. Menec's observation was at this time too. At about five minutes to six o'clock, Mr. Bishop called the RCMP and reported this incident.

OBSERVATIONS

The above report lacks noticeably in detail although the witnesses were somewhat reluctant to volunteer specific information such as, estimates of speeds, speed comparisons and distances. They generalize these points making it difficult to determine whether or not the object was under power.

The description of direction from all four witnesses coincides and indicates the object was moving when (a) there was no surface wind and (b) when the surface wind was WSW at 8 m.p.h. Since the object moved off in a SE direction, it was then travelling almost cross wind.

There were no airplanes in the vicinity during the sightings and a check with the meteorological office determined there were no weather balloons in the Ste. Rose area. The military facilities at Shile and Ginali would not be active on this day (Sunday).

The most impressive feature of the accounts MEE is the similarity of descriptions of the object itself. The Bishops and Menec appear to be sincere individuals and were reporting the incident because they believed they were observing something unusual. The possibilities that the sighting was a result of aircraft, balloons, temperature inversions or cloud reflections seems unlikely based on available knowledge of conditions, aircraft and balloon activity and the description of the witnesses.

When Peggy and Gordon Jr. initially observed the object it descended behind some distant trees. There is no indication that it landed although during the second sighting, it rose into the air from the same position behind the aforementioned trees.

When it left the area, it "streaked off" to the Southeast at approximately 50° elevation. No estimate of speed could be given by the witnesses.

Mr. Bishop Sr. ~~was~~ the object rise from behind the trees (the second sighting); ~~like~~ his son had pointed it out to him and then Bishop Sr. was able to discern the movements of the object. The flashing lights were not observed during the second sighting although Gordon Jr. stated the object itself did change colour several times (see original report).

Gordon Jr. photographed the object and the undeveloped film was given to a representative of the Winnipeg Tribune. B. Cannon telephoned the newspaper who acknowledged that had processed the film and "only discovered two fuzzy dots on the negative". The horizon line and ground detail was also visible. When the paper was asked whether or not CAPRO could examine the photographs, we were told that nobody knew where the pictures were. The Bishops have been asked to request the photos back from the paper and a follow up will be made later.

Information pertaining to a UFO sighting in Victoria, B.C. Sept. 29, 1968 has been submitted to us by a Mr. H. Voorsluys and a Mr. R. F. Neal. Included with their report are three slides which allegedly show a glowing object observed and photographed by the men at about 8:30 p.m. MDST that evening.

According to Mr. Voorsluys, copies of these pictures were forwarded to you together with a written account of the incident. We are endeavouring to have the photos analyzed although I think you can appreciate that it is difficult to evaluate night time exposures of star-like light sources.

One of the exposures shows numerous star tracks, the moon and another light track apparently moving opposite to the star tracks. It seems possible the latter could well be a planet, perhaps Venus, although if the witnesses were facing directly south as they claim, this explanation seems unlikely. Mr. Neal's picture shows a blurred light source followed by four circular lights. Neal exposed the film for 11 seconds therefore movement of the lights must have been extremely slow. He claims that five of these objects were ejected from the front-running light.

Normally we would not pay that much attention to this type of photograph but in this instance, we have good references on the characters of the two men. If you did receive their reports and photos, can you tell me what your examinations revealed?


I have included with this letter a resume of a sighting at Ste. Rose, Man. Feb. 2nd, 1969. If we have any success in securing the photographs mentioned, I'll let you know. As a matter of interest, I noticed in the Dawson Creek newspaper that several people observed a circular object at 5:45 p.m. MST Feb. 2nd. In the description, the witnesses stated, "It looked like it was boiling over...changing shape". This report is being followed up and if interesting, will be sent along later.

The Colorado report is to hand and it makes very interesting reading. As you said, it is not selling particularly well; neither is Dr. Saunders book for that matter, in Winnipeg.

I don't know whether or not I mentioned this before, but we did have Stephan Michalak under hypnosis last December and the results were about as expected. The story remained virtually the same with small differences although it is unfortunate that we waited this long to accomplish what may have been, a meaningful part of the investigation.

1. At 10:15 PM above date a message was received from Peace River Detachment by radio, that one Peter PAWLUK of Berwyn, Alberta had observed an unidentified flying object (U.F.O.). The scene of this sighting was 8 miles west, 2 miles north, 2 miles west and 1 1/2 miles north of the Town of Grimshaw Alberta, at the PAWLUK residence. The U.F.O. was observed directly west of this point.

2. An immediate patrol was made to the scene and the subject questioned as to pertinent details of the sighting. The following Telex message was then dispatched:

- (b) sky clear

1. Harold SCOTT of 10125-153rd St. Edmonton, Alberta reported to this office at 8:20 A.M. and advised that at about 8 A.M. 1 FEB 69, as he was travelling west on hwy. #43, 1 mile east of Sangudo, Alta., he saw strange objects in the sky. He described the first object as quite small, oblong shape, bright white in color and moving north at a rapid rate of speed at a very high altitude. SCOTT was only able to see the object for about 10 seconds before it disappeared. About 3 minutes later SCOTT saw an object in the sky which could have been the first object but this time it was much closer and much bigger. SCOTT said that the object was about 1000 ft. from him, had a flat base and oval top and glowed with a bright white light. This sighting lasted for ten seconds before the object disappeared to the north. At the time of these sightings the sky was covered with heavy clouds.
2. Mayerthorpe Det. message #2 was drafted and passed on to O.C. Edmonton Sub-Div. advising of the U.F.O. sighting.
3. Patrol was made to Sangudo area, Alta., and numerous inquiries conducted to establish whether anyone else had seen these objects. There were no other confirmations of the sighting.
4. The reliability of Harold SCOTT in connection with these sightings is unknown. At the time of reporting the U.F.O.'s he was quite calm and collected. SCOTT did say that he saw similar object 4 yrs. ago in British Columbia.

1. At approx. 10:40 P.M. on the above date, Samuel BUCKLE, phoned this office and stated that he and his brother Robert BUCKLE had just observed what appeared to be an Unidentified Flying Object. The object was described as follows: flashing orange red light approx: 10 to 15 ft. in diameter.

2. An immediate patrol was made to the scene by myself and Cst. P. SHAW and the following statements obtained.

STATEMENT OF SAMUEL BRENT BUCKLE OF YORKTON DIST. SASK.
 BEGINS: At approx. 10:30 P.M. on the 3 FEB 69 I was with my brother and we were approx. 5 1/2 miles south of Yorkton, Sask. on #9 Hwy. when my brother saw a reddish orange light to the right. I looked in the direction indicated, which would be approx. south west and to me the object appeared to be approx. 1 1/2 miles away at the time. We didn't think much about it at the time. As we turned west, 6 miles south of Yorkton, Sask., we saw the light again ahead of us. It still seemed to be a mile ahead of us. We followed the light at the same distance for two miles west and then the road came to a dead end. The light seemed to go down behind some trees and we lost sight of it. We turned around and came back east a mile and turned into our drive way. Approx. 150 yds. into our drive way we stopped the truck, as we saw the light again coming back east. We shut the truck and lights of and watched the object for approx. five minutes. It appeared to be coming towards us and then it stopped and started to go west again. It then disappeared and appeared to leave very fast. The light appeared to be an orange misty colour and was constantly going bright and dim. It was just one big mass of light. The light did not turn in a U shape but went straight back and forward. I could see no shape to the object. We shut the truck of and could hear no noise. The object seemed to be lifting and lowering and appeared to be about 100 ft. of the ground.

 BEGINS: I was coming south from Yorkton in my father's truck on #9 Hwy. I was making a right hand turn approx. 6 miles from Yorkton when my brother and I noticed a flashing orangy red light due west of the highway. It seemed to be about 1 1/2 miles away. We followed it with the truck and we were gaining on it. It appeared to be from 20 to 100 ft. above the ground. The light seemed to be flashing all over the thing not in one specific area. We followed it to the end of the road and lost sight of it on the other side of a bunch of trees. We watched to see what we could see for maybe five minutes then we turned and came toward home. We made a left hand into our home lane when we saw it again rising from the bunch of trees. We drove another 150 to 200 Yds. and then shut the lights and the truck off and stepped outside. It then started to rise and came toward us, possibly about 35 to 40 mph and stopped halfway in the middle of a field and it seemed to hover moving closer to the ground and then going up again. As it went nearer the ground the light got dimmer and as it went up it got brighter. This all took place about 10:00 P.M. The object then sped of to the west at maybe 3 times the speed at which we had first saw it. In my estimation it could have been 10-15 ft. in diameter in which the light was flashing. I don't think it was a plane, it made no noise whatsoever.

1. At 10:00 p.m. this date while driving north towards Carmacks, Y.T. on highway #2, I noticed an unusual white light in the sky towards the Mt. Nansen area. I stopped the vehicle at Mile 96 and observed this phenomenon for at least 5 minutes. It dodged behind the hills at Carmacks, and in order to get a better look, I continued through the village, and up Coal Mine hill to Mile 106. I again observed it for about 5 minutes. There was no noise, movement, or colour, just a pulsating white glow. It appeared about 1/8th. the size of the full moon which was also out that night. The sky was dark, with scattered wisps of cloud, and the other stars were clearly visible.

2. The light still appeared to be about 15 miles away towards the Mt. Nansen area, and about a mile off the ground as it cleared the local mountain tops. However, as we observed it, it grew brighter, then slowly faded softer, and appeared to diminish in size and intensity until it disappeared altogether. George KOLLA, a truck driver for White Pass was also parked at Mile 107, and had observed the same object for several hours while driving south from Pelly Crossing. He was interviewed, and his statement is attached. The reliability of this witness is unknown. Mrs. Gloria JARED, my wife, was accompanying me at the time, and also witnessed the above described object.

3. To date local investigation has revealed no plausible explanation for this occurrence. Stuart WHITE, another truck driver from White Pass Petroleum mentioned that he had observed a similar phenomenon on 24 JAN 69. I was unable to obtain a statement from him at this time, however he gave his address as 312 Hawkins St., Apt. #2, Whitehorse, Y.T. The information contained in paragraphs 1 & 2 was passed to the Yukon Sub/Division on 4 FEB 69 for processing of the usual telex. Any further sightings will be subsequently reported in the proscribed manner.

I left Pelly Crossing at 8:30 p.m. on 3 FEB 69. As I left I saw a white light, with a bit of a haze over it. I was driving south to Whitehorse, and it stayed on my right side. I noticed it again at Five Finger rapids, about 9:45 p.m. I stopped and watched it for a while at Mile 107, for about 2 minutes, then it went real bright, then disappeared over the top of the mountains. That would be about 10:00 p.m.

I saw the same thing about 2 weeks ago, at about the same time when I came through from Clinton Creek. On both occasions the sky was clear, there was no noise from it, no colours, just white; hard to judge movement as the truck was moving. Size would be about like a street lamp.

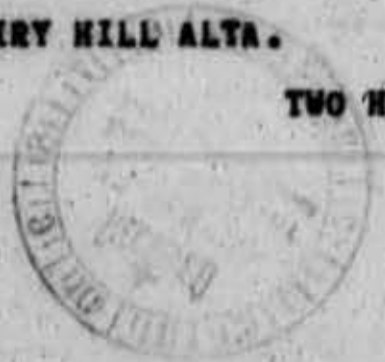

1. At about 9:50 PM of the above date a telephone call was received at this detachment office from farm location (NW 18-55-12). Stephanie ROSYCHUK reported that upon returning from Derwent, Alberta with her father John, brother Garry and cousin Dean, that they noticed a brilliant object in the sky to the front of their vehicle. At this time they were proceeding west on a district road at location (SW 17-55-12).

2. Immediately upon receiving the call Constable SIGMUNDSON and I proceeded via police vehicle to highway # 45 north and west of Two Hills, and prior to reaching the highway I observed a bright object in the sky at a distance estimated at one mile north. The object appeared to change colour, from white to orange to red and then reverse colour. The object was low in altitude and sight of the object was lost for a period of 3 to 4 minutes, before it was again sighted. The next time I saw the object it had appeared to have travelled a great distance west, and at this time the object appeared to blend in with the horizon and seemed to disappear.

3. At the detachment office Telex message # 4 was dispatched and sent to Edmonton Sub/Div in compliance with OP. Man. CO- Air.

4. Local residents who observed the phenomenon:
John ROSYCHUK- 41 Yrs., Nick ROSYCHUK- 38 Yrs., Joyce ROSYCHUK- 35 Yrs., Dean ROSYCHUK- 13 Yrs., Dorothy ROSYCHUK-9 Yrs., Linda ROSYCHUK- 11 Yrs., Garry ROSYCHUK- 14 Yrs., Stephanie ROSYCHUK- 18 Yrs.

5. The above mentioned residents all live in the district in which the object was observed and it is felt that the honesty and integrity of the persons is above reproach and therefore I feel that their observations are creditable.

9 FEB 69

6. On the above morning a patrol was made to the Hairy Hill District, accompanied by John ROSYCHUK of Two Hills. ROSYCHUK felt that the object disappeared over Hairy Hill, however, a subsequent search met with negative results with regards to any sightings, by residents in the area.

7. Those persons viewing UFO were interviewed and information received

At approximately 9:50 PM John ROSYCHUK, Garry ROSYCHUK, Stephanie ROSYCHUK and Dean ROSYCHUK were travelling west one mile from farm location (NW 18-55-12). Stephanie looked up and saw a bright object pulsating at what appeared to be at a very low altitude.

The basic light was rectangular in shape; but when the light brightened the shape increased in size and intensity of light. As it brightened it also turned from a dull to bright in colour. The object crossed the sky in a north to south zig-zag, however, the main direction was westerly. It appeared to move about two miles from north to south. It seemed to travel just above tree top level, and disappeared below the tree tops several times. In completing the zig-zag moves the object would come to a complete stop before reversing direction.

8. During this sighting the carload continued driving, and arrived at the Nick ROSYCHUK farm. John ROSYCHUK contacted the persons in the Nick ROSYCHUK farm, and all of those persons in paragraph 4 viewed the object from the ROSYCHUK farm. Further information gathered from the persons who viewed the object from the farm indicated:

When there was a colour change, there was a direction of movement change. The colours definitely noted were: red, yellow, and white. The persons interviewed are unable to associate any specific colour with a direction of flight pattern. The object appeared to drop at Hairy Hill.

9. There is no indication of the time length that the object was viewed. However, it would not be longer than a total of ten minutes. As Cst. SIGMUNDSON was operating the police vehicle he was unable to make any observations of the object.

10. I have travelled a number of times in aircraft, and worked on an RCAF Station at Portage La Prairie, Manitoba. This object was not like any aircraft or helicopter that I have ever seen.

1. At 9:30 PM, Mr. Ray KNIGHT phoned to advise that he and his wife had just observed an apparent UFO landing at the D.O.T. Airport, 12 miles south of the town of Fort Simpson. Mr. and Mrs. KNIGHT are known to this detachment and both are considered fairly reliable. They expressed certainty that the object that they had seen was not an ordinary airplane or helicopter.

2. In company with Cat. K.D. GILL, an immediate patrol was made to the scene. In compliance with "C" Department Policy, the following data was obtained from Mr. KNIGHT:

- (a) 6 FEB 69, Friday, 7:30 PM to 9:30 PM (Pacific Standard Time)
- (b) Clear with stars and northern lights
- (c) Shirley (Mrs. Raymond) KNIGHT
- (d) D.O.T. Airport, Fort Simpson, N.W.T. - Through front room picture window of own home, opposite the D.O.T. airstrip
- (e) Raymond KNIGHT, Airport Manager
- (f) Red dot, surrounded by white background with green and blue spikes which sparkled like a piece of crystal. Descended to about 600 or 700 feet above ground level and then to tree top level where it hovered up and down for about 10 minutes before disappearing behind the trees.
- (g) Two hours
- (h) Was not seen again after disappearing behind the trees. No noise was heard as the KNIGHTs remained in their home.

3. With Mr. KNIGHT, a patrol was made across the main D.O.T. strip to its junction with the old unused field. Due to the deep snow it was impossible to continue with a vehicle past this point and since Mr. KNIGHT now expressed uncertainty as to just how far away the object may have landed, there was no advantage to patrolling any farther on foot. Mr. KNIGHT stated that the object may have continued to move after it was cut off from his line of vision as it went below tree top level. D.O.T. Aeradio were contacted but advised that they had not seen an UFO nor had they received any notification of an aircraft in the vicinity.

7 FEB 69

4. Mrs. KNIGHT was interviewed and confirmation of the above data was obtained. To the right is a rough sketch which Mrs. KNIGHT drew at the time she was watching the phenomena.



He immediately informed the MIRAU'S who came out and watched it move across the sky, until it was almost straight east of Gull Lake and then slowly disappear. MUNT then came down to the Det. & reported the sighting. MIRAU stated that he thought it went in a zig-zag path as it moved in a southerly direction. Arnold MIRAU is a local businessman and is not the type to manufacture a story for publicity purposes. He, together with his son & MUNT, are considered reliable.

3. This sighting was made subject to a news item in the local weekly paper however no other persons came forward reporting a similar sighting. No other sightings have been reported since.

1. At approx. 7:10 P.M. Mrs. Alice MacMILLAN of McLennan, Alta. contacted this office by phone advising that she had just seen a "U.F.O." over McLennan and that it had gone north east over Kimiwan Lake and disappeared. This report was confirmed by other residents of the town.

2. McLennan Radio Message Mc/19 was forwarded to Peace River Sub-Division advising of the siting.

"14 FEB 69"

3. During the next few days it was learned that a few local citizens were sending hot air filled bags with a suspended candle into the night sky which would give off a reddish glow. Mrs. MacMILLAN was contacted and upon viewing one of these objects stated that it appeared identical to the one she had seen. Further investigation revealed that Mr. & Mrs. Jordan McARTHUR of McLennan let one of the bags go shortly after 7:00 P.M. "9 FEB 69". They advised that it was let go near the shore of Kimiwan Lake and that it proceeded in a north east direction over Kimiwan Lake and disappeared. It was sent aloft near the area where Mrs. MacMILLAN had first saw it.

4. As there was no doubt that this is what Mrs. MacMILLAN viewed Radio Message Mc/21 was forwarded. No further action taken.

1. During the evening on this date information was received to the effect that two residents of the settlement had sighted a bright object in the air approximately 15 miles west of Fort Norman during the morning of 22 DEC 68.

24 DEC 68

2. In view of Op. Man. CO-Air, paragraph 6, an investigation was conducted and a radiogram, as attached hereto, was passed to Western Arctic S/Div. via S.S.B.

3. On interviewing Wilfred McDONALD, the initial observer, it was learned that he was driving a D-6 cat. in a southerly direction from the edge of the Mackenzie River towards the Ray Geophysical camp which was approximately 100 yds. distance from him. At the time he had his parka hood up and could only see straight ahead without turning his head, as it was about one hour before sunup the lights of the cat. were on, the engine was running. A bright light seemed to light up the ground in the vicinity of the cat. causing him to look up at which time a bright pinkish object was seen passing directly overhead in a southerly direction, having approached from behind McDONALD. The sighting lasted about 5 to 6 seconds and McDONALD had time to call to Mr. Leo HARDY who was standing a short distance away. On interviewing HARDY he confirmed this story, however, stated the object appeared to him to be a bright white colour of undeterminable size and he saw it for about 2 or 3 seconds before it disappeared behind the tree tops.

4. Neither McDONALD nor HARDY felt the object resembled a meteor and both stated the sighting was so short they could not give a definite description of it. McDONALD, however, described the object as approximately 2 ft. in diameter and having a tail of fire about 8 ft. long. The object resembled a round fiery ball, descending during flight to what seemed an altitude of about 100 ft. at which point it seemed to make an abrupt descent behind the trees and was not seen again.

5. Because of the briefness of the alleged sighting little information could be supplied by the two observers. Both persons are felt to be reliable and not given to fabricating yarns as a means of getting attention. Neither person had been drinking at the time of the sighting. HARDY is the local Justice of the Peace and credence can be given to his information, the extent of which is that he saw a bright light of unknown size or altitude descending in a southerly direction behind the trees.

6. No further information could be supplied and no conclusions could be drawn from the information given.

7. While making the foregoing inquiries it was learned that another resident of Fort Norman had also made sightings. The resident, Mr. Albert NEYELLE (T.I.), being illiterate, was interviewed this date through an interpreter, Jonas NEYELLE, his son. As a result of interviewing NEYELLE it appears that the 10 objects he sighted between 5:00 P.M. and 8:00 P.M. on 11 DEC 68 were meteors and/or satellites. NEYELLE stated the objects appeared to be about the size of the stars and very high in the sky. All objects moved in a continuous straight line across the heavens to the horizon, however, all were travelling in different directions.

N69/059 * 8. During the interview with NEYELLE he further advised that on 27 DEC 68 at about 5:00 P.M. in the evening he, together with Fred ANDREW (T.I.) and his wife Bella ANDREW (T.I.), Henry HORASSI (T.I.) and his wife Dora HORASSI (T.I.) and Ronald DOCTOR had all seen a U.F.O. across the Mackenzie River near the McKay Mountain Range which is approximately 25 miles west of Fort Norman. This object appeared to be white changing to red, looked like a large star, hung just over the tops of the mountains which have an average altitude of 2,000 ft., and seemed to move slowly. The object was seen while walking along the road and was still in sight when the observers entered a house some 3 to 5 minutes later.

9. The object described in paragraph 8 is felt to be that which was reported in Norman Detachment report of 11 DEC 68, file number 68-400-15, however, due to its daily appearance this object is now felt to be a bright planet or possibly a satellite.

10. Although the objects reported by NEYELLE et al can be explained, that sighted by McDONALD and HARDY seems to be of a different nature and no explanation can be given for it at this point.

11. The foregoing has been reported in accordance to instructions, however, as no further investigation is felt to be warranted this file is being concluded.

**Unidentified Flying Objects - General
Corner Brook Area, Nfld. 30 DEC 68/19 JAN 69**

1. This Detachment received a number of reports alleging unidentified flying objects and/or optical phenomena recently. However, close investigations failed to show that the sightings were unidentified flying objects within the interpretation of Operational Manual CO-Air. To the contrary in fact, the basis of the sightings, press releases etc. stemmed from a bright shining object in the Western sky which only appeared as a brilliant asteroid spectacle. This star was witnessed by virtually hundreds of persons in this area, myself and most members of this Force in this area included. The only remarkable thing about this star was its brightness. It appeared to be the same size as other stars and the same distance from earth. It could be seen most clearly from sun-set to about 9.00 p.m. each night from about 1 JAN 69 to the present date. On overcast evenings the sight of this star was poorer and the general consensus of the matter became common place as numerous residents called the local radio station to give their interpretation of what they saw. It was generally thought it was just a brighter than usual star.

2. On 30 DEC 68 at 5.30 p.m. a report was received from a female to the effect that she saw something strange in the sky over the Blomidon Golf Course in Corner Brook and described it as appearing to be a large metal object which hovered for about one half hour and then just disappeared. She stated the object appeared reddish in colour with a revolving light beneath it. An immediate check on this sighting revealed two other eye-witnesses whose names we were successful in obtaining. They are namely, Augustus KENNY and Ross RENDELL, both employees of C.B.C., Corner Brook, Nfld. They saw the same thing as the female person at the same time and place. KENNY & RENDELL informed that a jet aircraft passed over the area leaving a vapor trail and that the rays from the sun-set on this vapor trail caused an optical illusion. They described this phenomenon as a glow, yellowish in colour which gradually turned to a red and blue shade. The glow was present, similar to a rainbow effect, for about twenty minutes before dissolving. There was no metal object, noise or other thing peculiar. The sky was hazy and the sighting was high and to the West of the observers.

3. Between 3 JAN 69 and the present date, a number of curious persons have called this Detachment to report a brighter than usual star in the West. This star has been seen from as early as 5.30 p.m. to as late as 12.30 a.m. As mentioned earlier, I have witnessed this star. It is seen in the Western sky each evening and same goes out of sight near mid-night. That is, it is first seen high in the sky and very gradually it falls further away to the West and downwards below the horizon. One of the local private radio stations have been giving this star widespread publicity in an effort to gain the public's opinion concerning unidentified flying objects. No one appears alarmed. Never has any sound been heard and the sightings are always the same. As stated, the star seems to fall off in the Western sky becoming dimmer

.....BECOMING DIMMER as the evening hours pass by. Some people have reported that they feel this star jumps or vibrates slightly. There is nothing significant about any of these sightings further to the above. On each incident that a call was received at this Detachment, same was checked out.


4. Margaret (Mrs. James Hartness) BEARDSLEY of Deer Lake, Nfld., a licenced astronomer who has her own observatory was contacted. She states there is no doubt that the object described is the planet, Venus. She has been attracted to this planet of recent due to its brilliance. She advises that it was and will be the brightest star in the sky until early spring of 1969. She states that the planet Venus is the most visible star and that it can be seen each evening from sun-set until about mid-night and that it gradually drifts down below the horizon. She explained that it is brighter during the early hours of each evening because at that time it is more overhead and there is much less visual obstruction in the atmosphere. Also, as it drifts away to the West and downwards to the horizon, we see it through heavy atmospheric conditions (haze - clouds - smoke - etc.). This condition has been compounded of recent dates due to our cloudy weather conditions. Mrs. BEARDSLEY states that Venus appears to jump or vibrate when the density of atmospheric pressure is high. This is a mere optical illusion caused by the atmospheric conditions.

5. In view of the foregoing, I do not feel the sightings as reported in this regard can be classified as Meteors, Fireballs, or Unidentified Flying Objects. The incident of 30 DEC 68 being the sun-set rays shining on the vapor left by a jet aircraft and subsequent reports of the asteroid object in the Western sky being the planet Venus.

6. The foregoing is being submitted for information purposes only.

- At 9:15 P.M. this date, Mr. Walter CAIL, 266 Medley St., South Devon, Fredericton, N.B., reported to this Detachment that he and his family had sighted a U.F.O. at the above location. CAIL stated that his neighbour, Mrs. Murray HOWE, 274 Medley St., had sighted the U.F.O. first and notified him. CAIL further stated that the object had been sighted at 8:15 P.M. and his son, David had viewed the object through a pair of binoculars.
- The Fredericton Airport and Tower were contacted and they advised that at the time of the sighting two Vanguard Aircraft and a private Cherokee Aircraft were flying in the area. The Cherokee Aircraft was flying in the Devon Area.
- Radiogram #85 was submitted to Fredericton Sub/Division in this respect.

24 FEB 69

- On this date, Walter CAIL, Mrs. Walter CAIL, David CAIL and Mrs. Murray HOWE were contacted and interviewed with regard to their sighting of the U.F.O.
- Mrs. HOWE stated that she first noted a red and green steady light, approximately the size of a traffic light in the distance. She watched these lights for about 10 minutes. The lights appeared stationary in the air. She advised that the lights were about the wing span of a plane width from each other. She stated that the lights moved in an easterly direction and went out of sight behind a house. Mrs. HOWE first noticed the lights while sitting at her kitchen window and then she went outside and stood on her porch. While in her kitchen she was watching the red and green lights through the crotch of a tree in her yard and for this reason she stated that they were stationary. She stated that while outside a bright white light exploded into view and she watched it for approximately 30 seconds. She heard an airplane approaching and she took her attention from the bright light and watched the airplane. She looked back for the bright light and it had disappeared. She doesn't know

if it disappeared behind a house or not. She stated the bright light was lower in the sky than the airplane. The sightings were noted in an easterly direction from her home at approximately 8:05 P.M.-8:15 P.M. She notified the CAILS before she went out of her house.

6. Mr. Walter CAIL stated that Mrs. HOWE telephoned him at 8.15 PM on the 23 FEB 69 and said there was something strange in the sky. He went out to the front of his house and saw a large red light in the sky. This light was in an easterly direction. He stated that the light stayed in the same position at an altitude of about 1,500-2,000 feet. The red light appeared to be glowing and appeared to be 8 to 10 feet in diameter. After watching the red light for a few seconds it turned a bright white like a electric welders torch and then disappeared rapidly in an easterly direction. The light reappeared after about one minute in a different position, but still in an easterly direction, and still very bright and at the same altitude. The light disappeared in an easterly direction after about two minutes. CAIL stated there was no sound. He further stated that he saw two large airplanes in the distance behind this light and also saw a small plane in the area of Devon. CAIL is certain that the light he saw was no airplane. He stated the light disappeared too quickly to be an airplane together with the fact that there was no sound.

7. Mrs. Walter CAIL stated that she saw a bright red light about the size of a half full moon. As the red light came closer it became bright white and described it as her husband had. She feels the light remained for approximately two minutes and then disappeared in a rapid manner. She noted the light in an easterly direction and it disappeared in the same direction that it came.

8. David CAIL, 17 years, stated that he went outside and saw a red glow about the size of a half full moon with what appeared to be red flashing light on the front of it. The glow was moving in an easterly direction. Stated the glow circled over the Fredericton area faster than any airplane. As the glow came closer to him he looked at it through a pair of binoculars and saw it was oval shaped and revolving. He then moved to the back of the house and lost sight of it. He looked for about 5-10 seconds and saw a red spot in the distance. The spot was coming from an easterly direction at a fast rate of speed and as it got closer it got larger and turned from a bright red to a bright white. He states that it was about twice the size of a full moon. He looked at the light through his binoculars

and saw that inside of the light was a pure white disc approximately 10 feet across and 5 feet thick. He stated that there appeared to be rays emitting from the disc. The disc was described as being like two saucers placed face to face but the upper part was more oval than the bottom portion. The disc was revolving in an awkward manner, like a coin revolving after being spun on a flat surface and coming to a stop, flat on the surface. He stated the light remained about 2 minutes in a stationary position and he went in the house. He did not see the light disappear.

9. No other reports of sightings were reported in the area and the pilots of the three aircraft in the area did not see any unusual lights and nothing was noted on radar at Fredericton Airport.


10. The weather office at Fredericton Airport was contacted concerning weather conditions at 8.00 P.M. on the 23 FEB 69. It was learned that the temperature was 28°, high cirrus clouds at 30,000 feet, cloud opacity was 3/10, visibility 15 miles, winds East at 13 mph, dew point 20 and barometer reading was 30.30.

11. From investigation it would appear that the object seen by the three eye witnesses was not a meteorite and they are very sure it wasn't an aircraft.

12. No explanation is available as to the origin of the light, but should further reports be received the appropriate investigation will be conducted.

Thank you for your co-operation in writing us concerning the bright object that you observed in the sky near midnight on February 20. I have examined your account and, although I cannot be absolutely positive, your description of the object, its position and its duration agree very well with Sirius, the Dog Star, and the brightest star we see. Unusual atmospheric conditions that often occur during the winter in Canada cause this star to change colour and perform other changes which may look quite peculiar, especially when it is low in the sky. According to my calculations, it should have disappeared near 1:30 a.m., which agrees very well with your observation.

We appreciate your interest in calling this matter to our attention.

I don't know the date, it was just before Christmas about 8:00 in the evening. I was Ski-Dooing out front of the house in the field. I was facing up towards the Willow Bank Mountain, in an Easterly direction. I looked up and saw a large round light in the sky travelling South. It was moving straight across the sky. It had a small tail of light behind it. I saw the light for a few seconds and then it went out. I don't have any idea what it could have been. After this I saw a greyish cigar shaped object going the opposite direction. The night was clear, but this time there was no light on it and it came in front of the Willow Bank Mountain. I didn't see any wings on it, so I don't think it was an airplane. I looked at it for about a minute and then came home. This object would have been about a mile and a half from me. I had the Ski-Doo running so I didn't hear any other noise.

On the 22nd of January at about 7:30 PM, Janet and I were just going out to the barn to feed the horses. The horses usually hang around the corner of the barn yard, but that particular day they had been about the centre of the yard, along the fence line. They had been acting up all day and they wouldn't go anywhere near the barn. We got about half way up there and the horses just took off to the top field. We went up to the barn and Janet went inside. I whistled for the horses but they wouldn't come. The stallion came part ways a number of times but he'd shake his head and run back. I went inside the barn to see if the curlosity would bring them down, but they didn't come. I came back out to see what they were doing and tried to call them in again and the stallion did the same as before, so I went back into the barn to see if the curlosity might bring them down again. We were in the barn, and we heard a loud crash in the bush and I thought maybe it was a Bull Elk that had gone crazy from a lung disease they get. I told the girl to head for the house. She ran down to the house and I followed. I ran in and grabbed my rifle and I took my 6 volt flashlight and I ran up to where I've got the hay on a platform. I saw the horses were in the top field along the fence line and they seemed quite uneasy so I shone the light up to see if I could see any game or anything up in there. Then I noticed that the horses were looking in a westerly direction, and the way they were holding their heads up; I knew there was something attracting their attention. So I sorta turned half way around and looked towards the West. I saw two bright white lights and they were coming down at a 45 degree angle in a Northerly direction. I figure that they were about four miles away from me and about 100 feet apart. When they got to about 500 feet altitude they both went out at the same time. I saw these two lights for about a minute. From the distance away and the altitude and their brightness I figure they would probably measure about 10 feet in diameter up close.

Laura-Ann's goat had been acting up all day as well as the horses. The horses hadn't touched their feed all day.

I have seen these strange lights about five or six times previous to this in the last year. They have always looked the same bright whiteness. They have all been farther away except one I saw around the 15th of September at about 7:00 PM. At that time I was emptying a bucket into a hole in the ground when I happened to glance across part the house, and I saw a bright white light travelling horizontally at a terrific speed. I'd say this light was about half a mile from me and about 300 feet high.

I've never seen any lights like these other than the times I've mentioned, and I don't have any idea what they are. I know they're not planes or flares, and I'm sure they're not shooting stars.

- At approximately 7:50 PM, POLAND phoned this Detachment and advised of two strange lights that he had seen in the sky at 7:30 PM. POLAND lives with his sister, Mrs. Emma Anna POPE, and her family, in the Blaeberry area approximately 13 miles Northwest of Golden, B.C., and he advised that he, as well as some of the others at that residence had seen strange lights on previous occasions which they had not reported. He stated that he had phoned Ben FISHER, a local service station owner, previous to phoning this office, and FISHER had advised him to call the Police about the incident.
- In the morning of the 23 JAN 69, Search & Rescue Headquarters were contacted in the event that the lights could have been from a missing plane, or from a plane in trouble at that time. They advised that they had had no reports of missing aircraft and therefore advised that they were not interested in investigating at that time. Golden telex message #GOL 22 to NCR Meteor Centre, information Kamloops Sub/Division, CANPORCEHED, and Commissioner per Operational Manual CO - Air, paragraph 6, was sent this date.
- Mr. Ben FISHER was also contacted on the 23 JAN 69 regarding this incident, and he advised that POLAND is a reliable type of person. Ben FISHER himself is a well known local resident, and his information should be regarded as reliable. He stated that after POLAND had phoned him on the 22 JAN 69, he took a drive on Highway #1 towards the Blaeberry area. At approximately 9:30 PM, while driving about 8 to 10 miles from Golden, he noticed a fairly large white light travelling horizontally in the sky near the Mountain Range across the Columbia River. FISHER looked at the light for some seconds through his binoculars and then it went out. He had nothing further to state regarding the light except that he had no idea what it was, and that he had not seen anything like it before. It should be added that FISHER holds a private Pilot's Licence, and is a pilot of some years experience, and has his own plane. He is not available at present for a statement, however it is felt that he will not have anything further to add, as the above information was stated direct to the writer by FISHER.
- On the 24 JAN 69, a patrol was made to the Blaeberry area and statements were taken from POLAND, Vincent Samuel POPE, Emma Anna POPE, and Mariem Janet POPE regarding sightings of strange lights. These statements, which are self explanatory, are forwarded herewith. It should be added that all sightings were at night time when the sky was clear. The reliability of all of the above mentioned persons is not known, but all seemed sincere at the time the statements were taken. They advised that they had not reported these sightings previously because of the possibility of adverse local opinion regarding their characters, as is sometimes the case with incidents of this nature.

1. At approximately 10:30 P.M. this date, a call was received from George FIELDS of Bible Hill, N.S. to the effect that Ronald NOLAN of Onslow, N.S. had seen an U.F.O. A patrol was made to the scene by Cst. R.O. PEDERSEN, Truro Hwy. Patrol. He stated that all he saw at this time were the Northern Lights. ~~See~~

2. NOLAN stated the U.F.O. was shaped like an isosceles triangle, with two sides longer than the other. It seemed to be stationary and was lighted around the outside and seemed hollow. The light had a blue tint. It was cloudy on that night with a low ceiling. Mr. NOLAN could not estimate the altitude or the distance of the U.F.O.

3. Mr. NOLAN'S wife also observed the U.F.O. It stayed in the sky from 9:15 P.M. to 10:30 P.M. and did not move. It went out for 4-5 minutes, but came on again sharply.

4. The U.F.O. was also seen by Owen WOOD and his wife, Jean WOOD of Elm St., Truro, N.S. They corroborated NOLAN'S observations but were unable to supply any additional pertinent information to that of NOLAN and his wife.

5. A telex message was forwarded to N.R.C., Meteor Centre, Info: Canforcehead, Commissioner, and "H" Division.

6. Abovementioned message and this report were delayed since Cst. PEDERSEN felt that this reported U.F.O. sighting was part of the Northern Lights, and also difficulty was experienced in contacting the witnesses.

1. At approximately 10:00 P.M. this date, while on foot patrol from the Police Lodge at Government House to the Prime Minister's residence, I noticed two (2) rather bright flashing red lights in the sky. At first glance I assumed that they were aircraft, but could hear no sound of engines. At this time the sky was very clear.
2. One of these lights proceeded east and was lost from view within a minute or less, while the other one travelled in a westerly direction. - On the above date a complaint was received at this office from Mrs. Constance DOYLE of 25 McLaren Drive, Oromocto, New Brunswick stating that she and her husband (Capt. James DOYLE) had observed an Unidentified Flying Object in the sky the nights of 2 MAR 69 and 4 MAR 69 about 9:00 PM directly above their residence in what appeared to be a fixed position until about 9:30 PM when the object began to move in a Northeast Direction and after moving in this direction for about one-half hour to an hour it disappeared.
- The U.F.O. was observed on Sunday, 2 MAR 69, and Tuesday, 4 MAR 69 at 9:00 PM, Atlantic Standard Time, for about half an hour until it began to move out of sight. On both the nights the sky was clear and starlight. It may be noted that on the night of 3 MAR 69 there was a snow storm in this area; therefore, nothing could be seen in the sky. The object was described to be larger than a star with a reddish light which at times appeared bright and then went quite dim. Radiogram No. 35 was forwarded to Fredericton S/Division in regards to the above.
- The Air Traffic Control Tower, Dept. of Transport, Fredericton Airport, Lincoln, New Brunswick was contacted regarding the above and it is believed that the object is the Planet VENUS as it is quite visible on a clear night moving in the manner as described by the complainant.
- About 7:30 PM on the above date the U.F.O. was observed by Judge C.F. TWEEDDALE, Oromocto, New Brunswick and myself which was identical as described by Mrs. DOYLE. The sky was clear and starlight.
- Extra copies are attached in compliance with Operational Manual, CO-Air, Para. 6 for Headquarters Ottawa. In view of the above and unless otherwise instructed this file is being considered as hereunder indicated.

1. This date at 10:20 p.m., Gordon ERICKSON of Porter Creek, Y.T., reported the sighting of an unidentified flying object at Fish Lake, Y.T. ERICKSON was interviewed, and the following information obtained. With ERICKSON at the time of the sighting, were Donald CHAPMAN and Miles CARRY, all adult residents of Porter Creek, Y.T.
2. Information obtained from the above mentioned is as follows:
 - a) Sighting made 4 MAR 69 at 8:35 p.m. to 8:45 p.m. Y.S.T.
 - b) Sky clear.
 - c) As noted above.
 - d) All three men were on the ice at Fish Lake near Whitehorse, Y.T.
 - e) Object seen approximately the same time by two teenagers at Whitehorse, Y.T.
 - f) Object first appeared as a round bluish ball. It was stationary at the time and the size was described as half moon. The object split in two; one piece remaining half moon size and the same colour and position; the other piece turned a dark orange colour and appeared to approach the observers and increase to moon size. This second object appeared to move back to object at original position and take on original size and colour. Both objects seemed to fade away completely. The position of these objects was about 10° above the horizon. The direction of the object from the observers was towards the north and no directional movement was noticed.
 - g) The sighting lasted approximately ten minutes.
 - h) Five minutes after the object disappeared, the three men were proceeding to shore with their Ski-Doo. At this time the entire area was lit up by a blue light, similar to that which would be given off by an arc welder. The light made objects all around the lake clearly visible. This flash of light lasted approximately two to three seconds and at this time, the Ski-Doo motor cut out and almost stopped for no apparent reason and started running normally after the flash subsided. The observers indicated that they felt heat from this flash similar to rays of sun passing through window glass. Enquiries from other observers and locally in Whitehorse area indicated that this flash of light was not

... WAS NOT observed by anyone else. The local Department of Transport reported no aircraft traffic in the Whitehorse area between 7:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m.

3. A sighting was also reported at 8:40 p.m. by Carol PETTIFOR (BD: 2 FEB 53) and Ken TICINISKI (BD: 28 JAN 52). These observers were travelling east on Ogilvie Street in Whitehorse when this sighting was made. The object appeared in the north sky approximately 10° above the horizon, was stationary at the time when it was observed, and was described as being perfectly round, very clear in detail and emerald green in colour. This sighting lasted approximately 10 seconds and then the object dropped below the horizon. As it dropped, there appeared to be a burst of flame from one side. Nothing further was seen from these observers.

4. It will be noted that both parties as outlined above made their sighting at 8:40 p.m. of an unidentified flying object in the north sky in the Whitehorse area. It would appear that these observers, although in different areas, were referring to the same object. No further information was received concerning this unidentified flying object and there is no indication that a sighting was made by other persons in the area. Reliability of observers unknown.

1. DOUGLAS to office and during conversation he mentioned having seen on 3 occasions, U.F.O.'s, which he was first reluctant to discuss for fear of being ridiculed. After being advised of other sightings in Fort Simpson, N.W.T. and Fort Nelson, B.C. he willingly gave the following details.

2. DOUGLAS is mechanic for Geophysical Service Incorporated, Camp #422, located at several locations around Liard. In this capacity he is second in charge of the camp. The party Manager is Michael BYCIUK, who witnessed all three sightings as well, and actually brought the first sighting to DOUGLAS' attention. DOUGLAS' home address is 239 - 28th Ave. N.W., Calgary, Alberta. At the time these sightings were reported here, the camp was 14 miles from Fort Liard in a north easterly direction. When BYCIUK first sighted the first U.F.O., the camp was at a different location, about 10 miles south east of Fort Liard.

3. When these sightings were reported, BYCIUK was out of camp and was expected to be away for another 10 days or so. On his return to camp, the camp was moved to Flett Rapids, about 50 miles north of Fort Liard. On Saturday, 29 MAR 69, I departed for Flett Rapids to interview BYCIUK but met two local men who had been working for the camp and they advised that work had ceased and the camp was moving out to Fort Nelson, B.C. this date. Fort Nelson Det. were advised and contacted BYCIUK and obtained the information contained in Operational Manual CO-air. As soon as it is received from Fort Nelson, it will be forwarded. Prior to these reports, I knew both DOUGLAS and BYCIUK fairly well and consider them both to be very reliable.

4. On Thursday, 13 MAR 69, Fort Smith Sub. Division was advised of the sightings via Liard message, ID-14. The contents of this message are as follows:

5. According to DOUGLAS, when BYCIUK sighted the first U.F.O. he got out a transit and put the most powerful lens in camp in it, 40 power, and after watching the object for a while alone, summoned DOUGLAS. After this sighting, both men kept watch on the sky each night thereafter, in hopes of seeing something again.

6. Local enquiries were made but nobody reported seeing any of the U.F.O.'s reported by these two men. The general direction of the sightings was towards Pointed Mountain which is south west of Fort Liard. The location of the camp at the times of the sightings was east of Liard and several hundred feet higher. From this vantage point, the camp overlooked a height of land which is directly west of Fort Liard and which blocks vision in that direction.

7. On Thursday, 20 MAR 69, I patrolled to the Pointed Mountain air-strip, about 15 air miles south west of Fort Liard to conduct enquiries at that point. William DeWETTER, Pouce Coupe, B.C. a grader operator for Pan American Oil Co. reported the following sighting. As in the previous sightings, details are as outlined in Operational Manual, CO-air.

(a) Around 11PM to 1AM, night of 8 MAR 69.

(b) Clear overhead, possibly some light clouds in area of sighting.

(c) Noted above

(d) About 19 miles south east of Fort Liard; Approx. Latitude 60°, 0'
Longitude 123°, 20'

(e) Nil

(f) When first sighted object was round and red, but not real bright. It travelled, coming in the direction of DeWETTER and getting brighter as it approached. It then receded, getting darker again as it went farther away until it just vanished in the distance. About 2 - 5 minutes later it appeared again from the same direction and was red in colour. The closer it approached it started to change colour until it was a misty blue or green. It was duller at the edges and fading at the corners. It again receded into the distance changing back to a red colour and finally disappearing. It appeared to be just about on the horizon and there was only one object sighted, always moving south or south east.

(g) About 2 minutes each time

(h) The size was estimated at about 50 to 70 feet across.

1. On 31 Mar 69 Liard Det. advised they had received information that BYCIUK had seen an U.F.O. several weeks ago and they requested we interview him. BYCIUK was enroute from the N.W.T. to Edmonton as seismic work in the area was finished due to spring break up.

2. BYCIUK was contacted and came to the detachment office and supplied the following information. He is the party manager for Geophysical Services Incorporated and on Feb. 15/18, 1969 the camp was located at 60 degrees 8 Min. Lat. and 123 degrees 31 Min. Long. At approx. 11pm. M.S.T. he saw an U.F.O. moving from East to West 15-20 miles away and at 500' altitude. He watched through a transit (27 power) for 15 minutes and the U.F.O. was travelling 225 degrees azimuth at the same altitude. Described it as round, half reddish orange and half white.

3. FMI67 sent to Prince George S/Div. with the above information included.

4. BYCIUK resides at 13535 - 113th St., Edmonton. The camp mechanic, Herbert DOUGLAS, also saw the U.F.O. DOUGLAS was not available for an interview in this regard however BYCIUK can provide his address if it is required.

5. BYCIUK was quite definite and clear on what he had seen and I feel he would be a reliable source of information.

6. No further investigation is possible. The area where the sighting occurred is unpopulated, with the exception of seismic crews in the winter months, and all crews left the area about the end of March.

Approximately 930 PM on or about Jan 3rd 1969, I was driving West on Highway 11 between Port Arthur, Ont and Sunshine, I was just approaching a place called Kaministiquia, when I noticed a very bright light hovering just above the tree-tops. This light was on my left hand side and just ahead of me.

And as I watched this object raised in the air, and then gradually moved out of my range of vision behind a hill.

I then proceeded to the junction of highway 11 and 17 and proceeded East towards Fort William, and as I came over a large hill on the highway and entered a flat piece of the road, I again noticed this bright light hovering just over the Tree-Tops, and as I watched this light crept slowly over to my right hand side, but always just a little ahead of me.

I drove along the highway for a distance of approximately three miles, and then stopped my car at the side of the road. And watched this object for about twenty minutes, I then drove my car into a laneway leading to an abandoned house by the roadside, and watched this object for nearly an hour.

After an hours time, it dissappeared from line of vision, it had been gone for about fifteen minutes when I decided to proceed on into Fort William.

As I entered the city limits of Fort William, and just about paralel to the Airport, I stopped the car and got out and looked around the sky. And as I watched, this bright object again came into sight heading for the airport. It came up over the airport, then it suddenly swooped down at the airport and just as it seemed about to crash the light went out, and that was the last I saw of this object that night.

The next day I heard from several people that a strange object had been seen flying in the sky around the lakehead, and that the airport had released the report, that it was a weather balloon released by the United States.

I am Thirty Six Years of age, and I know that I have excellant vision, and I am quite positive that I am sane. I cannot find it feasible that the United States cannot release a balloon with such a bright light and control its movements across the sky the way this bright object was moving.

The next night I again went out along the same route for the sole purpose of checking to see if this bright object was still around. Only this time I carried a strong pair of binochlars.

I again saw this bright object in approximately the same place I had seen it on Highway 17. I again parked my car in the lane-way leading to the old house, and upon focusing the Binochlars on this object, I could see that it was of an immense size, with red flashing lights all around its center. These Red lights where not visible with naked eye.

I again watched this object for about an hour before it disappeared from my sight.

It appeared to be revolving forward, and it would shoot forward with a great burst of speed, stop and just hang there in the air for a few minutes, and even while it was stopped it appeared to be revolving around and around. Then it would shoot off again, only in a slightly different direction, and stop again. This continued for about fifteen minutes, then it came to a stop, and to me it looked as though it was just above the tree-tops. And it stayed there for about thirty minutes, then it shot straight up and then disappeared from sight.

As it went straight up I also saw a Jet plane through the glasses, and there was quite a difference in the appearances of the two objects, about all I could see of this Jet, was its vapour trail, and then a small black dot at the nose of the vapour trail, at the same time this bright object was a great deal larger and was very bright, with its red lights showing. This Jet Plane did not appear to notice the bright object, as it kept straight on its course.

But as this bright object hovered over the tree-tops, at regular intervals I could see small pinpoints of lights shooting to and from the larger of the lights.

This bright light can be seen continuously over the Lakehead, and is usually first sighted about an hour before it starts getting dark, I have not bothered watching it again through the eye-glasses, as the times I have noticed it, I have been on my way to work, and could not afford to spend the time watching it.

I believe that this bright light hovering over the Lakehead is not a weather ballon as rumours claim, but is another object, and should be investigated further. And the reports of the findings published so that the people can know what is going on over their heads.


Dear Mr. Burridge:

Thank you very much for your report of March 17. May I assure you that we keep very careful watch on the general pattern of sightings reported to us, and we have the safety of Canada always uppermost in mind. I am happy to say that up to the present neither the Government of the U.S.A. nor the Canadian Government has seen the slightest indication of danger in any of the sightings of peculiar lights which have been made in recent years.

In regard to your own sighting, I believe you may have seen several different objects. When you were near the airport it is quite possible that some of your sightings referred to balloons or an aircraft. However, the object which you have been repeatedly in the west after sunset is the planet Venus which has been extremely brilliant in our evening sky. Certain atmospheric effects, combined with optical effects, cause this planet to appear to indulge in strange motions, to have vari-coloured jets of light jutting out of it, and to assume other peculiar aspects. Over the last few months we have had a great many reports concerning the peculiar behaviour of this planet.

Thank you for your co-operation in reporting to us.

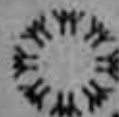



1. At 12:15 a.m. this date Raymond HINCHEY, Carlisle Road, Douglas, York Co., N.B. reported to this detachment that he had just viewed an unusual flying object flying over the Saint John River and travelling in the direction of Fredericton, N.B. He further stated that he viewed the object through a set of 7 X 50 binoculars and described it as being oval, round, quite large and displaying red, blue and white lights. He believed the object to be flying approximately 3,000 feet above the Saint John River.

2. The Fredericton Airport and Control Tower were contacted and both advised that no aircraft were in the area and none had been in the Fredericton area since 10:40 p.m. 14 APR 69.

3. Radiogram # 145 was submitted to Fredericton Sub/Division in this respect.

18 APR 69

4. On this date Margaret (Mrs. Raymond) HINCHEY, Carlisle Rd., Douglas, York Co., N.B. was interviewed concerning the sighting of the unidentified flying object. She advised that her husband, Raymond, had first sighted the object at approximately 12:10 a.m. and had called her to view it. She stated that when she first saw it, the object was above the Saint John River, opposite her home at Douglas, at a height of approximately 3,000 feet. She further stated that it appeared oval shaped with a green light on the front of it and a red light to the rear of it. She saw a dome of the top of the object which seemed to emit a bright yellowish-white glow. The object glided through the air and then would hover and appear to take a different shape. The object would move very slowly from one point to another. She further advised that the object would spin at a very fast rate and glow or shine light as bright as the sun striking a bright metal object. She advised that the object glided down the Saint John River in the direction of Fredericton and she watched it for about 15 minutes at which time she left the window and her husband continued to watch it. She advises that the object was definitely not an aircraft.

21 APR 69

5. On this date Raymond HINCHEY, Carlisle Rd., Douglas, York Co., N.B. was contacted and interviewed concerning his sighting of the unidentified flying object. He advised that he first sighted the object at approximately 12:10 a.m. of the 15 APR 69. He stated that the object appear to be about 5,000 feet above the Saint John River proceeding in a Southerly direction, following the Saint John River toward Fredericton. The object appeared to be gliding along and there was

AND THERE WAS, no noise from it. The object was moving slowly at a speed estimated at 100 to 150 m.p.h. At this time HINCHEY looked at the object through his binoculars and found the object was oval shaped with pulsating lights of red, blue and white around the middle of the object. HINCHEY described the object to look like a hamburger with the pulsating lights set in the concave between the upper and lower points of the object. The lights appeared to be set in approximately 2 feet from the edges of the object. The lights appeared to change colour but not position on the object. The lights appeared to be more red and blue to the front of the object and mainly white to the rear of it. HINCHEY did not see any red or green lights at the front or rear of the object. He stated the object would glide along, stop and hover and then gyrate in a wobbling motion and appear to bellow up and down, completely out of shape. The object would then stop and return to its normal shape. At this time the lights were blurred and he could not ascertain their colour. The object was first seen over the Saint John River in the Douglas area and then glided down the Saint John River over the Fredericton area to the area of New Maryland. HINCHEY watched the object until it was distant enough to appear as a pinpoint of light and then it disappeared. At this time it was red in colour. The object disappeared in a south-westerly direction from Douglas, N.B. He stated that the object appeared to be 100-150 across and 10 feet thick.

6. No other reports of sightings were reported in the area and the Fredericton Airport Control Tower did not receive any reports of sightings.

7. The weather office at the Fredericton Airport was contacted concerning weather conditions at 12:00 midnight on the 14 APR 69 and it was learned that the temperature was 41 degrees, dew point 29, barometric pressure 30.13, no wind and the skies were clear and visibility was unlimited.

8. From investigation it would appear that the object seen by the HINCHEY'S was not a meteorite and both are positive that it was not an aircraft.

9. The reliability of the HINCHEY'S are not known but after conversing with each of them it would appear that their imaginations may have gotten the better of them as each have read numerous articles on unidentified flying objects and it was learned that each read of similiar descriptions as they gave me of the object they saw. There is no reason to discredit them in their sightings, but on the other hand there is no reason to credit them on what they saw.

10. No explanation is available as to the origin of the unknown object, but should further sightings be reported the appropriate action will be taken.

UFO SIGHTING REPORT ON 23 APRIL 1969

by [REDACTED] OTTAWA 8

The report first came to my attention through one of [REDACTED] superiors who recommended him as a steady, sensible type who works as a driver for the Department of National Defence. The sighting was made on April 22, between 8 and 8:30 P.M.

[REDACTED] was driving with his wife and fifteen year old son near the village of Hammond, about twenty-five miles east of Ottawa. They were headed in an easterly direction just outside the Village. The weather was totally overcast and raining hard. Mr. Gibeau used to own a farm in the vicinity and hence knows the area well. They were approaching the top of a hill when his son noticed something towards the north. They stopped the car, turned off the lights, and opened the windows. He described what they saw as looking like a huge drinking cup turned upside-down. It had two bright, white lights which were directed more horizontal than down, and appeared to have a row of portholes. From the colour of the light from the portholes, he thought there must have been a pink light inside. He estimated the object to be two hundred feet away across an open field, approximately twenty feet long and about five feet above the ground. When I asked him how he judged these lengths and distances, he said he knew the field well and judged the distances from its apparent position in the field. The white lights lit up the field brightly. He said he was able to see the interior of his car quite well. He described the sounds heard as being a whirling or whining sound, something like the noise of a generator. There are high tension power lines running across the back of the field. He said the object turned, zoomed back over the trees and above the hydro lines. It then moved off along the power line. At this point [REDACTED] drove back to Hammond. He estimated that they had watched the object for from fifteen to twenty minutes.

I suggested to [REDACTED] that this sounded like a helicopter. He said "No.". He said, "I am a mechanic. I have worked with motors all my life. I know what a helicopter looks like and sounds like and this was not a helicopter.". I checked with the chief pilot for Ontario Hydro and they had no helicopters inspecting power lines in this area. The Department of Transport and various commercial helicopter firms were called and all stated they had no helicopters flying at that time.

Dear Dr. McIntosh:

I am writing in reference to the news item in the Ottawa Citizen of April 24th pertaining to a UFO sighting by an Ottawa family on April 22nd.

As a serious private researcher in the UFO field for many years, I am rather disturbed by the article which appeared. As the only information available to me at this time is the news item, I of course do not know how accurate the reporter was in presenting the story. My experience has been that news items are usually distorted and usually present only the sensational aspects of the sighting.

In the interests of getting at the facts of the case, I wonder if it would be possible for you to send me a detailed report of the sighting (less names of witnesses in view of their desire to remain anonymous).

The aspect of the news report which particularly disturbs me is the reported conclusion on your part that the object sighted was a helicopter, yet you are quoted as saying that you "normally.... never see helicopters at night and really have no idea of what they look like". If this is so, your conclusion would seem to be entirely unwarranted.

As for myself, as a former pilot and having spent many years observing hundreds of helicopters at night, operating under many different conditions, I can assure you that no helicopter in my experience has either looked or sounded like the object described in this report. Certainly, helicopters don't "hum" like a gener-

ator, and the lighting is particular^{ly} strange also. This, along with the fact that a "survey of helicopter agencies by the National Research Council Wednesday failed to turn up any which had a craft operating at that hour" leaves your conclusion standing on no apparent evidence to support it. But perhaps you have other evidence which was not reported by the press.

It does not surprise me that no agency could be located which was operating a helicopter at that hour in view of the weather conditions at the time. It would have been most unusual for such a craft to be operating under such conditions.

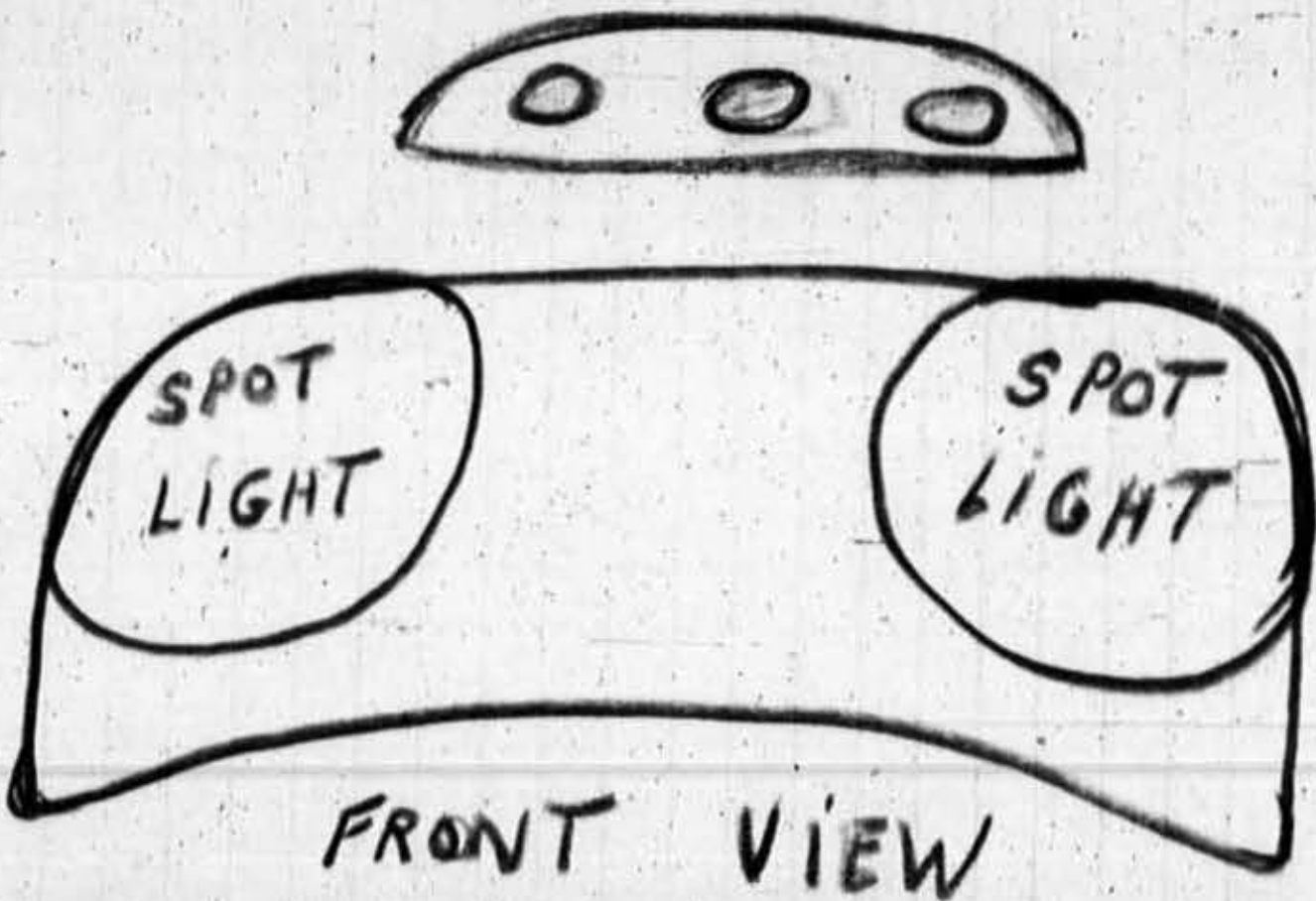
I am quite familiar with the many distortions, illusions, reflections, misinterpretations etc which can occur in such sightings, and the causes of them, but I see no evidence in this report for assuming that the object sighted was a helicopter.

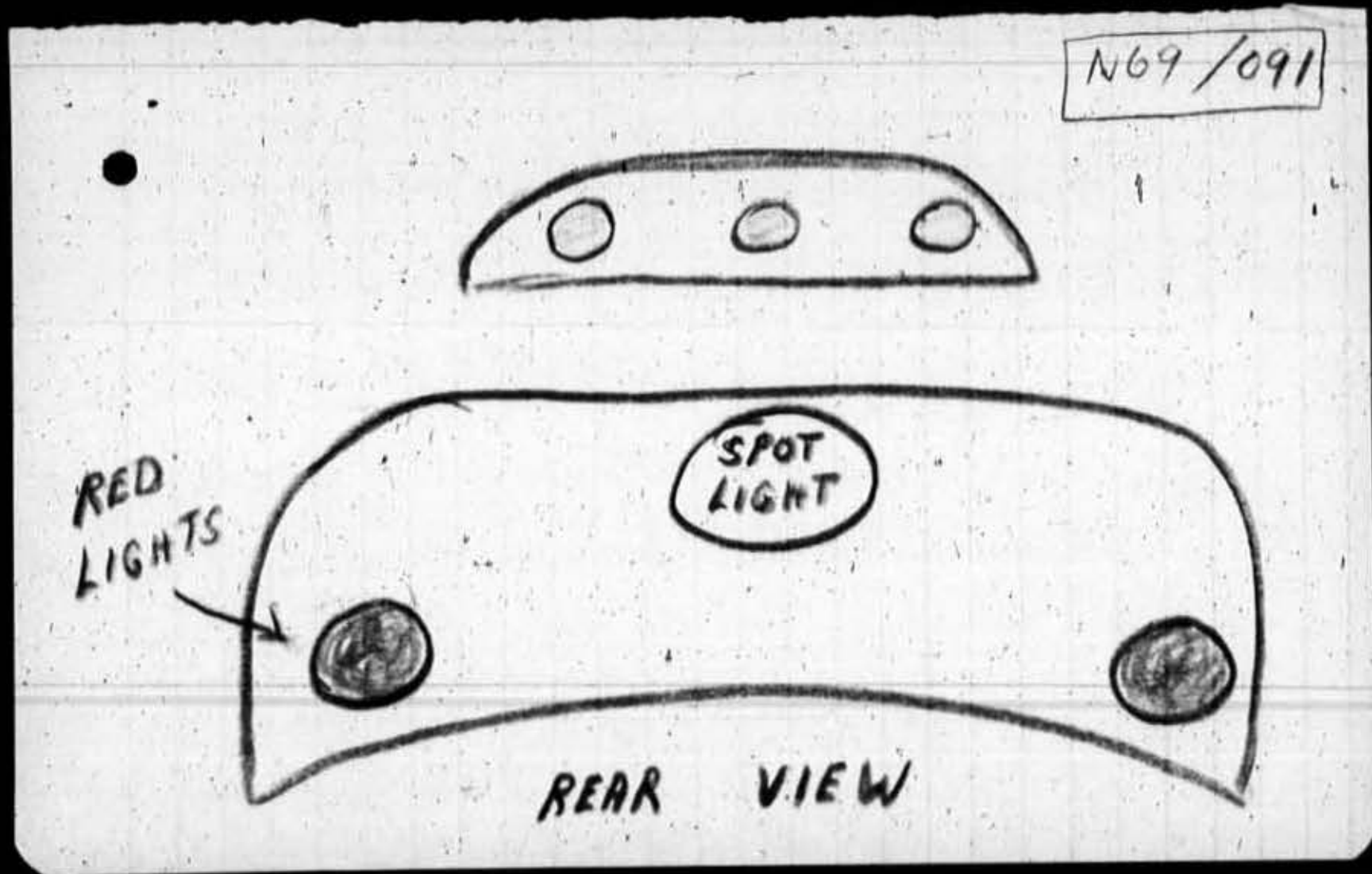
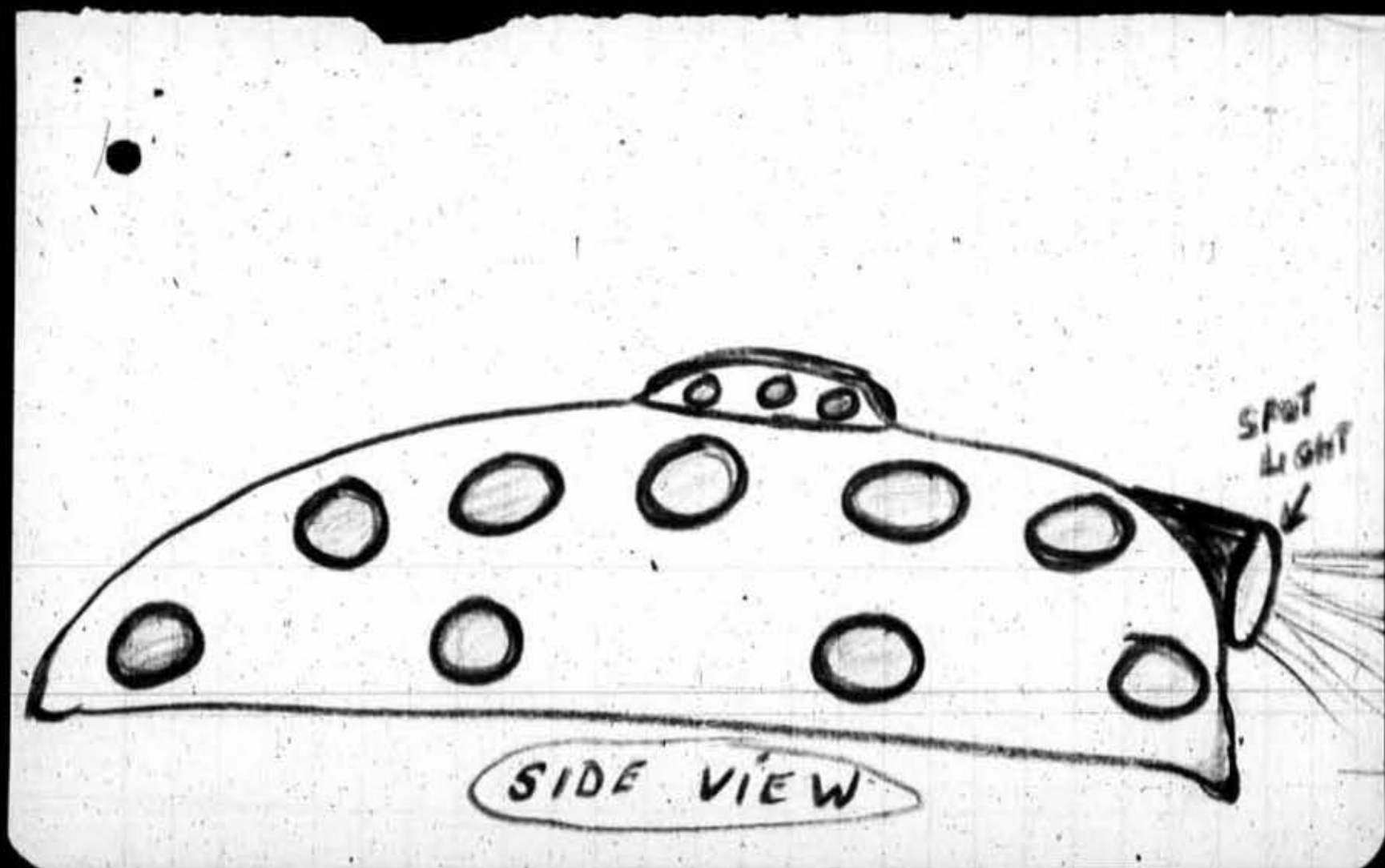
As one of the greatest problems facing the public in respect to UFOs is misinformation as well as lack of information, I will be very grateful if you can enlighten me as to why you reached the conclusion reported in the press, if such is indeed the case. I can assure you that my interest is only in ensuring that the facts are presented, and I have been assured many times that it is the desire of NRC to make all facts available to the public. It is my belief that government agencies and private researchers should work hand in hand in studying the UFO problem because often some information is available to one group, which is not available to the other, and thus we stand a better chance of an eventual solution to the mystery.

1. At 10:35 PM this date Captain V.A. NAUGLER, Duty Traffic Control Officer at the C.F.B. Southport, Manitoba contacted this office and advised that at 10:16 PM he received a report of an Unidentified Flying Object from Mr. C.G. WHITEHURST of the above address. Captain NAUGLER gave a brief description of the object and further advised their Traffic control and Winnipeg Airport Traffic Control had no V.F.R. flight traffic in the area or any overdue. The Portage Flying Club was contacted by the writer with negative results. Captain NAUGLER also contacted Winnipeg Search and Rescue in this regard and they advised that they could not search the area unless there was an actual report of a missing air craft.

2. Mr. C.G. WHITEHURST was contacted immediately and gave the following information concerning the U.F.O. At 9:45 PM he alone was standing in his front yard at the above address, facing in a northerly direction when he noted a pinkish colored light in the sky north of Portage la Prairie, Manitoba. The light appeared as that of a vehicle headlight at a distance of one-quarter of a mile or one-twentieth the size of the moons appearance. It appeared to be approximately one thousand feet from the earth, and five miles north and two miles east of the City of Portage. It was travel from north to south, horizontal to the earths surface but moving in a waving motion, up and down and about three times the light appeared to flash. At about 9:46 he went into the house and returned immediately with his wife and two children, same shown under 'et al' above. They all watched as the light turned in an easterly direction and it flashed about two times once again. At approximately 9:48 the light dropped towards the earth almost vertically, maybe a little from a westerly direction to an easterly direction. As the light dropped it disappeared behind the horizon of the viewer's which was blocked by buildings in the foreground. This was the last the viewer's saw of the light. There was no after affect as it went beyond their horizon. The light had no trailing affect at all nor any audible sound. None of the observers could give any explanation for the sighting. No further complaints were received about this time.

3. The general atmospheric conditions in the Portage Area at the time of the sighting were as follows. The sky was absolutely clear of clouds, visability was fifteen miles plus, with no obstructions such as smoke, fog, dust etc., the wind was steady from the north at fifteen miles per hour.

4. Cst. L. STRIGHT and Cst. H. TUBBS respectively of Portage H.P. and Det. made a patrol in the general area north of Portage to observe any unusual peculiarities, this met with negative results. Numerous persons in the area were question in regards to the U.F.O., this likewise met with negative results.

5. At 12:12 AM this date Portage City Det. telex #195 was dispatched to the O.C. Winnipeg Sub-Division and Info. 'D' Division.
6. Later this date the local Portage News Paper was advised of the circumstances of the sighting and published same. The local radio station C-FRY assisted by broadcasting the circumstances to the public and requesting that any person sighting the light contact this office. This met with negative results.
7. At 9:15 AM the C.F.B. Southport, Manitoba sent up a C-45 aircraft to search the area between the base of Lake Manitoba and the City of Portage for any peculiarities, but this met with negative results. There was no report of any missing aircraft which could have been in the area. The area north of Portage is completely flat farm country, swampy in parts with little tree and bush life. The area is moderately populated.
8. As the possibility existed that the light could have been a Gyra-lite used on passenger trains, the C.N.R. and C.P.R. in Portage were contacted. The C.N.R. advised that they do not have such lights on their units and the C.P.R. which has them advised that there were no trains in the area within two hours before and after the sighting. The Gyra-lite in question is located on top of the head unit. It rotates in a circle and sends a beam of light at about a twenty degree angle towards the sky. On a clear night only the beam of light can be seen but on an overcast night if the overcast is low enough a light spot will reflect off the clouds. From the description given by the observers this would definitely not have been a Gyra-lite.
9. Although Mr. WHITESHURST was unknown to the members of this Detachment it was felt that the information in question was fairly reliable.

29 APR 69

10. This date further investigation revealed the identity of the U.F.O. At 9:30 PM on the date in question David WICHINSKI 15, Sandra WICHINSKI 13, and Larry MAJOR 14 all of Portage were flying a kite in the North Memorial School grounds in Portage, which is located approx. one quarter of a mile north of Mr. WHITESHURST'S residence. The kite tail piece had a four cell flashlight attached to it. The pinkish color of the light was caused from a red plastic ring which is part of the head of the flashlight. At approximately 9:45 PM the kite string broke and the kite came to the ground about a block south of where it had been flying. This same instance occurred the following night by three unknown youths and was identified as such.

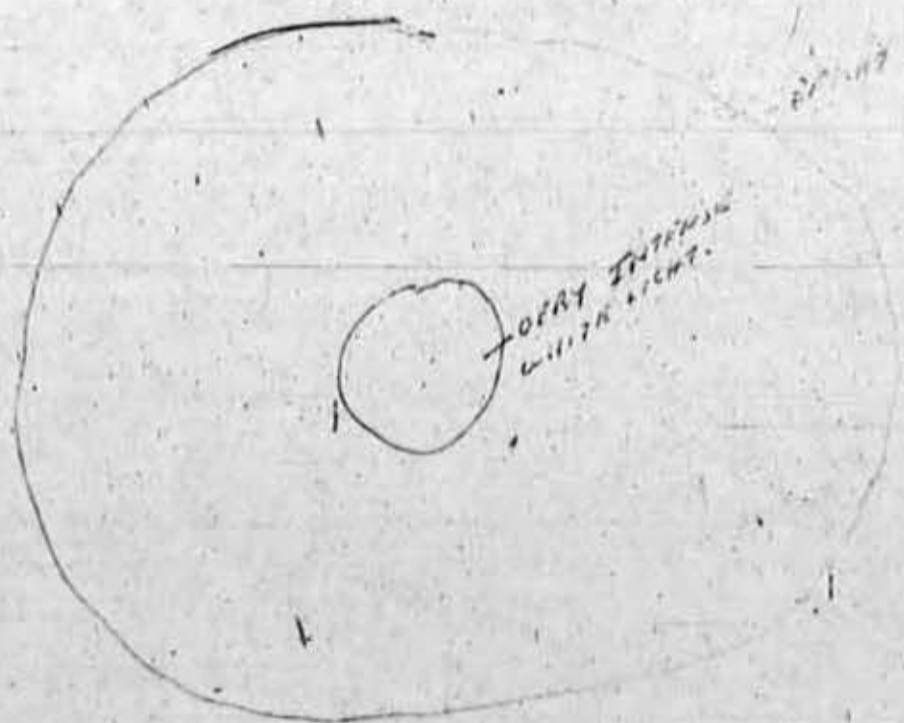
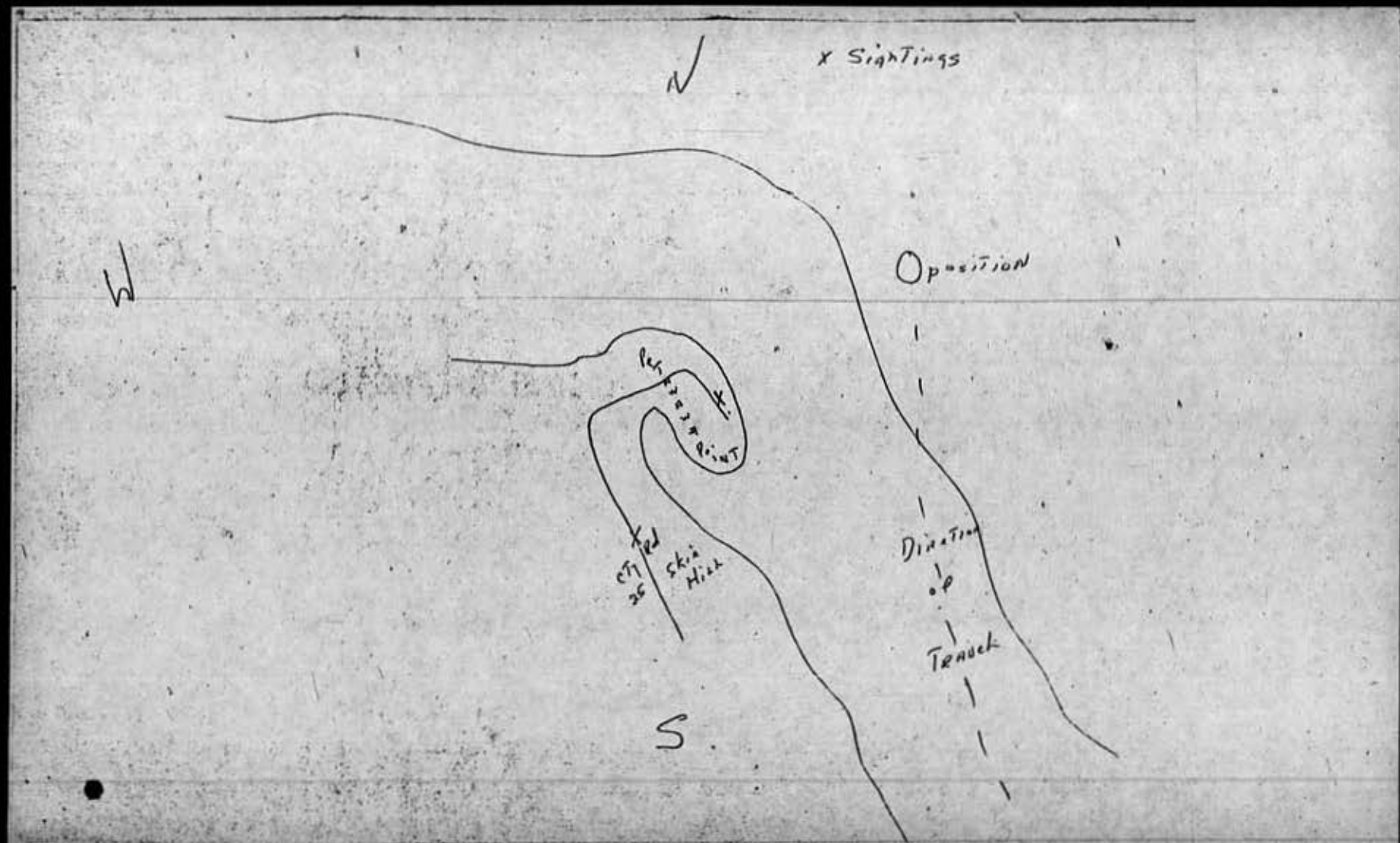


DIAGRAM ON BACK

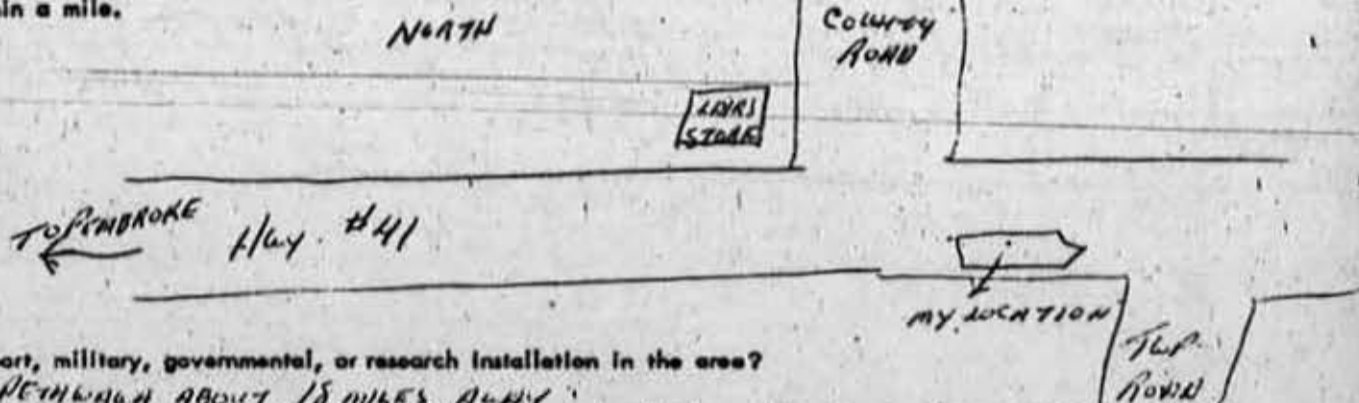

I was perfectly sober at the time of the incident and it really scared me. I cannot offer a logical explanation but, nevertheless, the light was there and it did follow me for approximately six miles, approximately 200 feet to my rear and possibly 20 feet high. It maintained perfect co-ordination with my speed.

6. LAKE is presently Assistant Director of the Nfld. Division of the Canadian Cancer Society in St. John's and was formerly a School Teacher in the Province for five years. He is known to Members of this Detachment as a sane and responsible individual.

There was no indication that he was anything but perfectly sober when he contacted this office in this respect. In addition, LAKE was checked by Members of Harbour Grace Detachment at 2.30 a.m. on the date in question at Riverhead, Nfld., and found to be perfectly sober. There was no indication that he had been drinking previously and the time element involved would

ELEMENT INVOLVED WOULD .. not have allowed him any time for drinking. He also states that he was perfectly sober at this time.

7. If LAKE had been under the influence of alcohol, I would doubt his story in view of his previous contact with Members of the Force. There is no indication of similar events of this nature being reported by LAKE. While there is always room for doubt in these incidents, I have no reason to question LAKE'S statement as being untrue. He is presently employed in a responsible position in St. John's and this incident really disturbed him.

8. In view of the above and unless instructions to the contrary are received, this file will be concluded at this point.

- At approximately 3.45 a.m. of the above date, Mr. Harry LAKE of 2 Mullock Street, St. John's, contacted this office and stated that he had observed a U.F.O. on the Trans-Canada Highway approximately twenty miles West of St. John's.
- LAKE, who sounded very excited when reporting the incident, stated that he had first observed the light ahead of his car on the Highway, at which time it resembled a star. As he continued East on the Trans Canada Highway, the light disappeared momentarily at which time his car radio cut out, his voltage indicator went to "Discharge" and the car stalled. He then observed the light to his rear, at which time the car appeared to function normally. The light followed him for approximately six miles, during which time he drove at a high rate of speed, and the light had no difficulty in keeping pace with him. There was no vapor trail visible or noise heard, other than from the car and the light was described as something unlike he had ever seen before. As LAKE went over the crest of a hill, the light disappeared momentarily and he then observed it proceeding over the woods in a southerly direction.
- Mr. LAKE was alone in his car at the time and there were no other similar reports received at this office. There was also no other vehicular traffic present on the highway at the time.
- The following self-explanatory statement was obtained from Mr. LAKE, with the original being held on file:-

STATEMENT OF HARRY ALEXANDER LAKE, 2 Mullock Street, St. John's

At approximately 3.05 a.m., 19 MAY 69, I was proceeding East on the Trans-Canada Highway at approximately 20 miles West of St. John's, Nfld. I was alone in my car when I observed a light ahead of me which I thought may have been a star. I continued onward and the light disappeared. Suddenly, my car radio went dead, my alternator went to "Discharge" and the car stalled momentarily. At almost the same time I observed a bright light in my rear view mirror. There was no other traffic around at this time. The light followed me for approximately six miles, during which time it seemed to change positions behind me at will, coming close and/or following behind a little. I heard no noise whatsoever. I drove at speeds up to 100 m.p.h. but the bright light or object had no trouble following me. The only way I can describe it would be as a bright oval shaped, fluorescent type light, unlike any

To me strickly an observational small 60 foot saucer unit, or remote control one. due to the light beams sticking out at 7 o clock or so. THE SMALLER REMOTE CONTROL GLOBES IVE SEEN MORE THAN ONCE.

1. At approximately 10:15 P.M., while on patrol on Lower Drive on Parliament Hill I observed an object which appeared as a bright falling star descending vertically from an altitude of approximately 2000 feet to approximately 1000 feet north-north-east on the north side of the Ottawa River over Hull, Quebec. It hovered in this position for about thirty seconds, changing colors to red, green, and white. It then proceeded east and appeared to be circling, dropping and rising for about four to five minutes above eastern Hull and Pointe-Gatineau. It then hovered for about five minutes - blinking its lights constantly. At approximately 10:30 it proceeded west of Hull at an altitude of approximately 1000 feet, and came across the river in the Ottawa area and disappeared from view behind high buildings of Wellington St. at approximately 10:35. All this while the object was of no discernable shape. At approximately 10:50 a bright object appeared in the sky due south of Ottawa. It kept its bearings at approximately 1500 feet altitude with a smaller bright object approximately 500 feet below it. The objects disappeared and reappeared at different intervals but disappeared completely at about 11:10 P.M. However, it could not be ascertained if it was the same previously mentioned object.

2. At 10:19 P.M. all the lights on Parliament Hill (East, West and Centre Block) went out. Mr. L. TESSIER of the Ont. Hydro was notified who said the cause could not be ascertained at the time but could be due to an explosion in the sewers at the corner of Sparks and O'Connor Sts. which was being investigated.

3. This object was sighted by 3/Cst. L.J. FENDER, 3/Cst. W.L. MORRISSEY, Cst. W.S. MAJAURY, Alvin PRINGLE (age 15 of 30 Lay St. Barrie, Ont), Brian BLAIR, (age 14 of 147 Cook St., Barrie, Ont.) and Stewart ROYAL (age 14 of 120 Rodney St., Barrie, Ont.). The civilians mentioned are presently staying at the Beacon Arms Hotel in Ottawa. The sky was clear with a few clouds but visibility was excellent.

4. The above information was passed on to the NCO i/c "A" Div. Desk who advised the R.C.A.F., Base Station at Uplands.

The objects have been described as "orange balls".

The sightings were confirmed earlier this week by staff at the Winnipeg International Airport control tower.

But St. James-Assiniboia police said today they now suspect that the UFOS are actually parachute flares — shot from a backyard in the Woodhaven area.



- (b) Clear sky.
- (c) Cst's WARNKE, R.E. JENKINS, R.H. HINES, and myself.
- (d) Cst's J.A. WARNKE and I were on patrol at the corner of Wilkes Ave., and Harstone Road, Charleswood, and Cst's R.E. JENKINS and R.H. HINES were approx. 1/2 mile north of us on Harstone Rd. JENKINS and HINES were made aware of this sighting via police radio and they both got out of their P.C. and also observed what WARNKE and I observed.
- (e) One Leo DASHENSKY of 721 Harstone Road noted JENKINS and HINES and came out with his binoculars, and also observed these U.F.O'S.
- (f) Four round ball shaped objects were seen travelling in a south westerly direction towards both observation points. They were all a bright yellow-orange color flying in somewhat of a formation of pairs, first side by side and changing to one pair on top of the others, remaining at a constant height. Size could be described as slightly larger balls in appearance than the planet Mars, that is large and bright at this time of the year. These seem to disappear one at a time first by leaving a contrail of sparks and then fading out. The first two did this and the third one gained a little altitude, left a glowing trail of particles and faded out. The last one rose rapidly and went out of sight.
- (g) Duration of observation was 12 min. approximately, from 12:10 A.M. to 12:22 A.M.
- (h) WARNKE and I first saw these U.F.O'S and called JENKINS and HINES, and all were out of our vehicles. There was no noise noted along with these objects. DASHENSKY did not see anything that we did not see through his binoculars, but he did see most of this sighting. These objects did not look like anything that any of us had ever seen before, and they did not look like flares of any sort. Message CHEWD 14 was sent from this Detachment as required in O.M.
