Thank you for your letter in which you asked for the Department's views on the incident at RAF Woodbridge in December 1980.

You may find it useful if I explain that the sole interest of the United Kingdom Ministry of Defence in reported sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) is to establish whether they have any bearing on the defence of the country.

The only information we have on the alleged "UFO sighting" at Rendlesham Forest in December 1980 is the report by Colonel Charles Halt, of the United States Air Force. We are satisfied that the events described are of no defence significance. I can assure you that there is no question of attempting to cover up any incident or mishap, nor are we attempting in any way to obscure the truth.

I recall you also asked when you telephoned me if I could give you the number of reports we have had of 'sightings'. During 1985 the Ministry of Defence received 160 reported sightings of aerial phenomena or 'UFO's', the majority of these being in the Welsh, Yorkshire and Thames Valley/London areas.

Up until the end of March this year we had received 39 reports. I trust that this information is of some use to you.

The object was also picked up by the near by civilian Airport radar, but a later report said that the object was infact a beam from a lighthouse, but radar dosn't pick up beams of light. Who ever gave that story to the news paper reporter I'm sure he could have made up a better story than that.

I would be very grateful if you could tell me the truth behind the artical. The only reason why I bring up the matter after so long is because a friend only just showed me the said artical.

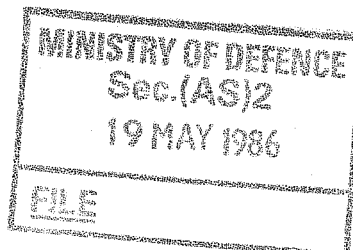

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS - CENTRAL TELEVISION INTERVIEW

1. My staff spoke to you on Friday evening about a request from Central Television to conduct an interview with a member of MOD, preferably a Minister, for inclusion in a 45 minute piece on UFOs which they propose screening in "Central Weekend", a 1 1/2 hour current affairs programme shown on Sundays in the Central TV area. The producers are, as yet, unsure of the actual date of the broadcast. We promised to let you have fuller information about the programme when it was to hand.

2. The programme will be based on a series of interviews interspersed with film, taken from public roads, of some MOD establishments which are assumed to be of significance in UFO circles. Interviewees will include Lord Hill-Norton and an ex-MOD employee **Section 40** **Section 40** who worked at Boscombe Down during the 1950's and who claims to have seen a UFO in 1952. You may wish to note that, because of his official status at the time, **Section 40** has been in touch with this office, independently, about taking part in the programme. We have advised him that, as a private citizen, the decision to take part must be his own but that the MOD would have no objection to him doing so.

3. The proposed interview with Minister(DS) would last perhaps 15 minutes which, when edited, will provide 2-3 minutes of TV time. The interview would take the form of specific questions upon which we would, of course, provide briefing. The questions are expected to include: our explanation of the strange phenomena which occur in the sky; the seriousness with which MOD treats reports of incidents; whether MOD is the sole authority in Whitehall which receives reports or whether they are passed on to another more clandestine organisation; and the incident in December 1980 at RAF Woodbridge. Central Television have indicated that the interview can take place at Minister's convenience but they would preferably wish it to be within a fortnight.

4. We have sought the views of CPR's organisation on this topic and they recommend Minister should take part. To refuse to do so would only add to speculation that the MOD has something to hide on this particularly emotive subject.

5. I would be grateful to know if Minister(DS) is content with the proposal that he should appear on the programme.

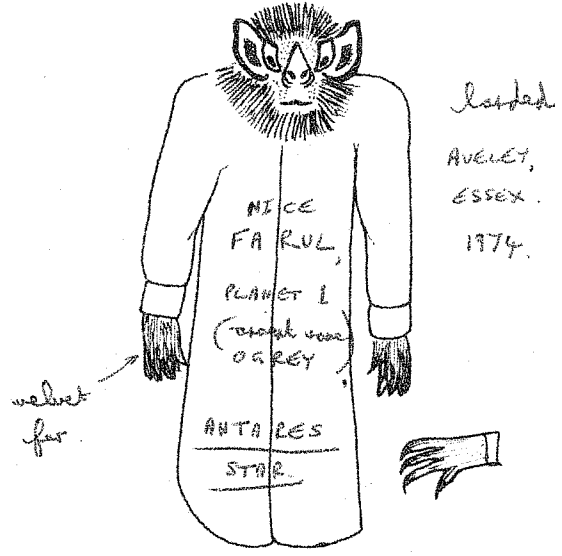
with four digits on each hand, Large talons or nails protrude from each finger. It is very thick set, and walks awkwardly. John hears it make occasional guttural chirps. Despite its appearance it seems to

is about 3ft. high on the ground. It is soft, with a surface of small "bubbles" that support the body. Like most other things in the craft it is grey in colour. The table is supported on an hemispherical pivoting support. On the left-hand side nearest the examiner is some kind of long control box from which the "pencil" instruments are obtained.

Whilst on the table John cannot move any part of his body. (He believes that they did use other instruments on him but he cannot describe them.)

pink rises and creamy eye bands. There are no visible noses or mouths, and John has a strong feeling that the entities are wearing masks.

As far as John can recall there are 3 fingers on each hand. The skin is very pale, almost translucent.

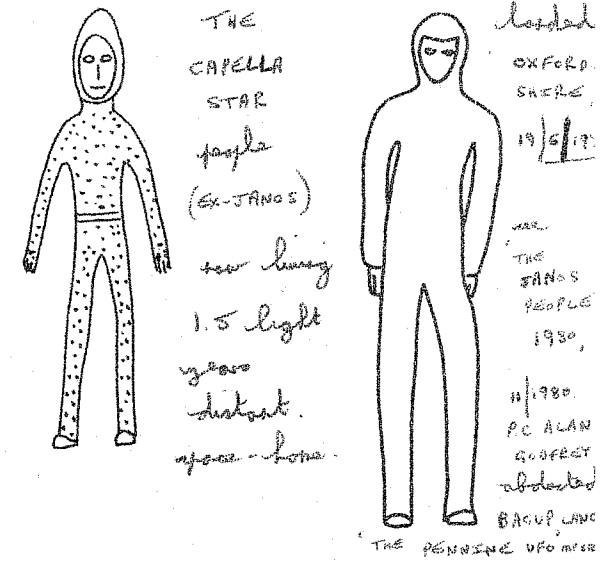
Neither entity seems to have joints in arms or legs. John likens this to a "bendy toy" or "blow up doll." As they move their arms, no elbows can be seen. Their movement is graceful, and they do not take large strides when they walk.

When John has swung his legs over the side of the table, he starts asking questions, all of which are answered. At one point he asks: "What do you do when you're outside the ship?"

"We use a visor," came the reply.

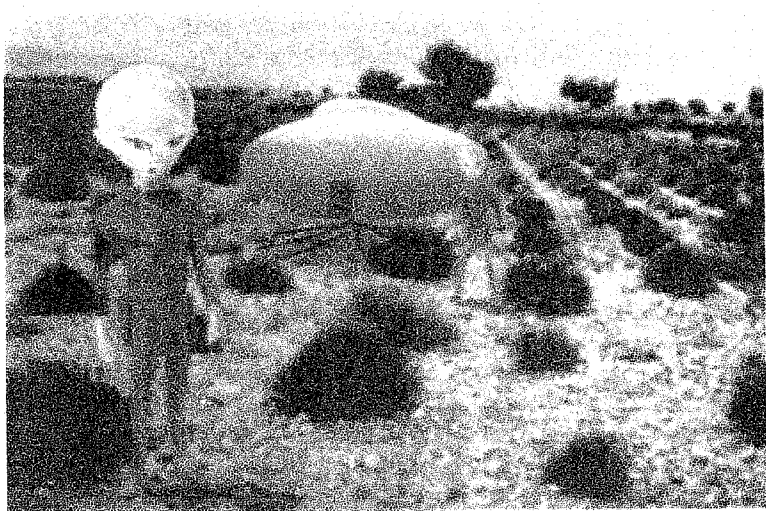

high - the size of a smallish car. It was standing on six legs connected to a central pivot, and had a door and a transparent dome: M. Masse likened it to a monstrous spider. At first he thought it might be a helicopter, since they frequently landed on these fields: but he quickly realized this was no such thing. Then he saw two creatures bending down as though examining his plants: since his crop had recently been damaged by unknown vandals, he moved forward angrily.

He was about seven metres from them when one of the figures turned and pointed a pencil-like object at him, taken from a holder at its side: Masse found himself halted in his tracks, unable to move. The two figures stood watching him, but did not seem hostile; they seemed to be discussing him. They were about one metre tall, dressed in close-fitting grey-green clothing, with no headgear. Their heads were about three times the size of a human head, in proportion to their bodies: they had large ears, high cheeks, lidless eyes, no chins, and round holes for mouths.

The two beings returned to their machine; the door closed, the legs whirled and retracted, and the machine left the ground silently. When it was between fifteen and twenty metres away, it suddenly vanished. About fifteen minutes later feeling returned to Masse and he was able to move again: he worked until between 7.30 or 8 am, then went back to the village, where he told his adventure at a cafe. Being known and respected in the neighbourhood, his story was taken seriously and thoroughly investigated both by the police and by private UFO investigative groups: though some contradictions were noted, no reason was found to doubt his story, and some confirmation was obtained from other witnesses which seemed to support his claim. Physical traces were found on the site, which persisted and affected future crops until the field was ploughed over. Masse also suffered from psychological effects - he slept inordinately and experienced dreams of a psychic character.⁵⁶

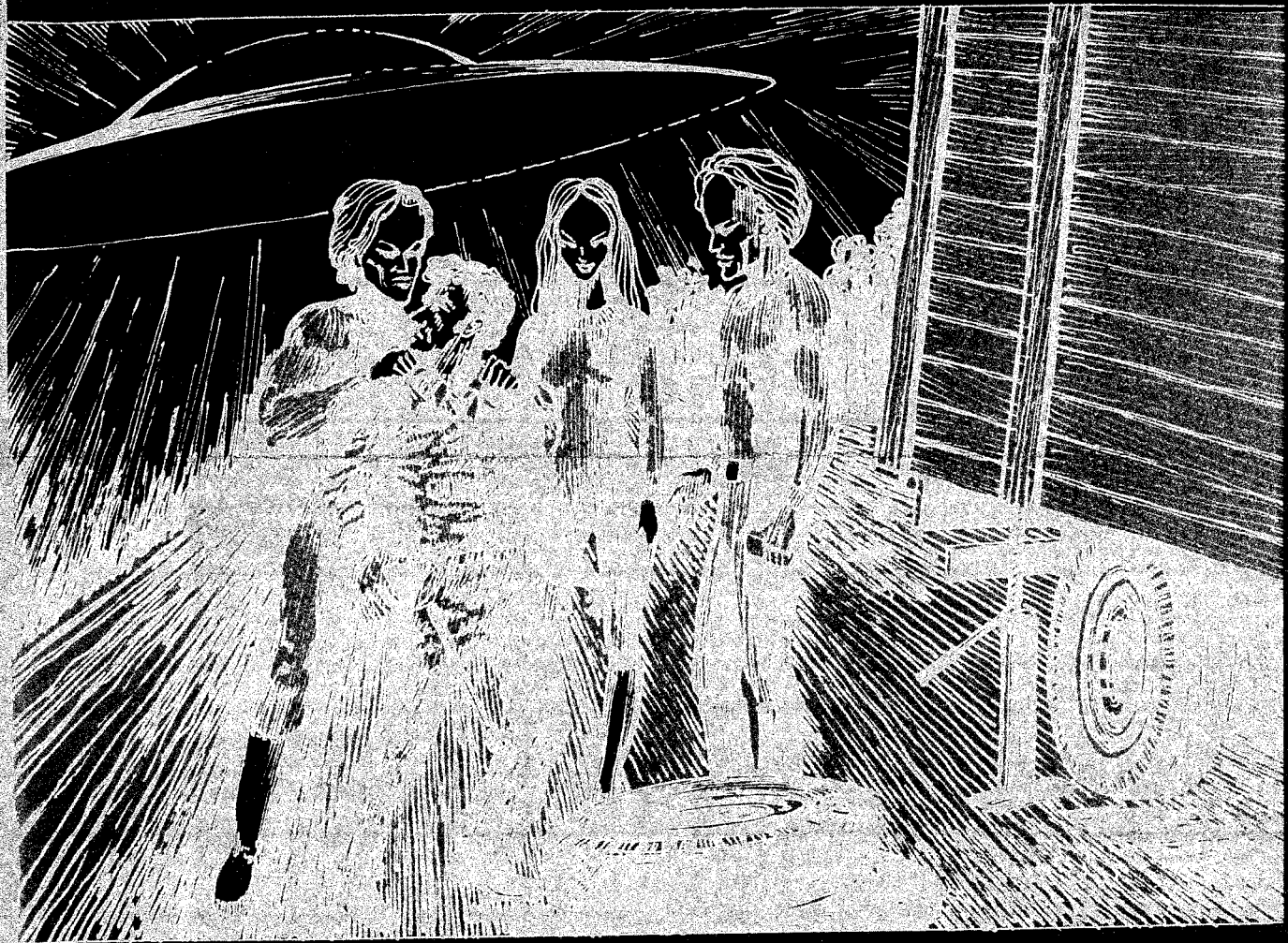
In selecting these examples, I have deliberately chosen relatively simple and unsensational cases, occurring to ordinary people in the casual course of their daily lives. None of these people was particularly interested in UFOs; they were not deliberately looking for them nor, so far as is known, were they subject to any other kind of delusion or preconception. In all six cases, the sighting came as a total surprise, to which the witness had to adjust while in the course of doing something quite trivial - going to bed, returning home, doing the daily work. In each case the witness responded with emotions ranging from mild puzzlement to complete bafflement; in each case subsequent investigation, while it has failed to discover the true explanation, has also failed to show that the witness in any way misreported the incident. In short, these things seem to have taken place as described, for all anyone can show to the contrary.

Of course, some of them are capable of some kind of explanation. For several of them, a helicopter might seem to offer an answer - behaving unusually for some

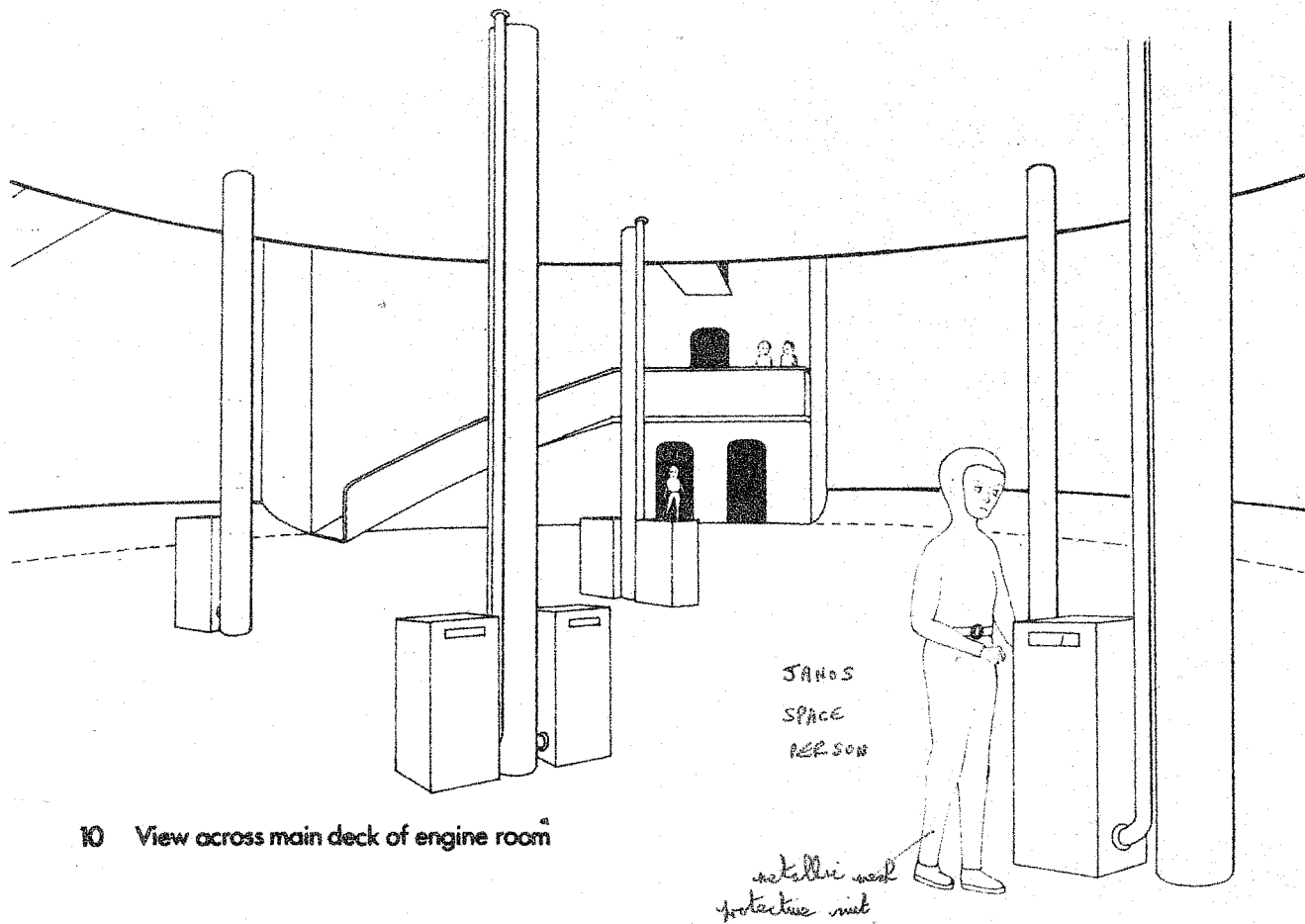

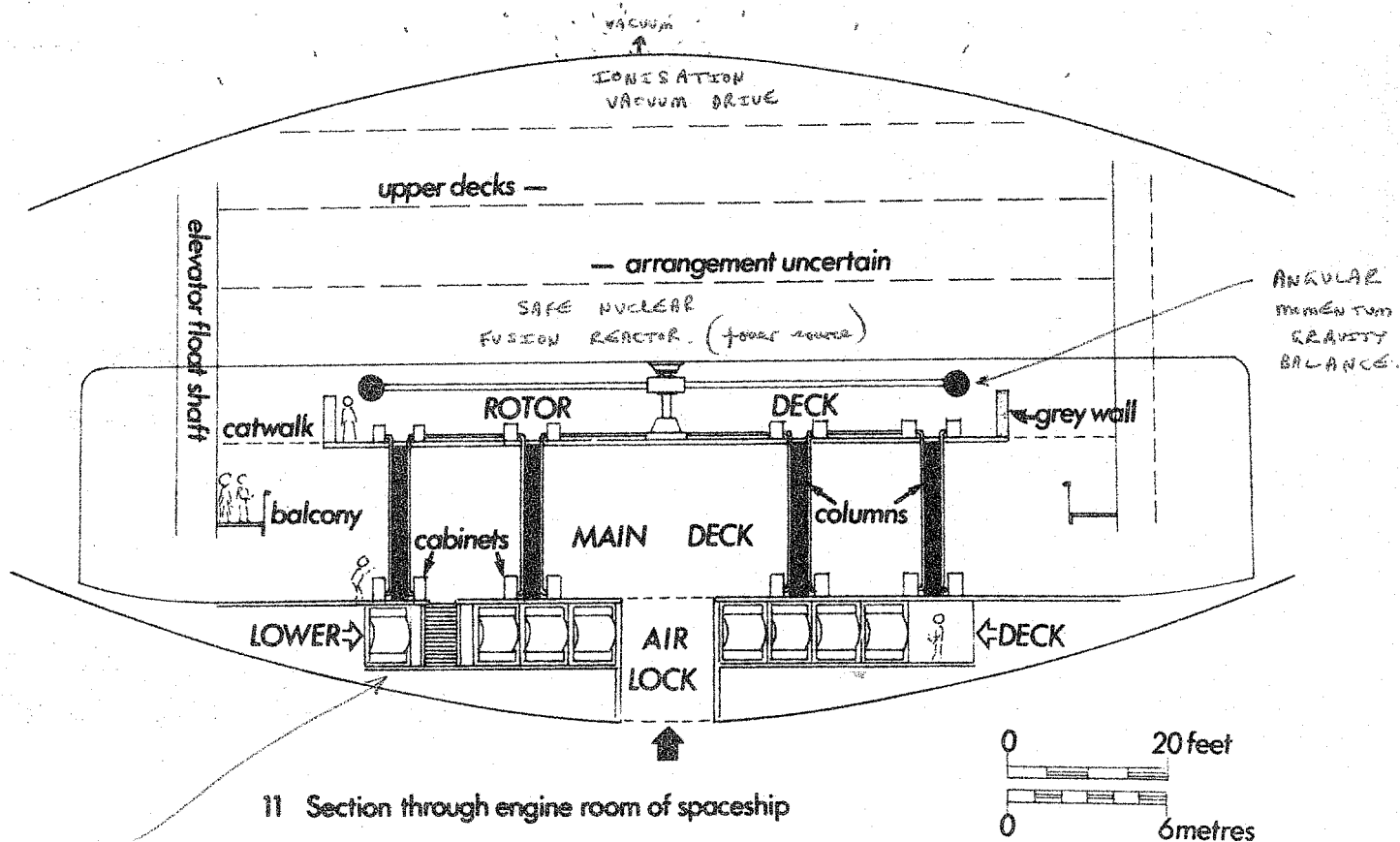

Star Wars? A load of old UFOs

I don't believe in radioactive giant rabbits²

IT IS there in black and white, an official report signed by a US Air Force Colonel saying that unidentified flying objects had been sighted by his men in Suffolk in late December 1980.

Needless to say, people wondered whether I had gone barmy three years later when I published the report by Lt Col Charles Halt, deputy commander of the USAF base at RAF Woodbridge.

The authorities today are still saying nowt or denying all, but they cannot magic away that official report by Lt Col Halt — later promoted to full Colonel and made commander of the East Anglia base. So he wasn't barmy!

It was unearthed under America's Freedom of Information Act as part of a remarkable investigation carried out for the past five years by three British women who refuse to be put down by officialdom.

Jenny Randles, director of investigations for the British UFO Research Association, and her two helpers, housewives Brenda Butler and Dot Street, tell their story in a paperback called Sky Crash to be published on May 22 (Crafton £2.95).

It was their early investigations that got me excited in October 1983, particularly the report Lt Col Halt filed to his superiors about the strange events in Rendisham Forest. He wrote on 13 January 1981:

1. Early in the morning of 27 December 1980 (approximately 0300) two USAF security patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate... the individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest.

off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two to the north and one to the south...

2. The next day, three depressions 1.5ins deep and 7ins in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 December) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions...

3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw

an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned [ie Lt Col Charles Halt himself] witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

You might have thought that this sensational report would have set the rafters alight. Not a bit of it. The Ministry of Defence admitted unusual lights had been sighted, but said there was no explanation.

Naturally the scoffers had a field day. Most reckoned those strange lights came from Orford Ness lighthouse, five miles away, and that the indentations in the ground were made by rabbits.

Nobody has yet explained

to my satisfaction how light-houses manage to fly in a blaze of lights nor how rabbits give off radiation.

The three authors have also produced some fascinating supplementary evidence and Ralph Noyes, former head of the MoD department responsible for RAF intelligence, said in a statement: "We now have evidence — I blush to say about my own Ministry — that they have lied about this case. They have covered it up."

Conspiracy

And so the conspiracy of silence continues, though these determined ladies have no intention of giving up their pursuit of the truth.

Their book raises some awkward questions about the USAF bases in East Anglia in view of Mrs Thatcher's decision to allow them to be used by F-111 bombers for the attack on Libya.

Quite clearly we have little control over the bases and, when something untoward occurs, lose no time in helping the US cover it up.

I do not believe that the UFO which disturbed the Suffolk woodland on that wintry night carried some spooky visitors from a distant planet.

No, the explanation is much simpler. A UFO it was — an American military spacecraft which had been on an illegal mission in outer space years ahead of President Reagan's beloved Star Wars programme.

RIGHT, fall-in, three ranks, you shower! I am riding my hobby horse. Bring back some form of National Service for the army of unemployed youngsters aimlessly wandering our streets.

Oh, I know all about freedom of the individual and suchlike, but can any of us who did our stint in uniform honestly say we did not thoroughly enjoy it?

I will not inflict you with such rubbish as: "It will make men of them" or "A bit of discipline will sort that lot out".

My experience in the Army was that it did neither. More important, it showed us how people from all parts of the country, of all classes, colours and religions, could live in harmony. It also gave us a chance to see the world beyond these shores, and taught us how to look after ourselves.

I hope the spirit of those times will be captured in an exhibition on National Service, opening at the Imperial War Museum in London next September. Altogether some 250,000 of us were conscripted between 1948-63.

What a laugh it all was. My post-bag suggests that others came away with the same impression.

Patrick Moore, from Bromsgrove, sends me a British Armed Forces 3d voucher (BAFs, we called them) with the comment: "I think I picked it up in Berlin or Nairobi... or was it Mauritius or Madagascar?"

Ah, sweet memories, he says. I'll second that.

Eric Firth, from Wilsden, Yorks, would not agree. He was a regular soldier who served 14 years, and reckons National Service was a waste of time, money, manpower and lives.

He writes: "Young men around 18 were plucked from their jobs, homes and loved ones, put into ugly, ill-fitting uniforms that made them resemble walking coal sacks, and dispatched to a variety of international destinations."

Well, you could say that. However, the youngsters I am talking about have no jobs to be plucked from. And that is the most dreadful waste of all.

Saudis seek to offset British Tornado deal

Mr George Younger, the US offset programme was stipulated before contracts were signed with private companies. No such prior agreement was reached before the Tornado deal was signed.

The investment programme would be similar to that imposed on a consortium of companies led by Boeing. The consortium had to invest 35 per cent of a \$1.2 billion contract to provide ground control for the airborne warning and control system (Awacs) jets sold to the Saudis by the Americans.

Mr Younger is expected to meet King Fahd and other important Saudi officials during his three-day visit, which may lead to another arms deal if a \$357 million (about £238 million) air-to-air and air-to-ship missile package fails to clear the US Congress. The Saudis may again look to Britain to fill the gap as they did when they bought the American-built F15 fighters they originally wanted.

£5 BN. ARMS DEAL

Mr George Younger, Defence Secretary, was in Saudi Arabia yesterday to iron out details of the £5 billion arms deal signed last year. The deal — Britain's biggest export order — is for 132 aircraft including 72 Tornados, support equipment and spares.

UK clinches Saudi deals

Riyadh: Saudi Arabia is considering buying weapons for its navy from Britain, after concluding a big aircraft deal with London, the defence minister, Prince Sultan Ibn Abdul Aziz, said yesterday.

"We are discussing the possibility of purchasing arms for the navy from friendly countries including Britain," the official Saudi Press Agency quoted him as saying after talks with the British defence secretary George Younger. Prince Sultan Abdul Aziz gave no details of the navy's requirements, but said that Riyadh had concluded final agreement on a £5 billion purchase of British military aircraft.

The deal, Britain's biggest export sale, includes 72 Tornado fighters, 30 Hawk trainers, and 30 PC Orion surveillance aircraft plus missiles, training, technical support and spares.

Prince Sultan said that some of the Tornado fighters had arrived in the kingdom and were due to take part in an air show today.

Saudi Arabia invited Mr Younger here to discuss final details of the deal, including a requirement under the Saudi "offset programme" that 35 per cent of the value of the contract be re-invested in Saudi Arabia.—Reuter.

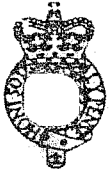

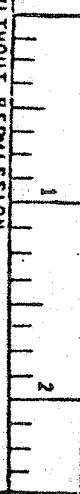

With reference to your letter of 5 March 1986 in reply to my previous correspondence to your office of 25 September 1985 and 30 January 1986, I thank you for reply.

This is just to inform you of my recent change of address to the one above so when your enquiries concerning the 25 October 1977 sighting (with photographs) and the Leicestershire sightings of a triangular object as witnessed on various dates in late 1985, are concluded then any correspondence from you will not be lost.

Your enquiries regarding the Leicestershire sightings may be assisted by the fact that a similar formation of red and white lights that preceeded the sighting of the triangular object at Melton Mowbray on 7 August 1985 (any connection between the two events is unknown) was observed a month or so before in the Leeds area. On June 23 a spate of red and white lights were observed. Although some of the lights observed at a high altitude were those of Jet Provosts from RAF Church Fenton some of the lights at least cannot be explained by conventional explanations, as some of them were observed to be very low down and flying round blocks of flats, even casting red glows over rooftops. All the time it was perfectly silent.;

I would be most glad to share any information relating to the UFO phenomenon and would be happy to act as a contact, at least for the Midlands. I would be prepared to investigate any reports in confidence and submit the details to your department. Hope the above information is of use to you.

Once the reports of the cases mentioned are completed I shall endeavour to submit a copy on to your department.

P.S. You may be interested to know of a triangular-shaped object that was actually filmed for several tens of minutes by the Italian National Broadcasting Company. The incident took place on 15 September 1985 at Aosta. The triangular UFO was apparently visible for several hours before it moved off at a fast rate of speed leaving a three-tailed vapour trail. The object was present for so long that the TV station were able to hire an aircraft under their control and to set off after it, but they did not get a close-up view of it. Milan airport reported nothing on radar nor had any air traffic. Still photographs of the object were also taken by members of the public. A clip of the event was also shown on BBC TV news (but only at breakfast time I hasten to add). I would be interested in hearing your opinion of this event and whether or not steps have been taken to obtain a copy of this film in an attempt to ascertain its true nature. If so I would also be interested in obtaining a copy for my own files and research. I would be most surprised if it has not gone through official channels since any unknown object transgressing the airspace of a fellow NATO member must surely be of concern at least to the military authorities whose duty it is to ensure the defence of Western Europe from transgressors of whatever origin.

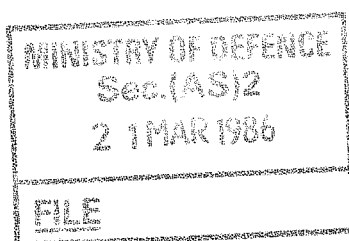

Thank you for your letter of 5 September 1985; I am returning the stamped addressed envelope which you provided. . You may find it useful if I explain that the sole interest of the United Kingdom Ministry of Defence in reported sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) is to establish whether they have any bearing on the defence of the country.

There is no organisation in the Ministry of Defence appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of such objects, and no staff are employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive are referred to the staff in the Department who are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we have not carried out a study into the scientific significance of these phenomena. Unless there are defence implications we do not attempt to identify sightings and we cannot inform observers of the probable identity of the object seen. The Department could not justify the expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond the pure defence interests.

On the specific question of the circles found in fields in southern England, I can confirm that the Army Air Corps at Middle Wallop have submitted a report on one such occurrence at Clatford. A copy of this report is attached for your information. As you will see, no mention is made of a "white jelly" and I can assure you that to the best of our knowledge no such substance was found at the scene.

You will of course appreciate that this is not strictly a report of a UFO sighting, although this phenomenon, which I understand has been reported on a number of times in various locations since the last war, is indeed mystifying. However we have yet to find anything to suggest that it has any significance in defence terms.

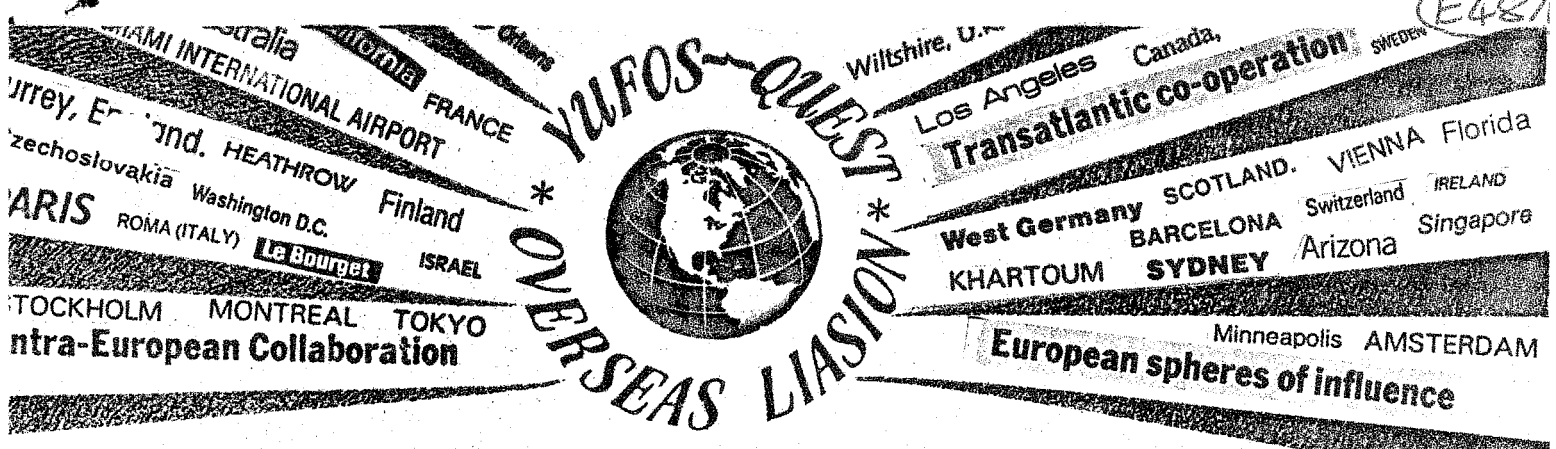

I am sorry that I can do no more to assuage your curiosity.

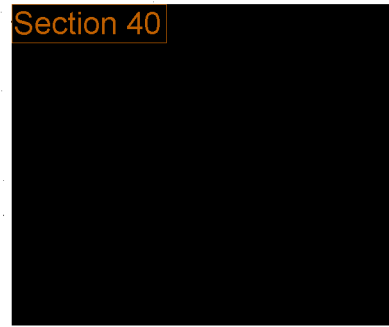

ALIEN INVASION OR HOAX?

For several years, southern Britain has experienced what some people claim is the work of pranksters and others say is evidence that UFO's have landed. Charles Walker investigates the mysterious circles which have again appeared

My attention was first drawn to these strange circles when a set of five, one large surrounded by four smaller ones, appeared in a wheatfield at Patching, Sussex. They appeared some time between 10pm on 28 June and dawn on 29 June 1985. The central and largest of the circles measured some 50ft in diameter and the four smaller ones 15ft in diameter. The wheat had been neatly flattened by a swirling motion in a clockwise direction.

The circles were a reasonable distance from the road and, at the time they were discovered, there was no trace of any of the surrounding crop having been flattened as it would have been if anyone had walked into the field to select the site. For this reason it was suggested that the marks would have to be made by something landing on the spot. My initial enquiries revealed that most people were of the opinion that a UFO was responsible. Obviously there were those who preferred to dismiss it as a hoax, although they have not provided a suitable explanation as to how this could be done without damaging the surrounding crop.

UFO sighting

At the time that news broke of the circles, no one except myself and the witnesses were aware of the fact that at 9.35pm on 25 June a UFO had been seen by five witnesses. The sighting was

reported to me on 26 June by Wayne Lewis who, along with his brother Ricky and three friends, had seen what they described as a yellowy white light moving in the direction of Clapham, which is but a short distance from Patching.

For approximately ten minutes the object hovered over Clapham Wood where the light became more intense and began pulsating. After this it took off at a reasonably high speed and was lost from sight within a matter of seconds.

Mysterious circles

Although there were no UFO sightings on the actual evening that the circles appeared - at least as far as I am aware - it is interesting to note that there does always seem to be a UFO sighting reported within a few days, and at the most a week, before the circles appear.

The very same weekend five circles, similar in dimension to those at Patching, appeared in a wheatfield alongside the B 3093 at Bratton, Wiltshire. This is not the first time that such circles have appeared in this area. In July 1983 their appearance made the national news mainly because of Bratton's close proximity to Warminster, which became famous in the mid 1960s for the number of UFO sightings and reported landings.

Throughout July 1985 the circles appeared in Hampshire and Wiltshire. In Hampshire one Alresford farmer lost

crops for the sixth year running as a result of the mysterious circles. Once again the dimensions were the same as in the other areas and just days before they appeared local police were involved in checking out a UFO report.

A brilliantly lit circular object was seen hovering over Stockbridge Down, Hampshire by Jack and Pat Collins whilst driving home one night. Mrs Collins said 'It looked like a big funfair wheel hovering in the sky'. The object was not visible for very long as the road along which the couple were travelling was tree lined and the object was therefore blotted out by the trees. They made no attempt to stop for a better look but on reaching home telephoned the police, who searched the area but found nothing.

Although the object was not visible for very long, perhaps five minutes at the most, Mr Collins was able to make a sketch, which perhaps provides the first clue as to what might be responsible for the circles. According to Mr Collins, the outer perimeter appeared to be a continuous ring of light, whilst the spokes

and the four quarters consisted of numerous individual lights, the lights of the spokes being considerably brighter than the others.

Neat pattern

If an object such as that described above were to land and the underside of the craft, with its spoke like construction, were to rotate as it did so or once it had landed, then it would almost certainly produce the neat pattern of flattened crop which is a feature of these circles. Of course attached to this large circular object there would have to be four smaller ones which must also rotate in the same way. Again from the neat way in which the crop is flattened within the smaller circles they would have to have the same construction.

Mr and Mrs Collins did not see anything attached to the large circular object they observed hovering over the countryside. However, if we accept the fact that a UFO was responsible for the circles - and by UFO, I mean an aerial object which has so far defied identification and not neces-

sarily an alien controlled space vehicle – then it could be that these marks were caused by some sort of landing gear which would not be lowered until the vehicle was actually going to land.

Certainly from an examination of some of the sites: Patching, Sussex, 28/29 June; Bratton, 28/29 June; Hampshire, 6/7 July; Andover in Wiltshire, July 1985; there seems no doubt that the circles were produced by an object coming out of the sky. At this stage there is, apart from the UFO sightings, no evidence from which we can identify a known vehicle as being responsible.

Flattened easily

On one occasion it was suggested that the crop could have been flattened easily by two people using a piece of string. One person would stand in what would eventually be the centre of the circle, whilst the other person would walk around in ever decreasing circles flatten-

ing the crop as he did so. However, whilst the crop would most certainly be flattened, it would not be done as neatly. There would also be some evidence of their walk from the edge of the field to the markings. Even walking along the plough tracks would not, as it has been suggested, mean that the circles could be made without some damage to surrounding crops.

No doubt speculation regarding this phenomena will continue, but perhaps, should it occur again, more information will come to light and enable us to get nearer to providing an explanation for this mystery.

I am writing in relation to an article/s which we have just recently researched in the October, 1954 edition of the London Dispatch (Sunday).

THE ARTICLE:

"Radar installations in Great Britain had repeatedly picked up whole formations of unidentified flying objects during september 1954, some of them passing overhead at low altitude. Military Personnel scrambled outside their offices to take a look and were much puzzled to find the skies clear and empty. Every time, they have followed the same pattern, always around Mid-day. All our radar sets in the area have picked them up. Some of the public individuals involved with Flying Saucer research/reports at that time, were told that Flying Saucers are normally invisible to us".

We are very interested in these official statements; could you please confirm these comments, especially as the radar installations now in operation, such as Fylingdales (which can track an object the size of a tea tray above Moscow) are far more technologically advanced, than of those in the 1950's? As a research organisation, we have numerous reports of UFOs, surely in range of civil and military radar never being seen as a physical structure throughout the entire observation (one second visible, the next completely invisible). There does appear to be some evidence to substantiate many of the claims made by the War Office in 1954.

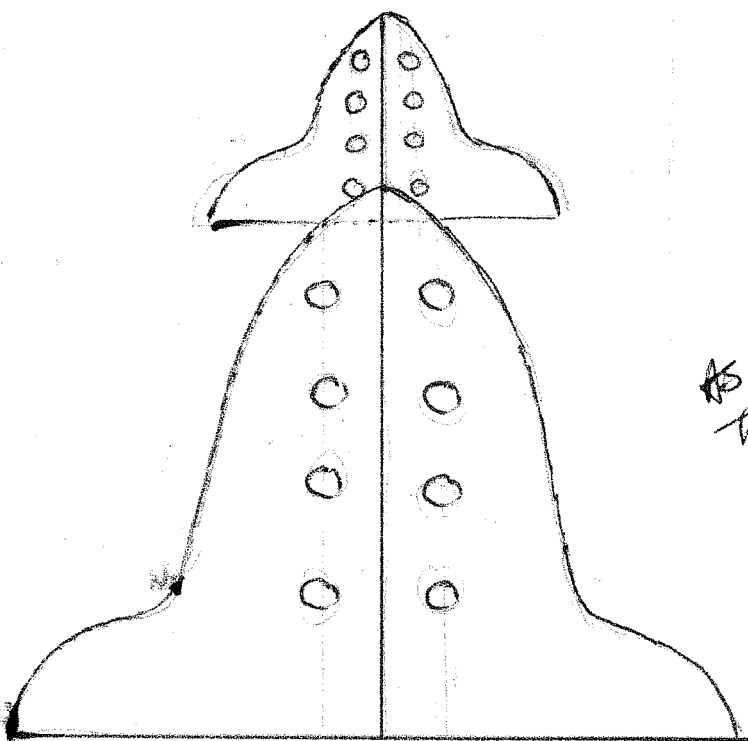

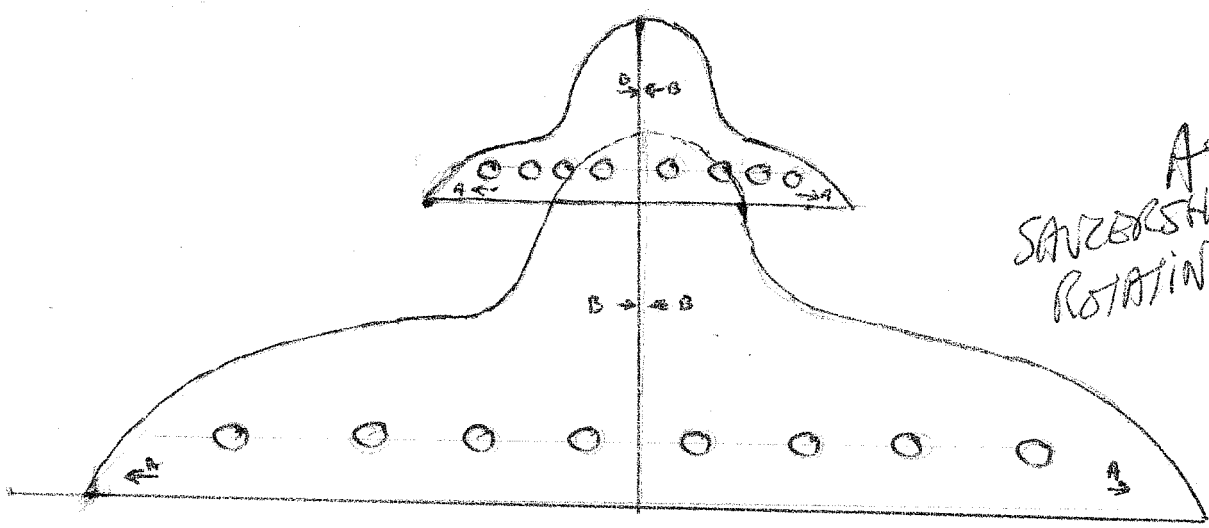

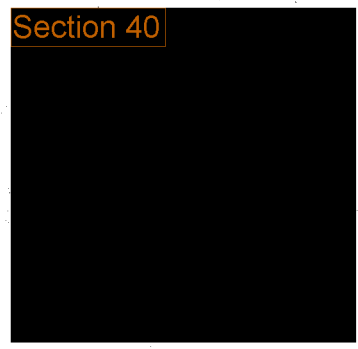

Many thanks indeed for your letter and the enclosed UFO documents relating to the reports I requested. However, nearly six months of waiting is not really ideal from a research stance, but I appreciate you must be very busy answering letters all the time in respect of UFOs?

Whilst understanding the official policy of your own particular Dept, I continue to be baffled at the content of your UFO Sighting Report Forms, when your counterparts in America seem determined to pursue every detail in relation to purported UFO encounters. Just recently we have managed to secure incredible papers from the USAF (enclosed) which concern the death of a non-human being, after a OSI and USAF Police chase viz UFO. Certainly documentation such as this requires an answer by the authorities in America and I am quite sure the UFO organisation C.A.U.S. (Citizens Against UFO Secrecy) who are our U.S. colleagues shall get one. Yet time after time we ask our own MoD reporting office for their opinion regarding the official report form. Why for instance, does your form not cover this aspect of UFO research? And can you inform if you take such reports seriously?

The search and request policy of your office is very limited. It is terribly difficult to determine if a report by any persons or official establishment has been submitted. Has your department ever thought that to release UFO documentation every year would save time? Of course a charge would obviously be made, yet the present stance and attitude does not help the MoD in relation to our claim you are with-holding vital data..

However, I would appreciate your help in relation to the months of August and September this year (1985). From the public and other

sources your office received numerous reports of unidentified flying objects, I request this documentation for research purposes and possible publication.

If a charge is made for search and photostat purposes, then I would be prepared to pay.

August in particular interests me, for several village people at Carleton near Skipton, North Yorkshire, claim an unknown craft landed some two miles Southeast of the village and military personnel at Menwith Hill who had tracked the target found a large burnt area in the locality. Rumour, perhaps, yet any further information you could supply would be interesting. If your department would like a full report of our findings I would be only too pleased to supply.

I must thank you also for your co-operation concerning the forwarding of the Public Records Office in Surrey. Pre 62 reports contain a great deal more than the 'modern type'.

One final question; does your report form surpass the 'LETTER P'?

Once again thanks very much for your help in these matters, and I do hope I receive the papers before July 1986!

1. In January of 1978, I was station at McGuire AFB, N.J.. One evening , during the time frame of 0300hrs. and 0500hrs., there were a number of UFO sightings in the area over the air field and Ft. DIX Army camp. I am a security policeman and was on routine patrol at the time. N.J. State Police, and Ft. Dix MP's were running code in the direction of Brownsville, N.J.. A state trooper then entered Gate #5 at the rear of the base requesting assistance and permission to enter. I was dispatched and the trooper wanted access to the runway area which led to the very back of the air field and connected with a heavily wooded area which is part of the Dix training area. He informed me that a Ft. Dix MP was pursuing a low flying object which then hovered over his car. He described it as oval shaped, with no details, and glowing with a blueish green color. His radio transmission was cut off. At that time in front of his police car, appeared a thing, about 4ft. tall, greyish, brown, fat head, long arms, and slender body. The MP panicked and fired five rounds from his .45 Cal into the thing, and one round into the object above. The object then fled straight up and joined with eleven others high in the sky. This we all saw but didn't know the details at the time. Anyway, The thing ran into the woods towards our fenceline and they wanted to look for it. By this time several patrols were involved.

2. We found the body of the thing near the runway. It had apparently climbed the fence and died while running. It was all of a sudden hush-hush and no one was allowed near the area. We roped off the area and AF OSI came out and took over. That was the last I saw of it. There was a bad stench coming from it too. Like ammonia smelling but it wasn't constant in the air. That day, a team from Wright-Patterson AFB came in a C111 and went to the area. They crated it in a wooden box, sprayed something over it, and then put it into a bigger metal container. They loaded it in the plane and took off. That was it, nothing more said, no report made and we were all told not to have anything to say about it or we would be court martialed.

3. I will be getting out of the air force in about two months. Do Not disclose my name as I could get into trouble. I am interested in pursuing this and other matters if you need help. Forgive me for not signing this but I can't take any chances. Please reply to the above address and my parents will forward it to me or I will be home already. Don't send it here because they monitor all mail closely and I again don't want to take any chances.

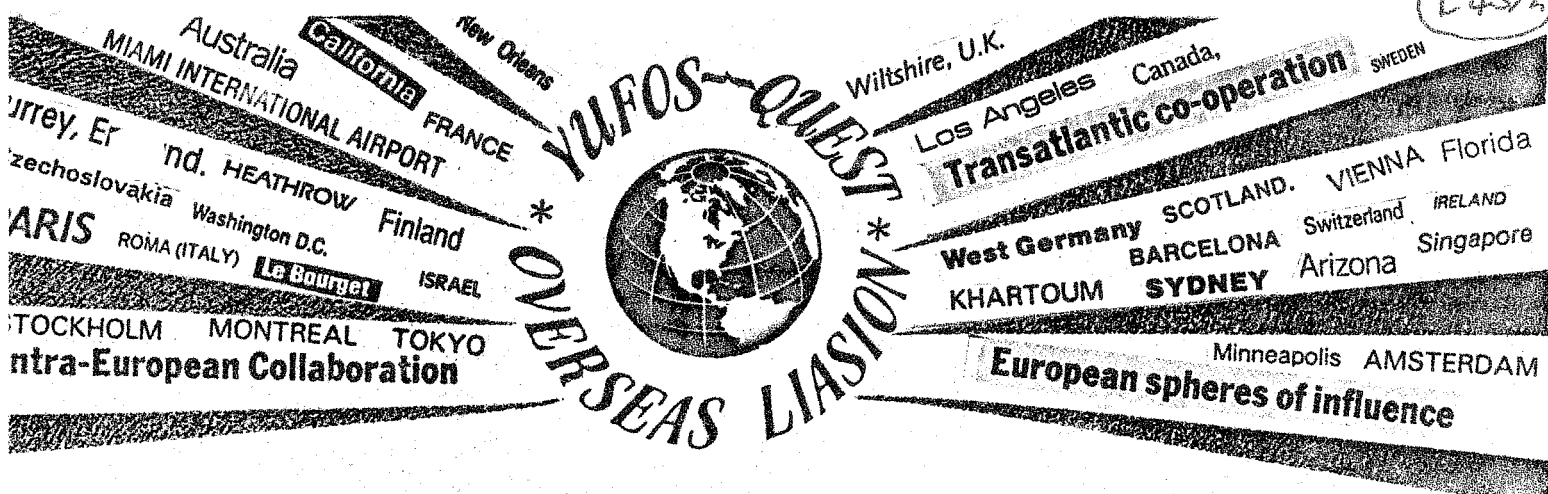
I am afraid there is little help I can give you in your research of this alleged incident. Indeed, we have received no reports of unusual activity in the St Mawgan area in February of this year and the only information we have is that which you yourself have provided. RAF St Mawgan have been consulted and they too have no knowledge of the phenomenon and were certainly not conducting any operation or research which might account for it.

I am grateful for the concern you express in your letters and I agree that it is important that such incidents are reported to us in view of the possible defence implications. However, as you will no doubt be aware, there is no organisation in the Ministry of Defence appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of such objects, and no staff are employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive are referred to the staff in the Department who are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties. The information you have provided has been considered in this way and we are satisfied that there was no threat to UK security and thus that there is no defence interest in this incident.

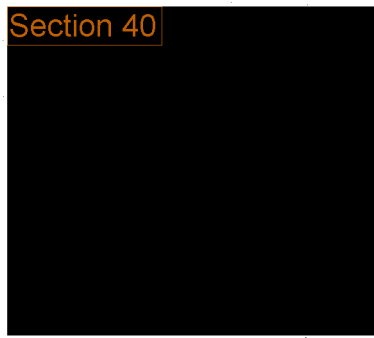

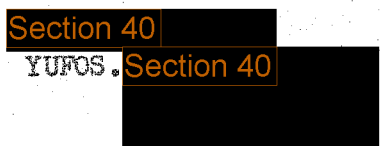

I thought you would be interested in the following sighting report which I have recently investigated. Although I doubt if there is any defence significance I feel sure that you would like to have it on file - especially if you received any other reports on the date and at the location specified.

The sighting took place on Friday, 20th September 1985, between 1700-1730 hrs., at the Outer Circle of Regents Park, near the junction with Park Square. The weather at the time was clear and sunny. The witness, Section 40 was walking towards her parked car in the Outer Circle when her attention was drawn to a very bright object hovering in the sky at low altitude, at an estimated elevation of 45° looking East.

The object appeared to be rotating about its axis at the rate of approximately 3 revolutions per second. As you will note from the appended sketch made by the witness, the object seemed to have 'faces' or 'facets' which flickered as they caught the sun. The object also bounced around as it rotated, although remaining in a closely prescribed area (not more than a few square feet). It appeared to be made of a smooth, highly-polished metal. As you know, distances and dimensions are difficult to gauge when dealing with unidentified objects, but the witness feels reasonably certain that its altitude was about twice as high as the trees in Nash Terraces and approximately 2 - 3 feet in diameter.

The witness is highly intelligent and observant, and has a BSc in Zoology. As an experienced ornithologist she is naturally familiar with most objects in the sky that might have accounted for the sighting, and rejects the possibility that the object could have been any type of balloon. Furthermore, there was no sign of any tethering. A number of other people had stopped to gaze at the object. Section 40 watched it for about 5 minutes but was unable to stay any longer as she was in a hurry. The object was still in view when she drove off.

Should you require further details the witness may be telephoned on 677 1946, mornings only. It would certainly be interesting to learn if there were any other reports.

I am also enclosing a copy of a report which I think does have defence interest, and which you are welcome to retain on file. The witness, Section 40 seems thoroughly honest to me, and he would be glad to talk to your people if necessary. I have not published this account yet, and would be delighted to quote the MoD's comments. I would also like to know if you received any reports from MoD installations at the time, date and location mentioned? Or at least a report of the MoD policemen's chat with Section 40

I look forward to hearing from you (also in connection with my last two letters).

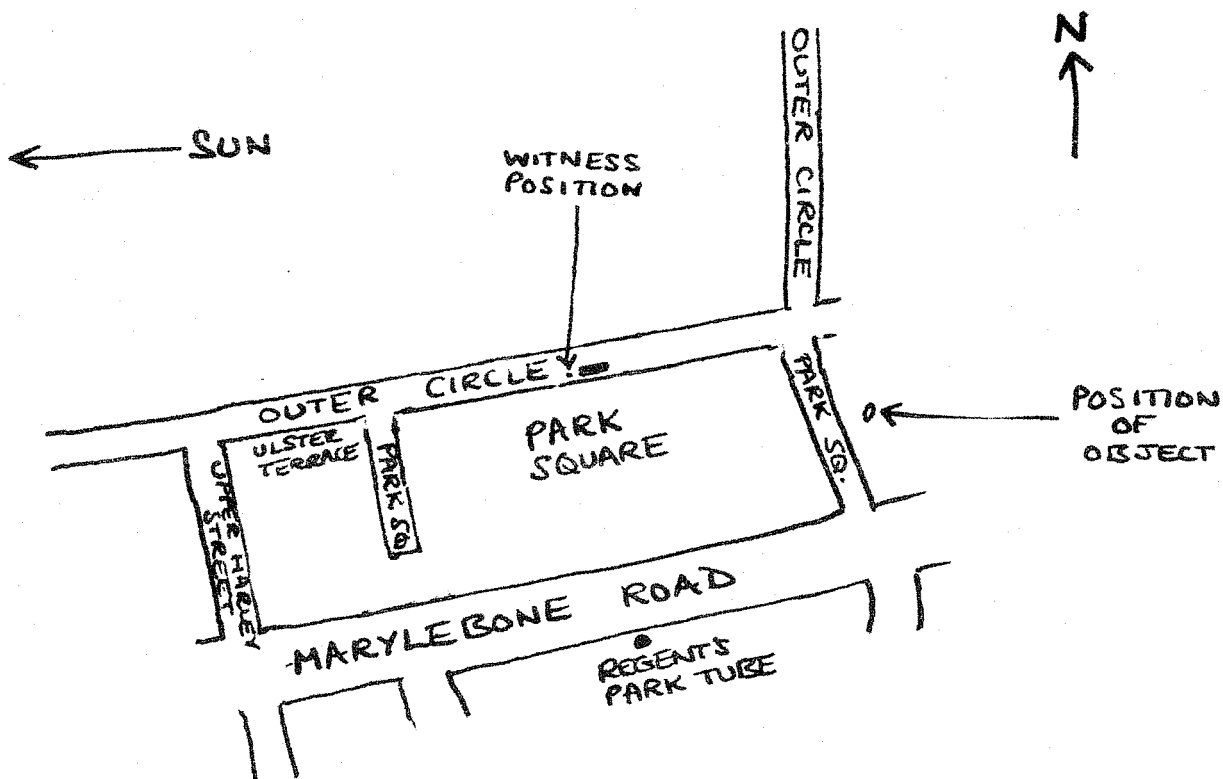

THE CLOSE ENCOUNTER CASE OF Section 40 1983

The remarkable story of Section 40 alleged close encounter beside the Basingstoke Canal in Aldershot, Hampshire, during the small hours of 12 August 1983, is a fisherman's tale with a difference: the one that got away was a flying saucer - complete with little 'green' men. The case is not directly relevant to the central thrust of my theme (although Ministry of Defence personnel were peripherally involved), but I am including it here because if the witness is not lying - and I for one am convinced he is not - we are presented with an important and highly detailed account which may teach us a great deal about the UFO phenomenon, irrespective of what interpretation we choose to place on it.

Because of its many military establishments, Aldershot is known as 'The Home of the British Army', and Section 40 himself has an Army background, having served in the Queen's Royal Regiment in 1924 and the Hampshire Regiment during World War II. Well-known as a local historian, he has in his time worked as a farmer and gardener, and while living in the Canadian outback hunted bear and fought wolves. He has told me that he is now afraid of nothing, and regarding his encounter, which would have terrified most people, says: "What did I have to fear? I'm 78 now and havn't got much to lose." Prior to his experience he had read no books or magazines on the subject of UFOs, which held no interest for him, yet much of what he claims has been corroborated by other witnesses.

Section 40 is a keen and experienced fisherman, and since the weather report for 11/12 August predicted a warm, fine night, he set off from his home in

Section 40 Aldershot, at 12.15 am, accompanied by his dog Tiny.

On reaching Government Road he encountered a Ministry of Defence policeman on his beat, and after a brief chat with him headed towards his selected fishing site, about 115 yards north of the Gasworks Bridge on Government Road. He undid his fishing rod holdall and took out the bottom joint of his fishing umbrella, pushed it into the soil and tied the dog to it. While unpacking his tackle box he heard the gong at the Buller Barracks strike one o'clock. He set up the rod rests, cast out his tackle and then sat down watching the water for fish movement.

The Encounter

"After about fifteen minutes," **Section 40** told me, "I decided to have a cup of tea, which I poured from my thermos. I stood up to ease my legs and was putting the cup to my mouth when I saw a vivid light coming towards me from the south, which is over North Town. It wavered over the railway line and then came on again, then settled down. The vivid light went out, though I could still see a light through the boughs of the trees. I thought, well that can't be an aeroplane; it's too low, because it was at about 300 feet."

"During this time I had set the cup down on the tackle box and lit a cigarette, and while smoking it my dog began to growl. It was then that I saw two 'forms' coming towards me, and when they were within 5 feet of me they just stopped and looked at me, and I at them, for a good 10 or 15 seconds." Tiny, an obedient dog, had stopped growling by this time, on her master's command.

"They were about 4 feet high, dressed in pale green coveralls from head to foot, and they had helmets of the same colour with a visor that was blacked out," **Section 40** told me. "Then the one on the right beckoned me with his right forearm and turned away, still waving its arm. I took it that he wished me to follow, which I did. He moved off and I fell in behind him, and the chap that was on the left fell in behind me. We walked along the towpath until we got to the railings by the canal bridge. The 'form' in front of me went through the railings, while I went over the top, and we crossed Government Road then went down on the footpath."

The Craft

"Going around a slight left-hand bend I saw a large object, about 40-45 feet across, standing on the towpath, with about 10-15 feet of it out over the water and about 10-15 feet of it over the bank on the left of the path," continued **Section 40** (see Illustration No.) "And I thought, Christ, what the hell's that? - Didn't think about UFOs at the time. When we got down there this 'form' in front of me went up the steps and I followed. The steps were off-line to the towpath and we had to step on to the grass to go up them." Portholes were set in the hull, and the object rested on two ski-type runners.

"Going in the door, the corners weren't sharp, they were rounded off. We went into this octagonal room. The 'form' in front of me crossed over the room, and I heard a sound as if a sliding door was being opened and closed. I stood in the room to the right of the door, and the form that had walked behind me stood just inside, between me and the door. I don't know whether it was to stop going out or not..."

"I stood there a good 10 minutes, taking in everything I could see. The walls, the floor and the ceiling were all black, and looked to me like unfinished metal, whereas the outside looked like burnished aluminium. I did not see any sign of nuts or bolts, nor did I see any seams where the object had been put together. What did interest me most of all was a shaft that rose up from the floor to the ceiling. (12) The shaft was about 4 feet in circumference, and on the right-hand side of it was a Z-shaped handle. On either side of that stood two 'forms' similar to those that walked along the towpath with me."

"All of a sudden a voice said to me, 'Come and stand under the amber light'. I could not see any amber light until I took a step to my right, and there it was way up on the wall just under the ceiling. I stood there for about 5 minutes, then a voice said, 'What is your age?' I said, 'I shall be 78 next birthday'. And after a while I was asked to turn around, which I did, facing the wall. After about 5 minutes he said to me, 'You can go. You are too old and too infirm for our purpose.'

"I left the object, and while walking down the steps I used the handrail and found that it had two joints in it, so I came to the conclusion it was telescopic. I walked along the towpath to about halfway between the object and the canal bridge, stopped, and looked back and noticed that the dome of the object looked very much like an oversized chimney cowl, and that it was revolving anti-clockwise."

"I then walked on to the spot where I had left my dog and fishing tackle, and the first thing I did when I got there was to pick up my cold cup of tea and drink it. And then I heard this whining noise, just as if an electric generator was starting up, and this thing lifted off and the bright light came on again. It was so bright that I could see my fishing float in the water 6 feet away from the opposite bank of the canal, and the thin iron bars on the canal bridge [115 yards away]" The object took off at a very high speed, out over the military cemetery in the west, and then a little later I saw the light going over the Hog's Back and out of sight. This was around 2.00 am."

Section 40 settled down to wait for dawn, which came at 3.30 am, and then, he told me, "I got into what I had come out for - the fishing!" Incredible though it may seem, he did not feel inclined to report his experience to anyone at the time. He sat there fishing until 10 o'clock in the morning, at which time two MoD mounted policemen came up to him. "Any luck, mate?" one of them asked. "Yes", replied **Section 40**, "I've had 3 roach, 5 rudd, a tench of 2½ pounds, and lost a big carp which took me into the weeds." He then started to tell them about the UFO he had seen, and one of them said, "Yes, I dare say you did see that UFO. I expect they were checking on our military installations."

Was this a tongue-in-cheek comment to placate the old boy? At that moment, anyway, a man from the canal lock yard came along and told the MoD policemen that horses were not allowed on the towpath, and so the conversation was cut short.

Section 40 continued fishing until 12.30 pm, and returned home at 1.00 pm. He told his wife and a friend of hers that he had seen a UFO, but refrained from telling them that he had been taken on board. "I knew the wife would say 'No more fishing

for you, old man!" he said.

No Witnesses

Section 40 did not return to the landing site until two days later, when he noticed that the foliage between the canal and the towpath was in disarray. Unfortunately, no photos or soil samples were taken. **Section 40** feels someone in the guard hut of the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers workshops must have heard or seen something, but checks by investigator **Section 40** drew a blank. He was also unable to trace the two mounted policemen. And the occupants of a bungalow near the canal lock beside Gasworks Bridge were away at the time.

Throughout his experience **Section 40** was hoping that a train would cross the railway bridge (Aldershot to Waterloo main line) which is about 100 yards to the south of the landing site, but there were none; at least, not while he was outside the craft. But even if a train had gone by it is doubtful if anyone would have noticed the object except at those times when it was at its most brilliant, i.e. during landing and take-off. No cars were seen on either Government Road or Camp Farm Road, which runs beside the Basingstoke Canal at the spot where was fishing, nor have any witnesses come forward.

Publicity

The story of **Section 40** encounter made headline news in the local paper two months later, as a result of his having written to the Aldershot News initially enquiring if anyone had reported an unusual 'light' at the time of the incident. (13) The paper then notified **Section 40** Chairman and Investigations Co-ordinator of the Surrey Investigation Group on Aerial Phenomena (SIGAP), who subsequently interviewed **Section 40** in October. My first interview with the witness took place the following month, in the presence of local reporter **Section 40**. The Aldershot News published our positive findings, and this attracted the attention of America's largest-selling tabloid, the National Enquirer, who ran a story on the case the following year. (14)

Details Of The Craft

Section 40 told me that the shape of the central room was octagonal (see Illustration No.) and the ceiling very low. The floor appeared to be covered with a soft material of some kind because he was unable to hear his footsteps. The internal lighting did not appear to emanate from any particular source, with the exception of the beam of amber light underneath which he was asked to stand. The lighting in general was rather dim. There were no dials, seats, controls, or other objects seen, apart from the central column with its Z-shaped handle.

Section 40 said that the temperature inside the craft was a little warmer than outside, which would make it about 65° Fahrenheit. He noticed a faint smell similar to that of "decaying meat". If there is any truth to some of the more outlandish hypotheses about the motives of UFO operators, it is perhaps just as well that **Section 40** was found to be "too old and infirm" for their purpose!

The Beings

The occupants moved like human beings, although they walked with a rather stiff gait, **Section 40** explained to me. No facial features could be detected since these were presumably covered by visors. The pale green one-piece suits also covered the hands and feet, and appeared to be molded on to their thin bodies "like plastic". **Section 40** did not notice if the gloves covered fingers. There were no belts, zippers, buttons or fasteners. All four beings were of the same size and unusually thin shape. Had any females been present, **Section 40** feels sure he would not have failed to have noticed!

The beings spoke in a kind of "sing-song" accent, similar, to "a mixture of Chinese and Russian". **Section 40** in fact, is convinced that they originate here on Earth. "I myself do not think they come from outer space," he said, "for we are told by scientists that this planet is the only one with water. If that is the case, how can they survive?"

I asked **Section 40** why on earth he refrained from asking any questions: surely that would be the first consideration in such a situation? He explained that he

simply did not feel it was the right thing to do, as he was anxious to avoid causing offence. As to his 'rejection', which he found mildly disappointing, he attributes this to his bronchial and arterial problems, and thinks that the amber scanning device (if that is what it was) detected the plastic replacement following an operation for arteriosclerosis.

Section 40 suffered none of the harmful side-effects sometimes reported by close encounter witnesses, such as temporary paralysis, nausea, diarrhea, skin and eye irritation, headaches, and so on; nor is he aware of any amnesia or time lapse. But he told me that he did feel "different" after the experience. He ate little for a while, resulting in some loss of weight, and felt less inclined to go out. He found difficulty getting to sleep, due to continually turning the events over in his mind. But he has few regrets about his extraordinary experience, which in my opinion ranks as one of the most convincing close encounter cases I have investigated.

"Until I had this encounter with the UFO," he told me, "I always took the talk about them with a pinch of salt, but now I know they are a fact. During the time I was with them I felt no fear, only curiosity, nor were they hostile towards me nor I to them. My only regret about the whole affair is that I did not have another person along with me to see and experience something that I did not believe in until it happened to me, and I think myself lucky that I am here today to speak about it, for I am sure that these men were out to abduct some person, and that person could have been me. But at the same time I will say that it was the greatest experience of my life."

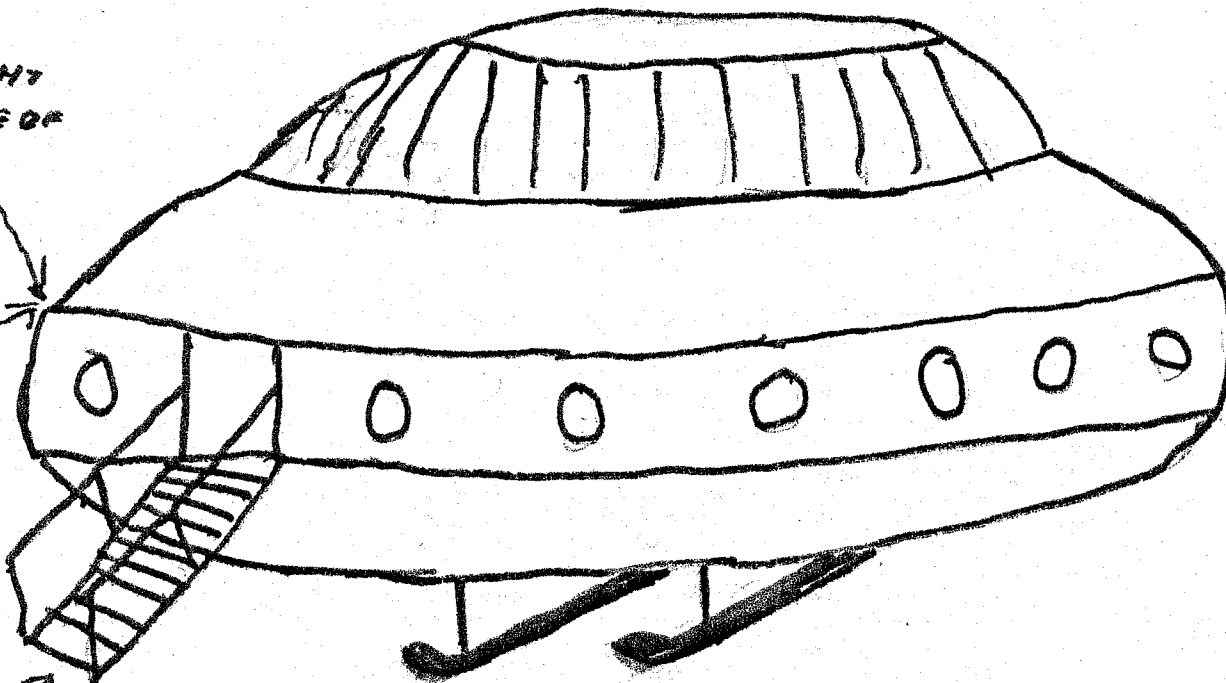

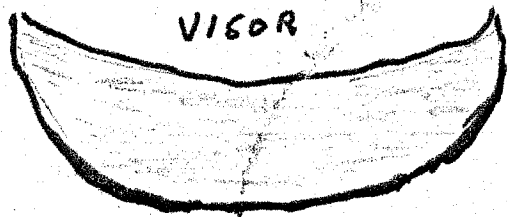

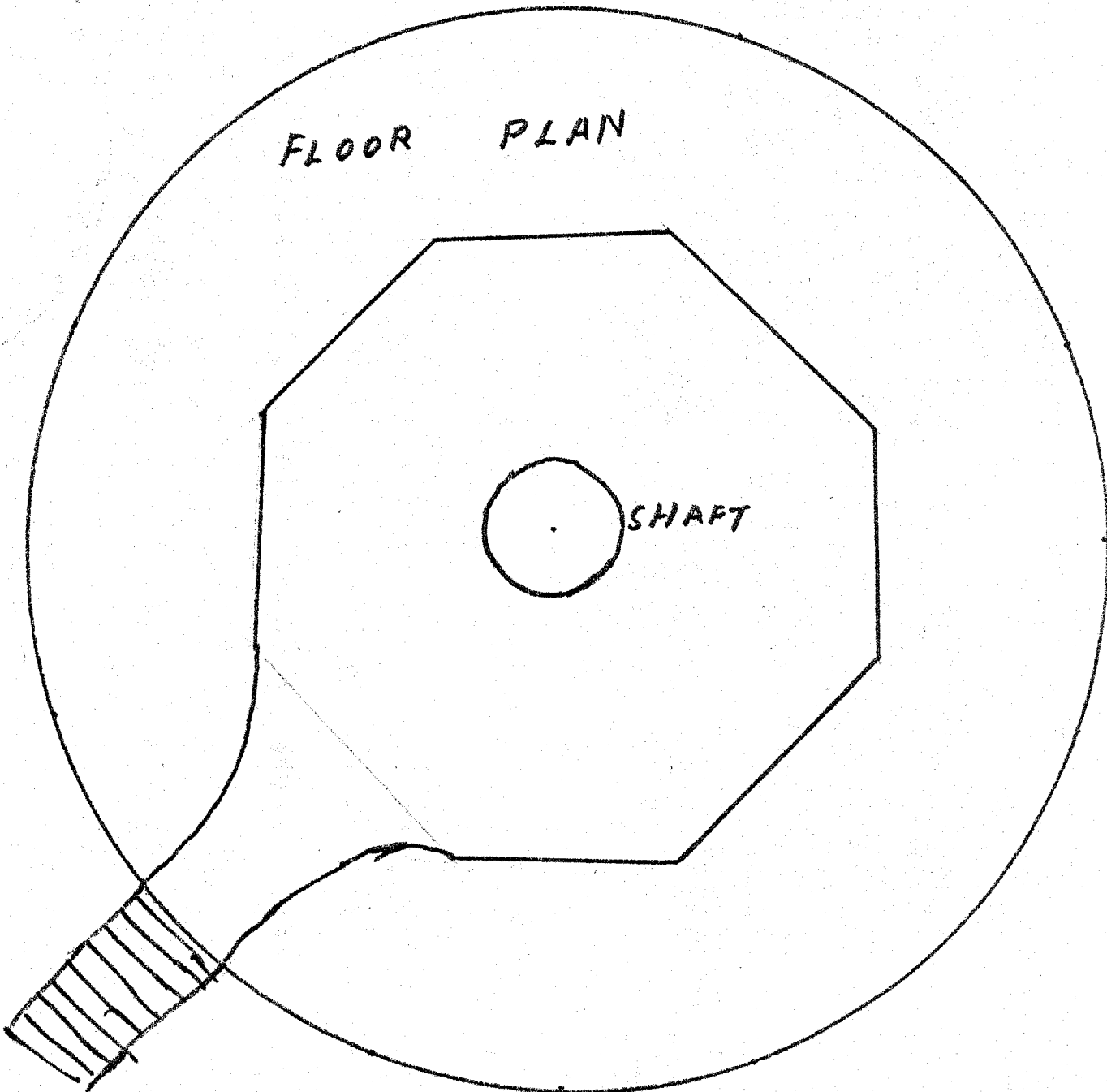

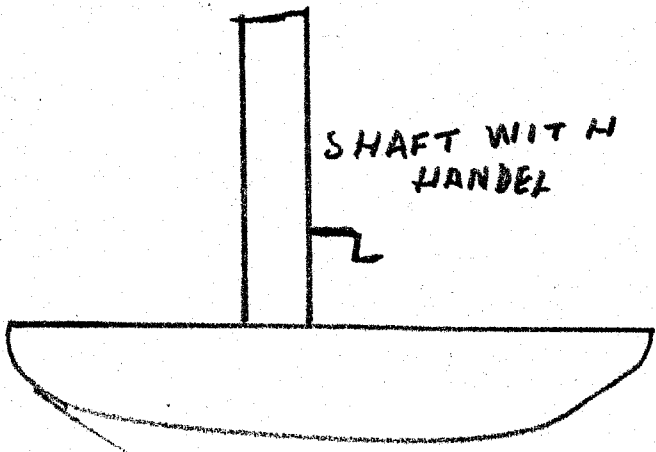

Dear Sir or Madam,

I am writing my second letter to you, after sending my first one in August, this year. As I have not had a reply to that letter, I am writing to you once more.

My previous letter, and this one concerns the same subject - that of a claimed 'U.F.O. Sighting', observed by a member of the public during the early part of February this year, near to the Royal Air Force Base, at St Mawgan, in Cornwall.

The phenomenon observed was that of an object, firstly spherical and orange in colour, changing to a black haze, then with a silvery white haze. It was observed for over four minutes by a reliable witness. The phenomenon made no noise. However, it was observed hobbing and weaving over nearby hedgerow, and the narrow road where it was observed.

When I first heard of this sighting, I was at the time working in Plymouth, Devon and visited the 'sighting area' many times in order to carry out field investigation. During these procedures, we discovered some nearby damage to growth within yards of where this phenomenon was first observed and the damage is consistent with that of being struck by an aerial object, consistent with the estimated size of the phenomenon, given to us by the witness. We have reason to believe that the damage found, was caused by this sighted phenomenon.

Because you have probably received my previous letter, and also two from R.A.F. St Mawgan that I sent to them in April/May, which they state they have forwarded to yourselves, I am not going to repeat details which I have done three times already.

What concerns colleagues and myself, is the somewhat lax response from both yourselves, and the Royal Air Force over this matter. The incident is not merely a light in the sky passing over a R.A.F. Base, but a very well defined phenomenon less than one mile away from this strategic Base, which we believe may have passed through the Base itself, and was flying less than 15ft from ground level, and we believe hitting some nearby hedgerow. Surely, incidents like this need to be reported to your Department, because of a possible Defence risk?

I do understand that your Department is possibly flooded with quite simple sightings of 'lights in the sky' (L.I.T.S.), by U.F.O. Investigation Groups, and from members of the public, who are ignorant of simple aerial

natural or man made phenomenon; however this sighting does not fall into this particular category.

Should your Department not be able to deal with my enquiry, I wonder if you would be so kind as to forward this letter and any of my previous ones to a member of Mr Reseltine's Secretaries, because I strongly feel this matter requires prompt attention. I will wait for a further couple of weeks and hope for some news from your Department, however if this letter is mislaid, I shall contact the Defence Secretary directly.

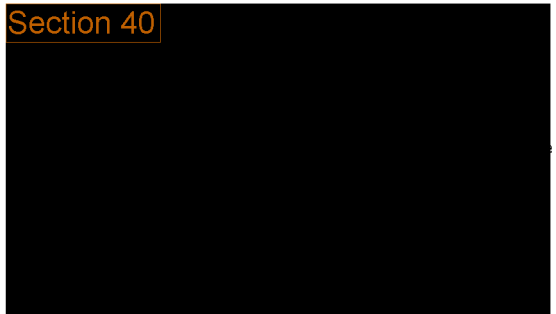

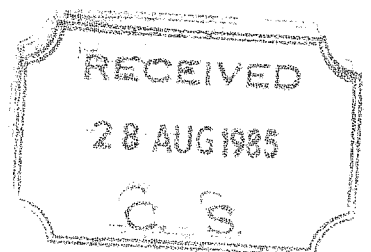



Thank you for your letter requesting information on Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

You may find it useful if I explain that the sole interest of the United Kingdom Ministry of Defence in reported sightings of UFOs is to establish whether they have any bearing on the defence of the country.

There is no organisation in the Ministry of Defence appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of such objects, and no staff are employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive are referred to the staff in the Department who are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we have not carried out a study into the scientific significance of these phenomena. Unless there are defence implications we do not attempt to identify sightings and we cannot inform observers of the probable identity of the object seen. Therefore, I am afraid we do not have a great deal of information available to send you. However, I attach copies of two recent Parliamentary Questions on the Ministry of Defence's interest in UFO reports together with a copy of the proforma we use to record reports, which you may be interested in.

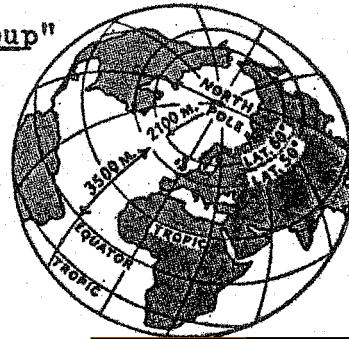

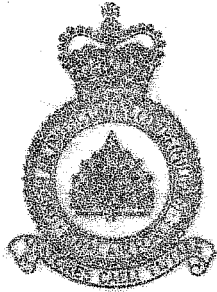

LOW FLYING AIRCRAFT IN NORTH AND WEST YORKSHIRE

I am writing to acknowledge your letter of 2 October 1985 in which you refer to a low flying aircraft passing over the village of Almondbury on 19 September 1985.

I have to tell you that I have no knowledge of such an aircraft movement however, you will be aware that aircraft and helicopters regularly overfly Yorkshire at relatively low altitude. As you may be aware there are no jet aircraft or helicopters permanently based at RAF Leeming at present and you will therefore understand that I have no direct control over the aircraft involved in this incident, nor any aircraft operating in your area.

In reply to your enquiry regarding aircraft lighting I regret that I am unable to assist you other than to state that most aircraft carry red and green navigation lights, red flashing anti-collision lights and, in some cases, flashing white strobe lights.

I regret that I am unable to assist you further in this matter and would suggest, as Royal Air Force Leeming's involvement in aviation within Yorkshire is at present very limited, that you may wish to consider alternative avenues of enquiry.

UNIDENTIFIED FLYING OBJECTS - MEETING WITH LORD HILL-NORTON:
THURSDAY 10 OCTOBER 1985

You were very kindly present when Lord Trefgarne met Lord Hill-Norton at 11 am at UKLF on Thursday 10 October to discuss Unidentified Flying Objects.

Lord Trefgarne opened the discussion by explaining that there was a central secretariat within the Ministry of Defence, part of whose responsibility was to act as a focal point for the report of unidentified sightings. Their task was to consider whether there were any defence implications from such reports.

Lord Hill-Norton emphasised that he believed quite sincerely that there was a problem of UFOs. He had considered for a number of years that the MOD's response to reported sightings had been unsatisfactory.

Specifically he cited the incident at Woodbridge in 1980 and criticised the alleged refusal by MOD to acknowledge the presence of Lieutenant Colonel Halt's report for 2½ years. He referred to a number of papers released in the United States under the Freedom of Information Act which had been carefully examined in the United States, and which he considered would be of interest to the MOD. He also referred to a book due to be published shortly which is anticipated to be critical of the MOD in this area.

Lord Trefgarne repeated that none of the reported sightings examined had proved to have any defence implications. He did not wish to appear unhelpful, however, and he undertook to consider whether any steps could be taken to allay the concerns of those like Lord Hill-Norton.

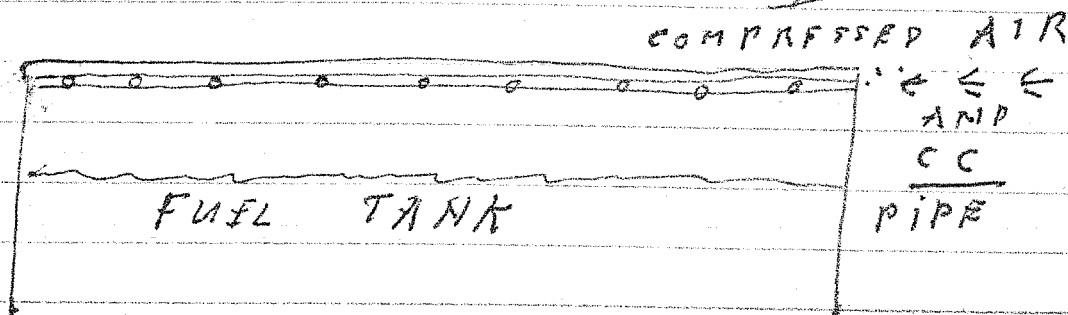
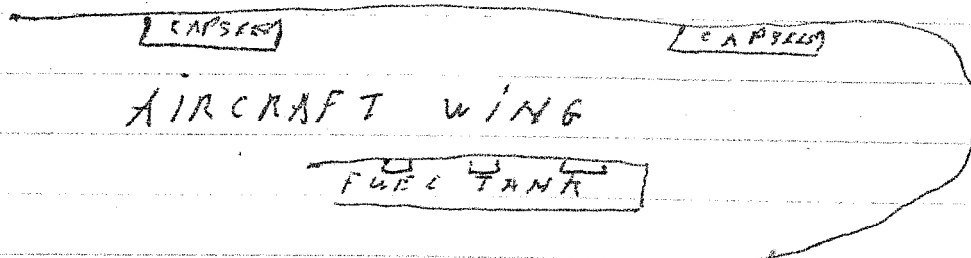
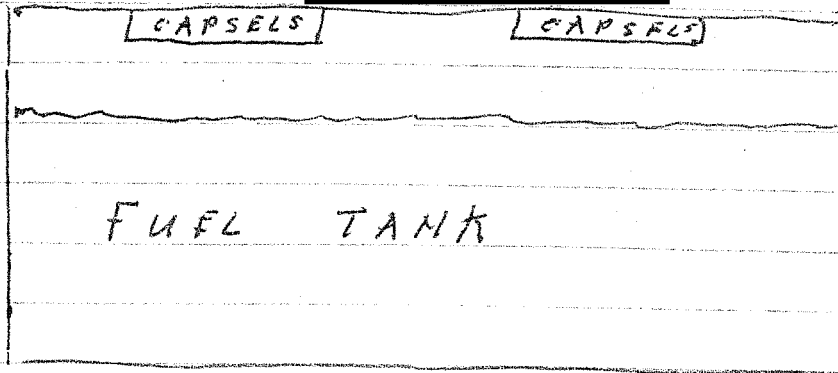

1. You asked at Reference A for briefing for Lord Trefgarne's meeting with Lord Hill-Norton on 2 October. I attach a piece covering the questions posed by Lord Hill-Norton in his letter of 26 July. I believe this adequately covers the broader issues and I see no need for further background briefing. However I attach a specific piece on the "RAF Woodbridge/Bentwaters" incident in which Lord Hill-Norton has previously shown an interest.

2. I would suggest that Minister is supported at the meeting by Hd of Sec(AS) and representatives of D Air Def and DSTI. I would also like to attend myself if you have no objection. I understand that Minister will wish to run through the brief prior to the meeting itself and that we should therefore meet at 14.30 on Wednesday 2 Oct. I should be grateful if you would let us know the venue in due course.

MEETING BETWEEN MINISTER(DS) AND LORD HILL-NORTON

UFOs

a. I accept that there are strange phenomena to be seen in the sky, however I believe there to be adequate explanations for them. Experience has shown that most reported sightings can be attributed to things such as aircraft, meteorological balloons or natural phenomena like ball lightning. Of course there are many other equally straightforward explanations. However, there are a small number of cases where a simple explanation cannot be found immediately and on these occasions we are careful to ensure so far as possible that that they are of no Defence significance. Having satisfied ourselves of this, as you know, we do not attempt any further investigations. Clearly some reports remain unexplained but we have found no evidence that these phenomena represent a threat to national security and therefore cannot justify devoting Defence resources to their investigation.

b. All reports received by the MOD are channelled through Sec(AS)2. They are passed to the Air Staff who examine them for Air Defence implications. In some cases, where (on the face of it) there could be a defence interest, enquiries are made of relevant radar establishments etc in order to obtain more information. All reports are also passed to the Defence Intelligence organisation who have a keen interest in any sightings of unusual objects. We have no specialist group in Whitehall or anywhere else involved in UFO's and no civilian advisers other than Sec(AS)2 are involved.

The Flying Complaints Flight at Rudloe Manor are concerned with receiving and investigating flying complaints. In the course of their duties they occasionally receive UFO reports (as do many other units) but they have no specific role with regard to this subject.

Secretariat (Air Staff) is the Division which provides secretariat support to CAS and the Air Staff and in this capacity is responsible for correspondence with members of the public and answering PQs etc on many subjects, including UFO's. Sec(AS)2 is the branch which amongst other things handles UFO's, there is no such branch as Air Staff Secretariat 8. You may be thinking of Defence Secretariat 8 which no longer exists and from which Sec(AS) evolved as a result of reorganisation of MOD last January.

c. Many of the UFO reports received in MOD come through Defence establishments, although most of these come originally from members of the public. Very few reports are made by military pilots; for instance, in the last 12 months Sec(AS) has received only two such reports.

d. No central record of radar recordings is kept. Major Air Traffic Control units take recordings as a matter of course, however these are generally destroyed after 30 days. ADGE units do not regularly make recordings although some are occasionally made for specific operational purposes. Relevant radar units are consulted where necessary as part of the normal process of handling UFO reports in order to ascertain whether there is any correlation between a reported sighting and known radar traces.

e. The Department is happy to release what information we have on specific incidents. However we could not justify the effort involved in searching for or collating information of a more general nature.

RAF WOODBRIDGE INCIDENT 27 Dec 80

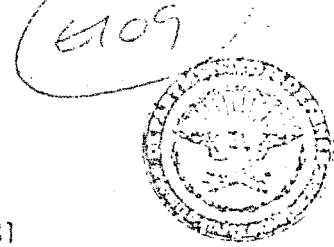
Col Halt's report of 13 Jan 81 concerns the sighting of unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge by two security patrolmen. Col Halt records what was subsequently reported to him without comment. The 3 patrolmen who went into Rendlesham Forest to investigate what they thought might be a crashed aircraft say they saw a triangular object. It has been suggested that this might have been a piloted vehicle, however in view of its reported size (about 9 feet long and 6 feet high) this was, and still is, considered highly unlikely. Indeed enquiries made both at the time and subsequently failed to reveal any radar trace of anything unusual in the area at the time.

Col Halt also reports on his own investigations at the site of the incident the following day. Once again he draws no conclusions from his findings and, significantly, does not recommend further investigation. Our own view also was that no additional action was required. Later on the night of 29 Dec 80 Col Halt and a number of others saw more unusual lights, but again we have no record of anything untoward being picked up on radar.

I think you will agree that it is highly unlikely that any violation of UK airspace would be heralded by such a display of lights. I think it equally unlikely that any reconnaissance or spying activity would be announced in this way.

Overall, we believe that the fact that Col Halt did not report these occurrences to MOD for almost 2 weeks after the event, together with the relatively low key manner in which he handled the matter (given resources available to him) are indicative of the degree of importance in defence terms which should be attached to the incident. He himself took all investigative action which was required. If members of the public feel that for scientific or other reasons, there should be an attempt to establish the cause of what happened, that is for them, but I am confident that it is not something in which the MOD should or need become further involved.

SUBJECT: Unexplained Lights

to: RAF/CC

1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.

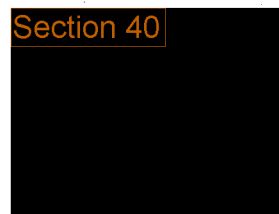
2. The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.

3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10° off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

Dear Sir or Madam,

I am writing to you again, after writing to you in August, to ask for information and possible explanation into a reported 'U.F.O. sighting' at St Mawgan, in Cornwall. This event occurred during early February this year.

My first line of enquiry was to the R.A.F. Base at St Mawgan, in May, and they forwarded my two letters to your Department, after consultation with HQ and Provost Security Services (U.K.). The R.A.F. Base informed me, that I would be hearing from you in due course.

After waiting for some three months I wrote to D.S.S. in August, but since then, I have heard that D.S.S. has been terminated, and upon gaining this news, I felt it responsible to write to the Ministry of Defence again.

Should my previous letters be in your possession, you will be aware of this incident. Should my letters not be in your possession, I will briefly put on paper the event.

In February, at 5.45pm a 28 year old lady was driving down a country lane, near Newquay. Quite suddenly she was confronted by a bright yellow light, which bobbed and weaved over the road in front of her, and also along the hedgerows alongside each side of the road. The light changed shape and colour, to the size of a football and a bright luminous green, with a red glow in the centre of it. It then changed to a purplish colour, prior to its exit, into a thick hedgerow. Naturally, the witness was unaware of any sound being made from the phenomenon because of her attention of the road - her speed varied from 20m.p.h. to 50m.p.h. which helps us with the distance it followed her, because she states the sighting's time duration was four minutes. Therefore, the maximum distance it followed her was 3.33 miles (5.36Km), the minimum distance was 1.4 miles (2.25Km). Because of the erratic changes of speed due to her surprise whilst driving, we have estimated the average speed at 35m.p.h., which would give us a distance it followed her was 2.3 miles (3.7Km).

Discussing the incident with the witness, there is a possibility, that this 'light' could have penetrated the inside of R.A.F. St Mawgan, without any challenge from the authorities there. We believe the 'light' may have then travelled in the area of Truro.

At the time, I was living in Plymouth when I first approached the Air Force Base, and operated a Research Organisation, Plymouth UFO Investigation Centre (PUFOIC).....

.....and my two letters to the Base would have been on headed letter writing paper. I have since then moved to Cheshire on a permanent footing and I wrote to R.A.F. St Mawgan informing them of this,so they could inform yourselves.

In April and May,PUFIC staff examined closely the route that the 'light' took,in case any damage had occurred to the natural or man made habitat in that area.We did this because of the closeness the 'light' travelled by,during the sighting. This included some cottages that were occupied,a barn and a barn type building,used to store farming equipment. (The witness stated the 'light' reflected an orange glow on a white cottage wall). The 'light' also flew over the hedgerow and some trees in the locality. In our examination of these areas,we discovered some burnt patches of ground on a track leading to a field,and some burnt small trees.At first we thought these might have been caused by the 'light';however since then we have excluded this theory. We also discovered a tree,which has been hit by an airborne object,because most of it's upper branches have been ripped off. The 'snap' marks on the branches are all similar indicating the damage was done by one incident.Our photographs show this damage very clearly.

Observation of aircraft activity over this area,does not help with any conclusion as to the nature of this 'light'.All aircraft are much too high in altitude to have damaged the tree.

One theory we have made is that it could have been an experimental exercise from R.A.F. St Mawgan,however if this is correct,then there is some concern to the safety of property and even people in this locality.If this theory is correct,then any correct procedures designed for the exercise were followed grossly incorrectly,and should not be allowed to happen again. Another theory is that of a missile experiment,which if correct,went horribly wrong.If the 'light' was a genuine 'U.F.O.' then a question we must ask,is "Why did it go unchallenged in an area less than one mile from the R.A.F. Base?".

Our investigations into this sighting have involved several people, and they,including myself,and some of the local people where this incident occurred are somewhat concerned at the safety aspect and potential dangers this incident might have caused.

This sighting is one of five,being discussed at a major Conference in the North - West in October,and we would be most gratefull if you could acknowledge and reply to my letters to both you,and the R.A.F. I feel that a wait of nearly three months for a reply from an Official Government body is a little 'slow' to say the least. I would not waste my own time,and yours if a mere 'light in the sky' had been observed and reported to us.I am quite sure you will agree with me,that this incident is not such a case,and does qualify for these letters to you. Again,I request urgent action to my letter because of the delay so far.

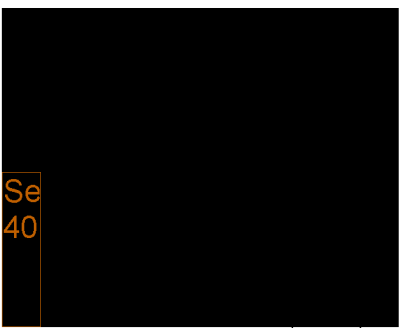



I have been involved in an investigation regarding the recent appearance of mysterious circles which have been found in crop fields throughout Southern England. Whilst studying various press cuttings and listening to the TV and radio reports I have heard that the Ministry Of Defence has shown some interest in this phenomena, or atleast the Army has passed on reports to you.

In one particular report, which appeared in the Salisbury Journal, it was stated that at Middle Wallop a 'white jelly - like flourescent substance' was found and that samples were taken for analysis. As yet I have been unable to trace any further mention of this in respect of the results of this analysis.

I wonder therefore if there is any information with regard to this that you could pass onto me. Although a great many people are of the opinion that there is either a perfectly natural explanation, or it is a prank my investigations to date have shown that about two or three days before the circles appeared there were reports of unidentified flying objects. The people who have reported such sightings, both to me and in some cases the press, are not assuming that these are alien craft (ie flying saucers), but the objects are certainly defying explanation at the moment in that they do not appear to be any known airbourne craft. The same can be said of the reports which have come from America, New Zealand, Australia and various other parts of the world in the past.

However I hope you are able to assist me to complete my file regarding this phenomena in as much as I will then have obtained comments and reports from all those concerned with this case. From this I will then be able to study the material in detail in an effort to find some explanation if at all possible.

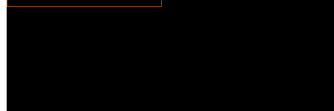

1. In Reference A, you notified us of the meeting between US of S(AF) and Lord Hill-Norton on Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) on 25 Sept 85; you asked for a short contribution on our area of interest and whether we would be willing to attend the meeting.

2. As you state in your brief for the US of S(AF), all UFO reports are passed to the DIS - specifically DI55 who, inter alia, are responsible for assessing WP space systems. It is in this area that our main interests lie, although the reports are also seen by other staff within DI55. Obviously we read the reports with interest, but over, at least the last few years, we have not considered that any of the reports justified detailed investigation; this point is well made in the opening paragraph of your draft.

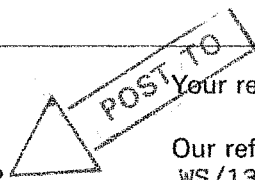

Thank you for your letter of 20 April 1985 concerning UFO's, I am sorry that I have been unable to reply before now. You may find it useful if I explain that the sole interest of the United Kingdom Ministry of Defence in reported sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs) is to establish whether they have any bearing on the defence of the country.

There is no organisation in the Ministry of Defence appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of such objects, and no staff are employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive are referred to the staff in the Department who are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we have not carried out a study into the scientific significance of these phenomena. Unless there are defence implications we do not attempt to identify sightings and we cannot inform observers of the probable identity of the object seen. The Department could not justify the expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond the pure defence interests.

I am afraid we do not keep the statistical information which you ask for. However, I attach copies of two recent Parliamentary Questions on the Ministry of Defence's interest in UFO reports, which you may be interested in. I also enclose a copy of the UFO article which appeared in the July 1957 issue of the RAF Flying Review which you asked for in your letter.

Unidentified Flying Objects

Sir Patrick Wall asked the Secretary of State for Defence (1) how many alleged landings by unidentified flying objects have been made in 1980, 1981, 1982 and 1983, respectively; and how many have been investigated by his Department's personnel;

(2) how many unexplained sightings there have been in 1980, 1981, 1982 and 1983, respectively; and which of these had been traced by radar and with what result.

Mr. Lee [*pursuant to his reply, 9 March 1984, c. 723*]:
For the years in question, the Ministry of Defence received the following numbers of reports of sightings of flying objects which the observer could not identify: 350, 600, 250, and 390. Reports of alleged landings are not separately identified. The Department was satisfied that none of these reports was of any defence significance and, in such cases, does not maintain records of the extent of its investigations.

Sir Patrick Wall asked the Secretary of State for Defence (1) if he has seen the United States Air Force memo dated 13 January 1981 concerning unexplained lights near RAF Woodbridge;

(2) whether, in view of the fact that the United State's Air Force memo of 13 January 1981 on the incident at RAF Woodbridge has been released under the Freedom of Information Act, he will now release reports and documents concerning similar unexplained incidents in the United Kingdom;

Mr. Stanley: I have seen the memorandum of 13 January 1981 to which my hon. Friend refers. Since 1980 the Department has received 1,400 reports of sightings of flying objects which the observers have been unable to identify. There were no corresponding unexplained radar contacts. Subject to normal security constraints, I am ready to give information about any such reported sightings that are found to be a matter of concern from a defence standpoint, but there have been none to date.

The "Flying Saucer" mystery deepens as sightings over Britain reach a new peak.

IT HAPPENED at London Airport on Friday, March 22, this year.

Sheila Manning, a dark-haired secretary in BOAC's Constellation Fleet Technical Officer's office, was looking out of the window in front of her desk. The office was on the southern edge of the airfield and Miss Manning was looking south, away from London Airport. She was puzzled by what she saw.

"What's that?" she asked of the others in the office. Pointing, she indicated a strange object which appeared to be floating above a bunch of cumulus cloud some three to five miles away towards the south. It seemed to be a shiny, metallic object. Its apparent size was not great but, if the distance estimation was correct, it would have been considerably larger than any aircraft now flying.

Its shape was that of a Yo-Yo seen from the side—two bowl shapes, the upper one inverted, joined by a short centre section. No one in the office had seen anything like it before.

"It's an aircraft catching the sunlight," said somebody at last. This was possible. Aircraft from the airport were taking off in that direction. The sun was slightly to one side and could be catching on and reflecting from the flying surfaces. But most people in the office were not satisfied. They were well aware of the strange atmospheric effects possible at times and this was unlike anything else they had experienced. And anyway, the object was not moving.

Not until almost ten minutes after Miss Manning had first seen it did the unidentified object vanish when obscured by a cumulus cloud. It had neither moved, nor diminished in size.

By this time about a dozen people had gathered in the office. They had all seen the phenomenon. A quick check revealed that radar had reported nothing in the area—nor had the control tower staff.

All the evidence seemed to point to a freak reflection of some type. But this did not satisfy those who had seen it. It was no reflection, they said. To them it was an Unidentified Flying Object—a UFO for short.

This strange event occurred at a time when there were many similar happenings. In April, a radar station at West Freugh, Scotland, reported a mysterious object which has remained unidentified. Mysterious explosions were heard over Epsom and Glasgow. Craters appeared but there was no sign of fragments or explosives. A little later, people living at Gravesend and Hendon, and many places in between, reported strange lights in the night sky performing strange antics. These are only a few of the reports which came in. All of them remain unexplained.

But some people had an explanation which fitted all these and many similar reports. They recalled a phenomenon which has been with us for the past ten years. These recent mysteries, said these people, could be explained away by Flying Saucers.

Flying Saucers were back in the news again.

How it all started is, of course, a well-known story. In the year 1947, Kenneth Arnold, an American business man, was piloting his private aircraft in the region of Mount Rainier, Washington, when he saw a formation of strangely shaped objects. He estimated their speed as some 1,600 m.p.h.—fantastic at that time. Their motion he described as "saucers skipping across a pond." The press seized on this descrip-

ive phrase and so the Flying Saucer was born.

The fact that strange objects had been reported in the skies regularly ever since the turn of the century—and before—escaped most people's notice. 1947 became known, incorrectly, as the year when UFOs began.

Within weeks "saucers" had spread throughout the length and breadth of America. Reports came in from everywhere. The craze caught on in other countries—including Britain.

Now, in the short space of ten years, the saucer enigma has snowballed beyond expectation. Every known type of theorist has jumped on to the saucer bandwagon. Spiritualists, occultists, theo-

sophists, professional forecasters of doom and many other mysterious persons have put forward their theories and explanations. Several have even claimed contact with beings from other worlds.

Between them these often well-meaning people have meaning people have astounding theories that it is small wonder that the general public is inclined to grin sceptically when Flying Saucers are mentioned.

This was the situation I found when I began an investigation into the UFO mystery for *RAF Flying Review*. My object was to discover whether the UFO was something peculiar to America or whether the same type of thing was happening in this country. I also wanted to find out whether the UFO was something which deserved to be laughed to scorn or whether it should be taken seriously.

It would be quite easy, I discovered, to pour ridicule on the whole proceed-

space but from a laundry in Rochdale! He went on to explain that a man working at the laundry had contacted the police and told them that, on the night in question, he had released two children's balloons filled with hydrogen. Below, he had rigged up a system of flashing lights. This, said the Under Secretary, was what had been seen.

And so the matter was apparently neatly tied up.

Or at least it was until a local newspaper interviewed the man who claimed to have released the balloon and discovered that he had no idea of how to fill a balloon with hydrogen nor how to fit lights to it. In fact, said the newspaper, he had nothing at all to do with the UFO. He had not released any balloons. This supposition was given added weight when the people who had seen the UFO insisted that it was not a balloon of any type.

Now, after officially debunking this sighting, the Air Ministry have confirmed that an investigator has been sent up to Wardle. After his researches the Air Ministry still maintain it was a balloon.

It is small wonder that the public are both bemused and amused at such complicated events.

But, in spite of all this, I do not think that we should laugh at UFOs. During my investigation I have sifted through hundreds of sightings. Many could have been anything from balloons to meteors, from aircraft to spots before the eyes. Yet, wrapped up in all these have been some which stand out. They stand out because they have been reported by reliable people and because it is difficult to see how they could be any of the things which are often mistaken for Flying Saucers.

Evidence, muddled as it is, indicates that there are unexplained objects in our skies. They may not be manned or sent by beings from another planet, but they are there.

Flight Lieutenant J. R. Salandin saw something that he could not explain on October 4, 1954. In fact, he was so shaken that he had to fly around for ten minutes before he could tell Control what he had seen from the cockpit of his Meteor fighter.

He had taken off from North Weald in Essex at 4.15 p.m. Climbing towards two other aircraft which he could see high above him, he was surprised to see two small objects, one silvery and the other gold, pass near the two aircraft. Salandin had hardly recovered from his surprise and was still wondering whether he had been victim of a hallucination when he happened to glance ahead.

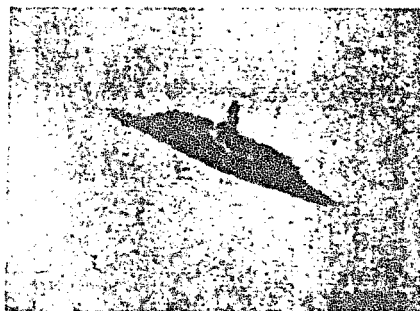
He received one of the biggest frights he has ever had. Streaking straight towards him at tremendous speed was a disc-

shaped object. In the brief time Salandin had for observation, the thing appeared to have a flange in the centre and two bulges above and below this.

The object was so near that it overlapped his windscreen. A collision seemed inevitable. Then, at the last moment, the object swerved and flashed past on the Meteor's port side.

Salandin had never before given a serious thought to Flying Saucers and even now he keeps an open mind on the subject. All that he knows is that he saw something very real up there over Essex on that October afternoon—and that it gave him a hell of a fright.

There have been many other non-sense sightings. Again in 1954, a

ings. A quick glance at the activities of the many hoaxers was enough to prove that. Take what happened in Jersey just three months ago.

Several people there saw an object in the sky. It was nothing very definite. It could have been a balloon, an aircraft catching the sun or a mere freak of the atmosphere. But it was peculiar. And it was also, according to a newspaper report, sufficient to give Mr. Reginald Queree of St. Helier, the idea of throwing a model Flying Saucer into the air and photographing it. The resulting picture was, he is reported as saying, the strange object which the others had seen.

But it was not until the picture had been published in good faith by a national newspaper, that this story was published.

"Large White Disc"

We could also laugh at the strange goings on at Wardle, in Lancashire. Here the hoaxers appear to have been at work again—but this time they operated in reverse, as it were.

It was the evening of February 15 this year when Mrs. Dorothy Fitton, a 45-year-old civil servant, looked out from her rather isolated cottage and saw a strange object moving in from the south-west. Flying quite slowly, it moved in a dead straight line.

As the object drew nearer, Mrs. Fitton could see that it was a light flashing alternately red and white. Above the light she could just make out in the darkness a large white disc—"as big as a cartwheel."

The object stopped, hovered stock-still for some five minutes, and then moved off, just as slowly and surely in a dead straight line towards the south-east. This was exactly ninety degrees from its original course. No noise at all.

Others in the village saw it. Mr. J. A. Leavey, the local M.P., heard about it and questioned those who had seen it. He was impressed and decided to ask a question in Parliament.

When the question was asked it caused quite a bit of hilarity in the House. Mr. Orr-Ewing, Air Under Secretary, said that the object did not emanate from

group of Scandinavian scientists were returning by air after observing an eclipse of the sun from the polar regions. They were on their way back, but still taking photographs of the sun, when their attention was taken by something else. Several shining disc-like objects appeared to be shadowing their aircraft. What they were, none of the scientists knew. They were no aircraft such as we know them and none of the scientists on the trip had ever seen anything like them.

And this year there have been a whole spate of sighting reports. One private researcher has collected 149 reports from Great Britain for the months of April and March alone. No doubt many of these could be discounted if a thorough investigation were made. But others remain a mystery.

Before any of these can be truly labelled "unidentified," however, a very thorough investigation must be made. The would-be investigator would have to know, among other things, the movements of all aircraft or balloons likely to have been in the area at the time. He would have to have a very sound knowledge of weather phenomena and astronomy—and of human nature.

But there are people willing to undertake this task. To find out who they are and how they go about the job, it is necessary once more to dip briefly back into saucer history.

In the early years soon after 1947, "saucer" clubs began to spring up all over the country. Their objects were not always well defined but generally it was to investigate saucer sightings.

Since this time there has been a general movement towards amalgamation and most clubs now regularly exchange views with others in this country and abroad. At the hub of all saucer activities in this country is the magazine, *Flying Saucer Review*.

Inside a Saucer

This is a small, well-produced magazine which sells about 1,300 copies. It attempts to cater for all degrees of saucer fans and so it is not surprising to read in a recent issue, an article by a "high ranking Tibetan Lama" telling how he went for a ride in a Flying Saucer!

But it would be quite wrong to dismiss all readers and contributors of this magazine as cranks. The editor is the Hon. Brinsley le Poer Trench and he is far from the general public's idea of a Flying Saucer crank. Tall and amiable, Trench is, by an odd chance, a space salesman by profession. When he is not selling advertising space for another magazine,

he sells interplanetary space through *Flying Saucer Review*.

Trench admits that he is working on a "sticky wicket." He realises that many of his readers want to see "astounding saucer news" but, at the same time, he tries to keep reports of actual sightings as objective as possible.

Among his readers are some who act as investigators. These men Trench entrusts with the task of looking into sightings. Two such men are Jack Ibson, a Yorkshire business man, and Wilfred Daniels, a technical writer from Stafford.

These two, like most other of Trench's investigators, are enthusiastic about their task and believe implicitly in Flying Saucers. They also believe that they have an interplanetary origin. How far is this theory justified? Let Trench explain:

"UFOs have been timed," he says, "travelling at fantastic speeds, far in excess of anything earthmade. And, again, many UFOs have been seen performing manoeuvres, such as a right-angled turn at high speed, which would cause any normal material or crew to disintegrate under the excessive loads."

Prominent experts, such as Professor Hermann Oberth, the guided missiles expert, have also expressed these views. Oberth says: "My own explanation of UFOs is that they are machines built in some place other than on the Earth. I believe that they originate exclusively from outside the Earth because observations suggest that Flying Saucers are able to suppress the force of gravity, and I do not think that anyone on Earth has yet found the means to do so."

But, if we grant the reality of these objects, then it seems to me that the interplanetary idea is only a theory. Admittedly, it seems the most likely one, but nowhere during my investigation did I come across evidence proving that Flying Saucers were interplanetary.

One failing which appears to be general among the most enthusiastic of saucer fans, is lack of a critical approach to their subject. Bear in mind the deceptive nature of human observation and the many atmospheric freaks that are possible, and it is easier to see how important it is to be critical.

A typical report received by Trench is that which came from Miss K. Connor, a member of the Royal Observer Corps, who lives at Truro, Cornwall. Last October, while on a ROC exercise, Miss Connor and her crew saw a UFO.

"The object appeared as a small, silver round one like a ball," said Miss Connor in her report. "Then it turned sideways and was seen to be oblong. The side away from the sun glowed pink and a sort of translucent blue." Estimated height was 45-50,000 feet. The UFO appeared to be "standing still against the wind" and disappeared when it rose into the upper haze.

Trench regards this as a good and reliable sighting. Admittedly Miss Connor should be a reliable observer and

I have no doubt that she reported exactly what she saw. But the great question of what this was remains unanswered. It could have been a weather balloon. *Flying Saucer Review* made no attempt to investigate this possibility. But, without official co-operation it would have been difficult to do so.

But not all UFO investigators lack criticism. There are many people investigating the mystery who prefer to remain in the background. They feel that the subject tends to be ridiculed by the general public and prefer to carry out their work on their own without publicity. Some of these people are scientists.

Men like Doctor Clifford Thornton, a 37-year-old doctor of philosophy who works as a scientific and statistical consultant. He also runs a business which specialises in developing special equipment for mineral prospecting. Dr. Thornton, of Hampstead, London, is a short, perky man who walks with a limp acquired while serving with the Armoured Corps during the war. One of his great interests is gravity. Through this he was brought into touch with Flying Saucers, although he is one of the many who abhor this term for UFOs.

Gravity Theory

In 1950 Thornton wrote a thesis entitled "The Unified Field Theory" which dealt with many aspects of gravity which had never before been examined. This had a great success and is still used in many universities all over the world by students in this field of research. It was in 1950, too, that he first became interested in UFOs. "Many aspects of this phenomenon," he says, "have a very close bearing to my work on gravity."

His first delving into the literature written on the subject of UFOs was not encouraging. He still has no hesitation in describing all of it as "science fiction." He makes one exception. This is the book "The Report on Unidentified Flying Objects," by Edward Ruppelt, one-time head of the USAF "Project Blue-Book" investigation into the mystery. This book is, indeed, one reliable volume on the subject. It does not state that UFOs are interplanetary, but it is the most convincing book ever written to prove that they exist.

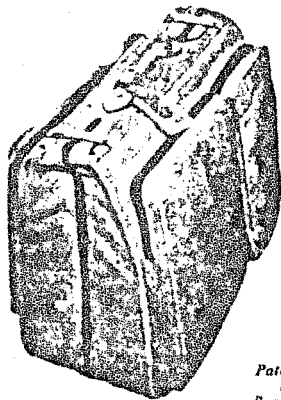
Since 1950 Thornton has himself reached the conclusion that UFOs exist. He has done more. Helped by many friends, some of them scientists like himself, he has been able to classify these objects into fourteen different categories. They range from small "saucers" only ten inches in diameter, to huge, cigar-shaped objects up to a mile in length. These never descend lower than the very fringes of our atmosphere.

Dr. Thornton has also found out that UFOs have a periodic frequency and that sightings reach a peak every 24 years. It was in early March that he told me that we could expect a crop of sightings towards the end of May. The recent spate of reports has shown how right he was.

"There is no positive evidence that UFOs come from outer space," says Thornton, "but all the available evidence seems to indicate that they do not come from this earth."

If pressed, he will advance the theory that UFOs may come from a solar system other than our own. "Our sun is a very

common type of star," he explains, "and there are many others like it in the Universe. It seems most likely that these stars will also have planets. UFOs could come from these planets."

Gravity still remains Dr. Thornton's main interest and he continues his researches. He has told me that it should soon be possible to build a device which would enable man to overcome gravity without recourse to wings or jet lift. If he has any success with this, then Dr. Thornton may be well on the way to building a Flying Saucer of his own!

IS there no official inquiry into the Flying Saucer mystery? Two years ago the Air Ministry pronounced:

"About ninety per cent of the reports (of Flying Saucers) have been found to relate to meteors, balloons, flares and many other objects. The fact that the other ten per cent remain unexplained may be attributed to nothing more sinister than lack of data." And it has said very little else until May of this year. Then, Mr. George Ward, Secretary of State for Air, said, in answer to a question in the House, that there had been so far this year five objects sighted which could not be explained. This compared, he went on, with six in 1956, none in 1955 and six in 1954.

The Air Ministry will not elaborate on this statement. We are left to presume that the unidentifieds this year include the Wardle mystery and the radar sighting from West Freugh.

But there are many people, other than the ardent saucer fans, who would like to know the answer. People like ex-Squadron Leader Ernest Booker of Lower Hillmorton Road, Rugby. Just after 9 p.m. on Tuesday, October 23, last year, Mr. Booker, now a schoolmaster, saw a strange sight in the night sky.

"There were two lights," he said, "about twice the size of aircraft navigation lights seen from 1,500 feet and a light amber in colour. They were different from anything else I have ever seen." During the war Mr. Booker was a pilot—an instructor at the Central Flying School.

"The most mysterious thing about these lights was that they made no noise whatsoever," he continued. "They were moving fairly slowly against a light breeze from east to west, quite low, about 1,500 feet up. As they moved the lights seemed to oscillate a little, both lights moving together as if they were at front and rear of some object which I couldn't see in the darkness."

Many other people in the Rugby district saw them. The ex-Squadron Leader was quite sure that they were neither balloons nor gliders; neither an aircraft nor a searchlight reflecting on a cloud. What they were he does not know, but he would very much like to know.

And so the saucer mystery moves on. Perhaps by August, 1959, when according to Dr. Thornton's theory, another peak period of sightings is due, we may know something more about these things. Perhaps some major discovery may have been made. And then UFOs might break into the biggest sensation of the century.

But today there can be no doubt that UFOs remain, very much, a mystery. ●

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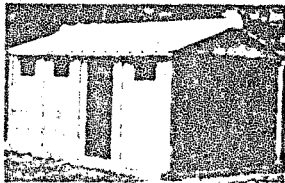

WHAT IS A MAGAZINE? It is a collection of facts and news and it is also something to store something in. I hope that I have in store in this one will be to your liking. CNK, for short, was incepted in JUNE 1972, and has had its ups and downs like many others. CNK's troubles lie around the method of production-namely duplicating. Our machine is, at this issue nearly on its last gasp. It has been working faithfully since 1968 non-stop and has churned out much material. In the beginning, my good friend and sub editor of long standing, David Prockter, complained that I should get up off my knees from the floor, way back in the 1960's, trying to do 3-colour duplicated photos, and stick to RECOGNISEABLE pictures.

In saying that, David meant that most of the photos in CNK were not clear and sharp enough for anyone to be recognised. THIS ISSUE, I hope, at least some of them are recognisable. In the past, this was largely to do with the fact that I had to send my photos, and artwork away to have them processed for the duplicating-mimeograph process. If that company did not do its job correctly, I had to put up with it for several reasons, even if I did send the work back. Now I own my own electronic scanning machine, as do most owners of duplicated sheets. If I do not like what I see, I just cut another one, at my own expense.

SOME OTHER amateur magazines use photocopiers, and others use expensive lithographics. At least, this is a FAST and cheap way of productions-apart from wear and tear. THEREFORE I hope that with this issue, all the gallery of photos you see here should be of somewhat clearness. Because of the past being NOT SO GOOD, I have re-reproduced old photos of UFO personalities, which have appeared in CNK publications in the past for those of you who could never see them. For example, people complained that if they ever met me in person, they would not be able to recognise me from the scruffy colour or black and white photo I printed. Now, as you can see, you are going to get a choice of several photos, where possible, of the same person through the years, so if you do chance to meet up in public, I hopefully think that now you should be able to recognise each other.

A LITTLE CNK HISTORY

FOR NEW READERS, I will give a brief outline on CNK and I have reproduced in this issue some items from past issues.

CNK was first produced by myself and my wife Rita, by

the letterpress method in June 1972. Anyone who has set up type by hand knows just how long and tedious this is. Because of this Issue 1, was part Letterpress, and part Litho, and the rest duplicated (RITA, Left) It was on Sale with Flying Saucer Review in Watkins Bookshop, London. CNK in the 1970's was a COSMIC ORANGE. It was segmented as you will see later. The colour photos lacked sparkle only due to poor inks. Finally we ended up in black and white.



THE HISTORY OF THIS MAGAZINE CONTINUED.

CNK GAINED IN popularity from 1972 to July 1979, when it finally closed 'NEVER TO APPEAR AGAIN'. This was due to two reasons. The first one was FINANCE. Because the magazine was and still is INTERNATIONAL, the postage costs made the price of CNK slightly inhibitive for those readers who obviously couldn't or finally wouldn't pay for them. Despite sad letters received from regular readers, the costs and the fact that the second reason was, we wanted to start up ANOTEER magazine, we decided the best thing to do was to fold up CNK for good.

WHY IS IT STILL HERE!? Well, only just! CNK still continued to receive exchange magazines from all over the World, and encouraging letters too. I did not want to stop receiving these, so I put out CNK for EUROPE instead. It was the cheper way. By not being involved with English copies the costs went down, and CNK continued. Naturally people in Europe do not all speak English! Therefore it was also a good excuse for me to learn several European Languages. I was now committed. I had to produce CNK in German, Swedish, Italian, Danish, a tiny bit of French, and then nearly too- Russian. This took up many many man hours with various foriegn dictionaries in my hand, translating both ways. Sometimes hilarious, sometime fine. But CNK continued.

There always now has to be an 'excuse' for me to 'bring out another issue'. So because the climate was right... out came two more issues. THE STANSTEAD SPACE SHUTTLE ISSUE 28 and the SUFFOLK UFO LANDING CASE issue 27.

The excuse for THIS issue is that I have a backlog of UFO and other data to get out, and ultimately dispose of, being within these pages now. BUT I MUST ADMIT that is closing down CNK I have lost all my circulation.

Those who I sent copies to last time in good faith, still have not sent in their payment. That was 1984! Come now Lads and Lassies, if this magazine is to make anything of a comeback its up to you to support it. I don't MIND giving CNK away in an exchange or as a first SAMPLE copy, but we can't do it for all and sundry.

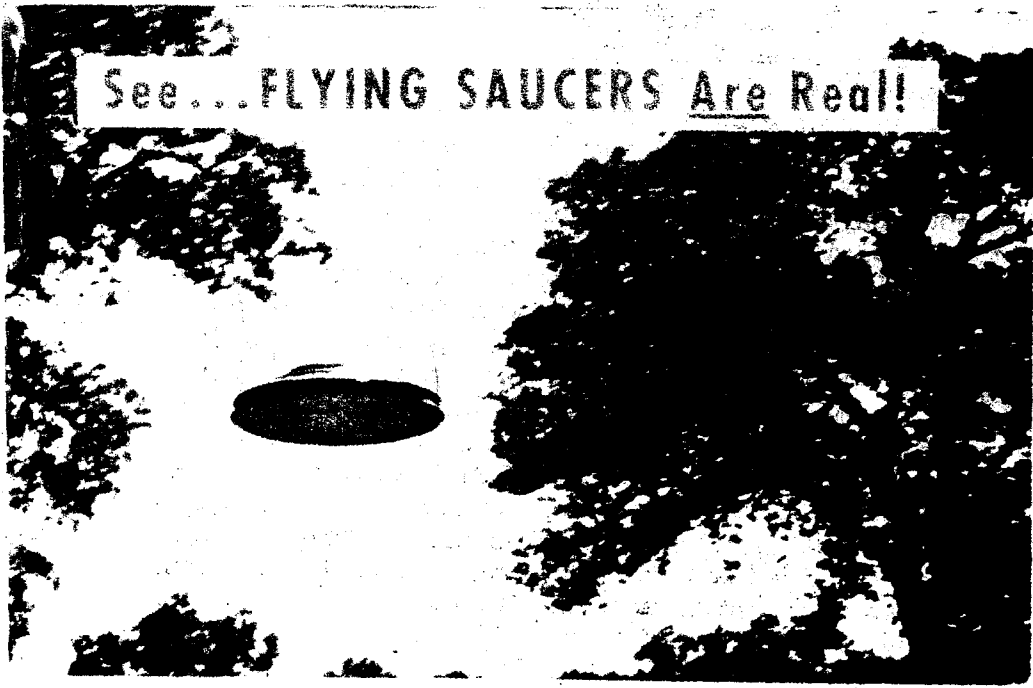

 ANSWERS IN SIGHT as to whome,
 what, where and why of the UFOs
 existance. "

 missed.

'eyebrows are raised' those you con-
 sidered to be your friends or acquaint-
 ances will walk less and frequent
 less with you, you will become an
 oddity simply because you have the
 audacity to indicate what you feel is
 at heart the truth of the matter! I
 know, I speak from experience.
 BUT NO MATTER, TRUTH or our
 understanding of it was NEVER
 POPULAR, NEVER ACCLAIMED
 BY THE MAJORITY!

This aspect of Ufology may
 cause dismay and even dissent

THE SUGGESTION THAT
 THERE MAY BE METAPHYSI-

 WITH UFOs MAY PROVE UN-

 with no little incredulity.

But truth is ever 'stranger than
 fiction'. This observation applies
 not only to the study of UFOs but
 to many other expressions of
 human thought and activity.
 Indeed our whole range of mater-
 ialistic conceptions and conditions
 could themselves be in serious
 question, especially when viewed in

the wider context of swiftly chang-
 ing situations on a global scale
 presently, and in the foreseeable
 future.

It is possible in view of these
 and many other far-reaching consid-
 erations affecting the destiny of the
 human race and his natural habitat
 and the many other natural inhabi-
 tants which have no vocal means of
 expressing their concern that the UFO
 and associated phenomena may in effect
 be a 'sign,' a cautionary note being sound-
 ed or shown from on high! Relative
 aspects AND further issues ARISING FROM THIS
 SPECIFIC LOOK AT THE PROBLEM OF FLYING
 SAUCERS WILL APPEAR IN THE NEXT ISSUE.
 COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS ARE CORDIALLY
 INVITED from INTERESTED READERS.

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...gave up in sheer frustration and despaired of finding any satisfactory explanation, or you accepted the apparent elusiveness of the problem and persevered in your research notwithstanding the enigmatic nature of the phenomenon.

Slowly but surely, I came round to the conclusion that there was more in it than meets the eye. It appeared to be something deeper and more intangible than mere technological or practical considerations, perhaps there were metaphysical and even spiritual associations involved in it all,

In common with most interested researchers, I pursued the conventional round of enquiry - reading of selective books and journals, attending meetings and lectures, participating in discussions and dialogues, taking part in skywatches, engaging in press and private correspondence with interested members of the public, studying reports and sightings, ect. (I still engage in this basic ground work of research).

It was later I came to read the book **UFOS - OPERATION TROJAN HORSE** by John A. Keel the American journalist and ufologist who made what is claimed to be 'an exhaustive study of unidentified flying objects'.

While I do not accept all that Mr. Keel writes on the subject, yet there is much that he states which is worthy of serious

consideration. I would quote the following comment: "A major but little explored aspect of the UFO phenomenon is therefore theological and philosophical, rather than purely scientific. The UFO problem can never be untangled by physicists and scientists, unless they are men who have been schooled in the liberal arts, theology and philosophy. Unfortunately, most scientific disciples are so demanding that their practitioners have little time or aptitude to study complicated subjects outside their own immediate fields of interest."

A further statement by Mr. Keel relating to the same line of thought, is also worthy of note: "History psychiatry and the occult have proved to be far more important than the many books which simply recount the endless sightings of aerial anomalies..."

I am inclined to agree with him in this observation. In my follow-up work, I try to go into the matter in greater depth and ascertain what the real significance is and how it affects mankind today, individually and collectively. This aspect could lead us into the very heart of the whole phenomenon! But please remember, this calls for a truly 'open mind' it calls likewise for bravery of a very high order, what I call 'moral courage' because once you prefer there are metaphysical or esoteric associations with UFOs or Flying Saucers, then you are in for trouble

People come from the world over to see the 'famous Southport Flower Show', but there was an unexpected attraction besides the blooms in 1971 when people coming from the grounds on the night of August 25th saw an unexplained bright object in the sky.

I spoke to keen amateur astronomer Eric Jackson, a 15 year old member of the Southport Astronomical Society. Eric lives at Banks (a few miles out from the town centre of Southport) where the object seemed to be centred.

At 10.27 that night he was looking through his telescope at the star Denebe in the swan when a bright object caught his eye. He described it as bluish white with a white centre. Not unlike a star, but far too

bright to be seen from a telescope. There seemed to be light radiating from it in the way a child draws the sun. It was Stationary and remained so for about ten seconds position being a degree and a half south of Cephei, a degree and a half south of Pegasi and South of Pegasi.

It began to move and took the form of a rocket flame leaving an orange trail of about half a degree in length behind it. slowly it increased in brilliance to eight magnitude and then suddenly died out. As soon as this had happened a most extraordinary noise took to the air. This noise can best be described as a crackling sound of a very high volume. It was definitely not a sonic boom. Whatever it was, it was

The strange case of Bedford Parham. A Wellford, a Georgia man. He said he was driving home from a business trip to Atlanta, Georgia and was near Levonia when a circular object came hitting down and stopped in the air like a hummingbird, over his car. Parham said "I was travelling 65 or 75 mph, but when the object approached, the car engine began to slow down. He said it seemed attracted by the car's headlights. The bottom portion was whirring in one direction and the upper part in an opposite direction.

Then on page 18 we saw an attempt to find the Flying Saucer 'astronauts' on Earth. Were such beings walking around among us on Earth.?

THE HUMANOIDS

Penthouse magazine, and a French UFO magazine plus many other researchers published articles on beings said to have left their craft, done what they wanted to do, entered their craft and left the earth. It seemed there were 7 types of creature, some squat and small, others tall, and even some hairy. Some had a friendly outlook towards the humans they encountered, others kidnapped earth people, and took them aboard their craft for medical and in one known case, sexual experiments. That was featured on page 20, and is too detailed to reproduce here.

The magazine also had a TACT section, which dealt with the scientific and searching for life on planets.

It concerned the aims of the USA and other countries searching for what the NEW SCIENCE EXOBIOLOGY means of Radio Astronomy EXTRATERRESTRIALS ON EARTH Section on page 18. In the first issue, we dealt with the phenomenon of the UFO IN BLACK. This was the subject of interest, at the time, of young Beryl Wallace, b

A more frightening multi-witness case occurred in Flatwoods, Virginia on September 12 1952. At sunset on that day a group of boys saw what they took to be a meteor coming down on a nearby hill.

They set off to have a closer look and on the way stopped at the home of Mrs. Kathleen Hill. Mrs. Hill, her two sons, and a 17-year-old National Guardsman called Gene Lemon, joined the boys and made their way to the top of the hill.

The 'meteor', a globe-shaped object as big as a house was emitting a most unmeteor-like throbbing or hissing sound. Next surprise: one of the group noticed a large creature in the branches of a tree and shone his flashlight at it. The light revealed huge (10 or 15 foot) monster with blood-red face and orange eyes. As it seemed to 'float' towards them, they all promptly turned tail and fled hysterically back down the hillside. Many of them were violently sick during the night—presumably the effect of shock.

Next morning the incident was reported to the editor of the local newspaper who came out with several investigators to search the area where the 'thing' had been seen.

They found plenty of traces, including two parallel skid

marks in a circular area of flatland, and all the visitor fled to a strange area which lingered close to the Flatwoods case. The Flatwoods case is one of the many UFO landing sites in which mysterious marks have been found afterwards. The case was accompanied by evidence in the form of footprints, unexplained metals (these are by Government seen again.) They can be substantial evidence for police investigators who have found marks of the kind in the cold light

GENE DUPLANTIER

Gene Duplantier, Ex-Editor of the regular SS&S magazine of Canada, talked recently to a reporter from Mirror Topics on November 10 1971.

When Gene Duplantier was 4 years old, he read Buck Rogers comic strips. "From then on," says the Willowdale commercial artist, "My eyes were really into outer space." When he's not working at his profession, Duplantier delves into another world—the realm of the unknown. Gene Duplantier is a UFO investigator and reporter. Duplantier is editor of Canada's first UFO magazine (editor's note: this was in 1971)—Saucers Space and Science. It had a world-wide readership. "I know they exist. I don't

They could be visiting us. Or even be behind us in development. They are a little flea-bite problem. If we can go out there and see what is so strange about them coming here?

WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT UFO'S

& WHAT THE U. S. GOVERNMENT KNOWS

This article deals primarily about the FAKES, which in the past have been put over to the whole country as fact, by well meaning television stations, and well meaning cameramen.

SUN: Are they real or just pie in the sky? Do they contain beings from other planets spying on Earth, or are they merely tricks of earthbound imaginations?

CNK: IT IS BELIEVED THAT ONLY 1% OF ALL UFO SIGHTINGS HAVE NO EXPLANATION. Therefore we must have an open mind, and BECAUSE THERE IS LIFE ON AT LEAST ONE PLANET IN SPACE, FORMED BY AMINO ACIDS, THEN THERE MUST, AT SOME TIME OR OTHER BE LIFE ELSEWHERE. That planet is the earth-you and me- us! What state of development other planets are in regards life, nobody knows.

SUN: Around 2,000 people throughout the world claim to have met UFO humanoids.

CNK: A FRUSTRATING ANSWER TO THIS. The obvious thing that springs to mind is WHY do it dogedly?

THE GREAT UFO COVER UP from The Sun August 22 1979

BRITISH UFO watchers believe our defence chiefs have held an American cover-up about UFOs.

So far, they say, the Defence Ministry have failed to see an amazing sequence of sightings, some by RAF officers. Dyfed Triangle around St. Bride's Bay in West Wales.

Mrs Pauline Coombs claims she was chased by a UFO as she and her children home to Ripplestone Farm. As she reached it the wiring burnt out. That was in January 1977. Before the year was out she and her husband Billy reported seeing UFO's at a quarters many times.

CNK COMMENT: I think it is odd that after UFO's have been reported in a certain area, they then are never seen in that area for a long time. Isn't that strange! It smacks of a secret government invention being tested out, which when DISCOVERED is quickly withdrawn when it is reported from a 'secret' testing area, or in the night, or at a time when we should be in bed. In other words, a man made machine has not quite ready for use, or will NEVER be revealed due to its very nature. THINK ABOUT IT! Radar was secret at one time. SUN: They also say they saw 7ft tall (approx 2½m) figures glowing silver clothes and helmets.

Across St. Bride's Bay, Mrs Rosa Grenville, an honours officer who runs the Haver Fort Hotel with her husband, Eddie, she saw UFO's land twice. Weird figures got out and prowled around.

At Broadhaven school, 14 children aged between 10 and 12. Their headmaster they had seen a UFO land 200 yards from where they were playing. He separated them and told them to draw what they saw. Their drawings matched. So did their reports. The headmaster Richard Llwhaelin said: "Children of that age are capable of maintaining such an elaborate hoax."

CNK: As if in answer to my above comments we see:-

SUN continued: It is an area bristling with defence establishments, SOME HIGHLY SECRET. (capitals ours). The RAF conducted a flood of reports and said the sightings did not match military operations. (well it wouldn't if it was secret-would it?)

But on June 15, 1977, the then Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Defence, Mr. James Wellbeloved told local Tory M.P. Douglas Edwards --now Mrs. Thatcher's Secretary for Wales-- apart from Mrs Grenville, one report by the Ministry has no record of unusual activity in the area.

RECORD OF THIS ACTIVITY???: If the MOD are SO ALL FIRED CONCERNED ABOUT DEFENCE IMPLICATIONS, THIS COULD WELL HAVE BEEN A SNEAK ATTACK. TUT TUT MOD, ARE YOU ALL ASLEEP IN THERE! SUN, continued : When pressed, a Ministry spokesman told me:

"We accept that reports were made by sane, rational people. A hundred people do not imagine they saw something.

"But no physical evidence was found that anything has happened.

"We only investigate UFOs to find whether there is a threat to our defences.

"If there is no threat, that is the end of the matter. We do not investigate whether UFOs exist or what causes them."

Asked who decided there was no danger to highly sensitive defence areas, the spokesman added: "We are not prepared to discuss how we investigate."

Sun Continued"Only false statements and fictitious reports be published" they were told. "All REAL reports must be kept as secret and forwarded to the appropriate authorities."

CNK: Back in the late 60's and early 70's when on a flight I watch your editor met Warminster's Arthur Shuttlewood, said to me that he had heard that the army in the area given instructions that if a UFO were to crash land in the vicinity, they were to capture it, or and, kill the occupant and get its secret of flight at all costs. Has this happened or what? Is rumour of a captured UFO in a Hangar in the 1950's TRUE. (The Sun continued:)

*IN 1955, the secret services of America and Russia, including Britain, meeting in Geneva, agreed that the public should be told nothing about UFO's.

* WHEN AMERICA'S NAVY Secretary Dan Kimball reported seeing disc-shaped objects circling his plane on a flight to Alaska in 1952, he was told it would be better for him to keep quiet if he wanted to stay in office.

*SUICIDE VERDICTS were recorded on two top US scientists who died after studying UFO's. Professor Robert Jessup was

in a gas-filled car in 1959. Professor James Macdonald died with a bullet in his head in 1971. A friend of Jessup said: "He knew too much. They wanted him out of the way."

The CIA denied any cover-up when approached by Sun reporters. A spokesman said the Agency stopped monitoring UFO's in 1953. But our investigations reveal that CIA agents were still probing UFO's as late as 1975--and telling people they interviewed not to disclose their interest.

And in his book, Von Buttlar says that the CIA have been taking UFO's very seriously, even while maintaining a flood of public denial.

In 1957 a CIA official admitted: "One thing is for sure, were being observed by beings from outer space."

And two inquiries in 1959 and 1969 both reported that a third of all UFO sightings could not be explained away.

If the authorities take UFO's so seriously why don't they admit it?

According to Von Buttlar, it's all a cold war ploy.

From 1945 onwards, Von Buttlar says, both America and Russia were convinced that UFO's were spectacular advanced technology their rivals had captured from the Nazis.

Orders went out to capture one, by shooting it down if necessary.

On January 7, 1948, U.S. Air Force Captain Thomas Mantell closed in fast on a strange silvery object over Fort Knox, Kentucky.

"It's a disc," he radioed to ground staff watching on radar.

"It could be 80 yards in diameter. Upper surface has a ring and a dome...the thing's gigantic. It's flying unbelievably fast. I can see windows.

Now..."

His voice cut out. Wreckage of his plane was found scattered over an area a mile wide.

Immediately a top level inquiry began to see if national security was threatened. The investigators said what Mantell chased was probably a spaceship and urged publication of their report.

Instead Air Force Chief of Staff General Hoyt S. Vandenburg ordered: "Burn it".

CIA leaders decided that if the mystery visitors were from other planets, they must capture a UFO before the Russians did. But they also decided to throw Moscow off

the scent by debunking UFO's. But says Von Buttlar, they reached similar conclusions.

THE SECURITY SHIELD ON BOTH SIDES OF THE IRON CURTAIN WAS REINFORCED AS BOTH NATIONS STEPPED UP THEIR ATTEMPTS TO CAPTURE A UFO.

In 1953, ground radar controllers saw a U.S. plane and it was chasing converge over Lake Michigan - then there only one dot on their screens. No trace of the plane or was ever found.

CNK SAYS: I wonder why in this case, and I'm sure it must have been covered up, that to get at the truth, that there was an incident, investigators should have interviewed the families of the missing pilots. etc. Sometimes a cover up is so intricate according to what I read, that the authorities can even fool you believe the plane in question never even existed.

SUN: A year later, over New York State, the engine of a jet closing in on a UFO inexplicably failed. The crew baled out as their cockpit became unbearably hot, and the jet crashed. In 1957, when Russian anti-aircraft batteries near Moscow opened up on UFO's, the entire electrical system of the missile base went out of action. (CNK adds, this is of PREVENTING a nuclear war--pull the plug out).

Man's new advance into space brought new sightings.

Astronauts James McDivitt and Ed White saw a silver object with antenna as they circled earth aboard Gemini 1V in 1968.

Top NASA experts in Houston dismissed it as their booster rocket in orbit alongside them.

But McDevitt said: "It was in the wrong place at the wrong time for that."

Other US astronauts have reported brightly shining cap on their journeys. But NASA consistently denies that the spacecraft.

Astronaut Gordon Cooper says; "The American Space Agency and Government know very well that intelligent beings from other worlds regularly visit our planet to enter into direct contact and observe us. They have an enormous amount of technology but have kept quiet in order not to alarm people."

Von Buttlar says that when Jimmy Carter was campaigning for presidency, he promised to "reveal all" about UFO's. He never did so.

British UFO experts agree with Von Buttlar that there has been a cover up. Lord Clancarty, founder-president of Contact with the National, the world's largest UFO group told me: "I am sure

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that the truth about UFO's has been kept from the public. And we have gone along with the Americans and Russians. "But now a change is coming,

"In America the Freedom of Information Act is uncovering a great deal of hitherto secret information.

"And the Russians have changed their policy of secrecy. The State newspaper Izvestia is now reporting UFO sightings."

CNK SAYS; Is this only now because no power on earth has been able to capture one, or if it has, can't get it to 'go'. And therefore in frustration have actually turned to the public to HELP?? I wonder!

Isn't it about time the U.K. had its Freedom Of Information Act. Come on Lord Clancartly, don't just sit there—get one off to a good start—introduce a Bill or something. Ufology needs you more than ever while you are in this high position to accomplish some GOOD!—editor. (We have sent him a copy of this. I hope he reads all of this). What the U.S. Government Knows About Unidentified Flying Objects

I do not know who sent me this report. Maybe it was CAUS, USA, also the date is unknown. But hopefully it is fairly recent in the 1970's (1978-9?) It is very welcome at this point in time. INTRODUCTION: PETER A GERSTEN has been pressing the legal effort on behalf of UFO groups—such as CAUS (Citizen's Against UFO secrecy) P.O. Box 4743F, Arlington, Virginia, USA.) for several years. He has been waiting for the release of over two hundred CIA documents relating to UFO's. We hope he now has them. In his statement Peter Gersten says: Over the past third of a century, the government's conduct with regard to UFO's has been characterised as nonfeasance, misfeasance and malfeasance. CAUS is a public-interest group. Formed to foster a review of the reality and significance of UFO's and the governments policies and practices regarding them. He has called on the government to: 1) ADMIT THE PUBLIC HAS BEEN MISLED ABOUT UFO'S. 2) ACKNOWLEDGE THAT UFO'S EXIST. 3) REVERSE ITS POSITION THAT FURTHER SCIENTIFIC STUDY OF UFO REPORTS IS UNWARRANTED. CAUS seeks the immediate declassification and public dissemination of all official UFO documentation. They also believe the public has a right to an objective reappraisal of the implications of the UFO phenomenon. _____ OoOooOoO _____

Extract from WHAT THE US GOVERNMENT KNOWS ABOUT UFOS:-

At Last! New evidence for the existence of unconventional aerial objects relies no longer on the credibility of civilian reports but on the records of scientists, military personnel intelligence analysts, law en-

forcement officers and other reliable people. Their testimony can be found in three thousand pages of previously classified documents on UFOs released recently through the Freedom Of Information Act

over the past few years by the Departments of State/Army/Navy AIR Force/Defense, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the National Security Agency, etc.

This overwhelming evidence indicates that Unidentified Flying Objects DO exist, and that some of them are unconventional craft that (1) pose a threat to national security and (2) perform beyond the range of present day technological development. Furthermore, there is evidence that our government has continually misinformed the public concerning the true significance of the UFO problem.

In late 1952, a memorandum was drafted for CIA Director Walter B. Smith's signature, to be sent to the Executive Secretary of the National Security Council. Subject was: "UFOs! The CIA had reviewed the situation which caused speculation in the press, and had been subject of concern!

It was the Director's opinion, based on the review, that "this situation has possible implications for our security which transcended the interests of a single service. I therefore recommend that this Agency and agencies of the Department of Defense be directed to formulate and carry out a program of intelligence and research required to solve the problem of instant positive identification of unidentified flying objects." A draft of a proposed Nat-

ional Security Council directive was attached to the memorandum.

Unfortunately, it appears that the NSC directive fell by the wayside. Now, twenty-nine years later, the 'current situation' contrary to official denial still poses serious implications for our national security.

UFO'S AS A THREAT

THE government's position: "NO UFO REPORTED, INVESTIGATED AND EVALUATED BY THE AIR FORCE HAS EVER GIVEN AN INDICATION OF A THREAT TO OUR NATIONAL SECURITY." -US Air Force 1980.

The evidence:

DOD, USAF, and CIA documents reveal that during October, November, and December of 1975, reliable military personnel repeatedly sighted unconventional objects in the vicinity of nuclear-weapons storage areas, aircraft alert areas, and missile-control facilities at Loring Air Force Base, Maine; Wurtsmith AFB, Michigan; Malstrom AFB, Montana; Minot AFB, North Dakota; and Canadian Air Forces Station, Ontario. Many of the sightings were confirmed by radar. At Loring AFB, the interloper demonstrates a clear intent on the weapon storage areas."

The incidents drew the attention of the CIA and other departments. Though the USAF informed the public and the press that individual sightings were isolated incidents, a USAF document says that "Security measures were coordinated with 15 Air Force bases from Guam to Newfoundland. It also reveals that the USAF conducted an investigation into the incidents but found no explanation for their occurrence.

It appears USAF 'security measures' provided no protection against the 'invasion'. One month later, on January 21, 1976, UFOs 25 yards in diameter, gold or silver in color, with blue light on top, hole in middle, and red light in bottom" were observed near the flight line of Cannon AFB, New Mexico. Ten days later, on Jan-

uary 21, a UFO was observed near radar site at Elgin AFB, Florida. On July 30, 1976, a UFO was observed 'over the ammo storage area' at Fort Richie, Maryland.

BI documents have revealed that throughout the years UFO's have been sighted by persons whose reliability is not questioned. 'near highly sensitive military and government installations including nuclear weapons

design, construction, testing and stockpiling sites.

Security officials were greatly alarmed by these incidents.

The evidence is clear and convincing that the Federal government has systematically misinformed the American people about the real threat to our national security posed by such UFO encounters.

UFO AS ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY

The government's position: "THERE HAS BEEN NO EVIDENCE SUBMITTED TO OR DISCOVERED BY THE US, AIR FORCE THAT SIGHTINGS CATEGORIZED AS 'UNIDENTIFIED' REPRESENT TECHNOLOGICAL DEVELOPMENTS OR PRINCIPLES BEYOND THE RANGE OF PRESENT-DAY SCIENTIFIC KNOWLEDGE." U.S. AIR FORCE, 1980

Official documents have revealed many unconventional objects exhibiting advanced performance, of speed, size and shape, and maneuverability

A defense document reveals that on Sept. 19, 1976, American-made Iranian jets encountered several UFOs that exhibited a technology beyond present-day development. During the nighttime encounter, one F-4 jet, upon approaching one of the UFOs, lost all instrumentation and communications functions. Another F-4's weapons-control panel became inoperable when

the pilot attempted to fire at the object.

The DIA evaluation officer refers to this incident as an "outstanding report," because the objects were seen by many witnesses of high credibility; the visual sightings had radar confirmation, similar electromagnetic effects were reported by three separate aircraft and physiological effects were reported by some of the crew members. Furthermore, the UFOs displayed an "inordinate amount of maneuverability."

A State Dept. message (March 7, 1957 from the American embassy in Algiers tells of "Strange machines" seen near Algerian military installations by "respectable people. Some of the sightings were confirmed by radar. Another message from the US Embassy in Kuwait said that: (Nov '78) One UFO appearing over the northern oil fields "seemingly did strange things" to the pumping equipment. The pump is designed to shut down automatically if any failure occurs that could damage it. When the UFO appeared it shut down; But when the UFO "vanished" the system started up again automatically.

The presence of a highly sophisticated technology beyond our present-day

development-seems obvious so WHY IS IT BEING IGNORED BY THE U.S. GOVERNMENT?

A QUESTION OF SURVIVAL

"IT WOULD SEEM A LITTLE MORE OF THIS SURVIVAL ATTITUDE IS CALLED FOR IN DEALING WITH THE UFOs. -National Security Agency 1968.

The evidence shows that some unconventional aerial object could provoke, intentionally or unintentionally, and international incident-with serious repercussions. In March 1967, an intercept technician with the USAF Security Service intercepted a communication between the pilot of a Russian made Cuban MIG-21 and his command concerning a UFO encounter. The technician has since stated that when the pilot attempted to fire at the object, the MIG and its pilot were destroyed by the UFO. Furthermore, the technician alleges that all reports, tapes, etc., were forwarded to the National Security Agency at their request. Not surprisingly later they issued a report UFO HYPOTHESIS AND SURVIVAL QUESTION (Oct 1979) under the U.S. Freedom of Info. Act. It says: "The leisurely scientific approach has too often taken precedence in dealing with the UFO question."

The Agency concluded that no matter what UFO hypothesis is considered, "all of them have serious survival implications."

Comparing the UFO problem to a rattlesnake on a forest path, the NSA report says, "you would have to treat the alarm as if it were a real and immediate threat to your survival. Investigation would become an intensive emergency action to isolate the threat and to determine its precise nature. It would be geared to developing adequate defense measures in a minimum amount of time. It would seem a little more of this survival attitude is called for in dealing with the UFO problem.

THE U.S. GOVERNMENT AND UFOs "FURTHER SCIENTIFIC INVESTIGATION OF UFOs IS UNWARRANTED. U.S. Air Force, 1980

Most disturbing is that after 32 years, a small percentage of UFOs still remains unidentified. The government has been concerned with the psychological danger of UFOs but has been unwilling to consider the prospect some UFOs pose an ACTUAL physical threat. Fearful of this, the government deliberately chooses to debunk UFO reports and has misinformed the public as to the true importance of the phenomenon.

UFOs that have done all that you have just read about-DOES WARRANT further scientific study. Awareness of an advanced technology

and potential threat is not an unreasonable pursuit. As the NAS agency indicates, it could be a matter of survival.

This document sent to CNK from 'someone' about 1981, I think, goes on to say that the now defunct USAF 20-year old PROJECT BLUE BOOK UFO STUDY never had a chance to receive the 'outstanding report' from Iran.

An Air Force document states:

"Reports of UFOs which could affect national security are made in accordance with JANAP 146 or Air Force Manual 55-11 and are not part of the Blue Book system." The Air Force's investigations were criticised as long ago as 1952 by the CIA. They complained that the U.S. Air Force's case-by-case investigations and explanations, were insufficient to determine the exact nature of the phenomenon." The Air Force's sponsored "Condon Committee" study by the University of Colorado in 1968 never earnestly intended to investigate the physical reality of the phenomenon. Indeed, an early memorandum by one of Dr. Edward U. Condon's staff indicates otherwise:

"The trick would be I think to describe the project so that to the public, it would appear a totally objective study...one way to do this would be to stress investigation, not of the physical phenomenon, but rather of the people who

...e doing the observing.."

CONCLUSION

In June 1978, a French government UFO study group (EPAN) concluded that "everything taken into consideration, a material phenomenon seems to be behind the totality of the phenomenon- a flying machine whose modes of sustenance and propulsion are beyond our knowledge."

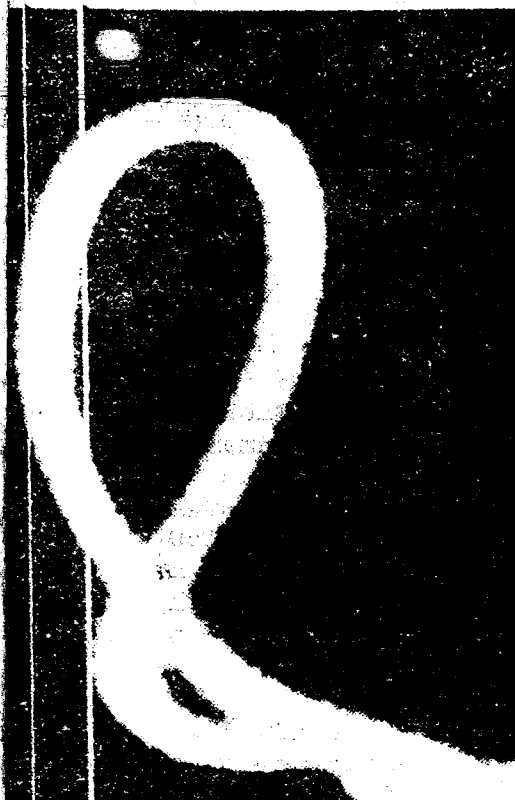
If the UFO phenomenon is indeed beyond the grasp of our understanding-technologically speaking-all the more reason to strive towards learning more about it. For although the United States may ignore the significance of the UFO phenomenon, it is hardly reasonable to suppose that the rest of the world will do so.

And there are other considerations besides national security in following up the UFO enigma. As a report from the National Security Agency in 1968 put it,

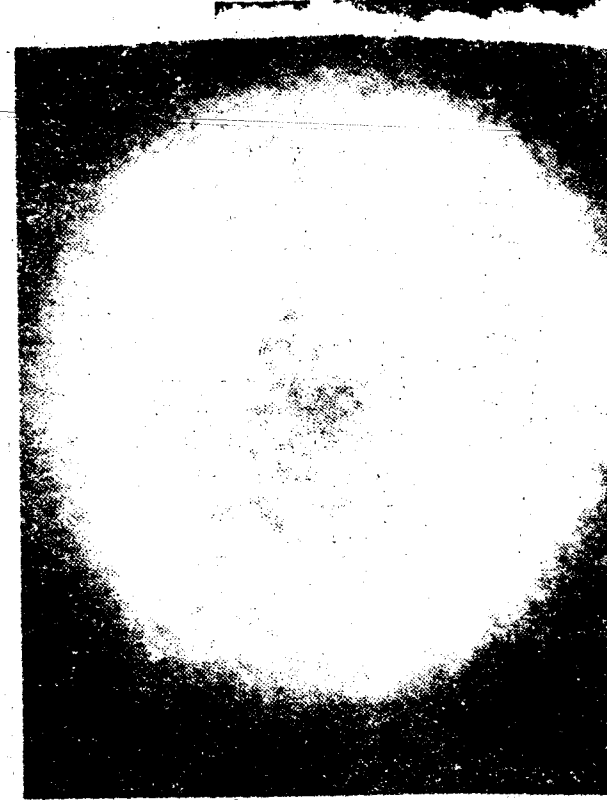
"Perhaps the UFO question might even make man undertake studies which could enable him to construct a society which is more conducive to developing a completely human being, healthy in all aspects of mind and body-and, most importantly, able to recognise and adapt to real environmental situations."

In isolating ourselves from the UFO phenomenon we may risk missing what could be the most important adventure man has yet embarked upon..

UFO flight path in New Zealand last year



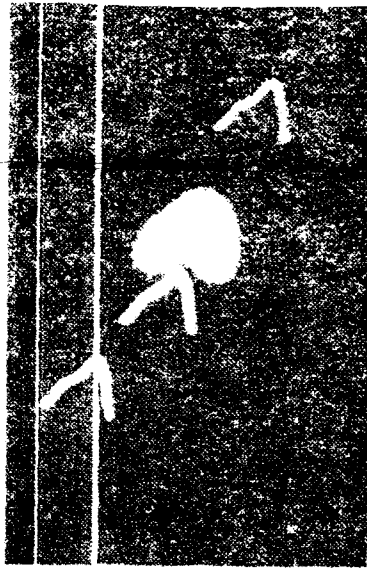
A UFO filmed for television in New Zealand last Jan

PART TWO: WHAT WE HAVE DISCOVERED ABOUT UFOS. Unmasking the fakes. In the next pages are some recent UFO pictures and some older ones. We would like to pass comments on them, and hopefully the reader may agree with us. If not, let us hear from you as to why?

IN 1978, two New Zealand cameramen, obviously using a video or similar camera, took what they thought was a UFO. Well maybe there was one. But the shot they also took with their camera might have been a bright planet. I have had the SAME effects on such equipment. Some video cameras tend to make streaks out of sharp bright lights. We do not think that the reproduced photo of the New Zealand sighting, which was announced on TV at the time, was a UFO flight path. We believe it was a television camera STREAK image. Therefore in our opinion this is a fake, unintentionally.

I believe that, 99.9% of all UFO sightings are seen at NIGHT. The very rare appearances these objects make in the daylight make up the rest. How can therefore, the media who print photos like the ones above declare for a FACT that the squiggle on the left is a "flight path of a UFO"? Were they THERE! It was ASSUMED too, the photo on the right, was nothing more than an out of focus shot of a lighthouse some miles away. As I remember it, the path of the aircraft was followed the next day, and several normal everyday items could account for these two photos above. Until further evidence come out of hiding, we will assume these are camera blurbs. Unless of course, you know better!

Photo, Left. This one could also be said to be due to a camera error. But although it would be nice to be able to explain away this one as that, there still is an air of mystery about the line formation which could not account for a camera image effect. Of course, it may have been a genuine UFO which is OUT OF FOCUS anyway. As I have not seen the original story or negatives, or film. it is really guesswork.

'UFO's (right) These could very well BE clouds. On first sight, without having access to originals, the feeling is these ARE clouds made Saucer Shaped due to atmospheric anomalies, i.e. low air pressure, and spiralling air currents. Shadows and heavy water

I do not know if they have street lamps in Iran of this shape an enterprising student need not have made his clever fake in Iran. I have seen many photos of UFO's since 1954, and have not seen one shaped like this. In fact, I produced a similar 'UFO' on a video camera sometime ago when trying to tape the night. I aimed the lens at a bright object, and when I focused, a rather blurred image, similar to the one above, appeared which was reflected from a rather dirty pane of glass in my garden shed. The 'windows' in this object may be air vents to let out surplus heat of the lamp. Most street lights are now made in white plastic material. Again, I do not have the whole story that went with this photo, or the original negative. Therefore, unless CNK has any more 'evidence' on this one, we are saying it is nothing more than a hoax.

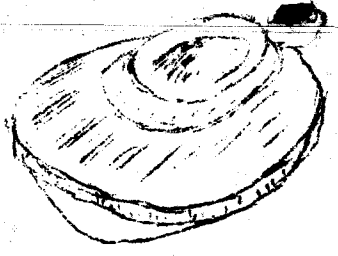
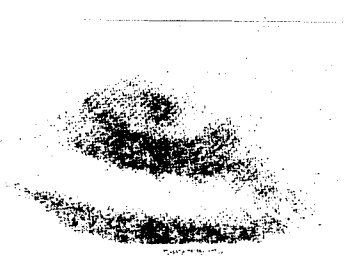


Seen from a plane: Staffordshire, 1966

This could well be a very clever fake of a street light. It is always painful when a student is involved, as I could well be in the mood for some playful. If you turn the photo upside down you will see I mean.

This is a classic. I do NOT know why this is classified as a UFO. There are TWO possible explanations. 1. It is in reality the shadow of the aircraft distorted by cloud and wind glass, giving a UFO effect, or 2. It may be a Soviet airship of giant size, which has been known to operate at very high altitudes.

ASTRONOMY: arrival of HALLEY'S comet

COMBINED REPORT & INFORMATION FROM
Edward Harris, Editor, York Astronomical Society, and Gene Duplantier, Canada.

FRUSTRATING AND EXCITING, is the arrival of Halley's comet. Frustrating for those, like the editor here, who has no decent astronomical instruments to take advantage of it, save an attempt to use a video camera on the night sky. Exciting because it is such a rare event.

As far as my memory goes into it, Halley's comet was first recorded on the Bayeux Tapestry in 1066 at the Battle of Hastings was in full swing. This is a very long length of cloth which depicts the battle, embroidered into the pictures.

THE RETURN OF HALLEY'S COMET reproduced from NOVA ALGOL publication of the York Astronomical Society. spring 1985. Olav Wilde.

Halley's comet is on its way back. It should become visible to the naked eye in December. It will be a chance for observers to observe the comet, if they have not already done so. Unfortunately observers in the Northern Hemisphere (like us) won't be able to get a brilliant view of the comet due to unfavourable approach, which places the comet between us and the comet at Perihelion.

However it will be visible to the naked eye low down in the South by early 1986,

According to our expert behind our telescopes, Trevor Bond, we should be able to see down to magnitude +13, plus or minus magnitude depending on sky conditions, therefore it will be around mid August that we may get our first glance at the comet through one of our main telescopes. Then over the next few months its position can be plotted among the stars and notes made of its gradual

brightness.

It's funny that after all these thousands(?) of years that Halley's Comet has come and gone, retaining all its mysteries, that it should be on this return that we are going to confront it head on, literally, as Giotto, ESA's Halley probe will actually dive straight into the comet on a Kamikazi mission. Four or five spacecraft will try and discover the secrets of our regular visitor. (It would be interesting to see what technology, if any, can come up with next time the comet comes round. Who knows, maybe Man will be advanced enough in centuries to come, to actually be able to CAPTURE the comet, perhaps by using magnetic stabilising fields. Then not only will we KNOW how it is formed, but Man will have a cheap source of electrical power. For this comet, it does appear to be a kind of Atomic fusion, which scientists can only dream about producing on Earth-I speak from a Science fiction-cum-fact standpoint-EDITOR). PS. It might even give a clue as to its propulsion in space.)

The York Astronomical Society may even go outside the city of York, to observe the comet from dark, unobserved areas to get a clear horizon because you won't see much (anything!) sat in the middle of a city. (seeing the comet on TV is nothing like seeing it in real life, what was it that President Kennedy said?).

If you have a camera drive it will be an ideal chance to use it (or build one) so that you can take shots of the comet over the months of its apparition. Even a short undriven exposure will show the comet.

The comet is strange in that it links^{us} with our ancient ancestors and just for a while all those years between us will disappear. In this sense, Halley's Comet is Timeless. But one thing is for sure, if you don't make an effort to observe it this time round it will probably be the last chance you ever get.

*****ONLY 14 MILLION YEARS TO DOOMSDAY*****

In Gene Duplantier new magazine called DEUVE, No.1
1985 which we received on the day I typed this, May 9,
is this interesting bit on Halley's Comet by Roger
C. Moldander called: ONLY 14 MILLION YEARS UNTIL
DOOMSDAY. (Thanks Gene this came just in time for this
article): =note due to length, we have shortened it).
"Halley's Comet appeared in 1066, on the eve of the
Norman invasion of England. It cuts a striking figure
in a contemporary tapestry woven to celebrate the con-
quest, altogether more moving than our 1910 photograph
of its last visit. (article about comets in general)

In fairly short order-we may find -say, in 14 million
years time-we may find ourselves similarly transfixed.
Not, mind you, by Halley's comet. This "friendly" visitor
has been tracked since 240BC., we enlightened moderns have
no reason to fear it. But scientists have recently made a
case for periodic cycles, of perhaps a million years each,
in which a billion-odd comets flash through the solar sys-
tem, with odd of two dozen direct hits on the Earth, throwing
enough dust into the upper atmosphere to block out the sun
and thus destroying life forms on the surface. Sounds fam-
iliar? Like the nuclear winter we could bring on ourselves.
But turn away from the doomsday clock now set by atomic
scientists at four minutes to midnight. The Doomsday clock
has been set forward, from 5 billion years to 14 million,
not by any human malice or intent. The cause is uncertain,

but the evidence for the battering that the Earth has taken
at intervals is undeniable:

There are peaks of cratering in its crust and peaks of ex-
tinction of its species (75% of all species in worst cases)
that coincide roughly every 26 million years in our planet's
history. And we are almost halfway through the current
breathing space.

There are two bodies of thought about the cause. One
postulates a sister dwarf sun, which at its closest approach
to our sun is every 26 million years shakes comets loose
from (area well outside our galaxy-editor)-from the Oort cloud
on the outer fringe of the solar system, and hurles a barrage
of them through our neighbourhood.

The other cites a period of about 31 million years and ex-
plains the cycle by the periodic movement of the solar system
through the plane of the Milky Way galaxy.

The binary star theory is more aesthetically satisfying-
the death star is called Nemesis after the Greek goddess who
persecutes the "excessively rich, proud, and powerful." The
dinosaurs are the best known ruling class to fall victim to
such persecution, and they disappeared in relatively short
order 65 million years ago. The classical overlay works well
if you remember that the Latin roots of our word "disaster"
are "evil star." Whatever the cause, the effects are enorm-
ous. Imagine a million years in which all eyes on Earth turn
towards the heavens, where perhaps a billion "dirty snowballs"
are flashing by. Quite a show, until the most disasterous
of the likely two dozen direct hits.

The ancients may yet be right in making comets a portent
of disaster in the affairs of men. But we will kill the Earth
long before the universe gets to it. What this latest news
flash from the science front demands is a major rethinking
of the cosmos and our place in it. It seems that we might
start with rethinking what defense means, in a cosmos where
our worst enemy is decidedly not other human beings.
We must think in terms of the Earth. We might need a star
wars system to save us from the death star. We might want
a battle station orbiting Pluto, maybe a brace of them around
Jupiter a dozen orbiting the sun. And we have only got 14
million years to bring it off.

Too bad it isn't a 100 years. It might concentrate the mind
to prepare for the universe pitching rocks at us in the year
2084.

1957, I founded the Interplanetary Space Travel Research, and that when we voted you in to be president in about 1966-7, you ran it so well, you became president for life, and I ended up producing other NON science fiction mags. I am writing to you, after writing two letters to R.A.F. St Mawgan, in Newquay, Cornwall. These letters were sent to the Air Base during May and July, this year.

The subject of this correspondence dealt with brief details of a reported UFO sighting, that was observed very close to this Air Force Base earlier this year.

Their replies to me, and my then Organisation, Plymouth UFO Investigation Centre (PUF0IC), they told me that they had forwarded both my letters onto "the M.O.D. in London", which I presume is yourself. They apparently decided to do this, after taking advice from Headquarters of Provost and Security Services (U.K.). They stated that I would hear from you, however as to date I have not done so.

Because of the length of time taken from first contacting the Area Military Authorities, and the apparent lack of progress, I have decided to write to ask whether your department has in fact, received my previous two letters to R.A.F. St Mawgan? (The Ref .. PUF0IC 38/85).

If this 'reported UFO Sighting' had not been observed so close to a strategic Military Air Base, I would have waited for another few weeks, before writing to you. However, this is a sighting which was observed less than one mile (1.609Km) away from the Air Base. From directions given to us from the witness, we calculate that whatever this phenomenon was, it might very well have passed through the Air Force Base itself.

In our early stages of our investigations into this case, we thought that this phenomenon might have landed, or hit the ground and nearby trees in an area close to the base, but we found out two possible causes for the burned areas of grass and trees, and have now dismissed the 'landing' theory from our enquiries. But, we do know the phenomenon came very close to the ground, and minor roads because of what the witness stated, and we have discovered a tree, close to the sighting area and fire damaged trees and ground which has obviously been hit by an airborne object of some mass, hitting the tree at some speed. We know this from damaged major twigs of the tree which have been examined.

I do not believe in wasting postage money in sending reports to you about mere 'Lights in the sky, etc', but this sighting proves to be very different from most of the reports we receive. The tree which was 'hit' was only 20ft (6.09M) tall, and was hit at a height of 15ft (4.57M).

There is a possibility that it hit the tree, prior to being seen. It also nearly hit the car the witness was travelling in, and could have caused an accident! The phenomenon bobbed and weaved about the road, above the hedgerow to the tarmac on the road.

I am sure you will agree to my concern over this sighting, which was obviously not an aircraft. I also doubt the possibility of a stray missile although after the fiasco at the American Air Force Base in Suffolk a few years ago, this explanation is always a possibility!

I hope that you will be able to deal with this letter soon, taking into consideration the time I have waited since May. Because of my research into 'U.F.O's' I belong to BUFORA, who you will be aware of. They, some local people and a Fleet Street journalist are becoming concerned at the lack of progress and identification of this phenomenon. My own concern is the danger to the local people and housing etc, if a similar phenomenon were to collide with a habitable building, or even a car.

There are some similarities between this case, and the one at USAF Woodbridge, Suffolk. Information gained by Investigators was confused by the American way of dealing with 'Public Relations', but I would hope that this is not the case with this sighting.

The two Officers who dealt with my letters were ... Flt Lt **Section 40** and Flying Officer **Section 40**

Lastly, although I was the previous Chairman of PUFOIC I have since moved to Cheshire to take up a post. However I have been asked to continue the investigation of this sighting because of my now close distance to BUFORA's Director of Investigations (Manchester). I have sent a letter to R.A.F. St Mawgan, telling them of this change of address, since to my original letter to them in May.

Further to my letter of 24 July, I am now writing to enquire if there is any possibility of the Ministry releasing to me a sketch of an unidentified object which was made by PC [redacted] at Stanmore, Middlesex, on the night of 26 April 1984.

I understand from Scotland Yard Press Bureau that a full report of the incident (which involved at least half a dozen police officers and four witnesses) was sent to the MoD and Civil Aviation Authority. [redacted], the Police Area Press Officer (Harrow) told me that the sketch would not be released, and that this was more properly a matter for the MoD.

In view of the Ministry's oft-repeated statement that no defence significance has been found to date, I am puzzled why a drawing of a flying saucer should remain classified, especially since the officer concerned has given a detailed description to the newspapers.

Thank you for your letter of 6 January 1985, I am sorry that I have been unable to reply before now.

With regard to the concern you express about the book "Sky Crash", the only information we have on the alleged "UFO sighting" at Rendlesham Forest in December 1980 is the report by Colonel Charles Halt, of the United States Air Force. We are satisfied that the events described are of no defence significance. I can assure you that there is no question of attempting to cover up any incident or mishap, nor are we attempting in any way to obscure the truth.

Under the rules laid down by the Public Records Acts, files must remain closed until 30 years have elapsed since the last action taken on them. The earliest UFO files of which we have records are dated 1962. However, any files which do remain from 1954, or earlier, may be obtained direct from the Public Records Office at Ruskin Avenue, Kew, Richmond, Surrey TW9 4DU.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we have not carried out a study into the scientific significance of these phenomena. Unless there are defence implications we do not attempt to identify sightings and we cannot inform observers of the probable identity of the object seen. The Department could not justify the expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond the pure defence interests.

We have to recognise that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky, but we believe there are adequate explanations for them. They may be satellite debris re-entering the earth atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or many other things.

Whilst I appreciate your concern about the possibility of an aircraft colliding with a UFO, I can assure you that RAF pilots and crews are well aware of the dangers of collision with any identified object including such things as hang-gliders and even birds. Procedures are therefore designed to protect aircraft, as far as possible, from this kind of risk. I am sure similar standards are applied by the CAA in respect of civil aircraft.

Since our interest in UFOs is limited to possible defence implications we have not carried out a study into the scientific significance of these phenomena. The Department could not justify the expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond the pure defence interests. I am afraid we could not therefore undertake to provide you with information on sightings in the Boulmer area. Nevertheless, we are prepared to release reports of specific incidents on request and if there are any recent cases in which you have a particular interest, I would be happy to see if we have any information.

1. As you will see from Reference A (copy attached), Lord Trefgarne has agreed to meet Lord Hill-Norton to discuss UFO's. MEETING BETWEEN US of S(AF) AND LORD HILL-NORTON

UFOs

a. I accept that there are strange phenomena to be seen in the sky, however I believe there to be adequate explanations for them. Experience has shown that most reported sightings can be attributed to things such as aircraft, meteorological balloons or natural phenomena like ball lightning. Of course there are many other equally straightforward explanations. However, there are a small number of cases where a simple explanation cannot be found immediately and on these occasions we are careful to ensure ^{so far as possible} that they are of no Defence significance. Having satisfied ourselves of this, as you know, we do not attempt any further investigations. Clearly some reports remain unexplained but we have found no evidence that these phenomena represent a threat to national security and therefore cannot justify devoting Defence resources to their investigation.

b. All reports received by the MOD are channelled through Sec(AS)2. They are passed to the Air Staff who examine them for Air Defence implications. In some cases, where (on the face of it) there could be a defence interest, enquiries are made of relevant radar establishments etc in order to obtain more information. All reports are also passed to the Defence Intelligence organisation who have a keen interest in any sightings of unusual objects. We have no specialist group in Whitehall or anywhere else involved in UFO's and no civilian advisers ^{other than Sec(AS)2} are involved.

The Flying Complaints Flight at Rudloe Manor are concerned with receiving and investigating flying complaints. In the course of their duties they occasionally receive UFO reports (as do many other units) but they have no specific role with regard to this subject.

Secretariat (Air Staff) is the Division which provides secretariat support to CAS and the Air Staff and in this capacity is responsible for correspondence with members of the public and answering PQs etc on many subjects, including UFO's. Sec(AS)2 is the branch which amongst other things handles UFO's, there is no such branch as Air Staff Secretariat 8. You may be thinking of Defence Secretariat 8 which no longer exists and from which Sec(AS) evolved as a result of reorganisation of MOD last January.

c. Many of the UFO reports received in MOD come through Defence establishments, although most of these come originally from members of the public. Very few reports are made by military pilots; for instance, in the last 12 months Sec(AS) has received only one such report.

e. The Department is happy to release what information we have on specific incidents. However we could not justify the effort involved in searching for or collating information of a more general nature.

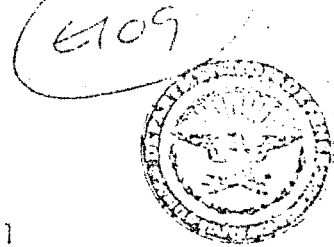

SUBJECT: Unexplained Lights

TO: RAF/CC

1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsing red light on top and a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.

2. The next day, three depressions 1 1/2" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.

3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10° off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

UFOs - RECORDS HELD BY PRO - ENQUIRY FROM MR R NOYES

1. I attach a copy of a letter I have received from a Mr Ralph Noyes concerning UFO's. I also enclose a copy of my reply. Mr Noyes is an ex Head of DS8 and retired from the MOD as an AUS in the late seventies, he is a regular correspondent on UFO matters and, because of his background, is quite influential in "UFO" circles.

2. As you will see, he raises two points on which I should be grateful for your advice. The first concerns 2 reports which he claims to have obtained from the Public Records Office. In view of our often repeated assertion that our records only go back to 1962 (a line which I believe you have confirmed in the past) this could clearly become slightly embarrassing. I therefore feel that we should try to identify exactly what files PRO still hold on the subject and perhaps you could suggest the best way of doing this. In the meantime I propose to take the same line with other correspondents as I have in the attached.

3. Mr Noyes' second point is a request for information relating, I assume, to events in 1956. If he was shown photographs in 1970 as he claims it may be that these files have also been retained. I have told him that we would need further information in order to identify these incidents but I am sure that more details will be forthcoming. However, if you are able to shed any light on the "clips", or indeed, the incidents themselves at this stage, I would be most interested to know.

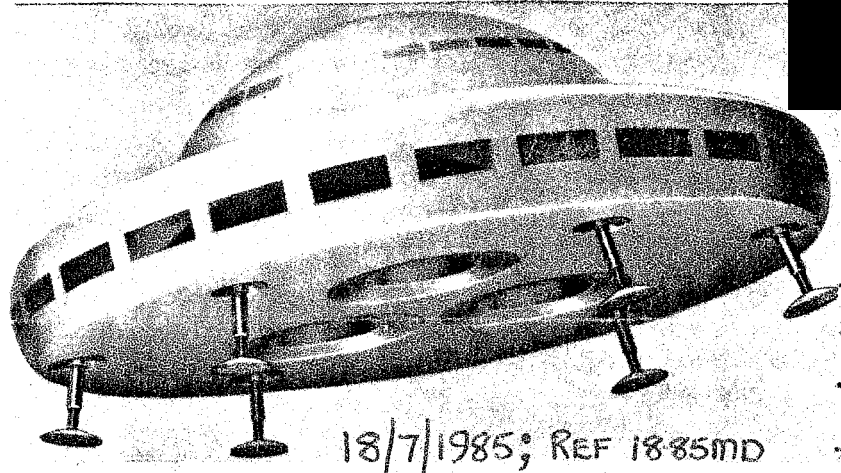

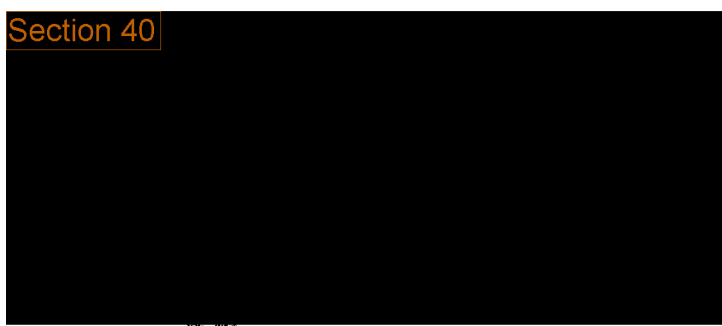

UNUSUAL OCCURRENCE (UFO?)

1. On Monday 5 Aug 1985 **Section 40** CLATFORD who farms near the AAC Centre, Middle Wallop telephoned to report some extraordinary depressions in a field of near ripe wheat, and asked, "What on earth we (THE AAC) were up to now?" I took the Aircraft Accident Investigation Officer (AIFSO) Maj **Section 40** REME with me and went to inspect the scene.

2. The site, Grid Reference 346392 was a vergin, un-weather damaged, near ripe field of wheat. We found the following:

a. An exactly circular hole in the wheat in which the wheat had been laid flat in a clockwise twist 40 ft in diameter. (As if a plank had been put with one end at the centre and then swept round in a complete circle). There were one or two stalks of wheat standing which had sprung upright again. The wheat on the edge of the circle was completely upright and undamaged.

b. Four separate, smaller circles approx twelve feet in diameter, exactly similar to the larger one. These were set in a precise square, NORTH/SOUTH and EAST/WEST, with their centres 43 paces from the centre of the large circle.

c. There were absolutely no tracks in the wheat. To have set the holes in such a precise pattern manually would have required a tape measure or string, and the users would have been bound to leave tracks in the wheat.

d. All but one of the holes touched onto the main furrows in the wheat, and could therefore be approached from the edge of the field without leaving tracks. However there was no way of moving from one to the other without leaving tracks in the wheat, except by going some 200 yards to the edge of the field, and then back down another main furrow. One of the smaller holes was completely isolated.

3. Maj **Section 40** took some polaroid photographs which are included with this report. **Section 40** a semi professional photographer, took some 120mm colour photographs. I subsequently took **Section 40** and we photographed the scene from the air. By that time some half a dozen sight-seers were on the scene and a track, which had not been there when we were on the ground, had been made out to the isolated hole.

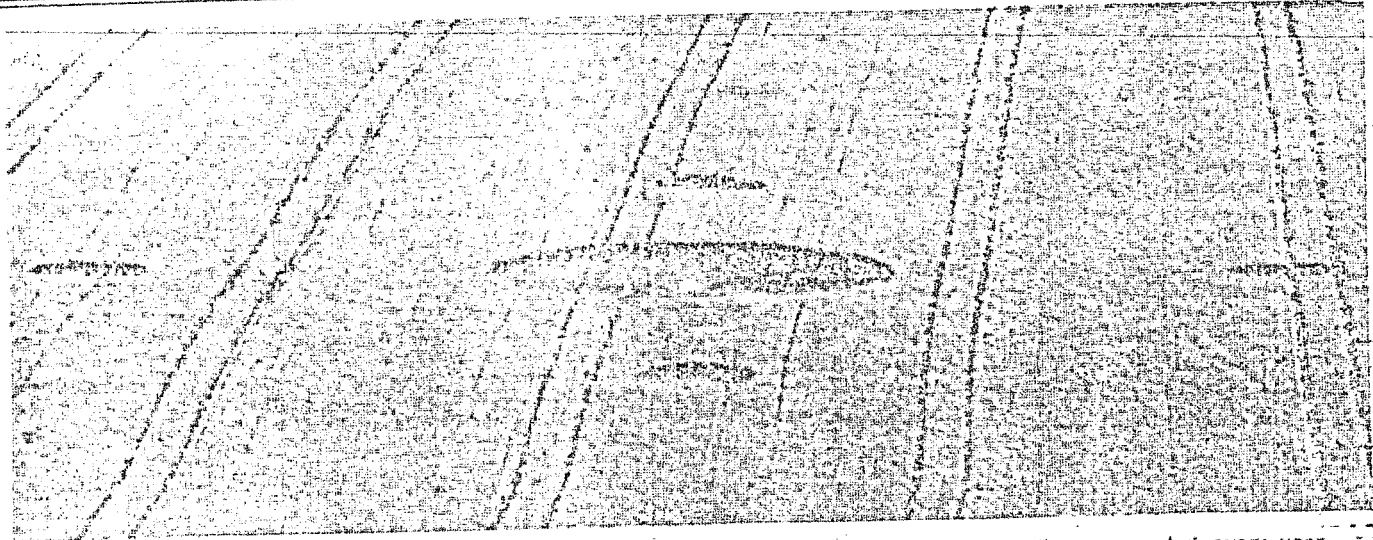
Founder's Day at Hordle House School

The school was open for parents to walk round, and the working models and computer displays in the Science Laboratory attracted great interest. Most of these had been made by senior children, and the exhibition in the Art Department was much admired.

Picnic lunches were eaten in the grounds, and the parents' cricket team, captained by Mr. Peter Tilby, home on leave from Nigeria, was defeated by the school 1st XI by 16 runs. The balance of parental power was restored by the ladies' shooting team scoring 357 against the school's 296, and justice was maintained by the tennis match ending in a draw.



It's happened again! The Mystery Circles have returned. Nobody knows why or whence they come, but every year since the last war, the perfectly regular circles have appeared somewhere. For the last five or six years, they have materialised between Alresford and Winchester, first at Cheesefoot Head, this year at Matherley Farm, just off the A31. Similar phenomena have been reported in Australia, Canada, Sweden and in other parts of the British Isles including Westbury and Warminster. The largest in this group is about 40 feet across, the rest are 11 or 12 feet. In each the corn is swirled clockwise round the rings, whilst outside it is untouched. Normally — if anything about them can be called normal — they are in this configuration, the largest in the centre of a square, the smaller at each corner, although in 1982 at Cheesefoot, there were only three in a straight line. Theories abound about the cause, from vandalism to UFOs by way of micro-tornadoes. The truth is, we just don't know, but if they run true to form they will be back next year . . .

Thank you for your letter of 17th July about our correspondence on the UFO question. I would greatly welcome an off-the-record talk with you. Parliament rises on Tuesday, but I would be delighted to come up to London at any mutually convenient date during August when you have had time to consider this letter and to take any further briefing from officials which you think might be useful. (Perhaps your office would care to be in touch with me by telephone at my home address Tel: **Section 40**)

It may be helpful if I list the questions which I, at any rate, would like to explore. I know you will understand that I do not ask them frivolously or without a good deal of careful thought about the evidence - or supposed evidence - which appears to exist for a persistent phenomenon which, as I see it at present, cannot be wholly without Defence significance. I need hardly add that if there were sensitive Defence questions at issue, I would be the last to press them in public.

The ground which I hope we might cover in an informal discussion is indicated by the following questions:

- a. Does the Ministry of Defence acknowledge - by way of reports from the public, the civil police, the Civil Aviation Authority, other civil authorities or its own establishments - that traces are obtained from time to time of the intrusion into British airspace (and sometimes territory) of phenomena for which no prosaic explanation can be given? (I should add that although I am always willing to be dissuaded, the evidence accumulated by civilian researchers for the persistence of some such phenomena - amounting on occasion to apparently structured 'vehicles' - seems to me at present overwhelming. I shall be glad to give you instances. The events reported by Lt. Col. Halt of the United States Air Force in a report to your Department dated 13th January 1981 are among them).

- b. Assuming, as I hope, that the Ministry of Defence does not ignore the reports reaching it (and we have been told in reply to Parliamentary questions that they amount to some hundreds a year from civilian sources alone), what steps are taken by the Department to investigate them? In particular:-
- i) Are they dealt with solely ad hoc, using routine staff channels? or is there some specialist group, either within the Whitehall establishment or elsewhere, which is charged with taking an expert view? If so, to whom do they report? And what is their composition? Do they include civilian advisers from outside your Department?
 - ii) What part is played, if any, by the Flying Complaints Flight at RAF Rudloe Manor?
 - iii) What part, if any, is played by Air Staff Secretariats 2 & 8?
- c. How many of the reports of unusual phenomena have been received from Defence establishments, including reports from the pilots of military aircraft?
- d. What material does your Department have of traces left on military radar or in photographic form either from sorties by military aircraft or from ground-based or ship-based facilities?
- e. Can any such material be released either to me or to responsible persons outside your Department for purposes of scientific study?

In troubling you with these questions I am well aware that their subject matter has often been thought easy to ridicule, especially when associated with some of the wilder notions which are current among the civilian research groups. I am not wedded to any particular theory myself. I do, on the other hand, believe that there is overwhelming evidence for a persistent phenomenon of a highly unusual character. This is, at the least, of considerable scientific interest; and I have not yet heard anything from your Department which convinces me that it is wholly without Defence significance. I would be reassured to know either that it is being adequately gripped as a Defence matter (and, if so, by precisely what means) or that material held by your Department can be release

to serious civilian researchers under arrangements which do not impose unacceptable administrative burdens.

Thank you again for the offer of a discussion. I look forward to our talk.

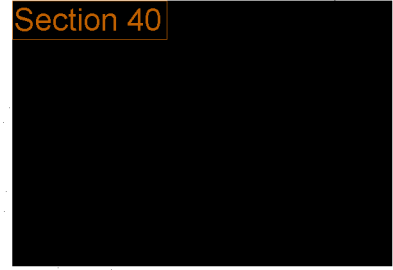

- 3) Does R.A.F. Chivenor agree that this multi-witness sighting of an unknown, portray, unusual airborne light configurations? and what in the opinion of Chivenor, do you feel the lights were representative of?

Thank you very much for your helpful letter of 10 July 1985 in reply to mine of 18 May 1985.

I am grateful to you for having gone to the trouble of providing me with a list of sightings reported from all sources for the period 1978-1984, but note that my question remains unanswered. While I realise that my request for the number of military sightings from 1959-1984 was a tall order, I still need to have some idea of the number of these - particularly concerning the RAF - in a given period. May I therefore re-phrase my question as follows: How many reports of UFOs have been made by RAF personnel from 1965-1975? If that's too time-consuming, may I ask: How many reports of UFOs were made by RAF pilots in 1967?

As you point out, there has been no evidence to date to indicate a defence threat or significance, so would your department have any objection to releasing details in order to assist me in my researches? As already mentioned, I have obtained a few reports from the early Fifties which have obviously been declassified under the 30-year rule, but it is well known that pilots in the RAF have been seeing these things since then: certainly the Bentwaters case (1956) is a good example.

I am glad to note that AS-2 is now the point to which all reports of UFOs are sent. But what about AS-8, which was mentioned to me by a reliable source? What are its functions, please?

Finally, I was interested to note that your department recognizes that there are "phenomena", even if you think there is no defence significance to them, and that no scientific study has been carried out.

If possible, I would appreciate a reply within four weeks. Thank you.

Thank you for your letter of 4 June 1985, addressed to the Prime Minister, which has been passed to me for reply. I have also received your earlier letter to Sec(AS)2. Since the letters cover essentially the same subject, I will reply to them both here.

As you say in your letter to the Prime Minister, you are familiar with official policy on UFO matters. I can confirm that there have been no changes to this policy as a result of transfer of responsibility from DS8 to Sec(AS)2 and that the sole interest of the MOD is to establish whether reports have any bearing on the defence of the country. I should immediately point out that Sec(AS) is the only branch within MOD which is responsible for receiving reports of UFO's from both military and civilian sources (including the Police and CAA). The reports we receive are referred to those in the Department responsible for air defence of the UK in order to establish whether they hold any defence significance. As you mention, there has been no evidence to date which would suggest a defence interest. For this reason, and in view of our limited interest, we have not carried out a study into the scientific significance of these phenomena. I can assure you that there is no question of "Top Secret research" being carried out.

With regard to your request for information on the number of reports received since 1959, I'm afraid we could not justify the time and effort involved in obtaining these figures for the years before 1978. However I attach figures which show the total number of reports received from all sources for each year from 1978 to 1984.

You also mention in your letter of 18 May the fact that you have obtained a number of Air Ministry reports from the Public Records Office. I am sure you will appreciate that I cannot go into the detailed arrangements for the disposal of our files. Nevertheless given the length of time since these documents must have been passed to the Air Ministry's archives (I assume before 1955), it is quite possible that some may have been retained prior to the setting up of the Ministry of Defence, even though we have no record of this.

Yuletide lights in the Solway

DURING recent weeks people living along the West Cumbrian coast have been fascinated by a series of lights which have sprung up on the Scots side of the Solway in the region of Auchencairn.

At times they appear to be at sea; at other times on the mainland.

Has Scotland decided to brighten up the lives of recession-hit Maryport and Workington this Christmas?

Because so many have been asking about the Scots-side illuminations, we decided to try to solve the mystery.

But even the Scots we spoke to were undecided just what the lights are — though they were adamant that the source was not extra-terrestrial.

Dumfries and Galloway council environmental chief Ken Stewart believes them to be from a giant carrier, anchored off Whithorn Island.

TRANSPORTED

"The carrier, bringing chemicals from North Africa for use at Marchon at Whitehaven, is too large to get into Whitehaven docks," he explained.

"So it anchors off Whithorn and the cargo is off-loaded on to smaller freighters and transported back to Cumbria," he said.

But neither Marchon nor J. B. Moffat and Co., the ship brokers at Whitehaven, have any knowledge of large shipping in the Whithorn area. The plot thickened.

Then Castle Douglas's environmental chief Bill Davidson suggested that the lights might be from the Dundrennan army gunnery range directly across from Maryport.

"The army have been carrying out night-firing practice for the past two months and this would surely require massive illumination," he suggested. Well, he was

An Army spokesman at Dundrennan said this week that there had recently been an extensive installation of new security lights round the range.

"And as we can see the lights of Workington and Maryport on a clear night and even watch vehicles moving along the

coast road between the towns, it is highly likely that what you are seeing over there are our new installations," he said.

So the mystery is apparently solved. But if anyone sees the lights begin to move this Christmas, don't ring us; ring Dundrennan . . . or put the top on the bottle.

Solway lights mystery

RED LIGHTS seen over the Solway Firth this week have officially been logged as UFOs — unidentified flying objects.

The lights were spotted at intervals during the early hours of Monday by members of the public and the police.

Interpreted as red flares from a stricken boat, Workington and

Silloth Lifeboats were launched to search the Solway.

However, no vessel in distress was found nor was one reported missing, according to Coastguard headquarters near Liverpool.

Solway Sector Auxiliary Coastguard, Mr Ashley Winterpe, said: "We thought it might have been meteorites but the meteorologists say it is the wrong time

of the year.

"In the official report we have put the lights down as UFOs. There is no explanation for them."

Driving on the marsh road at Skimburness, Carlisle baker Mr Dick Gardiner saw a huge crimson ball. "Pieces were shooting off it, then it just vanished. The whole thing lasted about 15 seconds," he said.

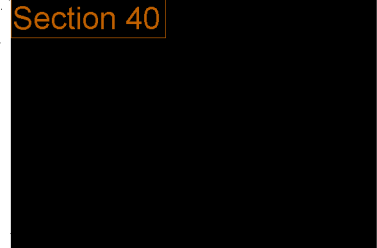

I am afraid I have little to add to what I said in my letter of 20 February 1985 in reply to your original enquiry on this matter. We remain satisfied that the events reported by Colonel Halt on 13 January 1981 are of no defence significance. The report was, like all other UFO reports, examined at the time by those in the Department responsible for the air defence of the UK and we have since seen nothing to alter our views.

Turning to **Section 40** request for copies of all UFO reports we have received since 1980, I am afraid that the Department could not justify the effort involved in acceding to this request. However, **Section 40** will already know that we are prepared to release reports of specific incidents to interested parties and, if he has any particular reports in mind, **Section 40** can obtain copies of these from Sec(AS)2 in my Department, whose address is room **Section 40** Ministry of Defence, Main Building, Whitehall SW1A 2HB.

On Thursday, 26 April 1984, PC Section 40 was on duty at Edgware Police Station when at approximately 10.20pm he received a telephone call from Section 40 aged about Section 40 of Section 40 Stanmore. As a result of what Section 40 told the officer, he went to Section 40 where he met Section 40 and Section 40, of Section 40 Stanmore. They stated in the presence of PC Section 40 and PC Section 40 that they had seen an object of an unusual nature in the sky above her rear garden.

Both officers accompanied Section 40 and Section 40 into the rear garden of Section 40 where Section 40 pointed east towards a flashing light, approximately 45° up in the sky from where they were standing. The officers obtained a pair of binoculars and studied the object through them and saw that the object was circular in the middle with a dome on the top and underneath. The middle of the object had blue lights around the middle and a red/pink lights on the extreme right of the middle. The dome on the top and blue and white flashing lights, the dome underneath was blue, green and red/pink with white flashes. They observed the object for an hour and during that time the object moved erratically from side to side, up and down and to and fro, not venturing far from the original position. During the time the officers observed the object it moved up to the right to a position of approximately 50° from where they were standing.

SC Section 40 was also present during this time and observed the object. The object appeared to be over Borehamwood or Mill Hill.

Section 40 stated "At 9.45 approximately, I opened my back door to let the dog in, when I noticed a bright light in the sky about 45° up above the trees in my back garden that was flashing blue, white, green and pink and it seemed to have things flashing off it. I called my friend out to show her. We both stood and watched for about 5-10 minutes. I ran out to tell my neighbours but saw two young boys walking by and asked them if they could see it they said they could. I ran back into my friend, we watched a little longer. I then ran next door and told them, we went in their garden. They also saw it and the light flashing off it. I ran back in again and my friend and I stood watching it when a blinding white ball with a trail behind went above from left to right, we both screamed at the same time our neighbours heard us. The light at this time was going further back in the sky and throughout the whole time the object was moving very fast and very erratic the whole time. I am not a nutter. I 'phoned the police who sent three officers round, who all witnessed and agreed this was not a plane or a star and that it was flashing colours and moving very erratic. This object was also viewed through binoculars by the police and myself".

Section 40 stated "My friend called me into her back garden at 9.45pm and we both saw a large flashing object, much larger than a star in the sky between two trees. The object was flashing bright pink, blue and white and small white objects were shooting away from the main object while it moved in a triangular motion. We watched it for 55 minutes and in this time it faded almost away and then came back and started to fade slowly. After watching for about 20 minutes a bright white light flashed rapidly past us about 100 feet from the house from left to right leaving a bright white trail.

I saw one white object go back to the main red, white and blue one after about 20 minutes."

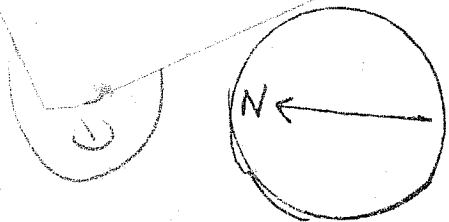

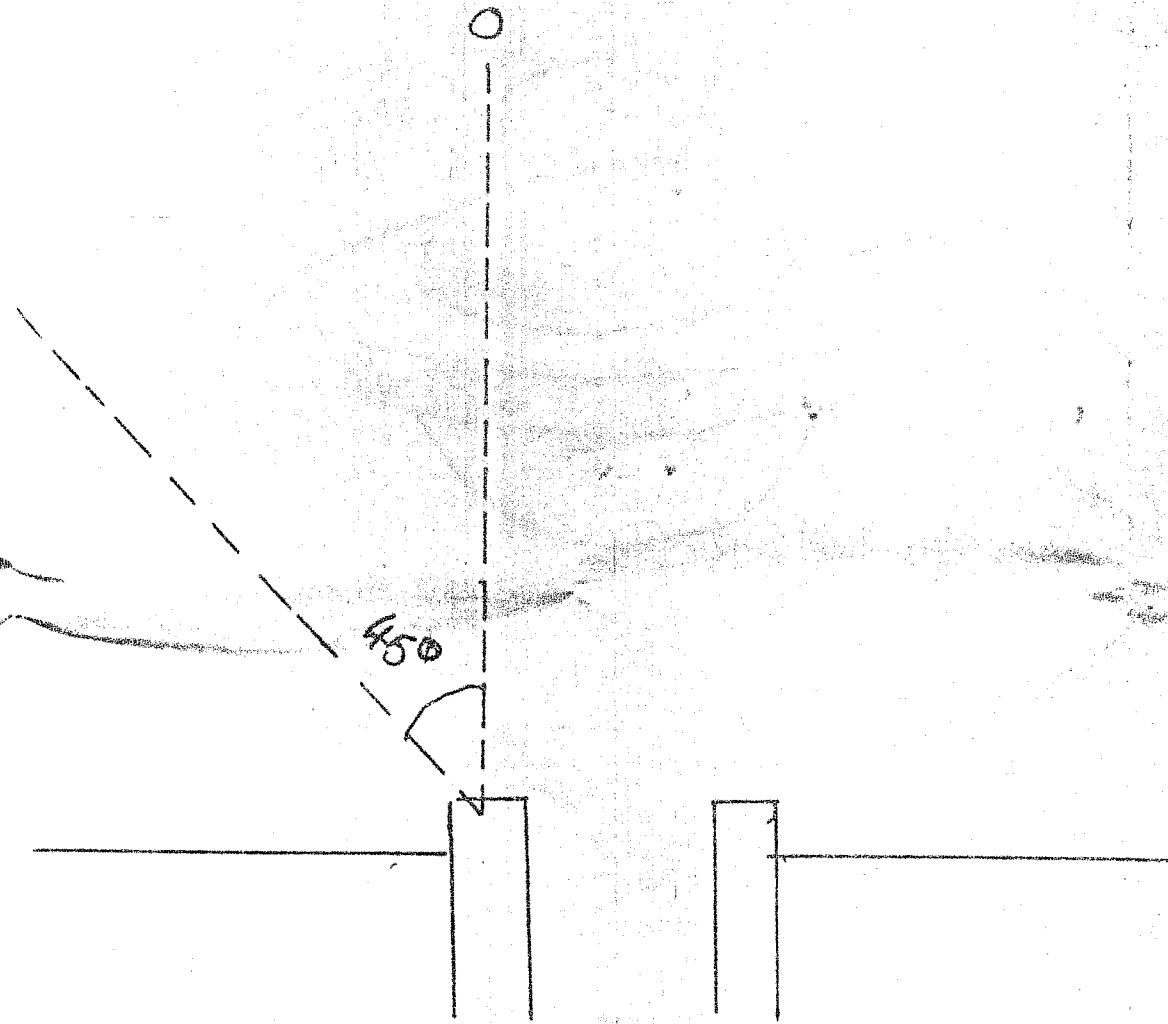

of vehicle Object.

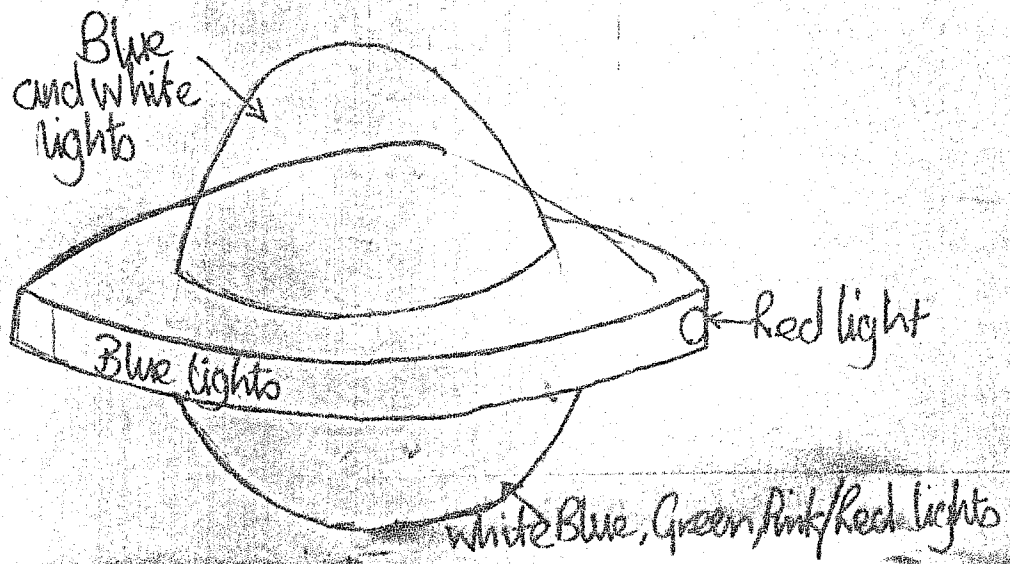

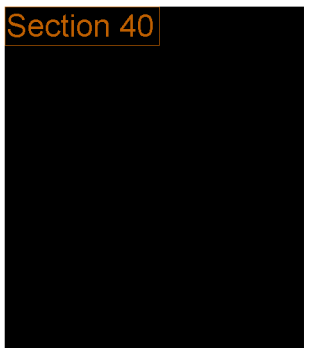

I am enclosing some information of which may be of interest to you regarding some strange lights that have suddenly sprung up across the Scots side over the Solway Firth, I myself became curious at these reports. So to find out if there were any truth in the sightings of the lights that appear to be at sea then on land, where I live (situated) I can observe right over the Scotch side with a good pair of binoculars, I then set up regular nightly Skywatches at an advantage point, to my surprise I began to witness these reported lights for myself, mainly these became visible after nine O' Clock at night at different locations. I later became somewhat alarmed and worried at what I was seeing. (The lights start to come on very low powered, orange and white lights, then they seem to expand bigger like welding lights, and get bluish. They then move across from land to sea very quickly, after being stationary for a few minutes or more. I thought these might be helicopters from an Army base somewhere on night exercise, perhaps !) 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BOOK REVIEWS.

ASTRONOMY/David Evans (1982) - 290 pages, index, bibliography, illustd.
Price: £2.95 from Hodder & Stoughton, Mill Road, Dunton Green, Sevenoaks,
Kent. This is another title from the publisher's 'Teach Yourself' series,
this edition being the eighth - having originally been published back in
1952. The author is well qualified being Professor of Astronomy at the
University of Texas. As would be expected it is a very good primer on
the subject, but in a market where numerous titles are available for the
discerning buyer this book is a bit dull in that, unlike others, it
has only black and white photographs. One would have thought that with
the hundred of excellent prints available today, the publishers would
have updated the older prints. Therefore the appearance of the book
is very 1950-ish.

THE EVIDENCE FOR VISIONS OF THE VIRGIN MARY/Kevin McClure (1983) - 158 pages, bibliography, index, illustrated. £2.50 from: The Aquarian Press, Denington Estate, Wellingborough, Northants, NN8 2RQ. When one started reading McClure's book it was obvious that he was far from happy about the primitive investigations of claimed visions. Chapters one to nine is a collection of visions from 1061 to the present day. The evidence which is assessed in Chapter eleven is very thin indeed and the author deviates into speculation when he attempts to link visions with UFO sightings. There's nothing like linking one unproven subject with another! As an introduction to the subject the book succeeds and should encourage interested parties to pursue the subject further.

STONEHENGE COMPLETE/Christopher Chippindale. (1983). 296 pages, illustrated, index. £12.95 from: Thames & Hudson, 30 Bloomsbury Street, London, WS1B 3QP. "Everything important, interesting or odd that has been written or painted, discovered or imagined, about the most extraordinary building in the world", proclaims the front cover. By "everything", we have to realise that this is the usual overstatement. However, this book is a truly comprehensive work produced to the high standard one expects from the publishers. Excellent photographs, painting, engravings, line drawings and even cartoons make it very pleasing to the eye and a very good coffee-table book. Recommended to all with an interest in this unique monument.

THE YEAR OF THE SAUCER/- GRAY BARKERS UFO ANNUAL 1983/Gray Barker. 101 pages, illustrated, no index. £12.95 from: New Age Press, Box D, Jane Lew, WV 26378, USA. Another book from the hand of Barker, the annual is supposed to be a Ufological record of the year 1982; but includes a mish-mash of dubious stories and claims from other years besides. Barker really is an enigma. On the one hand he compiles a major work to the UFO subject in his 'UFO Guides to Fate' (reviewed in CU 4), then come along with this book whose only aim seems to be the creation of an entertaining read for the credulous amongst us. In the ten chapters, he finds space to feature the Rendlesham Forest events, 1980, under the heading of 'The Mysterious Forest'. Sorry to say that this is a book that adds weight to the bookshelf, but very little else.

FAIRY TALES - ALLEGORIES OF THE INNER LIFE/Jean C. Cooper. (1983). 159 pages, bibliography, index, illustrated. Price £3.95 from: The Aquarian Press. A fascinating book that examines the recurring themes and motifs in classic fairy tales, and shows how they relate to the symbolic processes of the unconscious mind, although rather too esoteric at times, Cooper makes her point well and the text is accompanied by some fine illustrations, in particular those of Gustave Dore.

FUTURE WEATHER - THE CAUSES & EFFECTS OF CLIMATIC CHANGE/John Gribbin. (1983). 272 pages, index, bibliography, illustrated. £3.50 from Penquin Books Ltd., Harmondsworth, Middlesex. A most readable book by the co-author of 'The Jupiter Effect' several years ago. This latest work concerns the Greenhouse Effect - in simple terms a build up of carbon dioxide in the Earth's atmosphere leading to a temperature change. Gribbin structures the book well with some perceptive comments on the political, as well as scientific, aspects of the problem. He is also not too esoteric in his overview of the present state of thinking/research and therefore this book can be recommended to the person wishing to read a 'primer' type book.

UFO REALITY/Jenny Randles. (1983) 248 pages, illustrated, index, references. £9.95 from: Robert Hale Ltd., Clerkenwell House, Clerkenwell Green, London, EC1R 0HT. This is the fifth book from the prolific hand of Ms Randles, it is sub-titled, "A critical look at the physical evidence." One might argue that this is a contradiction, for if there was 'physical evidence', surely there would be no UFOs!? The book consists of some 14 chapters written in her usual style, which always makes for easy reading. She adopts what she terms 'the JR set': 1051 UFO cases covering five years, which she has personally evaluated as her hard-data for evidence. This is a great weakness of the book, she has not personally investigated the cases. Just because a case has been investigated up to levels 'A' or 'B', should not give it a higher status. How competent were the investigators involved is just one reservation that should always be taken into account. More and more, Ms Randles, instead of giving the true facts about the UFO subject, prefers to mould the opinions of her readers. UFO Reality fails to balance the open-minded viewpoint with that of the skeptics. This is evident in the lack of references to Klass and Sheaffer (they are only mentioned 3 times in the book) and in the section 'further reading', not one of their books is recommended! Hardly a critical look at the evidence.

Throughout the book I thought many cases were omitted that she could have used for critical study. For example, in Chapter 13 when discussing photographic evidence, discussion is to be found on the Trinidade Island prints, but there is no mention of the Jersey cases from 1973 which showed an identical object with what looks like a vapour trail - Kodak felt that the 'object' was caused by processing irregularities. Another good case which was omitted, was the Wistaston, Cheshire hoax photos from 1978. Here is an example of an English case being evaluated by Ground Saucer Watch in the states and uncovered as a hoax. In the chapter on UFO movies, no mention is made of the 1976 Ben Boyd case from Australia. One could go on; but in fairness Ms Randles may be totally unaware of these cases.

One final point, on page 152, she states the following, "I was told by a former British Government official once that he understood that such a device (a crashed UFO - E1.) could be found in this country. It was allegedly under wraps at a military base somewhere in South Wales." She says she treats such unsubstantiated stories as nothing more than interesting, and though provocative they tend to be unproveable. One could ask who was the official? Which Base? If some cases tend to be unproveable, does that mean that some have been proved? I won't go on but it is annoying that in too many UFO books, carrots are ritually dangled before the reader without any factual proof. Was it too tempting for Ms Randles to include this 'rumour'? It would appear so. Many books on the subject claim to be critical, many are not and this title, whilst appearing on the surface to achieve the job, many researchers, more knowledgeable, will be able to notice its faults.

THE MEGALITHIC ODDYSSEY/Christian O'Brien. (1983) 176 pages. illustrated. £4.95 from: Turnstone Press (same address as Acquarian-press). This book discusses 'astronomically aligned' stone circles and giant cairns on Bodmin Moor and their origins. Who were the designers and builders? O'Brien claims an advanced race of Master Builders travelled the world overseeing numerous projects. Although the research and text is well-threaded together it hardly statters one's own vision of prehistory.

LEY LINE...THEIR NATURE & PROPERTIES/J. Havelock Fidler. (1983). 144 pages, illustrated. £3.95 from: Turnstone Press. The author incorporates showing techniques developed by himself to show, via experimental work, his belief in ways in which a standing stone can be charged with energy and how this charge can then be permanently fixed. One conclusion he comes to is that the energy harnessed by ley-line systems are human in origin. All interesting stuff to read, although I doubt the seriously-interested scientist to latch onto this work.

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INDEXING -- THE FIRST THREE YEARS.

Some three years have passed since the indexing of material within the Centre began. In that time 241 U.K. UFO publications have gone onto this system. This period has given me a unique insight into this material which covers the years 1965 to 84. Whilst it must be understood that the type of references one adopts is governed by what is indexed, the following facts and figures make for interesting reading. No one else is indexing U.K. UFO literature to the same degree as OSEAP and the research possibilities are endless. It comes as no surprise to find that editorial preferences start with sightings - out of the 241 publications England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland have a total of 706 cases, add on another 38 countries also featured and this total rises to 945! These range from one-liners to detailed case studies.

A brief look at some subject-headings and references show that some themes are better represented than others eg: only 9 references to instrumentation in UFO research, a modest 50 to identified flying objects, 19 to men-in-black, 39 to UFO investigation methods, 59 to Warminster and 14 to the Condon Report. On the 'names' side, UFO skeptic Phillip Klass scrapes in with 8 and, as one would expect, the prolific Jenny Randles - 173. These references represent articles written by said person, letters, cartoons, crosswords, and a mention by other writers.

A breakdown of the present indexing situation clearly shows the fruit of three year's work.

Here's looking forward to the next three years!

- 1) THE PUZZLE OF BALL-LIGHTENING/Nikolai Zhiltsov. An interesting item which gives an insight into Russian thinking on the subject of ball-lightening; includes several cases from the Soviet Union and questions the origins of how this phenomenon gains its power. Source: Anomalous Phenomenon Review, Vol. 1/No. 1 1984 - Pages 4-6.
- 2) RUMOURS AND PUBLICITY - THEIR CAUSES AND EFFECTS/Mark Tyrrell. A well written and perceptive article originally published three years ago, but very relevant today and recommended reading for all serious researchers. The small study featured in the text concerning UFO shapes is illuminating to say the least and concludes that there is a strong indication of ingrained preconceptions as to the UFO phenomenon. Source: UFO Research Australia Newsletter (ISSN 0726-1764), Vol. 5/No. 2 1984 - Pages 24-32.
- 3) THE HANGAR 18 TALES - A FOLKLORISTIC APPROACH/Joe Nickell. A very reasoned debate on a subject, with ufology, riddled with questionable claims and 'conspiracy' overtones. It lays down clear challenges to believers of 'crashed saucers' and 'pickled aliens' to come up with facts! Nickell likens the 'belief tales' as exhibiting the qualities of true folklore! Source: Common Ground, No. 9 1984 - Pages 2-10.
- 4) ON THE ROAD WITH CUFOS: DUBIOUS PHOTO'S ON EXHIBIT/Michael R. Dennett. A review of the Center for UFO Studies' traveling photo exhibition in the States, the credibility of prints on view, and concludes 'the preponderance of sensational 'close encounter' cases in the CUFOS exhibit is another indication of the intellectual bankruptcy of ufology. Perhaps more significant is the brazen use of fake or highly questionable photographs by a supposedly scientific organisation'. Source: The Skeptical Enquirer (ISSN 0194-6730), Spring, 1984. Pages 209-210.
- 5) NEW DATA FROM HESSDALEN/Kim Moller Hansen. Latest news from the Norwegian sighting area of Hessdalen. Data on incidents from this location have already appeared in at least one British publication. In this article the NIVEØ group have collected some meteorological data which may account for some - but not all - of the sightings in the area. The local population have not like NIVEØ's findings. Source: UFO NYT (ISSN 0049-4976), No. 4 1984 - Pages 32-35.
- 6) WHAT DID LONNIE SEE?/Toby Smith. A good piece of journalism by Smith, Zamora and others involved at the time of his sighting at Socorro in 1964 are interviewed. It gives a fascinating and retrospective insight on the incident. Over the years Lonnie has grown weary of defending himself and fed-up of the harassment he has suffered from various quarters. Today he drives an earth mover and supplements his income by serving in the National Guard. He comes across as just an ordinary person who became involved in events he did not understand. On the sighting he says, "people say I saw a Flying Saucer...I can't say if I did because I don't know what a Flying Saucer looks like." He also feels he was at the wrong place at the wrong time and should he ever see anything unusual again he would not tell anyone about it. Dear Prime Minister ,

I am sorry to burden you with a question on an apparently trivial and irrelevant subject at a time when you have far more pressing problems to deal with. I refer to the much-ridiculed and controversial subject of Unidentified Flying Objects, which must have been brought to your attention on a number of occasions.

As you are doubtless aware, the subject is treated with the utmost seriousness by a number of intelligence agencies in the United States, notably the Central Intelligence Agency and National Security Agency. With regard to the latter, a Supreme Court ruling in 1982 decreed that the NSA was fully justified in withholding 139 documents on UFOs, in the interest of national security. This has been confirmed for me in a letter from Mr James Devine, Director of Policy for the NSA. The latter has, however, released to me some declassified documents under provision of the Freedom of Information Act which leave little room for doubt that the subject of UFOs is in some instances classified above Top Secret.

X I am familiar with the policy of Her Majesty's Government and have corresponded for many years with the Ministry of Defence on these matters, yet have been unable to secure official confirmation that any serious scientific research is being conducted, other than that reports are treated seriously but not pursued unless there is a defence interest. Apparently there is no evidence thus far that UFOs have any defence significance.

Unofficially it has been confirmed that Top Secret research is being conducted in this country, and I have been informed by reliable sources that in 1978 alone the budget was £11,000,000. I am given to understand that there is close collaboration with U.S. intelligence on the matter. My question then is: Are you aware of this secret research into UFOs? Former Prime Ministers Lord Wilson and Mr Heath have told me that they cannot comment on the subject as they do not know anything about it. I feel sure that you can come up with something better than that! As titular head of the security and secret services, presiding over meetings with the JIC, for example, there must have been an occasion when you were informed about this secret research, as well as national security implications. If not, I am left with the suspicion that the subject is so sensitive that not even the Prime Minister is on a 'need to know' basis.

Finally, a word of encouragement for your fine leadership. I have nothing but admiration for the courage and tenacity with which you pursue the problems facing our country.

Dear Sir (or Madam),

I am the Chairman of the above Society, and also the Regional Investigations Officer, (South - West) for the British U.F.O. Research Association (B.U.F.O.R.A.).

My reason for writing to you, is to request an appointment, in the near future, at your convenience of course. The subject for discussion is an alleged U.F.O. sighting (and landing), very close to your Base, that occurred in February this year.

We have good reason to believe that the sighting was genuine, and that the witness did not fabricate a hypothetical event. Members of our Society have visited and interviewed the witness for over two hours.

Although at present we are classifying this incident as a 'U.F.O.' incident, we have not dismissed the possibility that what the witness observed, could have been a form of experimental aerial craft - possibly from your Base. That is, of course if you are involved with design and testing of experimental aircraft. Should this be the true identity of this 'U.F.O.' sighting, then a greater measure of safety is certainly required, as this object nearly collided with a moving vehicle!

Should this sighting be truly unexplained, and you were not responsible for it, then I wonder, if you were able to track it on the radar facilities used at R.A.F. St Mawgan?

We have calculated that the object in question, might have passed through your Base, and furthermore - we believe that it landed less than one mile away, burning soil, grass and some small trees. We also believe that when it departed after landing, it hit a tree as it ascended.

Because there was an increase in radiation levels on trees and ground, after the U.F.O. incident at R.A.F. Bentwaters/Woodbridge, in Suffolk in December 1980, we are planning to examine the readings of radioactivity at the place of impact of this case.

Although U.F.O. Investigators experienced a 'mass of denial' over the U.F.O. hypothesis at R.A.F. Bentwaters/Woodbridge - by both M.O.D. and U.S.A.F. Officials and even D S S at M.O.D. Offices in London, I truly hope this will not be the case by Officials from a British Air Force Establishment.

I look forward to hearing from you, in the not too distant future.

Dear Community Relations Officer,

I am the Chairman of the above Society, and also the Regional Investigations Officer - South- West, for the British U.F.O. Research Association. (B.U.F.O.R.A.).

This is my second letter to you - during a telephone conversation, to your Establishment today, they were not aware of my previous one, therefore, I am writing you another.

I am writing to request an appointment with you, hopefully in the near future to talk about a U.F.O. sighting that occurred early February. The sighting was extremely close to the perimeter of your Base and we believe that the object might have 'landed' on the ground, for some time. Our belief here, lies with evidence of a 'landing' in the discovery of an area of damaged and burned grass, soil and trees, and also another tree that has been hit at the top, snapping several large branches off it. It is this, that I feel more relevant.

Obviously we have not dismissed the possibility, that whatever caused this damage, and more importantly, what our witness observed, was in fact some form of aircraft being tested from RAF St Mawgan. However I must add, that, when airborne, the craft was only 8 -15ft above the ground!

Should you be unable to account for this sighting, then did you manage to record it on your radar system, at the Base? Our own calculations indicate the object could have passed over the Base.

Since my last letter to you, we have taken radioactivity readings at the areas of damage, stated above, and I am happy to report there were no abnormalities detected. However, following the hypothetical theories put forward, which were neither denied, nor confirmed by the M.O.D. ; at RAF Woodbridge in Suffolk, after their strange incident in December 1980, our own theories must be similar to those in Suffolk, which were:-
(a) UFO - (b) crashed aerial craft (c) experimental craft, or (d) missile going astray. I state these simply because the description of the Woodbridge incident, and the one close to your Base, were nearly identical both in description and in size, and also aerial capability.

We thought that the best way to begin our task of solving this sighting, is to ask your advice, prior to approaching D.S.G, in London.

We look forward to your reply to this correspondence.

Thank you for your letter of 15 May, replying to mine to Section 40 of 25 February.

I am glad of your assurance that unidentified events in British airspace and territory are properly evaluated by the MOD for their possible Defence significance. It is no more than I would have expected from former colleagues !

I gather from the duty desk (which I telephoned recently during 'silent' hours) and also from the Flying Complaints Flight at Rudloe Manor that a standard form is currently in use for noting data reported by the public, the civil police and the CAA. As one of those who are at present attempting to make some scientific evaluation of a surprisingly persistent and not readily explicable phenomenon, I was interested to discover that the MOD and the Flying Complaints Flight have identified several factors which may be relevant in evaluating reports, eg. the proximity of high-voltage lines or bodies of still water in the area of a reported sighting. It would be of great value to myself and scientific colleagues if I might have a copy of the standard report-form which is currently in use in Whitehall and at the FCF. I assume that there can be no security objection to our having it in view of your assurance that no Defence significance has ever been detected in any sighting reported to Defence authorities. It would, on the other hand, be of interest to those who are looking at the matter from a scientific standpoint lest there is any potential factor identified by MOD experts which we may possibly have overlooked.

I assume from your recent re-organisation that the functions of both the former DS8 and the former S4(Air) have been absorbed into the new AS.2. If so, I congratulate you on a desirable piece of tidying-up ! The dividing line between the two former Divisions was never easy to administer. My own Division, DS8 (anyway during my term as Head of DS8 from early 1969 to late 1972) saw only such cases as appeared to have a possible air defence significance; and we doubtless missed many others. Nonetheless, the AD 'cases' were often interesting. I have been a little disappointed to see from the Answers to PQs in recent years that the MOD disclaims having kept on record any material earlier than (as I recall) 1962 or so. Recent enquiries to the Public Records Office suggest that this is not, in fact, quite accurate: I have by me two written reports - freely available from the PRO - which are dated 1950 and 1952, both by serving officers and both recording events in British airspace which closely resemble the mass of material which continues to be reported, and which we, with a scientific interest, cannot altogether dismiss.


I also recall having been shown, during 1970, during my term as Head of DS8, some interesting gun-camera 'clips' which suggested the existence of a puzzling phenomenon observed by RAF pilots (notably during the 'flap' at Bentwaters/Lakenheath in 1956). I hope these have not been thrown away. Now that we have had

your assurance that no Defence significance is attached to these matters, would be of scientific interest if any such material could be made available to a designated and responsible group. (I would make it my business to ensure that you were not in consequence bombarded with similar requests from a multitude of outside bodies !).

Thank you again for your letter. In the light of it, and noting your position that nothing of Defence significance arises, may I recapitulate my requests ? In summary;—it would contribute to serious research if you could now make available to me:—

- a. a copy of the standard form currently in use by the MOD for summarising the data reported by the public, the police and the CAA on unidentified events in British airspace and territory;
- b. the data still held by the MOD on these reported events, particularly any photographic material.

PS. I was interested in your comment that "there has never been any formal liaison with other governments". This used not to be the line when I was around ! If you care to look up the Official Record for 22 November 1967, you will find the following exchange between the Hon. & Gallant Member, Major Sir Patrick Wall, MP, and Mr. Merlyn-Rees, S. of S. for Defence.

WALL : "What exchange of information or other co-operation is taking place between his Department and the official American and Russian investigations into UFOs ?"

M-REES : "We are in touch with the Americans on this subject but not with the Russians. I understand the conclusions which the Americans have reached coincide with ours."

This doesn't quite substantiate your "never". I won't embarrass you by asking you to comment; but you might find it useful for your own purposes to refer to the Hansard reference and to refresh your memory on what precisely was the American position at that time and why we went along with it.

- b. There are objects probably approximating the shape of a disc, of such appreciable size as to appear to be as large as a man-made aircraft.
- c. There is a possibility that some of the incidents may be caused by natural phenomena, such as meteors.
- d. The reported operating characteristics such as extreme rates of climb, maneuverability (particularly in roll), and action which must be considered *evasive* when sighted or contacted by friendly aircraft and radar, lend belief to the possibility that some of the objects are controlled either manually, automatically, or remotely.

—U.S. Senator Barry Goldwater, also a general in the Air Force Reserves, who has repeatedly expressed his opinion that UFOs are real and who has been denied access to top secret UFO files at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, despite his status.

A curious set of regulations exists within NASA. Listed in the Code of Federal Regulations since 1969, 14 CFR 1211, as they are known, provide for the detention, examination, and decontamination of persons and things that have come in direct or indirect contact with a person, animal, or other form of life or matter that has "touched directly or come within the atmospheric envelope of any other celestial body."

Originally designed for our expeditions to the moon and, in fact, instituted only a few days before the first lunar landing, the regulations can be applied to space voyages by vehicles *not originating from Earth*, according to NASA's general counsel Neil Hosenball. Theoretically, anyone who sees and approaches a UFO and, if lucky (?) enough, is able to touch the object, may be liable for a \$5,000.00 fine and/or a year in prison if he or she does not submit to detention.

Now, we don't anticipate that such a thing will ever come down upon a UFO witness. It would hardly be a way to reward someone with physical proof of UFO reality! However, another problem surfaces and that is the fact that when such stories are circulated in the media, a potential witness could be frightened away from reporting a UFO encounter. The threat of a fine and prison term for exposing the public to some as yet unknown peril may be impetus enough to remain silent.

One witness involved in the following encounter had precisely this fear in mind when he came forward to tell us what he had gone through.

Persistent stories had come out of England about an unidentified flying object which had come down into the Rendlesham Forest near the American Air Force Base at Bentwaters on December 30, 1980. Reports included radar tracking from a civilian radar site, which later had been visited by U.S. Air Force officers with the purpose of confiscating the radar tapes, and accounts by USAF personnel of a metallic craft and entities seen in a clearing at Rendlesham. The stories, of course, were unverified and little else could be accomplished unless more concrete data came forth.

Two British UFO investigators, Brenda Butler and Dot Street, followed the course of the stories and found substance to them. Reportedly, a

security sergeant saw entities associated with a dome-shaped UFO in the woods; another witness, an airman, saw marks in the earth characteristic of what he had heard about UFO landing marks. All witnesses desired complete anonymity, however, and while the story became more intriguing with the increase in the number of confirming witnesses, it still could not be considered a strong case by any means. Anonymous witnesses and scattered rumors are not convincing evidence of anything.

While we were putting this book together, a person came forward as a result of a UFO article he had read. Fascinated by the subject because of his experience, this individual was eventually put in contact with the authors and told a very interesting tale. His identity is known to us, but, by his request, we will change his name to Art Wallace.

Wallace was attached to Bentwaters Air Force Base as a security policeman. He had been assigned to the base for only a short period of time, when at 1:00 A.M. on a night either on or very near to December 30, 1980, his life took a strange twist. While he was on duty at the Bentwaters flight line, a jeep pulled up. Two men, a sergeant and a lieutenant, told Wallace to get in because they were going over to the motor pool. On the way over, Wallace noticed that many animals were running out of the woods nearby; something he had never seen before, even in the States. When they arrived at the motor pool, Wallace and the sergeant were told to get gas-powered "light-alls" (trailer-mounted lights used for illuminating large areas). The lights were attached to the jeep, and they proceeded to the Bentwaters main gate where they met other vehicles.

The convoy moved out toward the Rendlesham Forest a few miles away. Wallace heard radio chatter mentioning names of people he knew plus "OSI," most likely a reference to the Air Force's Office of Special Investigations. Wallace saw security police as well as members of the British military stationed all along the way.

They pulled onto a dirt road and drove about a mile into the Rendlesham Forest, stopping at what Wallace referred to as a "staging point." The men were ordered to check their weapons in since they would not be taking them along. Wallace went into the woods with four other men led by a captain who had met them at the Bentwaters motor pool. As they approached a clearing in the woods, they noticed a brightness in the distance and the sound of helicopters overhead. Wallace noticed an airman crying at the edge of the clearing with a medic attending him. This puzzled Wallace greatly as he couldn't imagine what might have been going on. The first thing the men noticed when they had a clear view was that large movie cameras had been placed surrounding a field in the clearing. Many military and plainclothes personnel were milling about watching something.

The "something" was an object, taking the appearance of a transparent aspirin tablet, hovering about one foot off the ground. Wallace estimated that the object was fifty feet in diameter and had a bright, pulsating, yellow

inside. It did not move from its position. Wallace and some of the men approached the object to within about ten feet. Two cows in the field had come over to the object and according to Wallace, appeared to be just staring at it, oblivious to the security men in the area.

A radio call was heard over a field radio unit. A helicopter pilot said, "Here it comes." In the distance, a red light appeared, first behind a pine tree, then in front of it. The light quickly sped over to the aspirin-shaped object and hovered at a position about twenty feet above it. After maintaining this position for a minute, the red light broke up. No explosion occurred in the conventional sense. The light merely broke up into a shower of particles.

Suddenly, in the place of the red light and the aspirin-shaped object, another vehicle appeared. Wallace said it was a domed disc, bright white in color, with an intricately detailed surface much like the models used in movies like "Star Wars" and "Close Encounters." It had two appendages on the lower flange of the disc which seemed to be the beginning of delta wings but not quite. Shadows were cast on the surface of the disc by some of the raised-relief detail. Wallace and the men with him walked around the object and noticed an interesting effect. Their own shadows were cast onto the object, probably by the bright "light-alls" in the field. Not only did their shadows bend upwards at the head, but as they walked and then stopped, the shadows would appear to advance *one pace more* and then stop. Stunned and disbelieving of this effect, Wallace and the others walked and stopped several times, each time noticing the effect repeat itself. Additionally, the third time that they tried this, a light came over the head of a shadow and moved from one head to another.

Wallace recalled turning to say a few words to one of the men. The next thing he knew, he woke up in bed, fully dressed and muddy up to his knees. Wallace asked one of his companions in the barracks what time he had come in. He replied 4:00 A.M. At that point he did not remember what had happened that night. As he went about his usual duties, Wallace began to recall the events.

A phone call came later in the day. Wallace was summoned to his commander's office along with other security policemen who were at the scene of the UFO activity. Civilians were in the office also, giving Wallace the impression of being CIA personnel. The commander politely advised the men not to talk about the night's events to anyone. They were brought into another room where the civilians, much more stern and rude, reminded the men of their duty and ordered them never to discuss the matter with anyone. They were checked for radiation, debriefed for an hour, and made to sign forms which re-emphasized the high security nature of what happened. Wallace and others were put on a call-in schedule by which they would be required to phone a certain number daily at 11:30 A.M. as a check on their whereabouts and activities.

Wallace recalled being shown a film on UFOs in a room with other

for reasons which he still doesn't understand. The movie displayed film clips, some dating to World War II, of actual UFO activity in various places and times. Several of the sequences showed UFOs near what appeared to be fighter aircraft, and in one sequence from the Korean War, a disc-shaped object passed close to an MIG fighter, causing it to crash. Wallace was told they were being shown this so that they might better understand the need for secrecy on the events of the 30th.

Wallace said that versions of the story leaked to the British media detailing alien meetings in the forest and landing marks on the ground were deliberately contrived by the military to mislead the public. The false evidence was intended to be discovered by UFO investigators so that a negative evaluation would be ascribed to the story, thus preserving secrecy.

It is quite a story, and coupled with other accounts of the Rendlesham Forest events, we are inclined to think that something truly extraordinary may have happened.

What was the Air Force's official response to this? The authors filed a FOIA request with the 81st Combat Support Group at RAF Bentwaters to determine if documentation was on file at the base. A reply dated April 28, 1983, came from Col. Henry J. Cochran, Bentwaters Commander.

Reference your letter dated April 14, 1983 requesting information about unknown aircraft activity near RAF Bentwaters. *There was allegedly some strange activity near RAF Bentwaters at the approximate time in question but not on land under U.S. Air Force jurisdiction and, therefore, no official investigation was conducted by the 81st Tactical Fighter Wing. Thus, the records you request do not exist [emphasis added].*

If no records exist, how did Col. Cochran know that something had happened near Bentwaters? He was not the Bentwaters Commander at the time. Furthermore, under the provisions of Air Force Manual 12-50, such records would either have been destroyed after a short period of time or they would have been passed along to a permanent storage facility for retention; that is, they would no longer be at the base. And the investigation was probably not conducted by the 81st Tactical Fighter Wing but by someone else (OSI?).

On May 7, 1983, CAUS Researcher Director Robert Todd filed an FOIA request with the Air Force's 513th Combat Support Group for information on the Rendlesham Forest affair. The 513th CSG provides document management services for the Headquarters of the Third Air Force in Europe, which covers the Bentwaters area. Our hopes were low for any positive results as it seemed that a tight ring of secrecy was placed around the story.

However, in a June 14, 1983, letter from Col. Peter Bent, Commander of the 513th CSG, an utterly stunning admission was made. Col. Bent said:

It might interest you to know that the US Air Force had no longer retained a copy of the 13 January 1981 letter written by Lt Col Charles I. Halt.

The Air Force file copy had been properly disposed of in accordance with Air Force Regulations. Fortunately, through diligent inquiry and the gracious consent of Her Majesty's government, the British Ministry of Defence and the Royal Air Force, the US Air Force was provided a copy for you.

The January 13 letter was enclosed with Col. Bent's response. It was on the official letterhead of the 81st Combat Support Group at Bentwaters and signed by Lt. Col. Halt, who was the Deputy Base Commander. The title of the document is "Unexplained Lights," and it reads like science fiction:

1. Early in the morning of 27 Dec 80 (approximately 0300L), two USAF security police patrolmen saw unusual lights outside the back gate at RAF Woodbridge. Thinking an aircraft might have crashed or been forced down, they called for permission to go outside the gate to investigate. The on-duty flight chief responded and allowed three patrolmen to proceed on foot. The individuals reported seeing a strange glowing object in the forest. The object was described as being metallic in appearance and triangular in shape, approximately two to three meters across the base and approximately two meters high. It illuminated the entire forest with a white light. The object itself had a pulsating red light on top with a bank(s) of blue lights underneath. The object was hovering or on legs. As the patrolmen approached the object, it maneuvered through the trees and disappeared. At this time the animals on a nearby farm went into a frenzy. The object was briefly sighted approximately an hour later near the back gate.
2. The next day, three depressions 1½" deep and 7" in diameter were found where the object had been sighted on the ground. The following night (29 Dec 80) the area was checked for radiation. Beta/gamma readings of 0.1 milliroentgens were recorded with peak readings in the three depressions and near the center of the triangle formed by the depressions. A nearby tree had moderate (.05-.07) readings on the side of the tree toward the depressions.
3. Later in the night a red sun-like light was seen through the trees. It moved about and pulsed. At one point it appeared to throw off glowing particles and then broke into five separate white objects and then disappeared. Immediately thereafter, three star-like objects were noticed in the sky, two objects to the north and one to the south, all of which were about 10° off the horizon. The objects moved rapidly in sharp angular movements and displayed red, green and blue lights. The objects to the north appeared to be elliptical through an 8-12 power lens. They then turned to full circles. The objects to the north remained in the sky for an hour or more. The object to the south was visible for two or three hours and beamed down a stream of light from time to time. Numerous individuals, including the undersigned, witnessed the activities in paragraphs 2 and 3.

Outside of some small variation in detail, the story in the document is amazingly similar to what Art Wallace described. This letter was certainly part of a more detailed file, since it is clear that an official investigation was conducted. Looking back at Col. Cochran's April 28 response to our inquiry on Rendlesham, we now see that it amounts to nothing more than a gross

an attempt to mislead the public and constitutes a blatant violation of the spirit and the letter of the Freedom of Information Act.

What could be equally as mysterious as the events themselves is the reason why the letter was released in the first place. We probably would not have known about its existence had it not been given to us. And it surely doesn't help to make the Air Force's official stance on UFOs credible. Could there be a segment within the Air Force that wants us to have the facts on UFOs? It's a distinct possibility.

Our investigation into this most bizarre affair continues.

We have already discussed many of the agencies involved in collecting reports of UFOs domestically and internationally. One other potential source of UFO data has not been mentioned only because it has been relatively unknown until recently through revelations by the *New York Times*.

The National Reconnaissance Office (NRO) is an intelligence agency whose very existence has been classified top secret. It has an extraordinary budget of \$2 billion per year and manages to hide this primarily in Air Forces operations. It functions in such a manner that nothing about it is subject to open scrutiny.

The NRO's mission is to monitor international communications (like the NSA) and to oversee the operation of the nation's spy satellite system. Government officials have even refused to discuss the agency's name if it were brought up. How might the NRO's operations relate to UFO research?

Photo-reconnaissance satellites have advanced to such a degree that even individuals can be specifically identified from orbits one hundred miles up. If strange aerial activity were to be detected in space as has been done in the past by NORAD (see Chapter 1), a photo-reconnaissance satellite could be expected to be pressed into duty by taking high-resolution photos of the UFOs. Significant strong evidence for UFOs may currently exist in the NRO's files but accessibility would be virtually impossible under present security provisions. Such security could also protect an above-top secret version of Project Saint (see Chapter 13) in photographing UFO activity.

Let us summarize in detail our conclusions on the UFO subject. (We refer to the small percentage of total reports which are currently listed as genuine unknowns:

- 1) UFOs are a real, material, physical phenomenon, completely unidentifiable in conventional terms.
- 2) UFOs display intelligence of a very high order.
- 3) Granting that UFOs are real and intelligent, somebody is behind the phenomenon; that is, advanced biological life forms.
- 4) These life forms are here for a purpose. A "clear intent" has been demonstrated numerous times.

- 5) Their purpose at the present time is unknown but may be related to an extended surveillance of what might be termed a primitive, embryonic society.
- 6) The origin of the biological life forms is unknown, but the extraterrestrial hypothesis seems to be the most attractive explanation, although not the only one.
- 7) UFOs have overflowed U.S. military and other government facilities since World War II, as evidenced by official U.S. document releases from a variety of federal agencies.
- 8) This activity has extended to other nations, as evidenced by official U.S. government document releases.
- 9) UFO activity over some U.S. military/governmental facilities has been of such a sensational, dramatic nature that a definite threat to U.S. national security is considered as fact within the highest levels of government. (This scenario also applies to foreign governments.)
- 10) Documented UFO reports of national security significance have been and continue to be withheld, under tight secrecy regulations, from all but the most highly-placed government officials.
- 11) Despite tight secrecy regarding release of UFO documents, government officials most closely associated with UFO data of national security importance probably do not have a definite "answer" to the UFO problem, but they monitor the phenomenon in pursuit of an answer.
- 12) The monitoring procedure probably includes the use of unmarked helicopters as convenient vehicles of transportation to and from scenes of UFO and other related activity.

Part of why this book exists is to urge people with any knowledge of the events discussed here to contact us and fill in the missing details. Other events related to the subject matter of the book, but not mentioned, would also be of great interest.

We would like to stress that no information is being sought other than UFO data. Sensitive material about the defense of the United States, military and government personnel, and the internal functions of federal agencies is not of interest to the authors. The protection of such details is fully and understandably recognized under the Freedom of Information Act. Since the government has declared many times that UFOs are no threat to national security, we feel fully justified in asking that data about UFOs be released and put out before the public for a fair and open-minded assessment of what is one of the most intriguing topics in recorded history.

In particular, we solicit any information on the existence of long-rumored movie films on UFOs—some in general documentary format, others showing actual footage of UFOS filmed by people on the ground and by pilots in the air, equipped with aerial cameras. Additionally, a document written in the summer of 1948 by Air Force Project Sign personnel entitled "Estimate of the Situation" is sought. Although the original document was supposedly destroyed in 1948, copies were known to exist years later.

The "Estimate of the Situation" is a curiosity of UFO history. The

document concluded that UFOs were interplanetary, according to those few individuals who saw it, including the former head of Project Blue Book in the early 1950s, Captain Edward Ruppelt. Ruppelt stated that at least one copy, legal-sized with a black cover stamped "Secret," survived its original destruction order. Since then, all attempts to locate the document have failed. The Air Force's responses to such inquiries have been strangely contradictory.

One letter to a UFO researcher by the Air Force's Director of Legislative Liaison, Major General W. P. Fisher, said, "There has never been an Air Force conclusion that flying saucers were real and were interplanetary space ships. The alleged 1948 document mentioned in your letter is nonexistent."

Yet, in 1967, the Air Force's Chief, Civil Branch of the Office of Information's Community Relations Division, Lt. Colonel George Freeman, said:

Regarding the 1948 "Estimate of the Situation" the late Captain Ruppelt in his book, *The Report on Unidentified Flying Objects*, provides the answer. The Top Secret Estimation was working its way up to the higher echelons of the Air Force. It got to the late General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, then Chief of Staff, before it was "batted down." The General wouldn't "buy" interplanetary vehicles. The report lacked proof and the Estimate died a quick death. Some months later, it was completely declassified and relegated to the incinerator. I am sorry, but we have no copies of this document.

The "Estimate" obviously survived destruction by several accounts. Knowledge of its location would be of great historical importance.

We have tried to give a rational assessment of UFOs. Old questions have been answered and new ones have been raised. To be sure, UFOs have not been given a fair day in court, which is why the subject remains cloaked in rumor and ambiguity. Some scientists are aware of the challenge placed before us, but the scientific community at large must shoulder some of the blame for the way the UFO phenomenon has been treated. Scholars have descended upon UFO enthusiasts in righteous indignation, accusing them of promoting pseudoscience and misinforming the public to an almost irreversible degree. Indeed, some of the criticism is well-deserved. Serious UFO researchers were, for some time, a small minority in a subject dominated by religious fanatics, pseudointellectuals, and a variety of space explorers, whose alleged trips to "lush, green Venus" and the marvelous cities on the far side of the moon titillated millions.

Inevitably, the wheat is separated from the chaff and the true nature of a mystery manifests itself. This is what present-day UFO logists are promoting—a serious look at real events, not a 1980s version of "Earth vs. Flying Saucers" or "Invaders from Mars."

The U.S. government is convinced that UFOs are a serious matter. It is only through a concerted effort by the world's braintrust that UFOs can be dealt with effectively, almost surely leading to the revelation of new truths.

I would be extremely grateful if you could answer the following questions regarding the subject of Unidentified Flying Objects, in which we share a common interest:-

- (1) Is AS-2 now the sole recipient within the MoD for collating UFO reports from members of the public?
- (2) Which department within the MoD now handles reports from the military?
- (3) Is there a department within the MoD where all reports (i.e. from the public, police, military, civilian pilots etc.) are collated and analysed?
- (4) How many reports from the defence services of the United Kingdom have been received by the MoD between 1959-1984? I realize that this is a tall order, but wish to point out that for the period June 1957-June 1958 a figure of 54 reports (from military sources) was confirmed in the House of Commons by Mr Charles Orr-Ewing, the then Under-Secretary of State for Air, on 10 June 1958. I therefore assume that such figures can be made publically available.
- (5) DS-8 has repeatedly stated that all reports of UFOs received by the MoD prior to 1962 have been destroyed. "If there had been any evidence or important papers the records would have been retained," I was told in November 1980 by Section 40 (Your ref: D/DS8/75/2/1J). Since I have now obtained a number of Air Ministry reports prior to 1962 from the Public Records Office, may I assume that the MoD's assertion is demonstrably untrue, and that I am now in possession of "important papers"?

The Department could not justify the expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond the pure defence interests.

We have to recognise that there are many strange things to be seen in the sky, but we believe there are adequate explanations for them. They may be satellite debris re-entering the earth atmosphere, ball lightning, unusual cloud formations, meteorological balloons, aircraft lights, aircraft at unusual angles or many other things. There is certainly no evidence that "alien spacecraft" have landed on the planet. Although we have not carried out our own studies, we are aware of independent studies into the UFOs, notably by the University of Colorado published in 1969. This concluded that 90% of all UFOs reported could be plausibly related to ordinary phenomena.

I am sorry that you might find this reply somewhat disappointing, however I enclose details of 3 magazines which publish articles on UFOs and the address of the British UFO Research Association. I do not know whether any of these will be able to help you, but it may be worth writing to them.

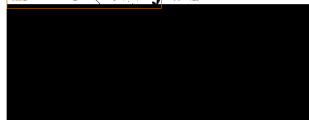

Thank you for your letter of 25 February 1985, addressed to Section 40 who, as I believe you now know, has left this division (now Sec(AS)). I am sorry that I have not been able to reply before now. Thank you also for sight of the extracts from your proposed book.

In his letter of 20 March 1984, Section 40 explained the MOD's position regarding Colonel Halt's reports on events near RAF Woodbridge in 1980, and I have little to add to the views expressed. I know from your letter that you are well aware of the limited extent of the MOD's interest in the subject. Nonetheless, there are, perhaps, one or two points which I should make. Firstly, whilst I cannot, of course, comment on the proportion of UFO sightings which are not reported, I can assure you that those which are reported to local police forces and to the Civil Aviation Authority should all be passed on to this division of the MOD. We treat all these reports seriously in case they show anything of defence interest. However, we have never found any reason to believe that, in the defence context, such reports warrant more detailed research. Equally, since our interest extends only as far as defence of the UK, there has never been any formal liaison with other Governments.

Turning to your specific questions about the Woodbridge incident, I can assure you that no unidentified object was seen on any radar recordings during the period in question, and that the MOD has no knowledge of the tape-recording or cine film you mention. As we have said in the past, the report sent by Colonel Halt was examined by those in the Department responsible for the air defence of the UK and since then there has been nothing to alter the view that there was no defence significance to the incident.

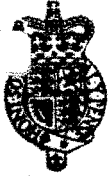

Thank you for your letter of 11 March 1985 addressed to the Secretary of State for Defence. We have looked into the sightings reported in your letter but have no records which would offer any explanation of what you saw. You may find it useful if I explain that the sole interest of the Ministry of Defence in reported sightings of Unidentified Flying Objects is to establish whether they have any bearing on the defence of the country.

There is no organization in the Ministry of Defence appointed solely for the purpose of studying reports of such objects, and no staff are employed on the subject full time. The reports we receive are referred to the staff in the Department who are responsible for the air defence of the United Kingdom, and they examine the reports as part of their normal duties. Unless there are defence implications we do not attempt to identify sightings and we cannot inform observers of the probable identity of the object seen. The Department could not justify the expenditure of public funds on investigations which go beyond the pure defence interests.

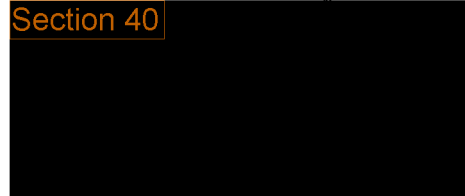

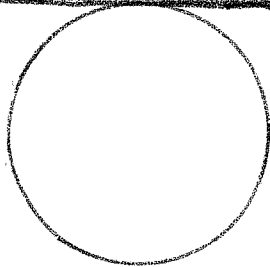
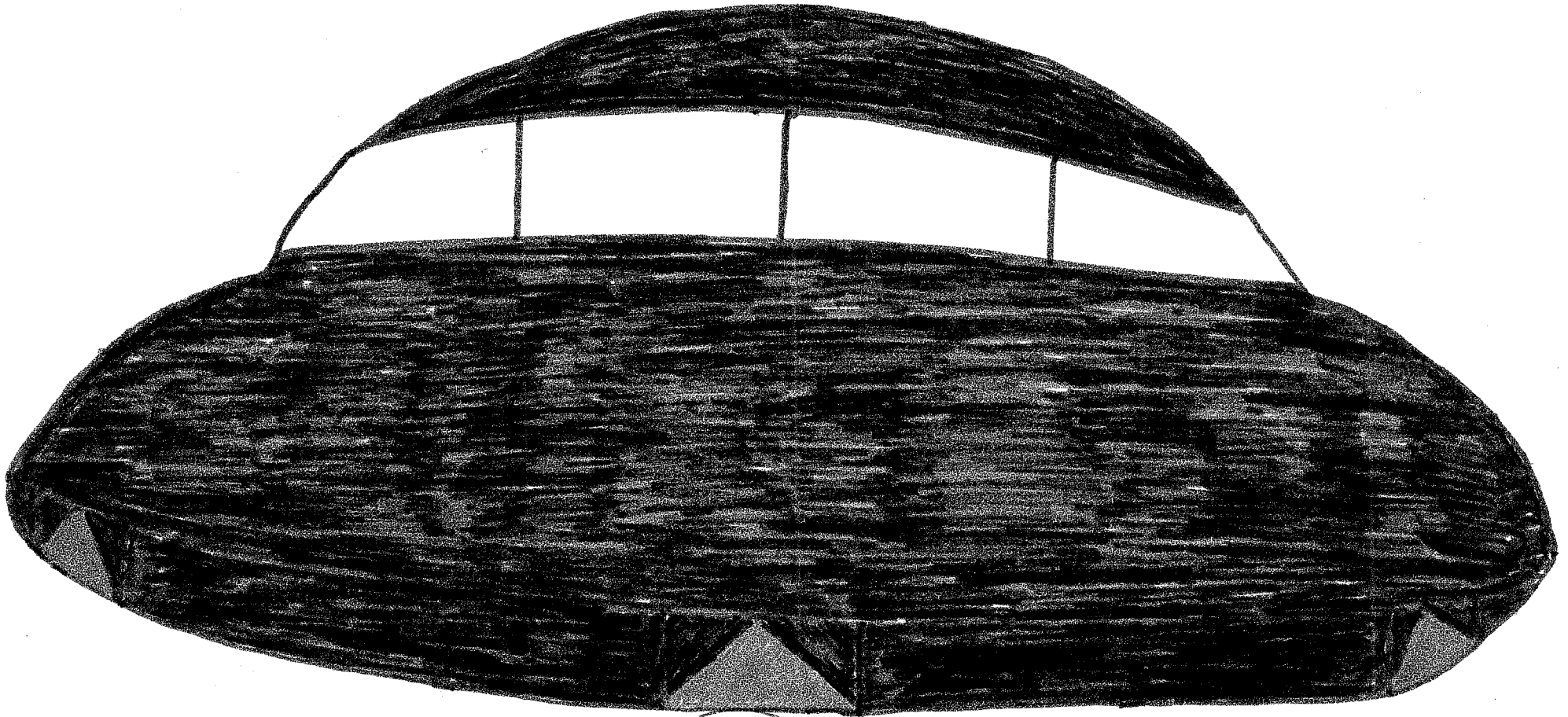
Later that night I photographed two white revolving white lights that seemed to be attached till two invisible objects sitting on the golf course.

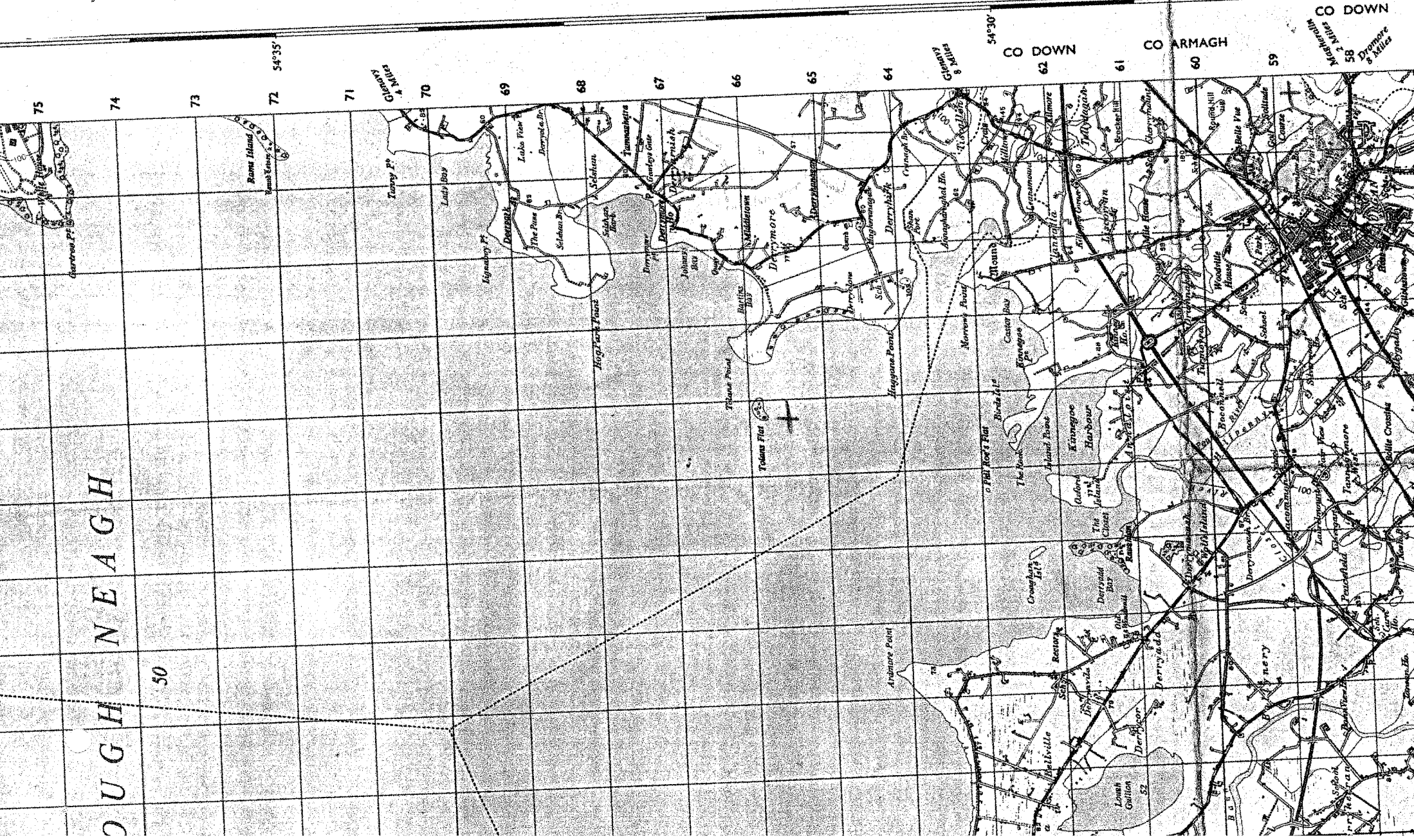

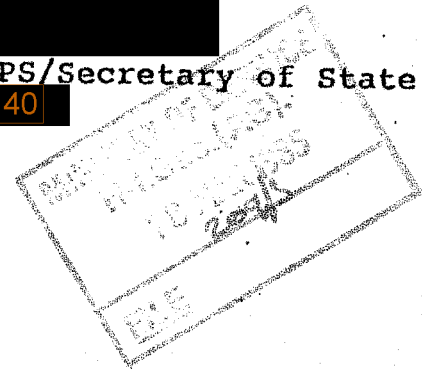

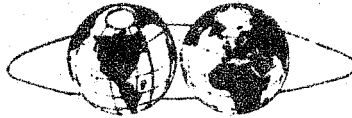

You may remember that I wrote to you in November 1983 about the reported occurrence of unusual events near RAF Woodbridge in December 1980. Your reply, D/DS8/10/209 of 20th March 1984, told me that the MOD saw no Defence significance in Colonel Halt's report of 13th January 1981. You suggested that the events reported by him probably reflected some entirely down-to-earth, but misperceived, phenomenon.

I am aware that DS8 has had several approaches on this matter from outside groups and individuals who possibly show more enthusiasm than judgement in the questions they press. I hesitate to place a further burden on the patience and courtesy of your Division. Nonetheless, there do remain some puzzling, and perhaps disquieting, features of this case on which I think it would be in the general interest to cast some further light.

I owe it to you to explain my interest. It lies in the following - not necessarily in the right order of priority !

First, as an ex-MOD chap, I have been asked from time to time by various bits of the media to comment on the Woodbridge affair. I have in fact done so on several occasions on local radio and on foreign television. One of the television programmes is now likely to be shown here before long and may excite some public interest. If I am invited to comment again, I would not wish to do so irresponsibly.

Secondly, I am publishing a book this June on the UFO phenomenon generally. My publishers are keen that it should say something about Woodbridge. I have already drafted a passage which reflects my own study of the case, and I am attaching to this letter the relevant extracts which deal with it. I do not, of course, expect you to comment on this (unless you wish to do so), but I feel it is no more than proper to give former colleagues some advance notice of what I am proposing to publish.

Thirdly, as the attached extract implies, I have come to the conclusion over the past year or so - somewhat reluctantly and by no means hastily - that something of importance (and something which is not illusory) underlies the persistent stream of reports of well authenticated occurrences, both in the UK and elsewhere, which can be loosely grouped under the UFO heading. Some of these reports reach the MOD from members of the public (and they doubtless also continue to do so from Service establishments as well); but a far larger number get no further than the local police, civil aviation authorities, or the amateur research groups. These occurrences may or may not prove to have any vital interest for Defence, and the Woodbridge case may or may not properly belong among them. But the sizable and persistent hard core of the more disquieting instances - particularly those in which there appears to be some degree of temporary interference with electronic equipment and/or minor damage to individuals and the environment -

seems to me to deserve closer and more expert attention in Whitehall than we are led to believe it gets at present. There is evidence that at least three other governments take the phenomenon seriously. A mass of documents released in the US under the American Freedom of Information Act shows a close and continuing interest by governmental agencies. The French agency GEPAN (Groupe d'Etudes des Phénomènes Aérospatiaux Non-identifiés) which was set up by the then French Minister of Defence in 1977 under CNES (Centre National d'Etudes Spatiales) remains in existence despite the heavy retrenchment in French government expenditure and continues to collect and analyse UFO reports country-wide. And there is a degree of recent evidence in the Soviet Press that the Russians take a close interest in the phenomenon through the Moscow Aviation Institute and (possibly) the National Academy of Sciences. Is it really the case that the British MOD takes no systematic interest (as distinct from dealing ad hoc with what are felt to be tiresome enquiries from the public) ? If there really is no systematic study of the phenomenon, viz. something in the nature of a small expert committee in Whitehall or the placing of responsibility on a designated and expert directorate in the MOD, should there not be ? Is there no liason with French and US agencies ?

I hope that you will feel able to comment on the three questions at the end of the preceding paragraph. I ask them, not in any spirit of contention, but because I believe that we cannot afford to ignore a persistent phenomenon which other countries appear to take seriously. It seems to me to deserve systematic study within a Defence context, even if only to dismiss it in the end as trivial. I think you will know that there are others, whose judgement is to be respected and whose experience qualifies them, who take a similar view, Lord Hill-Norton among them.



To return to the particular case of RAF Woodbridge, you may already be aware that television documentaries of the occurrence have been made by two foreign companies. The programme made by Cable News Network is now likely to be shown in this country before long. I have not yet seen the documentary in full, myself, but I understand from the organisation that they claim to have established a number of facts which are very much at odds with the view that Col. Halt and other USAF personnel merely misperceived some phenomenon with a wholly conventional explanation (the Orfordness lighthouse, a satellite re-entry, a bright meteor). The following are among the more important points which Cable appear to be claiming.

1. Col. Halt adheres to the report of 13th January 1981, of which the MOD has a copy. He also confirms the authenticity of a tape-recording made by himself on site on the night of 29th December 1980 which tallies with paragraph 3 of his report (and in some respects goes beyond it).
2. Other witnesses to the events of 27th and 29th December 1980 reported by Halt have made sworn depositions.
3. Although not reported by Halt, there was an unusual occurrence near RAF Woodbridge on the night of 26th December 1980. An unidentified object in an area of Rendlesham Forest sufficiently worried USAF personnel to cause them to seek help from the Suffolk police. Police officers at Woodbridge (the village) have confirmed that they responded to this call, albeit without establishing unambiguous evidence at the site of the 'sighting' claimed by the USAF contingent which had been sent to investigate it.
4. There is evidence that RAF Watton (and perhaps other radar installations) had radar traces on at least one of the three nights in question of an unidentified aerial object in the area of RAF Woodbridge/Rendlesham Forest.
5. There is evidence that a 16mm cine-film was made at the site by USAF personnel on 29th December 1980 and was referred for study by the USAF headquarters in Germany.

In your letter to me of 20th March 1984 you said, "The Department satisfied itself at the time that there was no reason to consider that the alleged sightings had any Defence significance". You added, "I can assure you ... that there is no evidence of anything having intruded into British airspace and 'landing' near RAF Woodbridge". In the light of the research which Cable News Network claim to have undertaken I hope you will not think it unreasonable if I invite your replies to the following questions.

1. What steps were taken by the MOD when Col. Halt's report of 13 January 1981 was received in the Department ? In particular:-
 - a. What consultations took place with the USAF ?
 - b. Was any on-site investigation made by MOD or British Service personnel ?
 - c. Was any enquiry made to RAF Watton or other radar establishments for possible traces of an unidentified occurrence in the Suffolk area on the nights of 26/27, 27/28 and 29/30 December 1980 ? If so, what was the outcome ?
2. Is the MOD aware of the tape-recording which Col. Halt claims to have made on 29 December 1980 (and of which alleged copies are now in the hands of several members of the public) ? If so, what interpretation does the MOD place on this recording ?
3. Is the MOD aware of the cine-film allegedly made on site on 29th December 1980 ? If so, what interpretation is placed upon it ?
4. In the light of the answers to these questions does the MOD adhere to its view that nothing unknown or untoward intruded into British airspace in late December 1980 ? Is this also the view of the USAF ?
4. If this does indeed remain the MOD's considered conclusion, does the Department feel any disquiet at an apparent and persistent misperception of presumably innocent phenomena by USAF personnel based at an important installation in British territory and charged with military tasks the mismanagement of which might have grave consequences ?

I regret burdening you with these questions and with those contained in my sixth paragraph above. But I think they are potentially important, and I doubt that we have heard the last of them.

A SECRET PROPERTY - Page 1 of extract

Yet the phenomenon is undoubtedly under study in at least some back rooms...
That air of governmental indifference is an assumed one...

From documents released under the Freedom of Information Act in America we have undeniable evidence of a keen interest in the phenomenon on the part of the CIA, the National Security Agency, and other government departments. The facts are meticulously documented in a recent book, CLEAR INTENT by Lawrence Fawcett and Barry J. Greenwood (Prentice-Hall, 1984). We know that the French government remains interested: CEPAN continues in existence despite ~~sh~~ingeing cuts imposed on many departments by the Mitterand government a little while ago. (though we can only speculate on what use is made of its material by its directing body, the French equivalent of NASA). We know that the Russian Academy of Sciences regularly buys a surprising number of each issue of the most prestigious British journal on the UFO phenomenon (though its importation by ordinary Soviet citizens is forbidden!). We must strongly suspect - to put it no higher - that the British Ministry of Defence is taking a close interest in the phenomenon. As a former Ministry of Defence official I sincerely hope so! Anything which can enter and leave British airspace with impunity, land on British territory, leave confusing traces in our radar system, interfere with electrical and electronic devices, register itself on film and out-manoeuvre British aircraft (and I think there is evidence for all these things) must surely be of more than passing interest to a government department which is charged with our defence. I hope I shall be thought to compliment rather than criticize my former colleagues and present acquaintances in Whitehall if I ruefully congratulate them on the suave effrontery with which they pretend to be taking no notice of the stranger occurrences reported to them!

It grieves me to add that I think we have some evidence of direct and deliberate mis-statement on the part of the Ministry of Defence in at least one important case, the occurrence of strange events on two nights in late December 1980 in a part of Rendlesham Forest adjoining the USAF Base at RAF Woodbridge. We have the evidence for these events in a statement signed on 13th January 1981 by the then Deputy Base Commander, Lt.Col. (now Brigadier General) Charles Halt of the United States Air Force. This statement was not made public until 14th June 1983 when - following persistent pressure by the authors of CLEAR INTENT (see above) - its release was authorised by the USAF in America under the Freedom of Information Act. Whether this release was an inadvertency at rather low level in the USAF we may never know: despite the Freedom of Information Act, American agencies have proved perfectly capable (and often no doubt with good reason) of sustaining objections in the courts to the release of documents. There is certainly some evidence that Halt was not consulted about the release and that it somewhat dismayed him. Be that as it may, however, the letter of release included the extraordinary statement that the USAF had disposed of its own copy of Halt's report but that: "... through diligent inquiry and the gracious consent of Her Majesty's government, the British Ministry of Defence and the Royal Air Force, the US Air Force was provided a copy for you." The Ministry of Defence have confirmed in reply to a Parliamentary Question tabled by Major Sir Patrick Wall, MP, that a copy of Halt's report was indeed received by them. Yet we are told in a recent book - SKYCRASH by Brenda Butler, Dot Street and Jenny Randles (Neville Spearman Ltd., 1984) that the Ministry of Defence had flatly denied any knowledge of supposed ^{EVENTS} in Rendlesham Forest when enquiries were made to them in 1981, following strong local rumours of an extraordinary occurrence.

The Ministry of Defence may well have good reasons for withholding information about the Rendlesham incidents. As a former Defence official, I would not wish to press questions on any matter touching national security; and in those circumstances I would not be surprised if questions pressed by others were met by a refusal to reply. But I cannot help feeling that it is something of a lapse from the usual standards of a government department to issue a direct mis-statement. Concealment is one thing (and is often justified), false denial is quite another.

The RAF Woodbridge case of December 1980 strikes me as one of the most interesting and important of recent years, anyway in this country - perhaps the most significant military sighting (or supposed sighting) since the celebrated events of 13th/14 August 1956 near RAF Bentwaters and RAF Lakenheath (both of which are, by an entertaining coincidence, quite close to Woodbridge in that much-haunted county of Suffolk). Those who wish to study the Bentwaters/Lakenheath incidents will find descriptions of them in the books mentioned below. The RAF Woodbridge case is described at length in SKYCRASH (see above). It is also to be the subject of several radio and television programmes. Much was said about it in THE NEWS OF THE WORLD in 1983, mainly in its issues of 2nd and 9th October. Alone in Fleet Street, the then editor, Derek Jameson decided to give space to Halt's report; and Keith Beabey of THE NEWS OF THE WORLD pursued it vigorously in the face of the kind of ridicule which the "quality" newspapers seem to find it expedient to attach to this mysterious and persistent phenomenon.

It was the Woodbridge case which prompted me to take up a long-shelved intention to write a "UFO book". I have chosen, quite deliberately, to cast it as a piece of fiction. Fiction allows the imagination to range widely, and it seems to me that this can sometimes be productive in turning better-qualified minds to new aspects of a problem. A false hypothesis can often have as much heuristic value as a good one! It does, at the least, enable serious researchers to consider - and properly test - a new idea, even if only to throw it away when it fails to stand up to scrutiny. I am far from being wedded to the hypothesis on which A SECRET PROPERTY is based. The main object of the book is to entertain, and to do so in the form of a thriller. It most certainly does not reflect any inside knowledge or startling revelation on the part of a former Defence official. (If I had such knowledge, the Official Secrets Act would forbid me to reveal it!).

Dear

I will skip the introductions, as we both know who one another is. I apologise for placing several requests in one letter, but trust that you will bide with me.

1: RAF Woodbridge 27 December 1980: I realise we have discussed this matter at length, but a great deal of vital new information has come our way since concluding our book "SKY CRASH" last year. I would like to pose some specific questions to you:-

(a) What is your position regarding the involvement of the British civilian police in the taking of photographs of the landed object? We have excellent evidence for this, and presume that the British police would advise the MoD. If not, then why not?

(b) You have doubtless seen the extensive "smear" campaign being successfully waged by the British media (under whose guidance I wonder?). Eg "The Guardian", 5 Jan 1985. On this thesis a gross mistake was made (a lighthouse seriously misperceived, background radiation levels viewed as sinister, rabbit holes regarded as something else). Not only that, but this "evidence" was supported by the US deputy base commander and the UK base commander, whom 17 days later could surely have figured some of these cock-ups out. This grand blunder is then perpetuated over the course of years; the UK commander remains in charge, the two base commanders (US), at the time and subsequently, endorse all the evidence (we have it in writing) and the deputy commander gets promoted to base commander. Now regardless of what sort of MoD investigation into these events was (or was not) conducted this leaves one with a serious dilemma. If the "lighthouse/normal radiation/rabbits" theory is correct then all your strategic commanders at a NATO base (for which you certainly have jurisdiction) are incompetent dodos who might be expected to misinterpret Orford Ness lighthouse for an invading MIG jet, not have a clue whether they have been irradiated by an exploding neutron bomb, and waste a great deal of the war filling in bomb potholes made by the Rendlesham Forest wildlife! I think the people of this country might be rather worried if that were the case. And frankly, unless you can help us refute this lighthouse nonsense then we are just going to have to make sure the British people see this interesting paradox. Believe me we have people in the right place to make sure this happens! Comments please.

(c) Since it is vital to the theory that the date not be 27 December 1980, but 26 December, then have you any way of confirming or denying the real date? Of course the Halt memo to you says the 27th, but that is dated 17 days later and suggests that he just made yet another mistake. (In view of such a plethora of errors how could Halt possibly have merited a base commandership?) However, some sort of action must have occurred between 26/27 December and the 13 January memo; either at your end, elsewhere in government, or at the base. The correct date would have been essential to confirm or refute options (eg a spy-plane mission). So I am sure there are ways you can look into this. I am not asking for details - just a statement regarding your level of confidence in the Halt memo dating.

Ra²⁰ies...2

2: We are investigating an incident dated 2 August 1984 from Salisbury Plain, Wilts. This occurred at 23.00 BST and was reported by [Section 40] and family, of Bedfordshire. We have received excellent cooperation from them and from PC [Section 40] of the Mitchin police, who investigated the matter at their request on 3 August. The matter was reported to the MoD, as both witness and police affirm. We recognise that certain aspects of the case fit a military manouvre that was going on that night; although some puzzles remain. It would help us in our resolution of this case if you could offer any data you have at your end. I know you regard things as confidential, and that you have decided not to release data generally. I respect the reasoning for this. But here I am making a specific request with the backing of police and witnesses, so there is no real purpose in confidentiality. Any records you have for that event/or potentially related events on the same night would help.

3: Finally I am making a request for any information you may have regarding an incident which occurred around midnight on the night of 23-24 August 1984 in the vicinity of Ipswich. We have details of an in-flight collision between an aircraft and something (which at this point we have no reason to suspect is UFO related). The airport involved and the investigators of the accident have been helpful. But it would be useful to have any data which the MoD have at their disposal on this affair. If you have any reports of sightings around this time it would be interesting to know; although in this case there is more than a fair chance the source was not a UFO-related phenomenon.

I address my communication direct to [Section 40] or the current section head of DS 8, rather than [Section 40]. I know [Section 40] courteously asserts that he is the person we should communicate with, but with all due respect we have good reason for in this instance not doing so. No offence on [Section 40] intended. I am sure he is very able at his job. And our reasons for contacting [Section 40] direct are not personal.

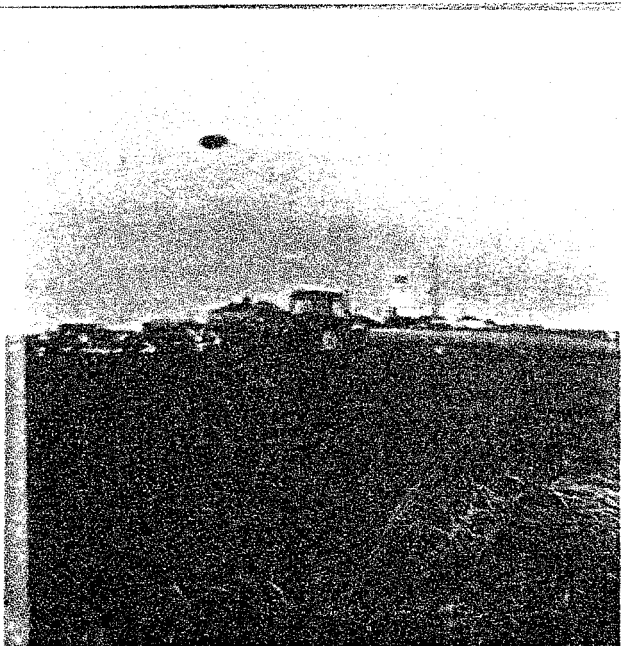

Dear Section 40

I am writing in response to the letter recieved, dated 9 March 1982. As my infomation can no longer be considered as classified, I am now able to pass it onto you.

The letter that I sent to you, was only a small fraction, of the work that I had done on U.F.O. research. I was in fact in physical and psychic contact with an E.T. called Algar; whom I have had a relationship with since 1958, and it continued until 1981, when he was killed by another race of beings.

So to start at the beginning. I was seven years old, when I first saw traces left by a U.F.O. At the time I lived at Section 40 Glasgow. One Saturday, morning I had the impression that I should go out to the back, so much it was like an obsession(DIA 1). When I did go to the back, I found three indentations in the ground, they were in triangular formation. Each indentation was the same distance from it's partner, and they gave the impression that three large ball bearings had been dropped there. My first thought was that it was a U.F.O.; but I had never ever heard of U.F.O. or flying saucers, and yet the thought seemed normal to me, as if I used it on a regular basis. I told my father, who was rather quick at ridiculing and poo-pooing what I had told him. Anyway, a couple of months later, the first visit came from E.T.s, which was followed by a few more. They were of green gas which solidified when it came in from the passage way, which led to the toilet under, the door, and the wardrobe, which was situated against the door preventing it from opening. (DIA 2). There was one which was green and very large, that had eyes all over it, this one came three times. Then there was a woman with very sharp features, and what looked like fat worms sticking out of her head, where the hair should be. The last visit from the large green thing happenend when my father tried to get into the bedroom, as usual I was against the door, withffear. My father was at the time, fairly atheletic and no weakling, but no matter how hard he pushed he could not get the door open; not until the large green thing had gone.

1959, I found semi-transparent, slug like creatures crawling up the wall on the opposite side of the back. At this period of time I was in with a band, especially, the lead singer Section 40 and the drummer [redacted]. Both of them saw the creatures. The end product of this was that we armed ourselves and started to shoot them, we used .22 air rifles at a range of fifty to seventy five yards. When we did kill them, they fell off the wall and took on the appearance of cement that had got damp and solidified. Quite often they would fall and appear to go through the ground leaving no trace at all. One day we found that we were unable to hit our targets, and we could see our shots pass through the targets, by the ricochete off the wall, and after that we found that it was a waste of time trying to shoot them, so we gave up as a bad job. (DIA 3).

I was stationed at Keogh Barracks - Sept. 1968 April 1969 - when I was in the R.A.M.C., and Algar was with me then, even in spite of other E.T.s going away. A strong bond was forming of friendship and trust. One incident involves telepathic contact, and that occurred, following an incident when I was unusually indecisive. It was when I was on guard duty, and I was asked if I would like the first tour, to which I normally said yes, but thank God I eventually declined, for the first one was critically injured with the pick axe he was carrying. It was on the basis of safety, that we were to go in pairs from then on, and it was under these conditions that I got a telepathic link with Algar. We were returning to the guard house after our patrol, and to our right was a field, which had lighting only on the road on which we were walking. Apart from the lighting mentioned, the field was totally dark. I heard only what I can describe as a whisper, and it was saying that someone was creeping about in the field, to the front and slightly right. I immediately looked in that direction but saw nothing. But as I had heard this whisper several times before, and it had proved accurate, I decided to follow it through. I sent my partner around the camp museum, which was situated about twenty yards behind us, and I went to a lamp, and prepared to go into the field. It was at this point, when someone came out of the dark. I then called my partner and after a few heated words, I convinced the stranger who had no i.d. on him, to accompany us to the guard house. (DIA 4).

The real work began in May, 1979, when my wife and I formed a team, and together we collected such data as:- what the different coloured lights on a U.F.O. means, how they manage to evade radar, what fuel they use and what it looks like, I have been to their bases which were in Wirral and Cheshire. There was a curious incident which took place over the river Mersey, by the Wallasey Town Hall. There were six U.F.O.s flying at speed up and down the river, when I noticed a black one was trying to manoeuvre the other six. Unfortunately, the black one was shot down, it hit the water in front of the Town Hall. As I was watching, the front end of the U.F.O. hit the water, then the whole U.F.O. disappeared; leaving the water to splash, as if done by an invisible entity.

In June, 1981, Algar, was ready to approach the government in person. I was over the moon with pride to be used as the medium between alien race and our own race. Unfortunately, another race of E.T. decided to attack Algar, and his team of scientists, and killed Algar and several members of his team. That of course was that. It was not until October, 24 1981, that they sent some one to dominate me by using threats, and eventually attacking me, the E.T. died during his attack on me. Since there have been four responses to my telepathic messages sent out, but two of those contacts have been lost. But of the two who are still in contact, one is a woman, but I am unable to give you her name. The other is a male and his name is Malcben, he says he comes from the Milky Way, and that his planet is called Platone.

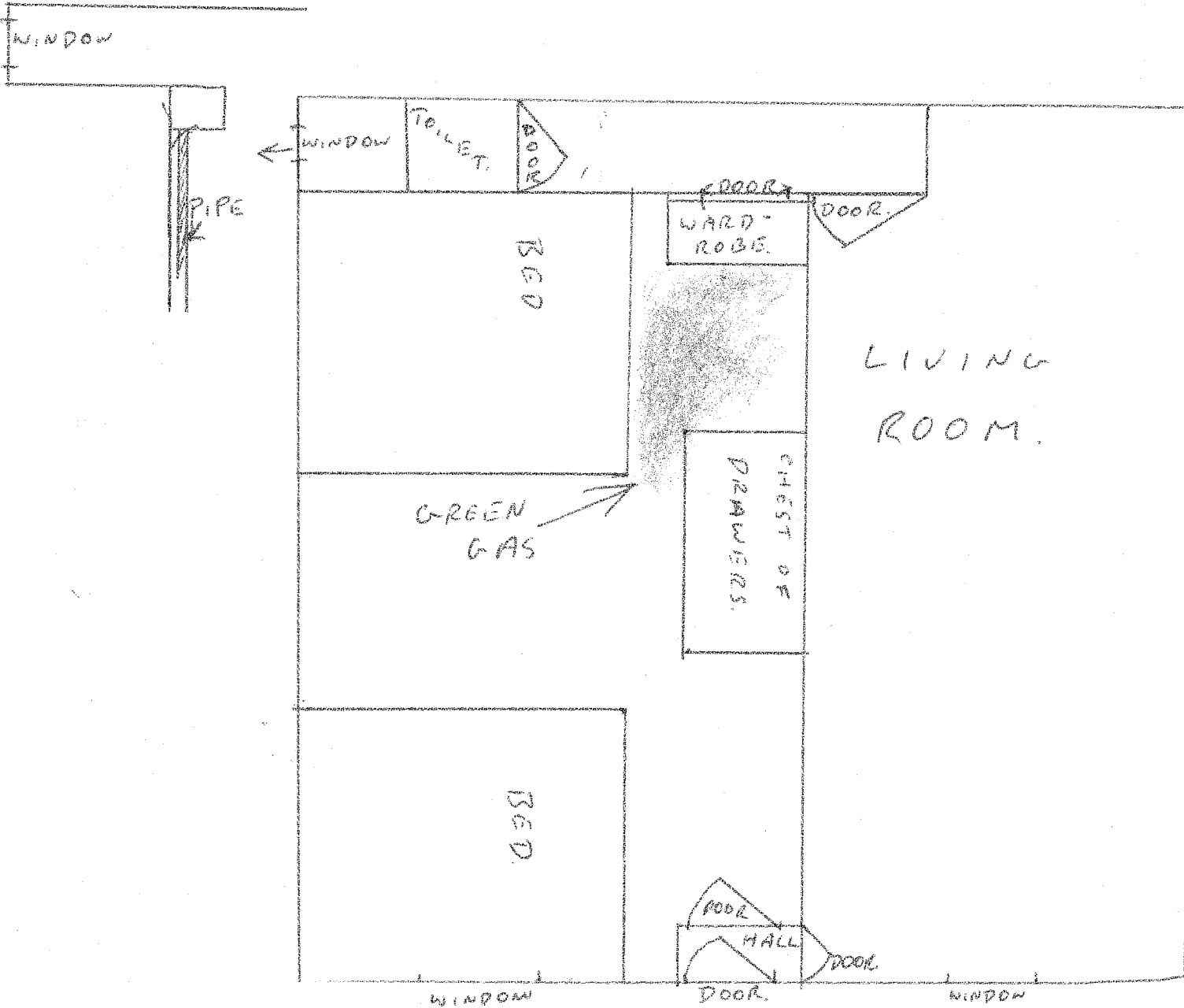
